healthfinder® is an award-winning Federal health Web site developed by the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion (ODPHP), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). healthfinder® links to carefully selected health information and Web sites from government agencies, nonprofit organizations, and universities.

healthfinder® supports the goals of HHS Secretary Thompson's *Steps to a HealthierUS* initiative, including supporting behavior changes, encouraging healthier lifestyle choices, and reducing disparities in health care. This new section of the site delivers reliable health information to Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and other Pacific Islanders on key issues affecting these populations. It brings together multilingual information in Chinese, Hmong, Khmer, Korean, Laotian, Samoan, Thai, Tongan, and Vietnamese. Intermediaries, caregivers, or patient advocates searching for health information on behalf of individuals more comfortable in their native language will find helpful resources here.

ODPHP partnered with the White House Initiative on Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders, the Office of Minority Health (HHS), and the American Public Health Association Asian Pacific Islander Caucus, and conducted interviews with many national and community organizations to identify and improve access to health information for Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and other Pacific Islanders.

- b. Choose a letter from the A-Z list to see more topics that start with that letter. For example, if you are interested in "exercise," choose the letter "e."
- c. Type a topic into the **search box**
