





Bo Derek

Running on the beach in the 1979 smash hit "10," Bo Derek entered American pop culture and became the standard for the "perfect 10 beauty." Nearly 30 years later, she has proven that beauty goes even deeper, devoting her time to caring for other people and animals alike.

Her concern for animals led Derek to create *Bless the Beasts*, a line of pet products sold in stores nationwide. A true humanitarian, she donates a portion of all sales to *Canine Companions for Independence*, a non-profit organization that enhances the lives of people with disabilities by providing them with highly trained assistance dogs and ongoing support.

Her strong compassion for people with disabilities goes even further. For seven years, Derek has also served as the national honorary chairperson for the Department of Veterans Affairs' National Rehabilitation Special Events. These four annual therapeutic and rehabilitative events are designed to help veterans overcome their disabilities through competition. They are the hallmark of rehabilitation programs in the nation.



Born Mary Cathleen Collins in Long Beach, Calif., Bo Derek is no stranger to veterans. Her father, Paul Collins, was a radio operator during the Korean War. Both her stepfather and her late husband, John Derek, were also veterans. It is this love for the armed forces that has inspired her to perform her duties as national honorary chairperson with passion and ease, taking the time to meet and encourage America's veterans one by one.

In 2002, Derek was bestowed by the Special Forces Association with the distinction of honorary Green Beret, joining only four other Americans who have been so honored. She was recognized for her efforts on behalf of America's men and women in uniform and our military veterans. She participates in USO tours, entertaining U.S. military personnel serving abroad.

More recently, she was appointed as Special Envoy of the Secretary of State for Wildlife Trafficking, working to create awareness of the dangers of wildlife trafficking. Along with her love of animals and devotion to veterans, Derek is also a patron of the arts. In 2002, President George W. Bush appointed her to the Kennedy Center Board of Trustees. In 2006, she starred on My Network TV's breakthrough drama *Fashion House*.

A published author, Derek poured into *Riding Lessons: Everything That Matters in Life I Learned from Horses* the essence of her beauty – a radiance that comes from her caring heart and bright mind. Despite the years that have passed since she first seared the American consciousness with her image, Bo Derek is as captivating and as ravishingly beautiful as ever – both inside and out.

Jane Powell Mistress of Ceremonies

Jane Powell came to Hollywood at the age of 14 from Portland, Oregon, where she had her own radio shows. She starred in 20 major MGM musicals including *Seven Brides for Seven Brothers* and *Royal Wedding*, co-starring Fred Astaire. Many of the songs she introduced became industry standards.

Starring in every entertainment medium, Powell has appeared on Broadway in *Irene* and repeatedly set attendance records in dozens of touring productions including *My Fair Lady*, *Peter Pan* and *The Sound of Music*. She has demonstrated an extraordinary flair for comedy in such non-musical successes as *Chapter Two*, *Marriage-Go-Round*, and *Same Time*, *Next Year*, for which she won a Drama-Logue Award. In 2000, she won considerable acclaim for her performance in the New York production of *Avow*, was featured in a Showtime original TV movie, *The Sandy Bottom Orchestra*, and won acclaim for her portrayal of an Alzheimer's victim in *Law and Order*, *SVU*. More recently, she co-starred in the Stephen Sondheim musical, *Bounce*.



Television audiences have seen Jane Powell in guest-starring roles in leading variety shows, popular series and numerous Academy Awards and television specials. She appeared regularly in the TV series *Growing Pains*, and in several daytime dramas. She has performed for five U.S. Presidents as well as the Queen of England.

Powell's autobiography, *The Girl Next Door and How She Grew*, was published by William Morrow and (in paperback) by Berkley. Her exercise video, *Fight Back with Fitness*, designed to help people with arthritis, was produced in conjunction with The Arthritis Foundation. On the lecture circuit, her subjects include fitness, renewal and growth in the golden years, and her life in Hollywood.

Powell lives in Connecticut with her husband Dick Moore, and enjoys gardening and cooking. She has three grown children and one granddaughter. She has served as Mistress of Ceremonies of the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival in 1991, 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2004, 2005 and 2006. It is an honor and a privilege to again welcome her in this role at the 2007 Festival in St. Louis, Missouri.

History of the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival

The National Veterans Creative Arts Festival originated as two separate competitions. Muriel Barbour, then chief of recreation therapy at the McGuire VA Medical Center in Richmond, Va., created the visual arts competition, VET ARTS, in 1981, as an observance of the International Year of Disabled Persons. Shirley Jefferies, a recreation therapist at the Waco, Texas, VA Medical Center, initiated the performing arts competition, The National Music Competition for Veterans, in 1982. The premier live winners' stage show was

held in 1981 at the VA Medical Center in Tuskegee, Ala. The second show was staged at the Coatesville, Pa., VA Medical Center in 1982.

In 1984, the live stage show was presented in Washington, D.C., and the music competition was renamed "The Music Festival." The following year, the stage show took place in historic Constitution Hall.

The Music Festival and VET ARTS merged and drama and dance divisions were added, to create the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival in 1989. Designed to spotlight the four creative arts therapies of art, music, dance and drama, this landmark Festival was performed to an audience of 4,000 in the Fox Theater in St. Louis, Mo. In 2005, a fifth creative arts division, creative writing, was added to the Festival roster.

The National Veterans Creative Arts Festival continues to evolve each year as it showcases the artistic achievements of veterans from across the country in each of the five artistic divisions. Each Festival features an art exhibit showing the first place artwork from 50 categories. A live stage show, complete with orchestral accompaniment generously provided by the Music Performance Fund, is performed by veterans who have achieved medal-winning status in a variety of categories from

the performing arts divisions of music, drama and dance, as well as creative writing. Workshops are offered during the Festival week for participants and staff, educating them in a variety of artistic modalities by utilizing the talents of local community artists. There is no competition at the Festival itself, as it is a showcase for previously judged medal winners.

In 2007, 2,839 veterans from nearly 100 VA medical facilities entered the art, music, drama, dance and creative writing competitions. Of those, more than 120 medal-winning veterans will participate in the 2007 Festival. This year the event returns to St. Louis, with the art exhibit and stage show performance taking place October 28, 2007 at the beautiful Touhill Performing Arts Center.

The Department of Veterans Affairs, the American Legion Auxiliary and Help Hospitalized Veterans present the 2007 National Veterans Creative Arts Festival, and it is also supported by many other organizations both locally and nationally. The staff and volunteers of the St. Louis VA Medical Center all take great pride in welcoming the 2007 Festival participants and their guests.



2007 Festival Host: The St. Louis VA Medical Center

The **St. Louis VA Medical Center** has a long history of proudly serving veterans. A full-service health care facility, the medical center provides inpatient and ambulatory care in medicine, surgery, psychiatry, neurology and rehabilitation, as well as more than 65 subspecialty areas. The St. Louis VA Medical Center includes two inpatient facilities serving over 45,000 veterans and their families in east central Missouri and southwestern Illinois.

Originally the site of an old military post, **Jefferson Barracks** sits on 170 acres overlooking the Mississippi River. Named in honor of President Thomas Jefferson, it was first established in 1826. Famous members of history such as Lincoln, Grant and Lee were stationed there at various points in their military careers. In 1922,

President Warren G. Harding signed an Executive Order assigning the 170 acres to the Veterans Bureau for construction of a hospital for the "treatment of wounded and invalid soldiers." The initial buildings were completed and opened in March 1923. Currently, Jefferson Barracks provides care and treatment in mental health services, regional spinal cord injury treatment, extended care and rehabilitation services, geriatric health care, poly-trauma services and a rehabilitation domiciliary program for homeless veterans.



John Cochran Division

The **John Cochran Division**, named after the late Missouri congressman John J. Cochran, was built in 1954 and is located in midtown St. Louis, in close proximity to its affiliated medical schools – Saint Louis University and Washington University. It has all of the medical center's operative and surgical capabilities, a major ambulatory care unit, and a six-story clinical addition that includes surgical facilities, intensive care units, outpatient psychiatry clinics and an expanded laboratory. As an inner city hospital, it plays an integral role in the St. Louis health care community. The John Cochran Division houses acute medical and surgical programs with complete state-of-the-art diagnostic facilities, and an emergency department staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The staff at the St. Louis VA Medical Center is looking ahead to meet the needs of the Operation Iraqi/Enduring Freedom veterans

and service members as they return from military service. St. Louis was selected to be the Poly-Trauma Network Site for VA's Heartland Network (VISN 15), serving veterans in the Kansas, Missouri and southern Illinois area. Additional mental health services and support will be available through a new recovery center, slated to open in midtown this year. The medical center is also expanding pain management services by opening a multidisciplinary pain clinic at the Jefferson Barracks division, to help meet the needs of veterans with chronic pain issues. In addition, the St. Louis Foundation is raising funds for the construction of a new Fisher House, to be located on the Jefferson Barracks campus. Groundbreaking for its construction will begin in 2008.

The St. Louis VA Medical Center is associated with Community Based Outpatient Clinics (CBOCs) in Belleville, Illinois; St. Charles, Missouri; and the Missouri Veterans Home in north St. Louis. Additional CBOCs are jointly operated with other VA facilities in both Effingham and Springfield, Illinois.

The St. Louis VA Medical Center has the distinction of being the first VA medical center to host the National Veterans Creative Arts Festival in 1989, where beloved Cardinals baseball announcer Jack Buck drew the largest crowd in the Festival's history. In 2004, it was the facility's privilege to host the National Veterans Wheelchair Games, welcoming more than 500 veterans to St. Louis. The St. Louis VA Medical Center employees and volunteers have continued to demonstrate, through their time and efforts, their heartfelt commitment and dedication to serving the veterans who have served our county so well.



2007 Festival Host City: About the Area

Missouri

Welcome to Missouri, the Show-Me state! Purchased from France as part of the Louisiana Purchase, Missouri was admitted to the union in 1821, when it became the 24th state. Missouri's beautiful rivers and streams and rich history of the westward expansion make it a great place to visit and live. You can expect to enjoy warm hospitality in this Midwestern state, where you will also experience the impressive talent of its local artisans.

St. Louis


St. Louis was founded by French fur traders in 1764. Since it was strategically located near the confluence of the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers, St. Louis was known as the "Gateway to the West," and served as an important departure point for settlers. The most famous of those starting their expedition here was Lewis & Clark. Permanent exhibits for Lewis & Clark can be found throughout the St. Louis area and include the Museum of Westward Expansion under the Arch, the Old Courthouse, the Lewis & Clark State Historic Site and the Black World History Museum. You can also visit William Clark's grave at Bellefontaine Cemetery.

In 1904, the city hosted the World's Fair and the Olympics, becoming the first English-speaking country to host the Olympic Games. Forest Park, site of the World's Fair, still houses many of St. Louis's most notable attractions such as the St. Louis Zoo, The Jewel Box, Missouri History Museum/Jefferson Memorial, The Muny (the largest and oldest outdoor musical theater in the U.S.), the Art Museum, and the Science Center and Planetarium. The city is also home for the world–renowned St. Louis Symphony, and has long been associated with great ragtime, jazz and blues music. Many well-known businesses call St. Louis home, such as Anheuser-Busch, A.G. Edwards, Edward Jones, Energizer, Boeing and Monsanto. Finally, the city is known for its enthusiastic and knowledgeable sports fans that support the World Champion St. Louis Cardinals, Blues Hockey and Rams Football.

In the Army

LEAYLE TODMAN JAMES J. PETERS VA MEDICAL CENTER BRONX, NEW YORK

At the age of 43, Army veteran Leayle Todman had a stroke that left him paralyzed on the right side of his body. Previously right-hand dominant, the stroke caused him to permanently lose all functional use of his right arm as well as the ability to walk. Although Todman could understand spoken words, he had great difficulty writing and speaking, thereby living with limited abilities to communicate.

Through therapy, perseverance and patience, Todman, who is now 60, met the challenges he faced and worked toward recovery. He gradually developed the ability to ambulate with the aid of a right leg brace and a four-pronged cane. He attended art therapy sessions at the James J. Peters VA Medical Center in the Bronx, and began the arduous task of retraining his left arm to do what his right arm no longer could. With extraordinary patience and determination, he learned to handle a palette knife, mix his own colors, blend, shade, and attend to very fine detail in his artistic endeavors.



In the Army, an acrylic painting, is a strong example of Todman's incredible achievements in rehabilitation. The painting depicts another veteran from the art therapy group at the time he was serving in the Army in 1953. Working from a photograph that the veteran had given him, Todman initially drew the image in pencil, and then painted and completed it.

Todman continues to attend art therapy sessions, striving to further improve and develop strength, coordination and skill in his non-dominant left hand. His motivation and positive perspective are an inspiration to others faced with similar challenges.

Faced with the effects of post-traumatic stress disorder, 55-year-old Army veteran Pamela "Jade" Scott looked for an outlet for her feelings and an avenue toward peace of mind. She discovered that working with clay is an answer to her search, and creates masks that in her words reflect "an evolution in transformation."

"I have watched myself move from a dark abyss using dark pigments, to transmuting into colors and textures," Scott says. "Oftentimes, being isolated from human contact through feelings of rage, depression, hopelessness and fear, working on the masks has helped me to transcend the difficulties of living and empower myself."

Though she still struggles with the effects of her disorder, Scott is proud of her accomplishments. She hopes that her efforts will assist others in their healing process and in finding continual harmony with all things. She says, "I hope that my art will reflect that we are all connected through a spirit of oneness."



MILITARY COMBAT EXPERIENCE

Not on My Watch


Allen Eckman served in the Marine Corps as a field radio operator in Vietnam in the mid to late 1960s. One of his most important responsibilities was to care for the casualties. "We never left a man on the battlefield," Eckman says. "Not on my watch. Sometimes I helped carry them out of harm's way myself and put out the first call for aid. I stayed with them until the chopper carried them away."

When Eckman returned from combat, he faced the challenges of post-traumatic stress disorder. Part of his therapy has been to create cast paper sculptures, one of which was titled *Marking the LZ*, which won first place in the 2006 National Veterans Creative Arts Competition. The sculpture was a self portrait mounted in an acrylic case accompanied by original photos, insignias, badges and other military artifacts that he collected during his time in Vietnam. "Creating this has made it possible for me to deal with some of the very hard stuff in a very small way," Eckman said.



Eckman, who is now 60, received first place in the 2007 competition with a paper sculpture he named, *Not on My Watch*, which represents this vital part of his military combat experience in Vietnam. "In combat, we protected and fought for one another, and when we needed help we got it," he says. "Thanks to VA [the Department of Veterans Affairs], we still do."







The Ballad of Ira Hayes

Steve McGinnis is a 37-year-old Army veteran of the Gulf War. He chose to enter the song, *Ballad of Ira Hayes* into the creative arts competition as a dedication to fellow veterans and to draw attention to the sacrifices made by Ira Hayes, the first Native American to serve in war.

Entering this song was a therapeutic process for McGinnis. The challenges of post-traumatic stress disorder, depression and anxiety disorder have been a part of his life for several years. Nevertheless, he felt strongly about presenting this particular song at the VA medical facility in Knoxville, saying, "Once I stopped shaking when the song was over, I felt pretty good about the performance!"

By accomplishing the goal of preparing and performing a song that is dear to his heart, Steve McGinnis has developed an increase in his self-esteem. That success is motivating him to face other life challenges in the future.

Tennessee Waltz
J.C. LEWIS, JR.

Eighty-year-old Army veteran J.C. Lewis, Jr., has always been involved with music. He has mastered many instruments throughout his life including piano, guitar, accordion and harmonica, and learned to play these instruments with no formal instruction. Diagnosed with dementia, he now resides at the VA Medical Center in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

Claude Norton, Certified Therapeutic Recreation Specialist, says, "When he first was admitted to the dementia program, J.C. tended to isolate himself. One day, a group of young people gave a performance with violins and J.C. began to play *Tennessee Waltz* on his harmonica. He received so much positive feedback from others, that he now attends small groups and initiates conversations."

The response of J.C. Lewis demonstrates the therapeutic influence of music and its positive effect on quality of life.



SPECIAL RECOGNITION CATEGORY - GROUP MUSIC DIVISION

The Rebrainer Therapy Group VA BLACK HILLS HEALTHCARE SYSTEM FORT MEADE, SOUTH DAKOTA

On Wednesday mornings, a group of veterans comes together at the VA facility in Rapid City, South Dakota to participate in a session focusing on such areas as improving their attention, memory, problem-solving and emotional adjustment. The group calls itself *The Rebrainer Therapy Group*. All of its members have experienced a brain injury, stroke, or other neuropsychiatric illness or injury. Many have experienced physical accidents that also left visible evidence, and others have unseen scars that restrict living a normal life.

During the sessions, there is a check-in period where each group member relays how he or she is doing and personal issues are discussed. Education and training topics such as communication, dealing with depression and social skills are explored, and drumming exercises and songs reinforce the goals of the group.

Dr. James Gardiner, a neuropsychologist who works with the group says, "This group process has made improvements in the veterans' quality of life. A bond of deep loyalty and devout dedication has grown among these men and women, as demonstrated by their regular attendance at the group and their active support for each other – both in and outside of the scheduled sessions."

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
