ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT FOR NEW CAVE AND KARST MANAGEMENT PLAN AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC REVIEW

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Superintendent Todd Suess announced today that Jewel Cave National Monument is soliciting public comments on an environmental assessment (EA) prepared for a new Cave and Karst Management Plan. The plan was written to establish and formalize specific direction and appropriate policies for science-based management of the cave and karst resources of Jewel Cave National Monument. The EA's comment period runs until September 7.

Superintendent Suess said, "In this EA we are looking at two alternatives. One would be to continue using our current, mostly informal, policies. Our preferred alternative would result in clearly written policies that provide for better management of cave and karst resources, greater public access, and limited use of herbicides for noxious weed control, based on the local geology, hydrology, and soil conditions. It important to control the weeds, but we want to ensure that herbicides do not enter the cave ecosystem."

Planning for this EA began in April 9, 2002, with a notice requesting public input regarding alternatives or issues related to the proposal. Initial public scoping meetings were conducted between then and July 25, 2002. Additional meetings have been held with local caving organizations and the National Speleological Society in 2002-2005, and in July 2007.

"It's been a long process," Suess said, "but we're excited about the changes that will be made. The plan will be a great tool for managing and protecting cave and karst resources, and for providing more, and better, opportunities for the visiting public."
