This is a partnership with the Training and Employment Consortium to fund natural resource work and provide opportunities for youth in the juvenile justice system. This project has been funded by RAC since 2003.

A group of 5 to 8 youth at-risk will be employed through the Training and Employment Consortium during the summer to maintain and manage developed and dispersed recreation sites on La Grande Ranger District. Project work includes:
