KEY DEVELOPMENTS

- The U.N. Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) reports that official results of recently concluded interagency food security assessments in the Horn of Africa region are scheduled for release during the month of August, including the Somalia April to July *gu* assessment, the Ethiopia March to May *belg* assessment, and the Kenya January to August long rains assessment. Assessment results will help inform revisions to current emergency food requirements and beneficiary needs in the region.
- In early August, the U.N. Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) allocated \$30 million to help fund humanitarian programs in 12 countries severely affected by the global food crisis, including Djibouti, Eritrea, and Kenya.
- During the week of August 11, USAID/OFDA committed \$24 million for the regional and local purchase of nearly 30,000 metric tons (MT) of food assistance to support U.N. World Food Program (WFP) operations in Ethiopia and Somalia, targeting a combined total of an estimated 4 million beneficiaries. To date in FY 2008, the U.S. Government (USG) has provided nearly \$906 million in humanitarian assistance to Djibouti, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Kenya, and Somalia.

CURRENT SITUATION⁷

Djibouti

• In late July, the U.N. and the Government of Djibouti launched an appeal for nearly \$32 million over the next six months in response to the current food security crisis resulting from the combined effect of rising food prices, drought conditions, and border conflict with Eritrea.

• As of mid-July, FEWS NET reported high and extreme food insecurity conditions in most pastoral areas in Djibouti. An estimated 155,000 people in both rural and urban areas currently require emergency aid, and approximately 341,000 people, representing approximately half of the total population, are projected to require emergency nutrition and water assistance by the end of August, according to FEWS NET.

Ethiopia

- Malnutrition rates remain high in Oromiya and Southern Nations, Nationalities, and Peoples (SNNP) regions, with additional areas of moderate and acute malnutrition emerging in Afar, Amhara, Tigray, and Somali regions, according to OCHA. GFDRE-led Emergency Nutrition Coordination Unit (ENCU) data indicates an increase from 30,000 to 50,000 children receiving treatment for malnutrition in Oromiya and SNNP regions in recent weeks. However, reporting gaps persist that are contributing to an underestimation of total figures.
- In response to deteriorating food security conditions and delays in food assistance delivery in Somali Region, a special joint humanitarian coordination committee was established in mid-July to facilitate emergency response efforts. The committee is jointly chaired by the GFDRE and the U.N. Resident Coordinator/Humanitarian Coordinator and includes U.N., GFDRE technical ministry, non-governmental organization (NGO), and donor representatives.
- Due to commodity shortfalls, WFP reports that the cereal component of August food allocations has been reduced from 15 to 10 kilograms for the second consecutive month. As of August 12, the WFP shortfall for food assistance programs countrywide amounted to 216,600 MT, valued at approximately \$176 million.
- To date in FY 2008, USAID/FFP has provided more than 600,000 MT of food assistance to Ethiopia, valued at more than \$467 million. In addition, USAID/OFDA has committed nearly \$4 million for the local purchase of approximately 3,600 MT of food assistance to support WFP operations targeting an estimated 2 million beneficiaries.
- From August 13 to 17, USG HAT staff is visiting Djibouti to assess port and warehouse conditions and capacity to receive increased commodity shipments in response to the current crisis. Between 450,000 and 550,000 MT of combined USAID, GFDRE, and other donor food aid commodities are expected to arrive at the Port of Djibouti in the coming months, raising concerns for delays in offloading and transportation.
- The U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) has confirmed 2,536 cases of measles between January and July 2008. More than 2,000 cases have been reported in Oromiya Region alone. In the context of existing levels of critical malnutrition, humanitarian agencies note significant concern regarding a potential measles outbreak and its impact on vulnerable populations.

Kenya

- On August 11, FEWS NET released a report on the continuing spread of the small livestock viral disease *peste des petits ruminants* (PPR) across pastoral and agropastoral areas of northwestern Kenya. According to the Government of Kenya Arid Lands Resource Management Project (ALRMP), at least 15 million sheep and goats are at risk of contracting the disease in affected areas. In Turkana District alone, the goat mortality rate attributed to PPR increased from 16 to 25 percent over the past year.
- According to the ALRMP, livestock prices have declined by between 10 and 20 percent in PPR-affected areas since
 early 2008 due to the combined effects of PPR, poor rains, and reduced market access, while cereal prices have
 increased between 10 and 30 percent in pastoral areas over the same time period, negatively affecting terms of trade
 for pastoralists. More than 900,000 pastoralists and agropastoralists require humanitarian assistance across Kenya,
 according to OCHA.

Somalia

- According to FSAU, the number of people in need of emergency humanitarian assistance continues to increase in
 drought-affected areas of Somalia, including Hiran, Galgadud, and Bakool regions. Countrywide, the collective
 impact of rising food prices, civil insecurity, hyper-inflation, and water shortages are contributing to deteriorating
 humanitarian conditions and exacerbating food insecurity. FSAU anticipates that the number of individuals in need
 of livelihood support or emergency assistance will increase from the current 2.6 million individuals to as many as 3.5
 million people, representing half of the total population of Somalia, by the end of the year.
- Preliminary results from the joint FSAU and NGO April to July gu assessment indicate that overall crop production will be below normal. However, average rainfall amounts during the gu season in some areas north and east of Afgooye, Lower Shabelle Region, and above average rainfall amounts in Baidoa, Bay Region, have improved existing crops and led to some off-season planting opportunities. A final report of the gu assessment is scheduled for release August 22.
- As a result of recent contributions, WFP reported on August 14 that current shortfalls of emergency food assistance for August to December have been reduced from more than 67,000 MT to approximately 5,000 MT. During the week of August 11, USAID/OFDA committed nearly \$21 million for the regional purchase of 26,107 MT of maize to support WFP food aid operations targeting an estimated 2 million beneficiaries. In addition, USAID/FFP has provided more than 211,000 MT of food assistance, valued at more than \$197 million to date in FY 2008.
- The continued deterioration of security conditions in Somalia is resulting in new displacement and significantly undermining humanitarian response efforts. More than 95,000 people were displaced in Somalia during the month of July, including 10,000 residents displaced from Mogadishu due to insecurity and nearly 75,000 people displaced from Beletweyne, Hiran Region, following clashes between Ethiopian troops and armed opposition groups, according to the Office of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR).

- Between January and July, OCHA reported nearly 110 security incidents involving humanitarian staff or assets in Somalia, including the deaths of 20 aid workers, 18 abductions of humanitarian staff, of which 11 remain held hostage as of August 5, and 49 carjackings and/or attempted carjackings.
- On August 6, WFP announced that the Government of Canada will provide naval escorts for WFP shipments of
 emergency relief commodities to Somalia through September 27. The Canadian commitment represents a temporary
 solution to the long-term need for escorts in the region to ensure the delivery of the approximately 90 percent of WFP
 food assistance to Somalia transported by sea. Between November 2007 and June 2008, France, Denmark, and the
 Netherlands provided successive escorts for WFP ships.

USAID AND STATE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

- On May 21, 2008, U.S. Ambassador W. Stuart Symington issued a disaster declaration for Djibouti due to the effects of the drought. In response, USAID/OFDA has provided nearly \$500,000 to support an emergency response program for affected populations and provide therapeutic feeding for up to 25,000 acutely malnourished children. USAID/FFP has contributed 2,360 MT of emergency food assistance valued at approximately \$2.7 million, and State/PRM has provided \$120,000 in earmarked funds for Somali refugee assistance activities.
- On October 12, 2007, U.S. Chargé d'Affaires Jennifer A. McIntyre renewed the Eritrea disaster declaration in response to ongoing food and water insecurity. To date in FY 2008, USAID/OFDA has contributed more than \$3 million for nutrition and water, sanitation, and hygiene activities in drought-affected areas in Eritrea.
- On October 15, 2007, U.S. Ambassador Donald Y. Yamamoto reissued a disaster declaration in response to the ongoing complex emergency in Ethiopia. To date in FY 2008, USAID/OFDA has provided more than \$35.1 million for health, nutrition, agriculture and food security, and water, sanitation, and hygiene interventions targeting drought-affected populations in Amhara, Oromiya, Tigray, SNNP, and Somali regions. USAID/OFDA funds also support international coordination and information sharing among humanitarian actors operating throughout the country. USAID/FFP has provided more than \$467 million in food assistance to Ethiopia to date in FY 2008, including more than \$264 million in emergency food commodities and more than \$203 million in contributions to the GFDRE-managed PSNP. To date in FY 2008, State/PRM has provided more than \$8.3 million in earmarked funds for refugee assistance programs in Ethiopia.
- On January 3, 2008, U.S. Ambassador Michael E. Ranneberger declared a disaster due to the effects of election-related violence in Kenya. To date in FY 2008, USAID/OFDA has provided nearly \$11.3 million in humanitarian assistance targeting populations affected by the post-election turmoil, and a USAID/OFDA Early Recovery Team based in Nairobi continues to monitor conditions throughout western and northern regions. USAID/FFP has provided more than \$91 million in emergency and development food relief for pastoralists, internally displaced persons, and other vulnerable groups to date in FY 2008. State/PRM has contributed \$21.7 million in earmarked funds to support primarily Somali and Sudanese refugee populations in northern Kenya and humanitarian services for internally displaced Kenyan populations to date in FY 2008.
- On October 3, 2007, U.S. Ambassador Michael E. Ranneberger redeclared a disaster due to the ongoing complex emergency in Somalia. USAID/OFDA's primary focus in Somalia is addressing the basic humanitarian needs of the most vulnerable populations through health, nutrition, and water, sanitation, and hygiene activities. To date in FY 2008, USAID/OFDA has provided more than \$47 million for emergency interventions, and ongoing programs from FY 2007 funding continue to assist more than 2 million beneficiaries. In response to the growing food insecurity crisis, USAID/FFP has provided more than \$197 million in emergency food aid for Somalia, more than tripling FY 2007 food contributions. To date in FY 2008, State/PRM has committed \$20.1 million in support of ongoing humanitarian services for displaced and vulnerable populations countrywide, as well as refugees in Somalia.
