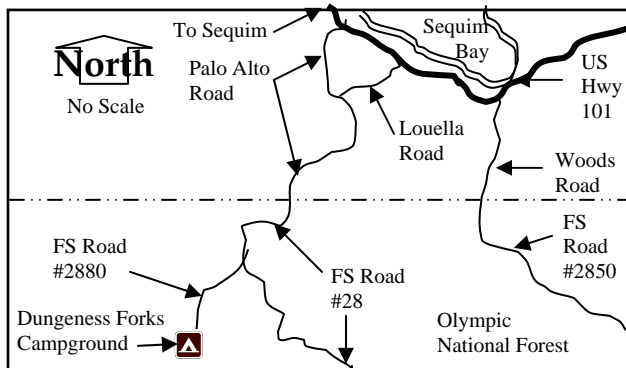

ACCESS: Travel US Highway 101 north to Sequim Bay State Park. Turn left across from State Park in front of fire station on Louella Road. Drive 1 mile to Palo Alto Road. Turn left and drive 4 miles to FS Road #2880, turn right and drive 1 mile to campground.

FEE: Regular \$10.00 camping fee covers two licensed passenger vehicles and a maximum of eight people. (50% reduced fee with Golden Age/Access & Interagency Senior/Access passes.) **The two vehicle rule includes any combination of the following:** passenger cars, trucks, and/or recreation vehicles (NOTE: boat and recreation trailers are not considered passenger vehicles). An additional \$5.00 fee is charged for each passenger vehicle over the limit. No more than 8 people per campsite.

Maximum stay is 14 days. Pets must be leashed. Season lasts from May 1-September 30.

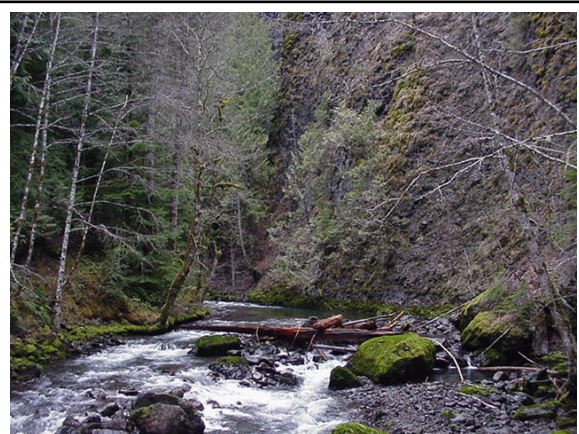


FACILITIES: There are 10 campsites that will accommodate tents. **Trailers and motorhomes are not recommended due to steep one lane unpaved road access.** Well water (please check current condition report for availability of water), tables, fire rings and vault toilets are available. Elevation is 1000 feet. Please pack out your garbage and leave a clean campsite.

SETTING: Campground is located at the fork of the Dungeness and Graywolf Rivers and is a shaded, forested area with evergreen conifers.

OPPORTUNITIES: Camping, fishing and hunting are possible. Nearby hiking trails within 10 miles of campground include Graywolf #834, Upper and Lower Dungeness #833, Royal Creek #832 and Tubal Cain #840.

PASS REQUIRED: A Northwest Forest Pass, Golden Age/Access Pass, or Interagency Pass is required on all vehicles parked at most trailheads. Day & Annual Passes are available at FS offices and vendors, but not available at trailheads.
