CURRENT SITUATION

Numbers Affected

• Estimates of the numbers of dead and affected from host country governments and international agencies continue to fluctuate. According to the best estimates received as of January 13, more than 150,000 are reported dead in all of the affected countries.

Indonesia Update

- On January 13, the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) attended a Disaster Management Center (DMC) meeting, co-chaired by the Government of Indonesia (GOI) Office of the Vice-President and the U.N. During the meeting, a senior GOI official expressed concern for the safety of international aid workers and advised that agencies in Aceh must register with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in order to obtain travel permits. According to the GOI, this measure is not expected to impede access or obstruct the delivery of aid as requests for travel outside Banda Aceh will be processed within 24 hours. The GOI also required that relief agencies report to the DMC in Jakarta information on the type and levels of support provided and areas where agencies are operational.
- International media continue to report that new GOI security measures will likely restrict the movement of relief workers. However, the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) welcomed the new procedures as necessary in enhancing security. The USAID/DART is closely monitoring the situation and reports that non-governmental organization (NGO) partners have had unhindered travel to date.
- On January 13, the USAID/DART met with USAID/OFDA implementing partner International Medical Corps (IMC). An advance team of seven physicians and three nurses arrived early this week to staff mobile clinics serving tsunami victims in Aceh Jaya and Aceh Besu. Two IMC physicians are traveling by boat with a team of local medical providers and supplies to treat and assess needs in Calang, especially to IDPs that remain cut off from assistance. Two other physicians are traveling with mobile health teams in the area of Aceh Besu. In addition, three nurses are assisting at the measles clinic established at the military hospital in Banda Aceh. According to IMC, medical needs in the area have shifted from immediate trauma care to convalescent care, rehabilitation, and public health surveillance.
- On January 13, the USAID-funded Malaria Emergency Technical and Operational Response (MENTOR) reported the first case of *P. falciparum* malaria in an NGO worker, and predicted an increase in malaria cases in the coming weeks. In response, the USAID/DART facilitated a U.S. military airlift of malaria prevention equipment and supplies from Jakarta to Banda Aceh on January 13.
- The USAID/DART reported that MENTOR, in partnership with the GOI Ministry of Health (MOH), plans to hire 200 staff to implement a malaria and dengue fever control program in Banda Aceh. The program will include

- standardization of drug treatment, residual spraying of homes, treatment of home water supplies for dengue vectors, and provision of impregnated tarps and medical supplies. In addition, the program will distribute the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) protocol for treatment to health units.
- On January 13, representatives from USAID, the MOH, WHO, and other U.N. agencies began a six-day
 interagency mission to assess evolving humanitarian needs along the west coast of Aceh Province. The U.S.
 military is providing the delegation with helicopter support and accommodations aboard the USS Abraham
 Lincoln.

Sri Lanka Update

On January 10, the USAID/DART met with NGOs regarding the prospective temporary shelter program. USAID-funded NGOs within the group agreed to establish a model size shelter with some flexibility for dimensions, materials, and flooring. Coordination on the shelter program is expected to prevent disparities in the provision of materials and facilitate logistical support.

India Update

- Based on assessments conducted on January 12 in Pallepalem and Krishnapalem villages in Andhra Pradesh State, the USAID/DART reported minimal damage to housing but noted that repair and replacement of boats is needed. In response to the need for boat repair and livelihood restoration, the Andhra Pradesh State Government is offering to pay 50 percent of the cost of repair/replacement of the boats. The other 25 percent will come from private bank loans and the final 25 percent will come from a World Bank micro-credit project.
- As of January 13, the USAID/DART reported that 35,962 persons remain in 106 relief camps on the Andaman and Nicobar islands. According to the USAID/DART, water supply has been restored in most of the islands with water supplied by tanker in a few locations. The USAID/DART reported no outbreaks of diarrhea or malaria.
- The USAID/DART reported that clearance of debris is a priority in Little Andaman Island. Buildings on this island are made of concrete and most collapsed during the tsunami.

Maldives Update

- On January 10, the USAID/DART met with the Maldivian National Security Service (NSS) who identified the three priority needs as water, cleanup of debris, and assistance with logistics/transportation. Currently, the Government of the Republic of Maldives (GORM) has adequate relief supplies but transport of the supplies to the islands has been difficult.
- In addition, the NSS identified a need for equipment such as bulldozers, backhoes, and excavators to remove debris. The NSS requires assistance to transport goods from the main airport in Male to the seven forward coordination centers (FCCs) that have been established as regional hubs for the storage and transportation of relief supplies. Three of the islands have airstrips and all locations have warehousing capability. These FCCs will serve Thaa, Meemu, Dhaalu, Raa, and Noonu atolls in the southern Maldives, where most of the damage occurred.
- The USAID/DART met with representatives from the U.N. Development Program (UNDP) and the U.N. Disaster Assessment and Coordination (UNDAC) team to coordinate response activities. UNDAC emphasized the need for excavation equipment, shelter supplies, hygiene kits, and cooking kits.

Somalia Update

On January 12, USAID's Famine Early Warning Warning Systems Network (FEWS NET) issued a trip report on
affected areas in the Puntland Region of northeast Somalia. According to FEWS NET, health concerns included
acute respiratory infection, eye sores, measles, and diarrhea. In addition, an outbreak of diarrhea and dysentery
was possible as a result of inundated latrines and contaminated shallow wells. The health situation was likely to
worsen due to the lack of medical facilities and emergency care in the majority of the affected areas.

USG ASSISTANCE

USAID Regional Response

• The USAID/DART and the U.S. military continue to conduct needs assessments and provide supplies and essential logistic support for the relief efforts in affected countries.

Indonesia

• To date, the USG has provided more than \$30.9 million to support emergency relief activities and the provision of food, water, and relief supplies for affected populations in Indonesia.

Sri Lanka

- To date, USAID has provided more than \$42.1 million in emergency relief assistance to Sri Lanka. On January 13, through funds already provided to USAID/Sri Lanka, USAID/OFDA awarded approximately \$3.2 million to GOAL for shelter, water and sanitation, and cash-for-work in affected districts. In addition, through funds already provided to USAID/Sri Lanka, USAID/OFDA awarded \$1 million to UNICEF for water and sanitation and emergency school kits ("schools in box") for affected areas.
- On January 13, USAID/OFDA provided \$4 million to USAID/Sri Lanka to support emergency grants for an integrated community rehabilitation, livelihoods, and micro-finance project for 30,000 families in affected areas.

- To date, USAID has provided more than \$3.1 million in emergency relief assistance to India. Department of Defense (DOD) Humanitarian Assistance
- As of January 13, more than 15,333 U.S. military personnel are involved in providing relief support in the affected region. Of the 2,628 military personnel currently on the ground, 1,423 are in Thailand, 618 are in Sri Lanka, 392 are in Indonesia, 187 are in Malaysia, and 8 in Bangladesh. With 25 ships and 94 aircraft, the U.S. military has delivered a total of 2,732, 517 lbs of relief supplies to the governments of Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Thailand, and other affected nations, including 12,644 gallons of water; 339,850 lbs of food; and 84,210 lbs of relief supplies in the last 24 hours.

BACKGROUND

- A magnitude 9.0 earthquake on December 26, off the west coast of Northern Sumatra, Indonesia, triggered massive tsunamis that affected several countries throughout South and Southeast Asia, as well as Somalia, Tanzania, and Kenya in East Africa. Aftershocks from the December 26 earthquake continue to occur in the region.
- Based on initial findings of USG assessment teams and on the recommendation of Secretary of State Powell and USAID Administrator Natsios, on December 31, President Bush committed \$350 million toward earthquake and tsunami relief and recovery efforts. Dollar amounts in this Fact Sheet are part of the total pledge of \$350 million and refer to specific funding actions that have been committed and programmed. USAID/OFDA welcomes proposals from qualified humanitarian assistance organizations prepared to implement relief activities in response to the Indian Ocean Earthquake and Tsunami disaster.
