Board members are licensed psychologists and members of the public. All members are appointed by the governor to three-year terms. The Board and staff welcome comments and questions from the public.



Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners

Be informed.

Expect ethical care.

Licensed psychologists welcome your questions about their qualifications and training.

Psychologists are mental health professionals who evaluate, diagnose and treat behavioral, emotional and mental health conditions.

Oregon psychologists have a doctorate degree in psychology and two years of supervised work experience with a licensed psychologist. They must pass examinations and maintain their licenses through continuing education.

The Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners reviews the education, work experience, and other credentials of those seeking a license to practice psychology in our state. The Board can confirm for you whether an individual psychologist is licensed in Oregon.

In addition, the Board provides information to the public and protects your rights as a consumer. For example, you have the right to professional treatment regardless of age, sex, race, color, national origin, or disability. You also have the right to a clear description of services, fees, and how you will be billed.

Licensed psychologists follow an ethical code requiring client privacy, commitment to client welfare, informed consent for treatment, and social responsibility. Above all, relationships between psychologists and their clients should be conducted professionally.

While the majority of psychologists are highly professional, just as in any other profession, some may bend

profession, some may bend or break the rules. For example, it is unethical

for a psychologist to misrepresent services, reveal private information without permission, or become involved inappropriately with his or her clients.

If you have concerns about whether your treatment from a psychologist is unprofessional or unethical, contact the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners. The Board responds to inquiries from consumers and determines if appropriate actions are warranted.
