#### CURRENT SITUATION

Numbers Affected

• As of January 8, according to information received from host country governments and U.N. reports, more than 159,000 people have been reported dead and more than 18,000 remain missing as a result of the tsunami. As of January 7, OCHA reports that more than 1.1 million people have been displaced throughout the region.

# International Response

 As of January 8, international pledges for humanitarian relief efforts total more than \$5 billion, according to international media reports.

# Indonesia Update

- According to the U.N., Medan has become a critical hub for emergency relief activities, as an estimated 100,000 internally displaced persons (IDPs) have relocated there from Aceh Province.
- On January 8, the overland convoy organized by USAID/OFDA partner the International Organization for Migration (IOM) reached Meulaboh in Aceh Province delivering urgently needed humanitarian supplies. IOM's first convoy from Jakarta to Medan will depart January 10, carrying water, food, clothing, shelter materials, and medical and household supplies.
- On January 7, the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) in Banda Aceh reported that
  OXFAM has nine rapid assessment teams in the province. According to OXFAM, the city-supplied water utility is
  operating at approximately 20 percent of pre-disaster capacity. Lack of adequate sanitation remains a major health
  concern within all displaced camps and assembly points, according to the USAID/DART.
- USAID implementing partner Mercy Corps has established an office in Meulaboh and is working with the Government of Indonesia to coordinate activities, including plans to distribute food, provide basic health and sanitation services, and establish a cash-for-work clean-up program. Mercy Corps reports that water distribution is a priority concern in Meulaboh, as the town is currently relying solely on bottled water.
- According to the January 8 U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) report, the U.N. World Food Program (WFP)
  distributes 15 metric tons (MT) of food commodities by helicopter every day to communities on the west coast of
  Indonesia.
- In the north-eastern districts of Indonesia, WFP reports that non-governmental organizations (NGOs) have registered a total IDP population of approximately 140,000. WFP will begin distribution of food commodities to this population on January 8. These IDPs are in addition to the approximately 120,000 previously identified in Banda Aceh and Aceh Besar.

# Sri Lanka Update

- According to the USAID/DART, the Sri Lanka Center for National Operations (CNO) reported that the Government of Sri Lanka, in coordination with WFP, the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF), and the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), has conducted food distributions of rice, sugar, dhal, and wheat flour throughout the country, particularly in eastern Sri Lanka.
- During a January 6 meeting, attended by the USAID/DART, the CNO identified the following immediate needs in displaced camps: 100 water storage tanks, 10 water trucks, 16,000 temporary toilet units, 3,200 urinals, and washing facilities. Needs in affected areas include: water trucks until repairs can be completed, repairs to toilets, and well cleaning—an estimated 11,470 wells, out of 12,130, must still be cleaned. According to the CNO, all urgent repairs to piped water systems have been completed. The USAID/DART is working with partners to fund activities, including the provision of water and construction of latrines.
- The Sri Lankan Ministry of Health (MOH) has dispatched assessment teams to numerous districts, and the results of rapid assessments will be available in the next 48 hours. MOH personnel have already determined that there is no longer a need for additional medical teams; however, due to the psychosocial effects inflicted by the disaster, there is a need for culturally-sensitive psychiatrists. USAID/OFDA has provided support to UNICEF for psychosocial programs, and the USAID/DART is exploring options for further contributions to the psychosocial needs response.

# Somalia Update

- USAID's Office of Food for Peace (USAID/FFP) is providing more than 50 percent of WFP commodities in Somalia. WFP immediately re-directed food assistance to tsunami-hit communities when the disaster struck and has three teams in place in affected areas. WFP is currently meeting the needs of more than 15,000 affected people with 277 MT of food. WFP is assessing the need for additional commodity contributions.
- On January 7, OCHA reported that an interagency assessment of Hafun, where approximately 5,000 people have been displaced, concluded that the situation in the town is critical. All water and sanitation facilities and 80 percent of houses have been destroyed, and there is a serious shortage of food and medicines. According to OCHA, security concerns, in addition to poor road infrastructure, are hindering relief agencies from conducting assessments of some of the tsunami-affected areas. UNICEF has begun to implement a large chlorination program and is currently conducting a measles vaccination campaign. In addition, UNICEF is providing family relief kits, oral rehydration salts, water bladders, and health supplies to affected areas.

#### UNICEF Urges Child Protection Measures

According to UNICEF, measures to protect vulnerable children in tsunami-affected areas from exploitation, abuse, and criminal trafficking are urgently needed. Registration of unaccompanied or lost children is ongoing in India, Sri Lanka, and Indonesia. In Aceh, 5 registration centers for children are operational in the camps and 15 more are planned to open in the next week. USAID/OFDA is providing \$1.5 million to UNICEF for child protection and psycho-social activities in affected areas in Indonesia and \$500,000 for similar programs in Sri Lanka.

# **USG ASSISTANCE**

# USAID Response

• To date, USAID has provided more than \$13.2 million to support region-wide emergency relief efforts. The USAID/DART and the U.S. military are conducting ongoing needs assessments and providing supplies and essential logistic support for the relief efforts and in affected areas countries. USAID/OFDA has dispatched ten flights of relief commodities to the region.

#### USG Food Assistance

 Food assistance from USAID and the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has already reached victims of the tsunami disaster. To date, the USG has provided nearly 27,000 MT of emergency food assistance valued at approximately \$25 million. Overseas pre-positioned stock facilitated the USG's rapid response to food needs of the affected populations an additional shipments are en route.

# Indonesia

• To date, the USG has provided more than \$22.2 million to support emergency relief activities and the provision of food, water, and relief supplies for affected populations in Indonesia. On January 8, USAID/Indonesia awarded an additional grant, using emergency funds provided by USAID/OFDA, for programs in Aceh Province. The grant was to CARE for \$256,000 to conduct water purification activities. USAID/OFDA also provided an additional \$41,500 to U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) for health surveillance, bringing USAID/OFDA assistance to WHO in Indonesia to \$291,500.

#### Sri Lanka

• To date, USAID has provided more than \$37.1 million in emergency relief assistance to Sri Lanka. On January 8, through USAID/Sri Lanka, USAID/OFDA provided \$513,897 to Save the Children/UK for shelter, water and sanitation, and emergency relief activities.

# Department of Defense (DOD) Humanitarian Assistance

• As of January 7, more than 12,633 U.S. military personnel are involved in providing relief support in the affected region. Of the 1,792 military personnel currently on the ground, 1,196 are in Thailand, 257 are in Sri Lanka, 186 are in Indonesia, and 153 are in Malaysia. With 19 ships and 98 aircraft, the U.S. military has provided a total of 2,062,290 lbs of relief supplies, including 16,455 gallons of water, 433,840 lbs of food, and 1,454,200 lbs of relief supplies to the governments of Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and other affected nations as of January 7.

#### **BACKGROUND**

- A magnitude 9.0 earthquake on December 26, off the west coast of Northern Sumatra, Indonesia, triggered massive tsunamis that affected several countries throughout South and Southeast Asia, as well as Somalia, Tanzania, and Kenya in East Africa. Aftershocks from the December 26 earthquake continue to occur in the region.
- Based on initial findings of USG assessment teams and on the recommendation of Secretary of State Powell and USAID Administrator Natsios, on December 31, President Bush committed \$350 million toward earthquake and tsunami relief and recovery efforts. Dollar amounts in this Fact Sheet are part of the total pledge of \$350 million and refer to specific funding actions that have been committed and programmed. USAID/OFDA welcomes proposals from qualified humanitarian assistance organizations prepared to implement relief activities in response to the Indian Ocean Earthquake and Tsunami disaster.
