A LIST of religious, agricultural, class and trade publications, magazines and reviews, etc., arranged in alphabetical order by their names, the place of publication of each being shown.

A DESCRIPTION of every place in the United States and Canada in which a newspaper is published; including railroad, telegraph, express and banking facilities, also state, territory or province giving the location, character of surface and soil, chief products and manufactures, forming a valuable guide to the judicious placing of any line of advertising. Ninety-seven maps of the United States and its possessions, the Canadian provinces, the West Indian Islands, etc., carefully revised and corrected to date.

THE FIRST NEWSPAPER DIRECTORY

NEWSPAPER PUBLISHING HALF A CENTURY AGO

The AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY is fifty-one years old. It first saw the light on January 1st, 1869, as George P. Rowell & Co.'s American Newspaper Directory.

Prior to that time each advertising agency possessed its own list of newspapers, compiled in its own office from the best accessible information. This list was usually guarded with jealous care as a professional secret.

In 1866 George P. Rowell, a New York advertising agent, issued the *Advertisers Gazette*, a monthly publication, which gave in each issue the names of the newspapers in some particular state or section, together with news of happenings in the newspaper world. These and other early lists gave simply the names and places of publication of the newspapers. Other details, when desired, had to be ascertained from the publications themselves.

The first serious attempt to publish a complete list of the newspapers and periodicals of the country resulted, in 1869, in the first volume of the American Newspaper Directory. After a career of nearly forty years Rowell's publication was combined, in 1908, with our AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL under the name of the AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY, of which the present volume is the fifty-first issue.

The AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL, in its present form, first came out in 1880, being, like Mr. Rowell's book, an outgrowth of lists kept up for our own use, and published in AYER AND SON'S MANUAL FOR ADVERTISERS, which we had issued quarterly for several years. From the start, The AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL contained many useful features not found in other lists, and presented the descriptive matter regarding the papers in a more concise and regular form than had hitherto been attempted. By this arrangement, which we have always retained, any particular detail can be seen at a glance, whereas it had, up to that time, been necessary to read through a solid paragraph to discover the feature desired. This and other distinctive features soon made "THE ANNUAL", as it is universally known among advertisers and newspaper men, the undisputed leader in its field, a position which it still holds.

A comparison of the first volume with the the present one may be of interest. In 1869 there were 5,411 publications. The present volume lists 22,428. The 1869 book listed 367 Canadian publications. Canada shows 1,416 this year.

The nine territories of that day, Arizona, Colorado, Dakota, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico, Utah, Washington and Wyoming, had a total of 59 newspapers among them. The ten states formed out of those territories have today 2,216. Kansas had 53, now it has 652. Nebraska had 27, today it has 584. Oregon had 31, today it has 263. The eastern states show large increases, as our population today is about three times as large as in 1869, but the chief increases are shown, of course, in the Western country, which, fifty years ago, except for a few isolated communities like Cheyenne, Denver, Pueblo, Santa Fe, Salt Lake City, Helena and others, was almost a wilderness from the eastern parts of Kansas, Nebraska and Dakota to within a few score miles of the Pacific.

Conditions at that period are indicated by the advertisement of the Kenosha, Wis., *Telegraph*, appearing in the 1869 directory, which states "The town is renowned for the manufacture of wagons, which find a market all the way to the Rocky Mountains, and even in Oregon, being shipped by way of New York."

In the first edition William Cullen Bryant is named as one of the editors of the *New York Evening Post*. Harriet Beecher Stowe was editor of a New York weekly publication named *Hearth and Home*, at 37 Park Row. Mrs. Henry Ward Beecher edited a monthly, *The Mother at Home and Household Magazine*. Theodore Tilton was editor of the

Independent. The late Robert Bonner, chiefly known, in his later days, as the owner of Maud S., was running the *New York Ledger*. Louisa M. Alcott was editor of *Merry's Museum* of Boston, an illustrated monthly. And some of our suffragist friends may be interested to know that a "Woman's Rights" weekly, under the title of *Revolution*, was edited by Elizabeth Cady Stanton and owned by Susan B. Anthony.

There was still an anti-slavery weekly published in New York, *The National Anti-Slavery Standard*. It was balanced by the *States Rights Democrat*, published by Mr. Victor W. Thompson in La Grange, Texas. We suspect brother Thompson was emphatically "Unreconstructed". George Washington Childs was busy making a reputation for the *Public Ledger* of Philadelphia. *Godey's Lady's Book* and *Peterson's Ladies National Magazine*, which might be considered as the *Ladies' Home Journal* and *Woman's Home Companion* of that day, were both published in Philadelphia and claimed the huge circulations of 108,000 and 140,000 respectively. The largest circulation in the country was 275,000, the proud boast of *Pomerooy's Democrat* of New York.

In Louisville, Ky., we find the *Courier-Journal*, with a gentleman mis-named Henry Materson as editor-in-chief. "Marse Henry" is too well known and too highly regarded today for anybody to spell his name with an M. We note the name of George W. Peck, afterward Governor of Wisconsin, and famous as the author of "Peck's Bad Boy," and of the thrilling history of "How Private Peck Put Down the Rebellion," etc. Our first edition shows him up. He was then just George W. Peck, editor and publisher of the *Representative*, a Ripon, Wis. weekly. "Parson" Brownlow, known to almost every soldier of the Civil War, who did as much to keep the Union flag flying in eastern Tennessee as any man in America, was publishing the *Whig* at Knoxville.

The *Saturday Evening Post* of that day claimed a modest 20,000 circulation. It has several more now. The Brooklyn *Eagle* confessed to "the largest circulation of any evening paper in the United States." The *Eagle* is a good paper, but if it should make such a circulation claim today, there might be some objections.

The newspapers advertised liberally in the first Directory, there being between four and five hundred advertisements, a great number of them treating of two or more publications issued from the same office. One of the chief points they enlarged upon in that day was their size. "A large 40 column newspaper", "One of the largest papers in New England", "32 large columns", "A large folio newspaper", "The largest sheet published in the county", etc., appear frequently. Forty columns do not make a very large paper today.

That the value of good advertising agencies was appreciated half a century ago is proved by some of the advertisements. One paper in Fultonville, N. Y., says "Our paper is on file with the best advertising agents in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Chicago and other large cities. Advertisers will find it to their interest to contract with our agents, as we charge an extra price for the trouble and annoyance of treating with separate parties". The McMinnville, Tenn. *New Era* says "We prefer transacting business through well established advertising agents, but where parties desire to contract directly, a cash payment of one-fourth of the amount will be required." Others show the same preference.

Honesty and morality in the advertising columns is not a new idea. We find many of the papers stating that "Only first-class advertising will be accepted", "Obscene advertisements not inserted at any price", "No advertisements inserted unless they are strictly unobjectionable", "No swindling or humbug advertisements received", "As we admit none but first-class advertisements, our people have great confidence in our advertisers."

Verily, honesty is the best policy, both for newspapers and advertisers. It was so half a century ago, is today and will be forever.

INTRODUCTION TO THE 1920 EDITION

The **ANNUAL** is now fifty-one years old. The first edition was dated January 1st, 1869.

In this issue of the **AMERICAN NEWSPAPER ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY** we have listed 22,428 publications, a decrease of 646 from last year.

This volume includes 1,043 new publications. The suspensions and consolidations during the year past make the net loss 646, as shown above. We show in this issue 10,988 towns where newspapers are published, a decrease of 201 from last year. The net decrease in the five years since the war started has been 2296. The total number dropped during the year through suspension or consolidation was 1689. The scarcity and high cost of necessary materials still trouble publishers and still cause many suspensions. The net decrease, however, is only a little more than half of last year's record.

DAILY NEWSPAPERS.—Following the General Catalogue is a complete list of all dailies in the United States and their possessions and the Dominion of Canada, which are issued continuously throughout the year, distinguishing the morning and evening issues by the use of roman and italic type respectively and also indicating by an asterisk (*) all that have Sunday editions whether under the same or different titles. Those which issue weekly, semi-weekly or tri-weekly editions are indicated by a parallel (||). Following it will be found a list of papers issuing rotogravure supplements. We have added to this list the populations of the cities included therein.

In this place it may be of interest to note that among the regular dailies—excluding college and summer resort dailies, which are issued during part of the year only—there are 1,831 evening and 646 morning papers.

MONTHLY AND WEEKLY PUBLICATIONS.—These are comprised in three lists—viz.: Magazines, including literary, illustrated and humorous weeklies of general circulation; Women's Publications of Home Circulation, and Mail Order Journals. Attention is invited to the special note on page 1191 relative to this group.

CLASS PUBLICATIONS.—These lists have, as usual, been carefully revised from late proofs of the catalogue. The Index to the lists has been greatly extended and amplified in order to assist in the search for publications devoted to any particular field. We also state, in the Index, the number of papers to be found under each head. A number of new lists have been added. We aim to keep this important and interesting part of the book fully abreast of the times, omitting no opportunity to make it more useful.

NEW FEATURES.—We have added a list in which are arranged in alphabetical order by their names all publications except local newspapers. The place of publication is given with each. This will be useful to librarians and others, who frequently need information on publications of which only the names are known.

POPULATION.—The population figures in the United States and possessions are those of the 1910 Census, except in Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Rhode Island, South Dakota and Wyoming, in each of which states we have used the figures of a state census taken in 1915. The populations of the other states, and of their towns and cities of 8,000 or more, are, with very few exceptions, taken from a bulletin issued by the Census Bureau on March 31st, 1914, giving the Census Bureau's estimates of the population of such places in the year 1914. These estimates were based upon the latest procurable information at that time, and may be accepted as practically correct. The figures in the Philippines are from the census of 1904. Those of Canada are from the 1911 census.

Where figures from the above sources are not available, or fail to approximate present conditions, we have used the latest presumably authentic information and have marked the figures with a star (*), signifying that they are estimated. A number of counties have been divided since the 1910 census was taken. In these cases we have estimated the population from the best information we could obtain.

On pages 19 to 31 inclusive will be found the population of all places in the United States and Canada which have 3,000 inhabitants and upward, arranged alphabetically by states and by groups in each state as follows: Towns of from 3,000 to 5,000, 5,000 to 10,000, 10,000 to 20,000, 20,000 to 50,000 and 50,000 upward.

STATE HEADINGS.—The headings of the states and provinces have been carefully revised from the latest authentic information procurable and give concise and valuable statements of their resources and productions. The Department of Agriculture, the Census Bureau and the Department of Commerce of the United States, the Census and Statistics Office of Canada, the Department of Mines and the Fisheries Branch of the Naval Service of Canada, with the officials of many states and provinces, have given us much valuable information of this kind, and we take this opportunity of expressing our thanks.

MAPS.—The maps have been brought as nearly as possible up to date, the larger and more thickly settled states and provinces being divided into two, three or four double page sections, thus doing away with the confusion and incompleteness inseparable from maps drawn on too small a scale. To each of these divided maps, in the United States, we have added a double page map of the whole state, for convenient reference when it is desired to have the whole of the state in view. Practically every newspaper town contained in the ANNUAL may be found on the maps, each town being indexed so that it may be readily located if reference to it is desired. The reference follows the population of each place, as (G 5), etc., the letters referring to vertical and the figures to horizontal divisions. To facilitate reference where the place desired is on or near the horizontal line, we have marked it thus: (G 5½), etc. All places so marked will be found on or very near the line indicating the southern limit of the space covered by the number given. Where maps are in two or more parts, the index figures and letters in the catalogue refer to the sectional maps, not to the complete map of the state. In front of the book we have also added a map of the United States, showing the new standard time zones; a map of the World, one showing the comparative density of population in the various parts of the country and another showing the chief productions of each locality.

TOWN HEADINGS.—These headings have also been carefully revised, every one being sent out each year for correction. The distance, on the map, and in most cases the direction, from some large city, trading centre or nearby railroad town, is given; the means of communication by railroad, water or stage; the telegraph, express and banking facilities. Then follows the description of the place itself, setting forth the leading manufactures, the nature of the surrounding district, with its agricultural and other productions, and educational and other public institutions and such other features as may be worthy of note. We pay particular attention to this valuable feature of the book, endeavoring to have it as nearly up-to-date and complete as possible.

SUB-EDITIONS.—We endeavor to distinguish between independent publications and those which are simply reprints of some other paper, usually with little or no change beyond the name. Papers so issued are entered in the Catalogue under the name of the leading paper, or, in some cases, that of the publisher. Under the place of apparent publication the name of the sub-edition is given, with a reference to the paper or house issuing it. It is difficult at times to determine this matter positively. Publishers of such papers are frequently unwilling to give information or to send sample copies, and in some cases an error may have been made in quoting a paper as a sub-edition, when it would be entitled to an independent entry if the facts were known, or in listing a paper independently which is not entitled to it. Every effort, however, is made to avoid error.

PUBLICATIONS EXCLUDED.—In accordance with our usual custom we have left out several hundred publications which have little value for the general advertiser or the general public. Among them are those issued by private and high schools, the smaller colleges, local church papers, papers issued by business houses primarily for the exploitation of their own goods, and generally known as "house organs," and publications issued by institutions, unless they have an influence outside of the particular one by which they are published. Care has also been exercised in the selection of newspapers and periodicals which rightly come within the scope of this book. Experience has shown that it is not wise to insert every paper when it is first issued, for while the exclusion may be unfortunate in a few instances, much dead matter is thereby kept out of the book; as many of these ventures have very short lives.

NAMES OF EDITORS AND PUBLISHERS.—No labor has been spared in the effort to have this department of the work as accurate as possible; the continual changes of ownership and places of publication, however, necessarily preclude absolute accuracy.

Papers which are believed to decline general advertising are indicated in the Catalogue by the words "No Adv." in the circulation column.

A SUGGESTION.—When writing to any publication, it has been found better to address letters, etc., to "Publisher of ——" rather than to an individual, firm, or company, as the communication will then be delivered to the office of the publication, even though the ownership may have changed and particular individuals may have retired.

THE REVISION of this book for the edition of 1920 has already been begun, and publishers will confer a favor by notifying us of the establishment, suspension or change of any papers within their knowledge, or by calling our attention to any inaccuracies in newspaper descriptions, town headings, state headings or any other department of the ANNUAL.

CONCERNING CIRCULATION

The only copies of a periodical which can have any value for an advertiser are those which are delivered to actual readers.

Because of our desire to give actual circulations for the benefit of the users of this book, we require that all statements sent us for publication therein shall be made according to the ANNUAL'S definition of circulation and shall cover six months or more, entirely within the year immediately preceding the date of the ANNUAL for which they are made. An exception to this is in the case of the sworn statements made by daily papers for the Post Office Department or for the Audit Bureau of Circulations. Both of these require, from daily papers, statements covering six months ending March 31st or September 30th. In case we do not receive the fall statement in time we use the spring statement.

This is our definition of circulation, whether the rating be certified, based on the publisher's statement or estimated.

CIRCULATION: THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF COMPLETE COPIES OF ALL REGULAR ISSUES FOR A GIVEN PERIOD, EXCLUSIVE OF LEFT OVER, UNSOLD, RETURNED, FILE, SAMPLE, EXCHANGE AND ADVERTISERS' COPIES.

This definition appears on all blanks we send out for circulation figures for the Annual, and no figures, sworn or otherwise, will be printed as publishers' statements unless made in accordance therewith.

The word "AVERAGE", as we use it, must not be misunderstood. It is the custom of some publishers to issue occasionally large extra editions; to add these and the regular editions together for a given time, and divide the total by the number of the issues within that period. This is not what we desire. By "AVERAGE" we mean that number which usually fills the needs of the mailing lists, and the demand either in or out of the office.

Left over, unsold, returned and file copies, having never reached the hands of a possible reader, cannot be considered as part of the circulation. Sample copies are excluded because there is, as a rule, no method of ascertaining the percentage which reach actual readers. Exchanges are usually cut up in the office to which they are sent, which terminates their usefulness. Advertisers' copies may be read, in some cases, but the great majority are simply checked for the advertisement concerned, and either filed or thrown away.

Before we adopted the above definition, each publisher included in his statements such papers as suited his fancy. Some gave the total number printed, some the "complete and perfect copies," some deducted their returns, while others gave the number of papers actually sold. These last were at a considerable disadvantage when compared with those who included ten to fifteen per cent of uncirculated copies.

Statements made according to the Annual's definition place all publishers upon an equal footing and do injustice to none.

Many publishers, members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations, justly holding that the full and complete sworn statements made for that organization should be sufficient to comply with all requests for circulation statements, and should save the labor and expense of making out other statements, have referred us to their A. B. C. statements. Circulation figures from such statements are printed in bold face type, as all are sworn to, and are accompanied by an italic note showing that the figures are those of a sworn statement made for the Audit Bureau of Circulations. Only the total net paid figures are given in every case, and all such statements include at least three months in the year 1919.

In a few cases where no later statement has reached us, or where a publisher has especially requested it, the figures are from an A. B. C. auditors report. These are marked "A. B. C. Audit," and, as with the statements, only the total net paid figures are shown.

Ratings are not increased, as a rule, except upon receipt of satisfactory signed statements. They may be reduced where the publishers' continued neglect to furnish such statements leaves us dependent on outside information. As every publisher, without exception, is furnished each year with a statement blank and a stamped envelope, and thus given an opportunity to present his own figures, publishers have no reasonable ground for complaint if in the absence of statements the ratings given appear unsatisfactory to them.

SWORN DETAILED STATEMENTS covering a recent period of six consecutive months or more we consider the strongest kind of statements that can be made. All ratings based on such statements are printed in **bold face type**, and marked with a star (*). All ratings from sworn statements are printed in bold face type. Detailed statements, not sworn to, are printed in plain figures marked with a star (*). A double dagger (‡) indicates the publisher's claim unsupported by either affidavit or detailed statement. Our own estimates are set in plain figures and unmarked.

Statements in detail enable us to see to what extent special or extra editions figure in the period covered, and also to what extent the circulation fluctuates or steadily increases.

A detailed statement covering the full period on our blanks will, if properly signed by the publisher or some responsible person for him, ordinarily entitle the paper to a rating in accordance therewith, unless contradictory statements or other evidence call for other action. We say *ordinarily*, because we do not regard the mere rendering of such a statement as incontestable proof of its correctness, and there have been instances where such statements, even when sworn to, could not be accepted in the face of positive information to the contrary; but we believe that such cases are few, and as a rule a detailed statement covering the required period, properly signed, is accepted as *prima facie* evidence of its reliability. In this connection we may say that while the greater part of the circulation ratings are based upon statements sent us by the publishers, and the publishers alone are responsible for them, we use our best endeavors to obtain statements showing actual circulation and we do not print figures if we have reason to doubt their substantial accuracy.

ESTIMATED RATINGS.—We endeavor to have all estimated circulation ratings as nearly accurate as our information will permit, without either favor or intentional injustice to any publication. When a publisher fails to submit a statement or other evidence, we base our estimate of his circulation on previous statements which have stood without question, or on such other presumably authentic information as we may have. Estimates based on data more than a year old are usually in round numbers. Such an estimate means that the publication has, so far as our records indicate, at least the number given, while it may have more. Although we try to have all estimates as fair as possible, yet the fact that we have to estimate indicates, as a rule, that our information is old or indefinite, and we would suggest that before concluding important matters with publications having estimated ratings it would be well to request an up-to-date showing.

Although the greater number of circulation ratings are determined when the bulk of the statements are received, earlier in the year, we are willing to revise the figures until the middle of October, if by that time acceptable statements are received by the editor of the ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY.

Circulation ratings are omitted in the following instances:—When the paper has been established during the current year, or is entered for the first time in the ANNUAL; when the information received is indefinite, contradictory or otherwise unsatisfactory, when our information on local conditions creates a doubt as to the accuracy of the figures sent us, when more recent information indicates that statements, made earlier in the year, do not represent present conditions, or where publishers have requested omission, in which case the word "Decline" is printed in the circulation column.

We aim at absolute impartiality in this important part of our work, and desiring always to avoid injustice to publishers, in our efforts to procure accurate and trustworthy information for advertisers, we will gladly receive communications from any who may consider themselves unfairly dealt with in any statement in this volume, and will cheerfully correct in future editions any mistakes made in the present one, if furnished with satisfactory evidence of error.

HOW THIS DIRECTORY IS MADE

Sometimes an unobservant publisher asks us the question, "Why don't you revise the ANNUAL every year?" Our answer is, "We do."

We try to make this book perfect, not because we expect to attain perfection, but because we know that by striving for perfection we shall grow better all the time.

By the system we follow, no publisher can justly say that we have neglected to describe his paper correctly. If its description is incorrect, it is because he failed to give us correct information, when we gave him his annual opportunity to do so. Every year, a printed proof of the entry of each one of the publications listed in the Catalogue (22,428 this year) is cut out, mounted on a blank, and mailed to the publisher, with the request that he make any necessary corrections and return it to us. This blank also provides space for his circulation figures. Another blank, printed and ruled for a detailed statement, is also sent him, as well as a stamped and addressed envelope in which to return his proof and statements. It costs a publisher little effort and no money to have his paper's correct description and his circulation statement properly set before the thousands of discriminating advertisers who use the ANNUAL. An increasing number of publishers each year take advantage of the service we offer them, although there are still too many who, impelled by the too handy pigeon-hole, indulge the common propensity for procrastination, to their own detriment.

This sending of proof slips and blanks to each paper for each edition of the ANNUAL, and writing up the facts obtained for the new book, is only a part of the work of revision. The description of each of the 11,000 towns named in the ANNUAL is also sent out for correction every year. This brings back a mass of valuable gazetteer matter for each issue.

In preparing the 1920 edition we found 2,474 new journalistic ventures of such apparent importance as to warrant our sending for copies. This was 534 more than in 1918. We received 1,418 of these, 386 more than in 1918. Of the remainder, some were merged with others, some reached us too late to get into the ANNUAL, many failed to respond to our repeated requests for copies, and the greater part died in infancy.

Of the 1,418 received, there were many which, although no doubt of considerable value and interest to their readers, were not considered of sufficient importance to be entered in the ANNUAL. These were papers evidently issued for campaign purposes, or published by single churches, by schools and other institutions, or as house organs, etc. As a result of careful investigation of those received, 1,076, being 246 more than last year, were judged worthy of being listed in the ANNUAL, and were written up, and proofs of their descriptions sent to their publishers for revision, except in the case of some of the later ones. Before the ANNUAL was printed, however, 33 had given up the struggle, for various reasons, leaving 1,043 survivors who consequently make their bow to the advertisers of the country in this volume. We wish them all success, and trust they will always fill out and return their proof slips and their statement blanks with care and promptitude, eschewing the pigeon-hole habit.

Consolidations, especially of daily and weekly papers, were very numerous. The weekly editions of daily papers are still being dropped, and many have gone this year. These and other causes which bring about the suspension of newspapers made it necessary for us to eliminate 1,689 names from the catalogue during 1919.

Of the fifteen or sixteen thousand newspapers whose publishers felt sufficient interest in their correct representation to return their proof slips, many were found to have changed in size, price, issue, name, politics or ownership. Our rule is to make no changes upon hearsay. We receive every year many thousands of communications relating to newspapers, in the shape of clippings, correspondence and voluntary items of information from other sources. Every one, unless coming directly from the paper concerned, is verified before the information is used for the new ANNUAL. The towns also contain many changes in description. An actual count of the changes made upon a number of pages, picked at random, leads us to estimate the total number of separate changes in the catalogue and the lists each year to be at least 75,000.

This summary of the changes made in a single year instances the truth of the statement of the late George P. Rowell, the first publisher of a newspaper directory, when he declared that a last year's newspaper directory had about as much value as a cancelled postage stamp.

The lists, which occupy 135 pages and classify 290 different kinds of publications, covering almost every field of human effort, are made up each year from the final proofs of the new ANNUAL. They include papers published in 40 different foreign languages.

The work of making a new ANNUAL each year calls for a large outlay for postage. The postal matter used in the preparation of each new ANNUAL includes, together with stamped envelopes, over 70,000 postage stamps, also five thousand stamped wrappers, 6,000 double postal cards, about 2,000 Canadian stamps and sundry West Indian, Cuban and other stamps. These stamps and cards are used solely for the work of revision, and do not include any of those used in selling or advertising the ANNUAL, that being a matter entirely outside the province of the department having charge of the editorial work on the book.

We have given much time, thought, effort and cash to the preparation of the 1920 ANNUAL AND DIRECTORY. We do so every year. We have tried to avoid errors of every kind, but in the listing of 22,428 newspapers, with ten separate and distinct items of information about each one; and of 10,988 towns with a dozen or more particulars of each, and in the making up of two hundred and ninety lists of different classes of periodicals; it would be a marvel indeed if every one of the half million distinct pieces of information should be absolutely correct. We shall consider it a favor to be informed of any error that exists and a duty and a pleasure to make the necessary correction in the next ANNUAL.

We bespeak from our friends an appreciation of the merits of the book and a frank and friendly criticism of what they may consider its faults.

POSTAL INFORMATION

DOMESTIC MAIL MATTER

Domestic rates and conditions apply to matter mailed for delivery in the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Porto Rico, the Virgin Islands, the Philippines, Guam, Tutuila and other islands of the Samoan group east of longitude 171° west, the Canal zone, United States naval vessels, the United States Postal Agency at Shanghai, China, and the United States Expeditionary Forces in France.

Mail matter is divided by the Post Office Department into four classes:—

FIRST CLASS mail includes all letters, postal cards, private mailing cards (post cards), all matter wholly or partly in writing or typewriting (including manifold or carbon copies), except manuscript copy accompanied by printers proof sheets, and all matter sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

SECOND CLASS mail matter includes periodical publications.

THIRD CLASS matter includes all miscellaneous printed matter, circulars, pamphlets, catalogues, etc.

FOURTH CLASS (PARCEL POST) covers all mailable matter not included in the above classes.

RATES. ON FIRST CLASS MATTER.

LETTERS, two cents for each ounce, or fraction thereof.

POSTAL CARDS or POST CARDS (PRIVATE MAILING CARDS) one cent each.

POSTAL CARDS. Government Postal Cards may bear any written or printed communication on the back and also on the left third of the face when the face is divided by a vertical line, approximately one-third of the width from the left edge. The right two-thirds of the face must be reserved for the address. If any matter, other than the address is pasted or otherwise attached to a postal card, it will subject the card to the letter rate, or, if the card and the attached matter are wholly in printing, it will be treated as third class matter. The initial half of a double postal card should be detached before the reply half is mailed. The reply half of an international postal card, when mailed to the country which issued the card, is considered prepaid, and may be mailed without affixing additional postage stamps.

PRIVATE MAILING CARDS (POST CARDS), which include all cards, written or printed, which are not larger than 3 9/16 by 5 9/16 inches, nor smaller than 2 3/4 by 4 inches, must be made of cardboard substantially of the same weight as the government cards, must not be enclosed in envelopes, must be mailed flat, not doubled or folded, and only the back and the left half of the face may contain written or printed communications. The right half of the face must be reserved for address, postage stamps, post marks, etc. Any departure from these conditions will cause the cards to be charged at letter rates. Printed advertising cards, or cards containing only printed circular matter, and which do not bear the words "Post Card" of "Private Mailing Card" and do not come within the size prescribed for post cards are subject to the third class rates.

SECOND CLASS MATTER includes newspapers and other periodicals. (For zone rates, which apply to publishers only, see local postmasters). When mailed by the public, unsealed, the charge is one cent for each four ounces or fraction of four ounces, on each separately addressed copy or package of unaddressed copies. To obtain this rate the copies must be complete. Incomplete copies are third class matter. On the wrapper, or on the copy, besides the address to which it is sent, there may be written or printed the name and address of the sender, preceded by the word "From"; the words "sample copy" or "marked copy" or both, corrections of typographical errors and marks (not words) calling attention to words or passages in the text. Any other writing will subject the package to letter rates.

THIRD CLASS MATTER is subject to postage at the rate of one cent for each two ounces, or fraction thereof, on each singly addressed piece or package. It must not be sealed, and includes circulars; periodicals not admitted to the second class; proof sheets; corrected proofs; manuscript copy when accompanied by printers' proofs thereof, with or without corrections; reproductions by mechanical processes of written or typewritten matter, when mailed in a minimum number of 20 identical copies at a place designated by the postmaster; reading matter in raised type for the blind; calendars; sheet music; engravings; photographs; blue prints; newspaper clippings, with name, date and address of the paper stamped or written thereon; maps; lithographs; printed postals or private mailing cards, mailed in bulk; insurance applications and legal blanks mainly in print, and miscellaneous printed matter (except books, which are included in fourth class matter) weighing not more than four pounds. If over four pounds or if printed on any other material than paper or cardboard, it becomes fourth class matter.

The only permissible writings on third class matter, other than that mentioned above, are the name and address of the sender, preceded by the word "From"; marks (not words) calling attention to particular words or passages in the text, such inscriptions as "Merry Christmas," "Do not open until Christmas," "Dear Sir," "With best wishes," etc. Also upon photographs or other matter there may be written a simple manuscript dedication not in the nature of personal correspondence. There may be enclosed with third class matter a card bearing the written name and address of the sender, a single order blank, mainly printed, a coin card, a post card or an envelope for reply.

When it is desired to send a personal communication with a package of third class matter, a letter, prepaid at first class rates, may be attached securely to the outside of the package, the latter being fully prepaid at third class rates; and both will be delivered together. The envelope must be attached in such a manner as not to interfere with the address on the package and must bear the same address, so that, if separated, both may be delivered. Samples of merchandise may be attached to printed matter provided such samples cover less than 20 per cent of the space.

FOURTH CLASS MATTER (PARCEL POST) includes merchandise, books, catalogues, miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than four pounds, farm and manufactured products, seeds, roots, plants and all other mailable matter not included in the first, second and third classes. All packages must be so wrapped, tied or enclosed that the contents may be easily examined by the postal officials. When sealed or enclosed in such a manner that the contents cannot be so inspected, they will be treated as first class matter. Boxes may have the lids nailed or screwed, provided they may be readily removed with a chisel or screw-driver for examination of the contents. All coverings should be sufficiently strong and secure to with-

stand the pressure and friction inevitable in the frequent handlings and changes of transportation to which postal matter is subjected, and also to prevent injury to other mail matter. The sender's name and address must appear on each package.

RATES on packages weighing four ounces or less, one cent for each ounce or fraction thereof, regardless of distance. Packages of eight ounces or less, containing books, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions and plants, one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof, regardless of distance. All other parcels of fourth class matter are charged according to weight and distance, as follows:—

Parcels for delivery by the post office within whose limits they are mailed, or by any letter carrier of that office, or on any rural route starting from that office, five cents for the first pound, and one cent for each additional two pounds or fraction thereof.

Parcels delivered outside of the limits of the post office where mailed are charged as follows, a fraction of a pound being charged as a full pound:—

* Parcels subject to pound rates, mailed for delivery in the first or second zones, are, when the distance by the shortest regular mail routes is 300 miles or more, charged at third zone rates, six cents for the first pound and two cents for each additional pound or fraction thereof.

The eighth zone rate applies to all parcels between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands, the Canal Zone, Alaska, the Philippine Islands, Guam, Tutuila, the Samoan Group east of longitude 171° West, other possessions of the United States, and United States war vessels stationed in foreign waters, also between any two post offices in Alaska. This rate also applies to all fourth class matter mailed to Canada, Mexico, Cuba and the Republic of Panama, including seeds, etc., but excluding books and other printed matter, on which the rate to those countries is one cent for each two ounces in all cases.

WAR TAX. On all parcel post packages on which the postage amounts to twenty-five cents or more, there shall be paid a tax of one cent for each postage charge of twenty-five cents or fractional part of twenty-five cents, payable in internal revenue stamps, which the sender cancels by writing his initials and the date thereon, in ink. The stamps are for sale by postmasters. Postage stamps cannot be used in payment of the tax, nor can revenue stamps be used for postage. The tax is on postage only, not on fees for registration, insurance or C. O. D. service. This tax applies to parcel post packages for Alaska and Hawaii, but not to those for other outlying territories, for United States naval vessels or the United States Forces abroad.

WEIGHT LIMITS. Seventy pounds for parcels mailed for delivery by the post office where mailed or within the first, second and third zones, and fifty pounds in all other zones.

SIZE LIMITS. Parcels must not measure more than 84 inches in length and girth combined. **ENCLOSURES.** There may be enclosed with fourth class matter a written or printed invoice showing the name and address of the sender and the addressee, with name, quantity, price, size, style, and quality of the articles contained, date of order and date and manner of shipment and the name of the salesman or packer, and printed matter descriptive of the articles it accompanies.

The rules as to permissible writing on or in fourth class packages and personal communications attached thereto are the same as for third class matter.

PLACE OF MAILING. Parcels of books, seeds and plants, weighing eight ounces or less, and other fourth class matter weighing four ounces or less may be deposited in letter or package boxes. All other parcels must be mailed at a post office, branch post office or station or delivered to a rural or other carrier duly authorized to receive such matter.

INSURANCE. Fourth class matter may be insured against loss or damage by a fee, payable in postage stamps affixed to the parcel, for an amount equal to its actual value, up to \$5.00 for three cents, \$25.00 for five cents, \$50.00 for ten cents and \$100.00 for twenty-five cents.

C. O. D. FEES. Fourth class packages may be sent C. O. D. and the price of the article will be collected from the addressee for a fee of ten cents when the amount to be collected does not exceed \$50.00, and for twenty-five cents when the amount does not exceed \$100.00. This fee also covers insurance on such parcels up to the actual value of the contents.

FOREIGN MAILS

Articles addressed for delivery in Canada, Cuba, Mexico and Panama are subject, with certain exceptions on second, third and fourth class matter, to the same rates and conditions as if they were addressed for delivery in the United States.

FIRST CLASS mail rates for letters to the Bahamas, Barbados, British Guiana, British Honduras, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies, England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Leeward Islands (including Antigua, Dominica, St. Christopher and others), Newfoundland, Trinidad, Tobago, New Zealand and the Windward Islands (including Grenada, St. Vincent, The Grenadines and St. Lucia), are two cents for each ounce or fraction thereof. To all other countries five cents for the first ounce and three cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof.

POSTAL CARDS. Two cents each for single, four cents for double.

PRINTED MATTER. One cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

COMMERCIAL PAPERS. Five cents for ten ounces or less and one cent for each additional two ounces or fraction thereof.

SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE. Two cents for four ounces or less and one cent for each additional two ounces or fraction thereof.

INTERNATIONAL PARCEL POST. Twelve cents a pound or fraction thereof. Limits, length, 3½ feet; length and girth combined, 6 feet; weight, 11 pounds. For exceptions, restrictions, etc., see postmasters.

s.c. It does not appear that the earliest printers had any method of correcting errors before the form was on the press. The learned ~~The learned~~ correctors of the first two centuries of printing were not proofreaders in our sense; they were rather what we should term office editors. Their labors were chiefly to see that the proof corresponded to the copy, but that the printed page was correct in its Latinity ~~that the words were there~~, and that the sense was right. They cared but little about orthography, bad letters, or purely printer's errors, and when the text seemed to them wrong they consulted fresh authorities or altered it on their own responsibility. Good proofs in the modern sense, were ~~not~~ possible until professional readers were employed; men who [had] first a printer's education, and then spent many years in the correction of proof. The orthography of English, which for the past century has undergone little change, was very fluctuating until after the publication of Johnson's Dictionary, and capitals, which have been used with considerable regularity for the past 80 years, were previously used on the [miss for hit] plan. The approach to regularity, so far as we have, may be attributed to the growth of a class of professional proof readers, and it is to them that we owe the correctness of modern printing. More errors have been found in the Bible than in any other one work. For many generations it was frequently the case that Bibles were brought out stealthily, from fear of governmental interference. They were frequently printed from imperfect texts, and were often modified to meet the views of those who published them. The story is related that a certain woman in Germany, who was the wife of a printer, and had become disgusted with the continual assertions of the superiority of man over woman which she had heard, hurried into the composing room while her husband was at supper and altered a sentence in the Bible, which he was printing, so that it read Narr, instead of Herr, thus making the verse read "And he shall be thy fool" instead of "And he shall be thy Lord". The word, not was omitted by Barker, the King's printer in England in 1632, in printing the seventh commandment. He was fined £3,000 on this account.

Populations, unmarked, in the United States are from the United States census of 1910, except in the states of Florida, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Rhode Island, South Dakota and Wyoming, each of which is credited with the official figures of a state census taken in 1915. Canadian populations are from the census of 1911. All populations marked with an asterisk (*) are estimated. Almost all of the estimated populations of the cities of 8,000 or more in the United States, except in those states which had a 1915 census, are taken from the published Census Bureau estimates for the year 1914.

The width of the column of each publication is given in nonpareil ems, the length in agate lines. For the benefit of those not conversant with printers' terms we may state that a nonpareil em measures exactly one twelfth of an inch, an agate line, the usual unit of measurement of advertising space, is one-fourteenth of an inch.

Circulation statements for which affidavits have been furnished are printed in **bold-face** figures; detailed statements are designated by a six-pointed star (*); signed statements, neither detailed nor sworn to, are designated by a double-dagger (‡); those unmarked are estimated from the latest presumably authentic information we have. Post Office Statements credited were made in 1919. A great number of publishers, members of the Audit Bureau of Circulations, in the reasonable belief that their sworn statements to that organization should be sufficient to meet all requests for circulation information, eliminating the time and labor necessary to make out other statements, have referred us to their A. B. C. statements. All circulation figures so taken are printed in bold face, as all are sworn to, and are accompanied by a note showing their origin, and the total net paid figures only are printed. All such figures are from statements made in the year 1919.

Where circulation figures are omitted, we have been unable to obtain any satisfactory information, or recent information indicates that circulation statements made early in the year do not represent actual conditions at the time we went to press, or the paper was established during the current year, or is entered for the first time in the ANNUAL. The word "decline" indicates that the publishers have declined to furnish any statement for publication.

STATE CAPITAL, MONTGOMERY

ALABAMA is bounded north by Tennessee, east by Georgia and Florida, south by Florida and the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Mississippi. Its extreme length north to south is 336 miles; breadth varying from about 150 to 200 miles; land area, 51,540 square miles. The climate in the northern portion is mild; the portion bordering on the Gulf may be called semi-tropical. The Alleghany range enters the state at the northeast and extends toward the centre, finally losing itself in mere hills; then follows a tract of rolling prairies, interspersed with pine barrens and exceedingly rich alluvial bottoms, including the cane brake region, one of the richest cotton-producing districts in the world. From this to the Florida border and the Gulf the land is gently undulating. This part is covered with forests of yellow pine, which is growing valuable, since the available supply of better timber has become small. Over a billion feet is cut annually. The total forest area is about 20,000,000 acres. The production of naval stores here is very considerable. The cut over pine lands are being settled by white farmers and good crops of corn, cotton, truck and fruit are grown. North of this is a broad belt of rich black soil, constituting the great cotton-producing section of the state. The soil then becomes sandy and poor, but abundant water power renders it capable of becoming a fine manufacturing district. The mineral region occupies the northeast part, while the northwest is a good agricultural and stock raising country. The mountain district and the valley of the Tennessee possess fine forests of hardwood timber.

AGRICULTURE. Cotton is grown throughout the state, but mainly in the central belt mentioned. The 1918 crop was 820,000 bales. The third largest yield of cotton (in the seed) in the country in 1916 was grown by a Chambers county boy farmer, who grew 3,019 pounds on one acre. The state's average was only 221 pounds, and the average for the United States 447.4 pounds per acre. A boy in Morgan county grew 140 bushels of corn on one acre, the state's average being only 12.5 bushels per acre. The United States average yield was 21.4 bushels, only one-sixth of this boy's crop. Tobacco is grown to some extent, and the light sandy loams of the central and southern portions produce a remarkably good quality of wrappers, of both the Sumatra and Cuban varieties. Very fine wheat is grown in the north and northeast; rice in the south; corn largely all over the state. A large amount of cane syrup is made, being 8,195,000 gallons in 1918. This was exceeded by only one state, Louisiana. Alabama holds first place in sweet potatoes, with a crop, in 1918, of 14,688,000 bushels and in peanuts, with 17,480,000 bushels, and third in peaches, 3,142,000 bushels. Dairy products, fruits, wool and oats are produced in considerable quantities and immense quantities of truck of all kinds, berries and small fruits are grown and shipped north, the climate and other local conditions being peculiarly favorable to this industry. The total value of the 1918 crops of all kinds was \$366,677,000. There were in 1910 262,720 farms in Alabama, the average area being 79 acres.

INDUSTRIES. Manufacturing interests have become important. The number of manufacturing plants increased 81 per cent. from 1904 to 1909. In the latter year there were 3,401 establishments, turning out an annual product worth \$146,481,000. The chief manufactures are iron, steel and their products, machinery and heavy castings, iron and soil pipe, cotton gins, flour, lumber (nearly 2,000,000,000 feet annually), leather, cotton goods, yarns, thread, turpentine, etc. Cotton manufacturing is growing fast and there are nearly a million spindles in the various mills in the state. Oysters and other shellfish are plentiful. Alabama's export and import trade centers at Mobile. Cotton, lumber, iron and naval stores are the chief exports. There are nearly five thousand miles of steam railroads, and a number of navigable rivers.

MINERALS. Extensive beds of brown and red iron ore are found in the counties of Jefferson, Bibb, Cleburne, Blount, St. Clair, Franklin, Shelby, Talladega and Etowah, covering a total area of over 7,500 square miles. Coal deposits are found over a large section of North Alabama in and around the Birmingham district, the total area of coal bearing lands being estimated at 5,500 square miles. Bituminous coal of several kinds is found and the mining of it now gives employment to many thousand men. The state's coal production in 1917 was 20,068,074 tons. Other mineral productions were pig iron 2,953,705 tons; coke, 4,892,589 tons. Birmingham is the center of the iron and coal region. Here are situated large steel works, many furnaces and scores of foundries, machine shops and pipe plants. The manufacture of basic steel from Alabama ores has proved a practical success and steel rails are now being manufactured at Ensley and other towns in Jefferson county, to the amount of about 50,000 tons each month. Considerable gold has been mined; silver, bauxite and copper are also found; potter's, porcelain and fire clays, hydraulic limestone, manganese, mica, graphite, asbestos, cement rock, emery and many other minerals exist in considerable quantities; there are various building stones. The statuary granite and white marble of Coosa county and the variegated marbles of Talladega and adjacent counties are not surpassed by any in the country. In Fayette and other counties natural gas is found.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Alabama is 200, including 24 daily, 5 semi-weekly, 151 weekly, 4 semi-monthly, 12 monthly, 1 bi-monthly, and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 121, of which 70, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

ALASKA is bounded north by the Arctic Ocean, east by the Yukon district of Canada and British Columbia, south by the Pacific Ocean, and west by Behring Sea and Strait, and numerous islands. It has a total area of about 590,884 square miles, its greatest length, from north to south, being 1,200 miles and greatest breadth over 800 miles. The northern half is low with great swampy morasses along the streams, running back into low, rolling hills. The population of this portion consists chiefly of Indians, who live along the streams in small bands. The southern half is mountainous, and along the southeast coast are some of the highest mountain peaks on the American continent; Mount St. Elias, the principal one, is over 18,000 feet. Near the center of the territory is Mt. McKinley, the loftiest on the entire continent, summit over 20,000 feet. The southwesterly section comprises the peninsula of Alaska and the Aleutian islands, the latter the principal seat of the fur seal and sea otter fisheries. The production of the latter fur has greatly decreased, as the animal is now almost extinct. This district is mountainous and actively volcanic.

MINERALS. The principal industry at present is mining, the country being seamed by the largest quartz veins in the world. The production of gold in 1917 was 733,911 ounces, valued at \$15,171,300; silver 1,351,100 ounces, worth \$1,112,800; tin, 104 tons in 1915, value \$96,560. Valuable deposits of copper are also being developed. Coal, which was first discovered in 1855 by the Russians, has been worked to some extent. The output varies greatly, one year reaching over 10,000 tons. Deposits of anthracite of high quality have recently been discovered, as well as new fields of bituminous, the new coal fields covering an area of almost a thousand square miles, and it is believed that Alaska, with improved transportation facilities, will greatly increase its production. Some small deposits of petroleum have been found, also gypsum, antimony and graphite. Marble is quarried on Prince of Wales Island.

FISHERIES. The fisheries in 1917 employed 639 vessels of a total of 89,483 tons, and 20,481 persons, the product, chiefly canned and dried salmon, being worth over \$50,000,000. \$54,000,000 is invested in this industry.

AGRICULTURE. The agricultural industries in Alaska are confined to a few small truck farms near the cities, but the Department of Agriculture has established experiment stations in various places, and oats and wheat have been brought to maturity in favored situations. Some cattle have been raised on the Aleutian Islands, and it is believed that the enterprise will be successful. The Department of Agriculture is also raising sheep there.

COMMERCE AND TRANSPORTATION. The exports consist chiefly of gold, canned salmon and other fish, copper ore and furs. Seal skins were exported to the United States to the value of \$211,830 (7,061 skins) in the year ending June 30th, 1917; gold to the value of \$15,409,529; canned salmon, 231,322,837 pounds, valued at \$21,195,612, other fish, \$2,638,050; copper, \$33,098,190, an increase of nearly \$30,000,000 in three years; silver, \$683,824. The imports are chiefly hardware, machinery, tin cans and tin plate, explosives, cotton goods and provisions, and the export and import trade for the year ending June 30th, 1917, with the United States was, imports, \$38,992,049; exports, \$60,773,850. Only about four per cent. of the commerce is with other countries. About 27,000,000 acres of forest land are set apart as national forests under the care of the Forest Service of the Department of Agriculture and their timber will be cut under the supervision of the department in such a manner as to make them a permanent source of supply. In 1912, 45,000,000 feet of timber were sold. The coast, from the southern boundary to Cape Spencer, is lined with a continuous chain of islands, between which and the main land are salt water channels, navigable for the largest sized steamships. In the interior is one of the largest rivers in the world, the Yukon, which has a course of between 1,500 and 1,600 miles through the territory, navigable the entire distance. There is a weekly steamboat between St. Michael, Alaska and Dawson, in the Yukon Territory of Canada, through the season when the river is open. There is also frequent steamboat connection between south coast towns and the ports of Seattle, Portland and San Francisco and monthly steamers from those cities to the Behring Sea ports. Places on the north and northwest coasts are reached once or twice a year. The United States government is now building a railroad from Seward to Fairbanks, several hundred miles being already in use. Other railroads run from Skaway to White Horse, Yukon Territory, Canada, about 40 miles; from Fairbanks, north, about 40 miles and from Cordova, north, along the Copper River, about 200 miles.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Alaska is 27, including 10 daily, 1 three times a week, 1 semi-weekly, 13 weekly, 1 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 15, of which 4, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

ARIZONA

Population *239,053
(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, PHOENIX

ARIZONA is bounded north by Utah and Nevada, south by Mexico, east by New Mexico, and west by California and Nevada; length, north to south, 390 miles, breadth averaging about 300 miles; land area, 113,956 square miles. It lies entirely within the valley of the Colorado, which stream forms nearly all the western boundary. The streams generally flow through deeply eroded chasms, among them being the wonderful "Grand Cañon of the Colorado." The rainfall is very light, increasing with the altitude and varying from 3.15 inches at Yuma, which has an elevation of 141 feet, to 23.87 inches at Flagstaff, at an elevation of 6,907 feet. The Weather Bureau station at Yuma shows the lowest percentage of humidity in the United States, 42 per cent.

AGRICULTURE, LIVE STOCK, ETC. Farming is successfully carried on in the valley lands, by the aid of irrigation, and the mountain lands are well adapted to stock raising and wool growing. The production of wool in 1918 was 5,656,000 pounds. The reports of the United States Department of Agriculture for January, 1919, give Arizona 1,185,000 cattle, of which 84,000 were dairy cows; 136,000 horses and 1,400,000 sheep. The 1910 census found 223,512 goats and about 260,000 head of poultry. The raising of ostriches is one of the great industries of the state, which has more than 80 per cent of all the ostriches in the United States. The ostrich farms are all in the Salt River valley, which seems to be peculiarly well adapted to their needs. Several thousand birds are in the valley, and feathers of the finest quality are abundantly produced. Their principal food is alfalfa, and that they thrive on it is shown by the fact that nearly 2,000 young birds were successfully raised in 1909. Irrigation is necessary almost everywhere and has been practiced by some of the Indian races from time immemorial, also by the Mexicans before the country passed into the possession of the United States. In recent years, under government care, the area irrigated has been greatly extended. The great Roosevelt dam, constructed under the national irrigation law, and dedicated in the spring of 1910, stores the flood waters of Salt River and Tonto Creek and forms a reservoir whose capacity is sufficient to cover 1,284,000 acres, or a little over 2,000 square miles, a foot deep. Its purpose is to irrigate 240,000 acres of land in the Salt River valley, sixty miles distant from the reservoir. The annual rainfall in this district is only five inches, and the average temperature 69°. Another district of 250,000 acres will be irrigated from the Laguna dam on the Colorado River, near Yuma. It is calculated that it will be possible to irrigate a total of about 900,000 to 1,000,000 acres. A sufficient supply of water demonstrates that the soil of the state has remarkable fertility, and a succession of crops can be grown throughout the year. Oranges, lemons, grape fruit, canteloupes, dates, figs and other deciduous fruits thrive, as well as every variety of fruits and vegetables which will grow in the temperate and semi-tropic zones. The high summer temperature and the days of uninterrupted sunshine make the valley lands wonderful producers of exotic fruits and vegetables. The U. S. Weather Bureau at Phoenix shows the highest summer temperature in the United States, the average from April to October, inclusive, being over 100°, reaching as high as 119° in June. The winter months bring the annual mean down to 69°. Alfalfa and grain are the principal crops grown on the irrigated lands, and with the division of the farms into smaller holdings the dairy industry is increasing and will soon take a prominent position. The chief grain crops are barley and kafir corn. Wheat, corn, oats, beans and cotton (51,000 bales in 1918) are also grown. Sugar beets have been successfully grown, and the acreage will be considerably increased as soon as the factories can take care of the crops. "Dry farming" has been carried on with good results in some parts of the territory, and fair crops of grain and fruit have been secured, but the results are yet somewhat doubtful. It is believed, however, that the establishment of an experimental station in the district suited to this branch of agriculture will result in discoveries that will be of great benefit. The area of farm lands and the number of farms are increasing fast. The total value of field crops in 1918 was \$42,267,000. There were in 1910 8,088 farms, averaging 154 acres. In the north are pine forests of large extent, the greater portion being included in the National Forests, the timber of which is being cut under government supervision, which prevents the destructive methods usual under private ownership. The annual cut of lumber is estimated to reach nearly 100,000,000 feet.

MINERALS. The chief wealth of the state, however, lies in its mineral deposits. Gold, silver, lead, and copper abound, and the mining and working of gold and copper ores is at present the leading industry. Gold, 267,700 ounces, valued at \$5,533,800; silver, 8,183,200 ounces were produced in 1917, valued at \$6,738,900, also 450,000,000 pounds of copper; 22,272,000 pounds of lead and 17,729,000 pounds of zinc in 1915. The production of copper was much greater in that year than in any other state, being 459,972,295 pounds, worth over \$80,000,000, about one-third of the country's total.

COMMERCE AND TRANSPORTATION. There are now over 2,000 miles of railroads. An extensive system of good roads is provided for under a special tax and will be of material assistance in opening up the country to settlement. Manufactures are small, but increasing with the needs of a growing population. There are over 300 manufacturing establishments, with products valued at over \$50,000,000.

ARKANSAS

Population *1,686,480
(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, LITTLE ROCK

ARKANSAS is bounded north by Missouri, east by Missouri, Tennessee, and Mississippi, south by Louisiana, southwest by Texas, and west by Oklahoma; greatest length from north to south, 240 miles, and breadth from 170 to 250 miles; land area, 53,045 square miles. The state is well watered by numerous streams and the average rainfall is about 45 inches. The summer season is long, the winters short and mild. The eastern part is low and level, originally covered with dense forests and many swamps and lakes, and frequently more or less inundated by the Mississippi, Arkansas, and other rivers, but this part of the state is being drained, and the land, which is of great fertility, brought into use, a great part of it being devoted to the culture of rice. The surface rises toward the centre, where it is hilly and diversified with forests and rolling prairies. Further west are branches of the Ozark Mountains, comprising the Black Hills in the north, Cane Hills in the northwest, and the Ouachita Hills in the south. The valley of the St. Francis, in the northeast, like the Mississippi valley, is gradually being drained; the valley of the Arkansas, from the Oklahoma line entirely across the state, is unsurpassed as a cotton producing country; the valley of the White in the north, abounding in forests, is also rich in agriculture and has deposits of zinc and marble. In the southern part of the state are the Saline, Ouachita, Little Missouri and Red rivers, while in the southeast the Bayou Bartholomew drains a large area, giving it communication with the Mississippi.

AGRICULTURE. Arkansas had in 1910 214,275 farms averaging 82 acres. The soil is very varied in character, and its elevation reaches up to 2,500 feet, so that almost every crop which can be grown between the lakes and the Gulf of Mexico can be successfully grown in Arkansas. The river bottoms are very fertile, and yield large crops of cotton, corn, sweet potatoes, rice, tobacco and fruit. The cotton crop in 1918 was 935,000 bales. The soil on the uplands, particularly in the north, produces good crops of wheat, oats, and fruit, especially apples and peaches. Two crops of potatoes are frequently grown in one year and the average yield per acre is high, both of white and sweet potatoes. The country's record crop of sweet potatoes in 1916 was 1,000 bushels on two acres, 500 bushels per acre, was grown by a Cleveland county farmer. The country's average crop of "sweets" for that year, which was only 91.7 bushels per acre, was evidently produced by methods susceptible of much improvement. Cotton is the chief staple; corn next. Corn clubs are doing good work toward the production of more and better corn. Many acres have shown a yield of from 75 to 100 bushels. In one case, a 12-year-old boy in Montgomery county grew 120 bushels. Rice is becoming one of the state's great products—Arkansas holding third place in this crop—and the small grains, peanuts, alfalfa and hay are important crops. The principal grain crops in 1918 were corn, 35,100,000 bushels; rice, 7,310,000 bushels; oats, 11,271,000 bushels; wheat, 3,048,000 bushels. The white potato crop was 2,400,000 bushels, sweet potatoes 3,420,000 bushels. Peanuts produced 546,000 bushels. Some sugar cane is grown for syrup. The field crops in 1918 had a value of \$331,479,000. Stock raising is an important and growing industry, the mild winters making it unnecessary to house the stock during that season.

MANUFACTURES. The principal manufactures are cottonseed oil, rice, flour and grist mill products, furniture, wagons and lumber. The manufacturing establishments numbered 2,925 in 1909, an increase of 52 per cent. from 1904. The goods produced had a value of \$74,916,000. Lumber and its products occupy the first place with 1,697 establishments in 1909, producing goods valued at over \$40,000,000. The 1916 output was 1,910,000,000 feet. Next in value come cottonseed products, value nearly \$8,000,000. Lumber, especially hardwood, is abundant, and the state produces large quantities of red gum, hickory, ash, cottonwood, cypress, pine, oak and sycamore.

MINERALS. Coal (about 2,000,000 tons a year), argentiferous galena, zinc, copper, lead, phosphate rock, bauxite, fuller's earth, cement rock, asphalt, soapstone, chalk, lithograph stone, slate, whetstones, iron, marble, grindstone, granite and kaolin are among the minerals. Diamonds have been discovered in Pike county, and the mines are being worked to some extent with a production of a few thousand dollars each year. Pearls are found in many of the rivers. Good coal is mined in Crawford, Conway, Franklin, Johnson, Perry, Pope, Pulaski, Sebastian, Scott, Washington, White, and Yell counties. Silver is found in connection with galena in Pulaski and Sevier counties, and with lead in Benton, Carroll, Independence, Izard, Lawrence, Madison, Marion, Newton, Randolph, Searcy, and Washington counties. Excellent marble quarried. Slate for all purposes is quarried in Pike, Pulaski, Polk, Garland and Sevier counties; Garland county has extensive quarries of Arkansas hone or ollstone. In Pulaski county, a few miles south of Little Rock, very extensive quarries of blue granite have been opened up, and valuable discoveries of iron have also been made. A large part of the country's supply of aluminum is made from Arkansas bauxite. The mineral deposits in general are being rapidly developed, and much eastern capital is being invested. Natural gas is found in the western part of the state. Among the mineral springs, the "Hot Springs of Arkansas," at Hot Springs, are the most renowned. There are others, celebrated for their medicinal qualities, at Eureka Springs, Heber and Searcy. Over a million gallons of mineral waters are shipped out each year.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Arkansas is 287, including 32 daily 1 three times a week, 6 semi-weekly, 227 weekly, 4 semi-monthly, 15 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 1 issue unknown. The places of publication number 164, of which 84, designated by a dagger †, are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, SACRAMENTO

CALIFORNIA is bounded north by Oregon, east by Nevada and Arizona, south by Lower California, and west by the Pacific Ocean. A line drawn through its centre, following the curves of the eastern and western borders, would measure about 770 miles. Its average breadth is about 230 miles; land area, 155,980 square miles. It is the largest state in the Union except Texas. The state is traversed by two great ranges, the Sierra Nevada in the east and the Coast Range in the west, and between them are the beautiful and fertile valleys of the Sacramento and San Joaquin, forming practically one immense basin, over 400 miles long. The Yosemite and other valleys are on the western slope of the Sierra Nevada, and the entire range teems with minerals, as does the Coast Range to a lesser degree. The surface presents every variety of soil and scenery. The highest peak in the country, excluding Alaska, is Mount Whitney (14,998 feet), and the lowest depression is in Death Valley (276 feet below sea-level). Both are in Inyo county, only 75 miles apart. The extreme north of the state is an elevated mountain region and is celebrated for timber, minerals and fresh fruits, such as apples, etc. The central and southern portions, except in the more mountainous districts, have soil unexcelled in fertility. The southwestern portion, although containing some fertile valleys, is chiefly a region of arid and barren deserts. Its mineral wealth, however, is great.

AGRICULTURE. Irrigation, necessary in much of the state's area, was originally introduced by the mission fathers and has been largely increased since the American occupation. The Mormons established a very elaborate system in San Bernardino county in 1853, and the Riverside Canal was built in 1869. Other large public and private enterprises are in operation. There are 360,000 irrigated farms, about a quarter of the whole number of such farms in the United States. The class of crops grown on these lands is shown by two record potato crops in 1916. One acre in Nevada county produced 692 bushels, one in Lassen county 678 bushels. The country's average in that year was 80½ bushels per acre. California occupies a high position in agriculture. Every kind of fruit that grows in semi-tropical and temperate climates finds a favorable soil and climate here. California stands first in production of beans, oranges, peaches, pears and hops. The wheat crop was 7,590,000 bushels in 1918. Barley was 34,321,000 bushels; 12,870,000 bushels of potatoes were grown. The hay crop was 2,970,000 tons. Corn produced 2,975,000 bushels; rice, 7,011,000 bushels; oats, 5,600,000 bushels; oranges, 14,322,000 boxes; peaches, 11,570,000 bushels; pears, 1,890,000 bushels; hops, 12,500,000 pounds; beans, 8,880,000 bushels. The total value of field crops was \$365,000,000. The 1918 wool clip was 12,545,000 pounds. Dairy cows numbered, in 1919, 561,000, other cattle and calves, 1,650,000; sheep, 2,943,000. There are several "ostrich farms" and the feathers produced are fully equal to those imported from Africa. The largest farms are at South Pasadena, where there are about 1,000 birds. Several others in the state have each 100 birds or more. It is estimated that the feathers of each male bird have an annual value of about \$30 raw, and \$100 after the various treatments necessary to prepare them for use. The yield of raisins in 1910 was about 120,000,000 pounds, about two-thirds of it from Fresno County; the yield of wine, 45,500,000 gallons, and of brandy, 2,500,000 gallons. Dried and canned fruits are extensively produced, prunes alone averaging over 75,000 tons each year; the 1912 output of dried fruits was 239,000 tons and the shipments of canned fruits to Great Britain alone over 1,000,000 cases. Canned tomatoes average around 3,000,000 cases yearly, only one state, Maryland, exceeding this. The 1918 tomato crop was 202,533 tons. The 1910 output of canned fruits was 3,200,000 cases. More than two-thirds of the citrus fruit in the country is grown here, the 1918 crop being worth over \$50,000,000. Deciduous fruits are worth nearly as much, almonds and walnuts over \$10,000,000, berries \$7,000,000. The 1910 census says California's crop of olives was 16,182,412 pounds, 88 per cent of the country's total. The quality is unexcelled. The crop of figs was 22,990,353 pounds, the country's total being 35,060,395 pounds. Honey is an important product. Peaches run from nine to ten million bushels. In beet sugar, the state in 1918 was third in rank. The factories produced 122,795 tons of sugar from 945,728 tons of beets. There were produced in 1910 45,819,471 pounds of butter and 4,648,348 pounds of cheese. Cotton is grown on irrigated lands in the Imperial Valley, 100,000 bales were produced in 1918. The lumber cut in 1918, over half being California redwood, the rest pine, spruce and cedar, was 1,420,000,000 feet.

MINERALS. California is famous also for her yield of precious metals. The 1,006,969 ounces of gold produced in 1917 was worth \$20,815,900, the silver weighed 1,839,800 ounces, valued at \$1,638,600. In 1914 the copper output was 44,098,552 pounds; zinc, 11,443,926 pounds, and lead, 6,346,319 pounds. Mercury produced 13,916 flasks, more than a million pounds, valued at \$1,189,818. There are numerous other minerals, including valuable deposits of platinum, coal, copper, asphalt, fuller's earth, pumice, tungsten, iron, chromium, antimony, borax, rock salt, soda, potash, sulphur, etc. Petroleum production is large, being 89,000,000 barrels in 1915, about a third of the total for the country. Natural gas is being used at Sacramento, Stockton, Santa Barbara, Redwood City, and other places.

INDUSTRIAL, ETC. Manufacturing interests are growing, the products for 1910 being worth \$485,000,000, the principal being lumber (about 4,500,000,000 feet annually), flour, woolsens, wine, brandy, tobacco, cigars, cement, machinery, and metallic wares. The annual value of the fisheries is over \$10,000,000. A large number of interurban electric lines have been built within the past few years, especially in the vicinity of San Francisco, Los Angeles and Sacramento, one of them from Sacramento to Chico being ninety miles long.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in California is 863, including 161 daily, 7 three times a week, 23 semi-weekly, 510 weekly, 4 fortnightly, 8 semi-monthly, 1 every four weeks, 140 monthly, 3 bi-monthly and 6 quarterly. The places of publication number 357, of which 57, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, DENVER

COLORADO is bounded north by Nebraska and Wyoming, east by Nebraska and Kansas, south by Oklahoma and New Mexico, and west by Utah. Length, from east to west, 380 miles, breadth, 280 miles; land area, 103,845 square miles. It is intersected near the center by the main range of the Rocky Mountains, otherwise known as the "Continental Divide," and including the highest peaks, among which are Pike's and Long's, Mts. Torrey, Lincoln, Gray, Yale and Harvard, and the Spanish Peaks, etc. The mountains enclose wonderful valleys or basins known as parks, many of which are small, but others larger than some entire states. These parks are well timbered, and abound with beautiful scenery, being diversified with low hills and ridges, which contain the sources of all the great rivers that rise in the state. The average altitude of this state is over 6,000 feet above sea level. There are 120 peaks of over 13,500 feet altitude and 85 over 14,000 feet. In crossing the mountains the height reached by railroad is 11,330 feet and by wagon road 13,700 feet. These altitudes, however, do not mean that the mountains are bare of vegetation, or snow-covered. While in the European Alps but little arboreal growth is found at over 6,000 feet, and the line of perpetual snow is found between 9,000 and 10,000 feet, timber is found in many places in Colorado at a height of 11,000 feet, and the snow line in summer is about 14,000. Wheat and oats have attained maturity at 7,000 to 8,000 feet, barley at over 10,000 feet and apples, pears, plums, cherries and small fruits between 7,000 and 8,000 feet. The climate is healthful and has been of great benefit to many invalids, who have tried Eastern and European resorts in vain, the dry atmosphere, light rainfall and abundant sunshine—nearly double that of the European resorts, together with the usually higher temperature, making an outdoor life both agreeable and beneficial. There are many mineral springs, some reputed to have medicinal virtues. The eastern part of Colorado is an immense plain which was for many years devoted to cattle raising, but is now being rapidly developed into one of the finest agricultural districts in the country.

AGRICULTURE. Much of the land will always no doubt be better fitted for grazing than for other uses, but the cultivated area is steadily increasing. Irrigating ditches have been constructed in all parts of the state and are being steadily extended. The total length of canals and ditches is now over 20,000 miles; acres irrigated, 3,000,000. Colorado is second only to California in the number of farms under irrigation. The state has about 240,000 such farms, one sixth of the total number in the country. Where water can be had the soil is very productive. The leading farm products are wheat, corn, beans, sugar beets, alfalfa, barley, oats, rye, broom corn, kaffir corn, flax, hay, melons, potatoes, fruits, honey, garden and dairy products. Colorado has some real farmers. The first and second largest yields per acre of oats in 1916, the first and second largest of wheat and the fourth largest of potatoes were all grown by Colorado farmers. The average crop of oats per acre for the nation was 30.1 bushels. An Eagle county farmer grew 428 bushels on three acres, 142 bushels per acre. A Grand county man grew 127 bushels per acre, making 381 bushels on three acres. In the great food staple, wheat, the difference is even more marked. The nation's average for the land sown to wheat in the three years 1915, 1916 and 1917 was 14.3 bushels per acre. The highest state average in any of the three years was Vermont's 1915 crop of 30 bushels per acre. In 1916 a farmer in Boulder county, grew 81.5 bushels per acre on twelve acres, another in the same county 73.5 bushels per acre on four acres. The average crop per acre for land in wheat during the three years in the chief wheat growing states were: Kansas, 12.2 bushels; Minnesota, 14 bushels; North Dakota, 10.5 bushels and South Dakota, 12.8 bushels. Colorado's yield of wheat in 1918 was 13,335,000 bushels; oats, 9,668,000; corn, 11,067,000; barley, 4,923,000; potatoes, 11,376,000 bushels; hay, 2,045,000 tons; beans, 1,638,000 bushels; beet sugar, the largest output among the states, 191,580 tons. In 1912, 16,027 carloads of fruit exported included 7,770 of apples, 4,042 of peaches and 2,300 of canteloupes. The total fruit crop for that year was valued at over \$6,000,000. The western slope is particularly adapted to the apple, more than two-thirds of the state's crop coming from that region. The 1918 crop was 1,845,000 bushels. Berries and other small fruits do well, also peaches and pears. Cattle, sheep and hog raising are among the chief agricultural pursuits. Colorado had, in 1919, 2,303,000 sheep and 1,465,000 cattle, of which 264,000 were dairy cows. The wool clip was 9,261,000 pounds in 1914.

MINERALS. The mining of gold, silver and other metals is one of the chief industries. The annual production of the precious and semi-precious metals is very large, the gold alone produced in 1917 being valued at \$15,955,000, second only to California; while the silver produced was worth \$6,722,700; 7,100,000 pounds of copper were produced 1914; lead, 66,661,000 pound; zinc, 100,000,000 pounds. Other mineral products are also abundant. Large beds of lignite, bituminous and semi-bituminous coal exist, also a little anthracite. The total extent of coal-bearing strata in the state being estimated at more than 20,000 square miles. The production of coal in 1917 was 12,433,336 tons; coke, 1,112,449 tons. Petroleum is found in various places. The 1913 output was 188,799 barrels. There are about 125 producing wells in the Florence field alone. Natural gas fields are also being developed. Cement, slate, sandstone, marble, granite, fire clay and manganese are being worked, and the iron of the state is manufactured into steel and iron rails. Some radium is produced in Montrose county. Thirty-three separate minerals are produced in commercial quantities, and the total annual mineral production in 1918 was valued at \$54,294,281.

Manufactures are developing. The census report, for the year 1909, gives the total value of manufactures in the state as \$130,044,000. Lumbering of is considerable importance.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Colorado is 382, including 40 daily, 1 three times a week, 6 semi-weekly, 281 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 49 monthly and 4 quarterly. The places of publication number 181, of which 61, designated by a dagger (†), are county seat.

STATE CAPITAL, HARTFORD

CONNECTICUT is bounded north by Massachusetts, east by Rhode Island, south by Long Island Sound, and west by New York. Its average length from east to west is 86 miles; its average breadth, 55 miles; land area, 5,004 square miles. The eastern part is principally composed of rounded hills, which, though stony, afford rich pasturage; and the valleys support a thrifty agricultural and manufacturing population. The Connecticut valley, near the river, and at a distance from the Sound, is very fertile. In the south the land is broken and the soil sandy and gravelly, but when well manured it yields good crops of potatoes, rye, oats, and corn. In the west the surface is rough and the hills are abrupt. There are several good harbors on the coast, and a large business is done in oyster fishing and in the taking of fish for oil and fertilizer. The state is second in the value of oyster fisheries, its annual production being 4,000,000 bushels.

AGRICULTURE. Agriculture employs less than one-third of the working population. Dairy products and hay are the principal staples of the east and west. Tobacco is largely grown, chiefly in the Connecticut valley, which produces the finest cigar wrappers grown in the United States. In 1918, 25,000 acres were planted, resulting in a crop of 37,500,000 pounds, with a total value, at the farm, of \$16,500,000. Corn, rye, oats, buckwheat and potatoes are grown in nearly all parts of the state. The 1918 corn crop was 2,400,000 bushels grown on 56,000 acres, and the average per acre—50 bushels, was higher than in any other state. The land near the large cities and towns is chiefly devoted to market gardening. The total value of the agricultural products in 1918 was \$59,964,000.

INDUSTRIES. Connecticut is mainly a manufacturing state, having an unusual abundance of water power, and its industries are extensive and varied. Among the leading productions are brass goods, clocks, hardware, india rubber goods, firearms, silver and silver plated ware, hats, corsets, cutlery, machinery, tools, automobiles, bicycles and textile fabrics. Connecticut stands first in the manufacture of brass goods, producing 44.6 per cent. of the total for the United States. In clocks, corsets, firearms and ammunition and silver plated ware, it produces over two-thirds of the country's totals. The state ranked twelfth among the states in the value of its manufactured products in 1909. It had 4,251 manufacturing establishments and from materials worth \$257,259,000 the labor of 233,871 workers produced goods worth \$490,272,000. The brass goods manufactured were worth \$86,933,000, foundry and machine shop products \$65,535,000; cotton goods, \$24,232,000; silk goods, \$21,069,000; firearms and ammunition, \$19,948,000.

A little iron is made from Connecticut ores, a productive tungsten mine is operated in Trumbull, but the state's mineral industries are practically confined to stone quarrying and clay working. Large quantities of brown stone are taken from the celebrated Portland sandstone quarries. The state of Connecticut, and especially its capital city of Hartford, has become celebrated for the extent and solidity of its insurance interests,—the nineteen life and fire companies of Hartford alone representing in capital and assets nearly two hundred millions of dollars. The lumber cut amounts to 75,000,000 feet a year.

The Connecticut river is open to steamboat navigation from its mouth to Hartford. The Thames river is likewise navigable by Sound steamers as far as its formation by the Yantic and Sbetucket rivers in Norwich city, and steamers ply regularly between that city and New York, and, in the summer season, to the shore resorts.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Connecticut is 149, including 36 daily, 4 semi-weekly, 83 weekly, 2 fortnightly 4 semi-monthly, 15 monthly, 1 six times during college year, 1 bi-monthly and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 64, of which 9, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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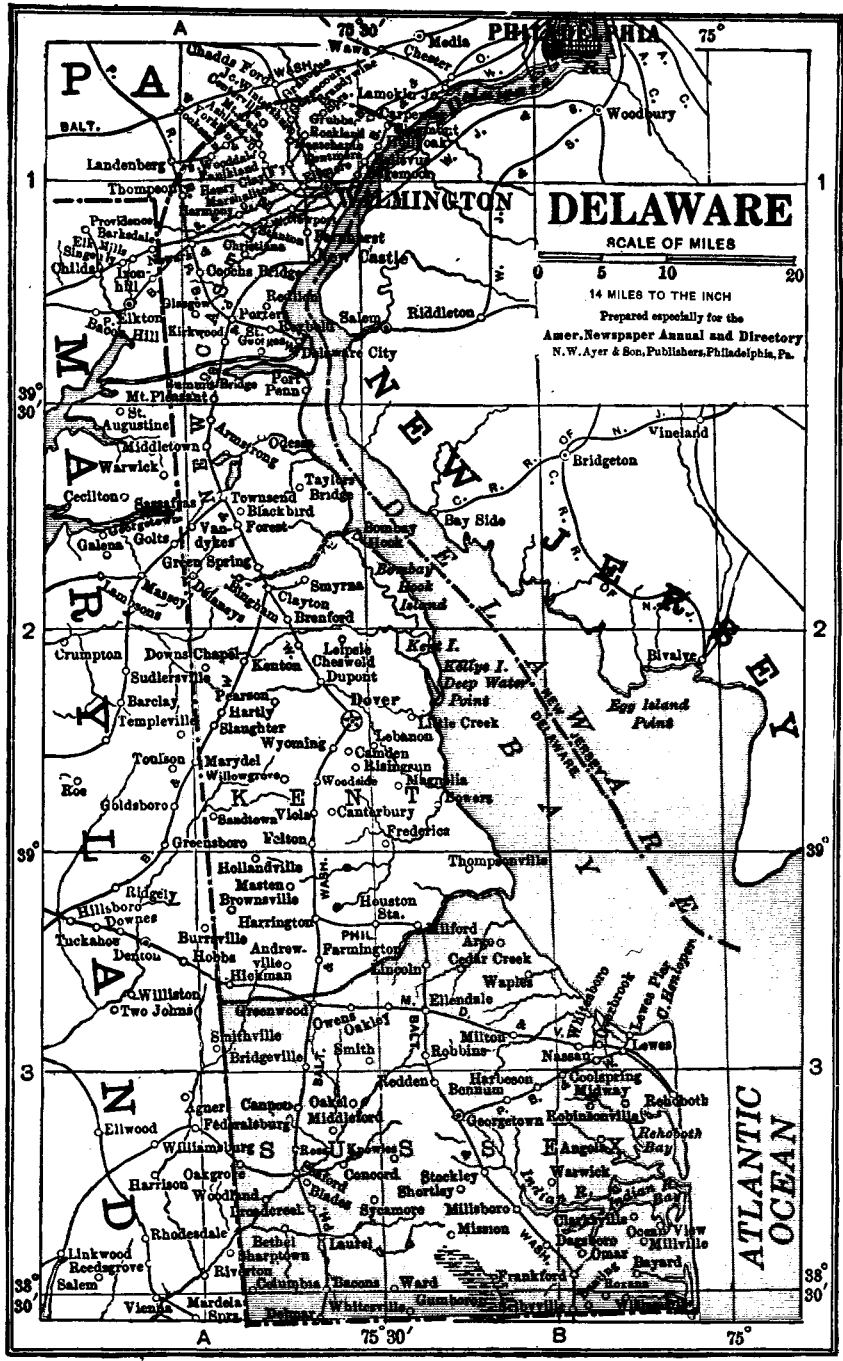

STATE CAPITAL, DOVER

DELAWARE is bounded north by Pennsylvania, east by the Delaware River and Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, south and west by Maryland. Its length from north to south is 96 miles, its breadth ranging from 9 to 12 miles in the north to about 38 miles in the south; land area 1,960 square miles. The surface in the north is somewhat hilly, and southward the land is rolling, with fringes of marshes and swampy tracts along the indentations of Delaware Bay. The southern portion of the state is in great part a sandy region, but by skillful farming has been made highly productive. Kaolin and iron ore are found in the north. The soil in the interior of the state is light and easily cultivated.

AGRICULTURE. The agricultural products are grain, corn, fruit, potatoes, and market garden produce; peach growing and small fruits—berries—are prominent industries. Apples and pears of fine quality are also largely grown. Over one hundred evaporators and canneries are engaged in preserving all kinds of fruits, berries and garden vegetables, at Seaford, Dover, Milford, Georgetown, Smyrna and other towns in the lower half of the state. In 1918, the state produced 7,285,000 bushels of corn, 1,729,000 bushels of wheat, 957,000 bushels of potatoes, 130,585 tons of tomatoes for the canneries, etc., and peaches, apples and pears in large quantities. In 1909, the latest year for which we have exact figures for small fruits and vegetables, the production was 18,845,539 quarts of berries, 623,786 baskets of fresh tomatoes, 258,982 bushels of canteloupes, and other fruit and vegetables in abundance. In 1918 the output of canned tomatoes was 1,901,900 cases. Poultry products have an annual value of \$2,500,000.

INDUSTRIES, FISHERIES, ETC. Manufactures are various, and are carried on chiefly in Wilmington and its vicinity. The 1910 census gives the total value of manufactured goods in 1909 as \$52,840,000. Iron goods, iron and wooden steam and sailing vessels, cars, bridges, structural steel, fibre products, crates and boxes for the canneries, gunpowder, paper, pulp, leather, carriages, machinery, cotton and woolen goods and flour are the leading products.

Seaford ships immense quantities of oysters, and Lewes is a station for menhaden and other fisheries. Oyster growing and fishing are important industries. Large quantities of timber are cut for ship building and railroad ties. Delaware's mineral industries are small and confined to stone and clay products.

Congress is considering provision for increasing the depth and width of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal, which connects the upper portions of the bays, and converting it into a free ship canal, which would greatly facilitate traffic between Philadelphia and Baltimore, and other ports in Maryland and Virginia. Other projects are being pushed for the drainage of swamp lands in Sussex County, and for the building of good roads, New Castle County alone spending \$600,000 for the latter purpose.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Delaware is 40, including 3 daily, 28 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 6 monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 13, of which 8, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

The DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA is inclosed by the state of Maryland, except on the southwest, which is bounded by the Potomac River; land area, 60 square miles. Surface undulating, with a fine fertile soil on the small portion, about twenty per cent., which is available for cultivation. Floriculture, truck growing and dairying are the chief agricultural industries, flowers and foliage plants leading with a production of fully sixty per cent. of the total value of all agricultural products. The number and total area of the farms are declining year by year. The United States Government has large plants for engraving, printing, bookbinding and the manufacture of various articles, employing in normal times about 15,000 persons. The private manufacturing industries are varied, the most important being the brewing of malt liquors, and the manufacture of ice, pottery, brick and clay products, lumber and planing mill products, marble and stone, roasted and ground coffee and spices, flour, structural iron work, castings and bottled mineral and carbonated waters. The manufactures have an annual value of over \$25,000,000. A considerable coasting trade is carried on.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in the District of Columbia is 104, including 6 daily, 24 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 51 monthly, 5 bi-monthly and 16 quarterly.

FLORIDA

Population 921,618

STATE CAPITAL, TALLAHASSEE

FLORIDA is bounded north by Alabama and Georgia, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south and west by the Gulf of Mexico and Alabama. The peninsular portion of the state is about 375 miles long by an average breadth of 90 miles; the upper portion 360 miles from east to west by from 90 to 90 miles from north to south: land area, 54,240 square miles. The surface is diversified with numerous lakes, the largest, Okeechobee, being 40 miles long by about 90 miles broad. There is a coast line of about 1,150 miles, while the water surface comprises one-fifteenth of the whole. The larger portion of that part of the peninsula south of Lake Okeechobee is occupied by the Everglades, an evergreen marsh or swamp, fifty-five miles wide by one hundred and fifty miles long, and covered with a dense growth of "saw grass," eight to ten feet high and so thick as to be practically impenetrable, except where it is intersected by numerous winding channels. The surface is dotted with innumerable islands of from half an acre to hundreds of acres in extent, almost all being subject to overflow during rainy seasons. The state has made good progress on a project for draining the Everglades, by cutting through the rim of limestone rock which confines the waters, and by controlling the overflow of Lake Okeechobee. This project, when carried to completion, will add millions of acres of most fertile soil to the area of tillable land. The Coast Line Canal, with a depth of five feet from Miami to Jacksonville has been completed. It is 370 miles long. A ship canal across the state from Jacksonville is under consideration and U. S. engineers have made preliminary surveys. Many other improvements of water courses are contemplated or under construction. From the northern end of the swamp to Georgia is mostly a dead level, with occasional undulations and small hills. The highest place in the state, at Mt. Pleasant station, is only 301 feet above the sea. The pine lands, which cover the greater part of the state, are studded, at intervals of a few miles, with stretches of extremely rich soil, called hammocks, varying in extent from small patches up to thousands of acres. The swamp lands, when drained, are remarkably fertile. The climate is semi-tropical, but the temperature does not reach the extremes attained in other states and frost is almost unknown. The U. S. Weather Bureau Station at Jupiter shows the highest average temperature in the United States, being 74°, the highest monthly average being 81°, the lowest 64°. The same station records the greatest annual rainfall, being 60.2 inches. The winter climate of Florida is exceedingly mild, frost being of rare occurrence, and it has become a most fashionable resort at that season.

AGRICULTURE. Florida had, in 1910, 49,834 farms, of an average area of 105 acres. Sugar cane is grown for syrup, chiefly along the Gulf coast. Both long and short staple cotton and tobacco are grown. Corn, rice and oats are the principal cereals. The cotton crop for 1918 was 25,000 bales, the tobacco crop 4,416,000 pounds; potatoes, 3,500,000 bushels. Oranges, peaches, lemons, limes, pineapples, figs, olives, peanuts and grapes flourish luxuriantly; garden vegetables are largely produced for the northern market. The orange crop in 1918 was 5,265,000 boxes. The total value of the farm products in 1918 was \$108,144,000. Cattle require little care, are not housed in winter, and large numbers are raised and shipped to Havana. Hogs form an important part of the live stock, numbering, in 1919, 1,512,000.

MINERALS. Immense deposits of phosphate rock underlying parts of several counties furnish material for large fertilizer industries, the product being shipped not only to other states but to European countries. The total product in 1914 was 2,138,891 tons, value \$7,354,744, nearly four-fifths of the country's product. Outside of a considerable output of fuller's earth and some brick and china clay, there are no other minerals of importance.

INDUSTRIAL, FISHERIES, ETC. Sponges are found on many parts of the coast. Pine lumber, ship timber, tar, rosin, turpentine, cottonseed oil and cake, palmetto hats and braids are manufactured; salt is made by solar evaporation; cigars are manufactured at Key West and at Ybor City, near Tampa, in large quantities. Naval stores form a very important part of the products, the value of turpentine and rosin alone amounting to over \$15,000,000 each year. The lumber cut is nearly one and a half billion feet.

The fisheries are of great value, the inland and coast waters being full of fish; oysters are abundant, and the sponge and coral fisheries are of considerable importance, the annual production of sponges being estimated to have a value of \$2,000,000. Manufactures are growing. The 1910 census figures give Florida 7,153 manufacturing establishments, with an annual output of \$72,724,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Florida is 194, including 33 daily, 4 semi-weekly, 145 weekly and 12 monthly. The places of publication number 104, of which 52, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, ATLANTA

GEORGIA is bounded north by Tennessee and North Carolina, northeast by South Carolina, southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, south by Florida, and west by Alabama. Its extreme length from north to south is 320 miles, extreme breadth 254 miles; land area, 58,980 square miles. The surface is varied; along the coast it is intersected by numerous rivers and sounds, and the country for miles inland is a succession of ridges of pines and live oaks and swamps of cypress; the great Okeefinokee swamp is in the southeast. Back from the coast is a stretch of sandy land, mostly pine barrens and yielding large amounts of timber and naval stores. A series of terraces bring the land in the middle of the state to about 575 feet above tidewater, from which elevation it rises toward the north more rapidly, until it becomes mountainous, being there crossed by spurs of the Appalachians.

AGRICULTURE. Georgia had in 1910 290,497 farms, averaging 93 acres. The soil of the islands is sandy, producing sea island cotton; that of the mainland, rich alluvial, producing corn, cotton and rice; the middle region is red loam, yielding good cotton, corn, tobacco, etc. In the North, grain, tobacco, fruits, and vegetables are largely grown, but cotton is mainly grown in the central, west central, and southwestern regions. Georgia's live stock forms an important part of the state's wealth. In the production of hogs, she excels all other southern states, having 3,043,000 in 1919. Georgia's fruit and vegetables, especially peaches (the 1918 crop was 6,746,000 bushels, exceeded by California only), and watermelons are greatly celebrated and enjoy a great sale in the northern markets. In the production of cotton Georgia ranks second among the states, her crop in 1918 reaching 2,100,000 bales. She was second also in peanuts, the 1918 crop being 10,136,000 bushels, nearly a fifth of the country's crop. Sugar cane is grown in the south, and considerable pork fattened, mainly for home consumption; wool is prominent, but corn and cotton are the leading staples. Wheat and oats are grown in considerable quantities. In 1918, the production of corn was 68,850,000 bushels; wheat, 3,631,000 bushels; oats, 12,000,000 bushels; potatoes, 1,610,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, in which Georgia holds second place, 11,960,000 bushels; tobacco, 2,668,000 pounds. Cane syrup, 7,500,000 gallons, exceeded only by Louisiana and Alabama. The prize cotton yield of America, in 1916, was from a farm in Wilkes county. One acre produced 3,336 pounds of cotton (in the seed), more than seven times as much as the average yield per acre for land in cotton in the United States, which was only 447.4 pounds. It may be of interest to note that Georgia's 1918 crops placed her fourth among the states, with a total agricultural production of \$590,292,000.

MANUFACTURES. Among the leading industries are lumber, flour, boots and shoes, carriages, cotton and woolen goods, wool carding and cloth dressing, leather, saddlery, metallic wares, furniture, castings, machinery, farm implements, etc. There are many cotton factories in the state. The most important are at Augusta and Columbus; the other chief seats of the cotton manufacture are Athens, Atlanta, Decatur, Macon, Savannah, and West Point. Savannah is the most important South Atlantic seaport. The city is the seat of a large foreign and domestic commerce. Its railroads extend to all parts of the country, and its steamships ply daily to the principal North Atlantic ports. Savannah is the largest naval stores port and second largest cotton and rice port in the United States, and holds an important place in the manufacture and shipment of lumber and fertilizers. Atlanta has large iron works, and has developed into a great manufacturing city. Rome, Dalton, Marietta and Thomasville are manufacturing towns. The iron and steel trade is overtaking the cotton manufacture in importance. Other important branches of manufacture are lumber (one billion feet annually), flour, pulp, etc. Darien, Brunswick and St. Marys manufacture and export lumber. The 1910 census gives the number of manufacturing plants as 4,792, with a production of \$202,863,000, more than double that of ten years previous.

MINERALS. Bituminous coal in the northwestern portion, producing over a hundred thousand tons annually; 39,589 tons of coke were made in 1917. Deposits of iron ore exist in Bartow, Chatooga and other counties; gold is found in Cherokee, Carroll, Cobb, and Lumpkin counties. Barytes, bauxite, fuller's earth, mineral paints and asbestos are produced in commercial quantities, granite, marble, gypsum and slate are found. There are numerous mineral springs, of which the Indian Spring in Butts county and the Bowden Lithia, or Salt Spring, in Douglas county, are the best known. The development of the rich marble resources in north Georgia during recent years has been wonderful. There are quarries of the finest marble in Pickens, Cherokee, Murray and adjoining counties, and millions of dollars have been invested in opening them.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Georgia is 319, including 31 daily, 1 three times a week, 12 semi-weekly, 215 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 6 semi-monthly, 48 monthly, 8 bi-monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 185, of which 144, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, BOISE

IDAHO is bounded north by British Columbia, east by Montana and Wyoming, south by Utah and Nevada, and west by Oregon and Washington; its length from north to south is about 380 miles, width varying from 44 to 325 miles; land area, 84,313 square miles. Surface is diversified, mountainous in the northern and central portions with arid plains in the south. In the southeast is a volcanic region, abounding in geysers and saline springs.

AGRICULTURE. The valley lands in many parts of the state are unsurpassed in fertility, and almost all crops of the temperate zone can be successfully grown, except those classed as sub-tropical. The farms in 1909 numbered 30,741, an increase since 1900 of 76 per cent. They averaged 171 acres. Fruits of all kinds belonging to the temperate zone are produced in abundance, and their quality is unexcelled. The chief products are wheat, live stock, fruits, potatoes, sugar beets, hay, oats and barley. Barley does especially well. A farm in Lewis county produced in 1916 a crop on 12 acres averaging 105 bushels to the acre. The state's average is usually 30 to 40 bushels, the United State's average about 25 bushels. The wheat crop in 1918 was 18,043,000 bushels, that of oats 9,480,000 bushels, barley 4,900,000 bushels, potatoes 5,220,000 bushels, hay 1,984,000 tons. The live stock produced is worth annually over \$9,000,000, the fruit over \$7,000,000. Mutton and wool are largely produced. Cattle in 1919 numbered 676,000, 139,000 being dairy cows, horses 276,000, sheep 3,231,000. Idaho stood second in sheep and third in wool production—19,500,000 pounds. The production of sugar beets and the manufacture of beet sugar form an important industry. Only five states excelled Idaho in the production of sugar beets in 1918. Her output of beet sugar was 44,652 tons. Many of the arid plains have been irrigated, and make excellent wheat growing districts. There is abundant water in the streams and lakes to reclaim the 10,000,000 acres which are susceptible of irrigation. The water power is said to be sufficient for all the needs of the state for transportation, manufacturing and all other purposes requiring power. Irrigation work to cost about \$150,000,000 has been planned and work already done on the various projects to the value of \$30,000,000. Dry farming is successfully carried on in various parts of the state. It is estimated that about 10,000,000 acres can be made productive by this means.

FORESTS. The forest-covered area is very large, embracing about 20,000,000 acres, much of the timber "lodge pole" pine of small diameter, but growing very thickly. Other trees are fir, spruce, cedar, etc., some of these being very large. The annual value of the lumber output is estimated at \$10,000,000. The National Forests occupy a large part of the forest area, and are estimated at forty-five billion feet of lumber. Nearly 2,000,000 sheep graze in them.

MINERALS. Gold, silver and lead are plentiful in all parts of the state and are largely produced, especially lead, the production of this metal in 1915 being 377,000,000 pounds. Gold to the amount of \$711,500 was produced in 1917, with \$9,621,000 in silver. In 1915, there were produced 7,169,000 pounds of copper and 80,000,000 pounds of zinc. Coal is also mined, and there are immense deposits of coal and phosphate rock which have not yet been developed. The total metal production was nearly \$40,000,000. Manufacturing industries are increasing with the rapid extension of transportation facilities and the increase of population.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Idaho is 155, including 14 daily, 1 three times a week, 5 semi-weekly, 128 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 5 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 108, of which 43, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, SPRINGFIELD

ILLINOIS is bounded north by Wisconsin, northeast by Lake Michigan, east by Indiana, southeast and south by Kentucky, and west by Missouri and Iowa; extreme length north and south 385 miles; extreme breadth 218 miles; land area, 58,960 square miles. The surface is mostly level table land, inclining gently toward the south, with bluffs along the principal rivers. A small tract in the northwest, around Galena, is somewhat broken, and a low mountain ridge extends across the southern end from Grand Tower, on the Mississippi River, to Shawneetown, on the Ohio, about 850 feet above sea level. This is a great fruit region. The prairies are sometimes level, but generally undulating.

MINERALS. The mineral wealth is great. More than two-thirds of the state is a productive bituminous coal field, the output in 1917 reaching 86,199,387 tons. Only two states, Pennsylvania and West Virginia exceeded this quantity. In the production of petroleum, being credited with 18,500,000 barrels in 1915, it is exceeded only by California and Oklahoma. Natural gas in large quantities has been discovered at various places in the state. The iron ore is good only when mixed with Michigan and Missouri ores. Lead and zinc are mined extensively in the northwest. Copper ore, a little silver, lead, zinc, tripoli, gypsum and marble are found. Limestone and freestone abound; 2,289,833 tons of coke were made in 1917.

AGRICULTURE. The prairie soils are deep and fertile; that of the river bottoms often seems inexhaustible. A tract called the American Bottom, extending along the Mississippi River a length of ninety miles by about five in breadth, has an alluvial soil about twenty-five feet in depth. Illinois is unexcelled as an agricultural state, and is among the first in manufactures. The total value of her field crops in 1918 was \$879,679,000, leading all other states. Spring and winter wheat, corn, and other cereals, dairy produce, wool and hay are leading products. Illinois stood second in corn in 1918, the crop was 418,000,000 bushels. The state is second in oats of which she grew 198,352,000 bushels; wheat produced 60,991,000 bushels; potatoes, 11,520,000 bushels; hay, 4,552,000 tons. In poultry, Illinois is exceeded only by Iowa. Broom corn, sorghum, buckwheat, barley, rye, sweet potatoes, root crops and some tobacco are also grown. Dairying is a very important industry, the dairy cows, numbering 1,060,000 in 1919 contributing to the state's wealth over half a billion gallons of milk each year. Other live stock are 1,387,000 beef cattle and calves, 1,028,000 sheep, 5,724,000 hogs and 1,467,000 horses. In the number of horses it stands fifth among the states and in hogs it is second only to Iowa. There is also a large production of fruit, livestock, mutton and wool. The wool clip in 1918 was 4,048,000 pounds. Illinois has over 250,000 farms. The total value of farm lands and buildings, according to the 1910 census, was over \$3,500,000,000, an average of \$108.12 per acre.

INDUSTRIAL. The manufactures embrace a wide range of articles, and the seats of manufacture are distributed generally throughout the state. The leading articles include iron and steel and their products, woodenware, furniture, farming implements, cars and carriages, flour, watches, woolen goods, bridge work, lumber, tiles, glassware, soap, malt and distilled liquors, etc. In 1905 the total production of iron and steel goods was valued at \$87,352,761. The total value of manufactured goods in 1909 was over \$1,900,000,000, produced in 18,026 factories. Illinois is exceeded, in this respect, by only New York and Pennsylvania. Fishing interests are extensive on the large rivers and on Lake Michigan. They center chiefly at Chicago, which is also the center of an immense business in live stock, lumber, slaughtering and meat packing industries. The value of the meat products from these establishments in 1909 was \$389,594,956. The state is amply supplied with transportation facilities, by rail, river and lake. It has 12,216 miles of railroad within its borders.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Illinois is 1,807, including 157 daily, 8 three times a week, 33 semi-weekly, 902 weekly, 8 fortnightly, 29 semi-monthly, 2 every three weeks, 639 monthly, 1 eight times a year, 1 six times a year, 1 four times a year, 1 semi-quarterly, 8 bi-monthly, and 17 quarterly. The places of publication number 615, of which 101, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL. INDIANAPOLIS

INDIANA is bounded north by Michigan and Lake Michigan, east by Ohio, south by Kentucky, and west by Illinois. Its extreme length north and south is 276 miles; average breadth 140 miles; land area 35,910 square miles. About two-thirds of the surface is undulating or level prairie; near the Ohio and other rivers the surface is hilly. In the extreme northwest there is a sandy tract, with considerable marsh land, where peat abounds and is an article of considerable commercial importance. The northeast abounds in oak openings and prairie land, interspersed with many small lakes. The soil is generally fertile, much of it exceedingly so; the richest is found along the Wabash, White, and White Water rivers.

MINERALS. There is abundance of coal of good quality, the 1917 output being 26,539,329 tons. The petroleum output amounts to nearly 1,000,000 barrels. The natural gas belt, one of the largest known in the world, extends over 21 counties, or more than 6,000 square miles. The iron manufactures are extensive, Indiana coal being particularly suited to this industry, but the ores used come mainly from the Lake Superior region, Missouri, and Tennessee. Indiana has some bog ore and local deposits of better grades which have been worked to some extent. Coke was produced to the amount of 3,540,718 tons in 1917. There are some salt springs, good sandstone, limestone, fire brick, potter's clays, and kaolin. The manufacture of cement is a large industry, over 10,000,000 barrels being made in 1913. Limestone is particularly abundant, being practically inexhaustible.

AGRICULTURE. Indiana ranks among the first as a grain producing and stock raising state. She had, in 1909, 214,741 farms, of an average size of 99 acres. Corn, of which 169,554,000 bushels were grown in 1918 (Indiana standing in third place among the states), is the largest single product; other important crops being wheat, 49,427,000 bushels; oats, 85,050,000 bushels; barley, 1,665,000 bushels; potatoes, 7,760,000 bushels; hay, 3,204,000 tons; rye, 6,765,000 bushels; tobacco, 15,159,800 pounds. Cattle, hogs, sheep and horses are raised in all parts of the state. Important among the live stock are sheep, numbering in 1919, 1,698,000 and hogs, 4,668,000. Butter, wool, fruits, maple sugar and sirup (238,000 pounds of sugar and 267,800 gallons of sirup in 1918), and sorghum molasses are also important products. Tomatoes for the canneries, ketchup factories, etc., produced 208,768 tons in 1918, and the output of canned tomatoes was 1,331,924 cases. The total value of the field crops in 1918 was \$507,563,000.

INDUSTRIES. Manufactures are numerous and extensive, the principal goods being flour and grist mill products, lumber (270 million feet yearly), woollen goods, furniture, carriages and wagons, iron and iron ware, machinery, agricultural implements, pork products, liquors, metallic wares, leather, canned goods, boots, shoes, clothing and automobiles. The manufacturing of automobiles is now an immense industry in Indiana, which is surpassed by only one state in the number built. The total value of manufactured goods in 1909 was \$578,728,000.

No state is better supplied with transportation facilities, as it lies directly in the path of almost all the great trunk lines, which have branches extending into all parts of the state; and fully half of its borders are on navigable waters. Indiana has a larger mileage of good roads than any other state, having 30,962 miles of hard surfaced roads in 1915, more than two-fifths of all the roads in the state. Ohio came next with 30,569, nearly double the mileage of New York, which held third place.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Indiana is 641, including 136 daily, three times a week, 19 semi-weekly, 416 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 6 semi-monthly, 54 monthly and 7 quarterly. The places of publication number 326, of which 91, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, DES MOINES

IOWA is bounded north by Minnesota, east by Wisconsin and Illinois, south by Missouri and west by Nebraska and South Dakota. Its greatest length from east to west is 300 miles, and breadth 208 miles; land area, 55,475 square miles. The surface, especially in the eastern, southern and southwestern parts of the state is generally rolling prairie, with no mountains nor very high hills, but with frequent bluffs along streams; and in places near the large rivers it presents a broken appearance, caused by erosion from torrents. The central and northern parts are the most level, with prairies, groves, and the numerous affluents of the two great rivers. While Iowa is generally known as entirely an agricultural state, there are about 2,250,000 acres of natural timber lands, situated almost entirely in the eastern portion of the state, and about 120,000 acres of planted timber. Most of the natural growth, however, is of little use except for fuel and fencing, the more valuable species having been largely cut off. In the northeast the surface is more elevated, with numerous low hills, with tops covered with oaks, and abounding in lead and other minerals; but the distinguishing feature of Iowa is its prairies which are every where fertile and easily tilled and, having few stones or stumps, are especially adapted for the use of agricultural machinery. The valleys of the Red Cedar, Iowa and Des Moines rivers contain the richest soils; northward of these the soil becomes less fertile, but is still productive and remunerative.

MINERALS. Building stone, cement rock, gypsum and clay of fine quality are abundant; coal and lead are extensively worked. The coal fields extend through twenty-three counties, with three hundred mines working, and the production in 1917 was 8,965,830 tons. Iron ore and a few other minerals are also found.

AGRICULTURE. At the time of the 1910 census Iowa had 216,807 farms, averaging 156 acres. In total value of crops in 1918, Iowa with a product worth \$321,920,000, was excelled only by Illinois. The cereals generally, dairy and market garden products, hay, wool, linseed, sorghum, and live stock of all kinds are very largely produced. Iowa is first in oats and corn. The 1918 crops included 375,824,000 bushels of corn; 229,572,000 bushels of oats; 4,236,000 tons of hay; 9,648,000 bushels of potatoes; 11,340,000 bushels of barley and 19,650,000 bushels of wheat. Other grains are also largely grown. Grapes grow well in the south, and fruit culture is increasing. Iowa is the headquarters of the hog, the porcine population in 1919, according to the government statistics, numbering 10,925,000, nearly double the number of the second state, Illinois. Iowa had also 1,322,000 sheep, 1,381,000 dairy cows, 2,861,000 other cattle and stood first in the number of horses, 1,567,000; third in the number of beef cattle and third in dairy cattle. This state is also first in poultry and eggs, having, according to the 1910 census, over 29,000,000 head of poultry, an average of over a dozen head for every man, woman and child in the state. The dairies supply about 600,000,000 gallons of milk yearly for all purposes. Iowa occupies third place among the states in the value of its dairy products. Prepared cereal products are also of great value. The total value of Iowa's farm property in 1910 was \$3,745,861,000, the land being worth \$2,801,974,000, buildings \$445,480,000, implements and machinery \$95,478,000, live stock \$456,453,000.

MANUFACTURES, ETC. The manufacturing interests are rapidly developing, especially in flour, lumber and wood working, carriages, bricks and other clay products, cement, woolen goods, boots and shoes, pork packing, saddlery, furniture, malt liquors and farm implements, and the total output of manufactured goods in 1914 was valued at \$400,000,000. Iowa has a well deserved reputation as a leading state in educational matters. She has twenty-six colleges, and over 200 libraries, of which 102 are public and the rest belong to educational and other institutions.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Iowa is 832, including 51 daily, 8 three times a week, 30 semi-weekly, 664 weekly, 1 three times a month, 1 fortnightly, 9 semi-monthly, 60 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 7 quarterly. The places of publication number 548, of which 109, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, TOPEKA

KANSAS is bounded north by Nebraska, east by Missouri, south by Oklahoma, and west by Colorado. Its length from east to west is 410 miles, and from north to south 207 miles; land area, 81,700 square miles. The surface is chiefly undulating in the east, while the western part has a rolling and varied surface, and until recently has been devoted to stock raising, but irrigation works are gradually changing it to an agricultural district of great fertility. There are no mountains, very few lakes, and those small and shallow; no marshes but salt marshes, and these are valuable. The bottom and table lands are chiefly a rich black loam, and highly productive. When the state was settled only five per cent. of the area was forest, and this was distributed mainly along streams and in occasional groves and small tracts; but it is estimated that the area of forest trees has since doubled by voluntary growth, transplanting, and by seed.

MINERALS. Kansas has rich mineral resources. The coal production in 1917 was 7,184,975 tons; petroleum, in 1914, 3,000,000 barrels, and rapidly increasing; salt, in 1914, 2,967,864 barrels. Natural gas is abundant. Some lead and zinc are produced.

AGRICULTURE. Kansas is primarily an agricultural state. There were, according to the 1910 census, 177,299 farms, averaging 244 acres. Winter and spring wheat, corn, rye, oats, live stock and potatoes are the chief products, while broom corn, sorghum, flax, hemp, castor beans, sugar beets, tobacco, and hay are also largely produced. Within the past twenty years, the growing of alfalfa has become one of the chief agricultural industries of the state, and large quantities of alfalfa hay are shipped east. Alfalfa meal mills have been established in many places, and the product is a valuable stock food which is becoming more generally used each year. The wheat crop of 1918 was 102,008,000 bushels; corn 43,523,000 bushels; oats 51,238,000 bushels; barley, rye and other grains are also largely grown. Kansas led in wheat and was second in the production of kaffir corn, with 20,107,000 bushels. Hay produced 2,617,000 tons; broom corn 8,500 tons. The total value of the 1918 field crops was \$424,298,000. Cattle raising is a prominent industry, and sheep farming is increasing in the western part. The number of cattle in the state in 1919 was 3,365,000, 964,000 being dairy cows; of hogs, 2,331,000, of horses, 1,153,000, of mules, 260,000 and of sheep, 460,000. The total value of the live stock products of the state in 1909 was \$90,000,000, and the value of all agricultural and animal products was \$307,538,164.91. The live stock market and the packing house industry in Kansas City, Kansas, are exceeded only by Chicago. The packing house products of the state in 1909 had a value of \$165,360,516. Dairy products are increasing rapidly, and in 1909 had a value of \$12,344,099. Over 1,000,000 pounds of honey is gathered annually.

MANUFACTURES. The manufacture of sugar from sugar beets and the making of glass are important industries. Manufactures are being developed, and the number of establishments is rapidly increasing, especially in the southeastern part of the state, where industrial enterprises are greatly assisted by the strong flow of natural gas, an extensive gas belt underlying that region. In 1909, 3,500 factories had a total output of over \$375,000,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Kansas is 652, including 66 daily 2 three times a week, 7 semi-weekly, 548 weekly, 3 semi-monthly, 24 monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 434, of which 103, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, FRANKFORT

KENTUCKY is bounded north by Ohio and Indiana, northwest by Illinois, east by West Virginia and Virginia, south by Tennessee, and west by Missouri; greatest length from east to west, 350 miles; greatest breadth, 178 miles; land area, 40,000 square miles. The surface in the east and southeast is mountainous, being broken by numerous parallel ranges of the Alleghany system, with deep and fertile valleys. Northwest of this section, and in the centre of the state, is the famous blue grass region, with a gently undulating upland surface, and deep valleys at the rivers. Between the Green and Cumberland rivers the surface is level and known as the "Barrens," from the scarcity of heavy timber. The western part is generally level, with slight undulations. The soil of the whole state is remarkably fertile; that part between Lexington and the Ohio river is known as the "Garden of Kentucky."

AGRICULTURE. The chief agricultural products are tobacco, hemp, corn, wheat, oats, rye, barley and potatoes. The corn crop for 1918 was 93,600,000 bushels, and the wheat crop 12,129,000 bushels. Hemp averages over 6,000,000 pounds. Apples, 3,780,000 bushels in 1918, are an important crop. Kentucky has acquired a world wide fame for its thoroughbred horses, shorthorn cattle, and mules. The wool clip is very large, and immense numbers of hogs are raised. The state in 1919 had 1,274,000 sheep and 1,768,000 hogs. The wool clip in 1918 was 3,058,000 pounds. Dairy products are very important; also sorghum, molasses, maple sugar, honey and wax; some cotton is raised in the southwest near the Tennessee line. In tobacco this state surpasses all others. In 1918, nearly a third of the American crop was grown within the state. In that year Kentucky grew 427,500,000 pounds on 475,000 acres, the total value being \$98,325,000. Louisville is the greatest leaf market in the world. There were in the census year 258,742 farms in the state, averaging 86 acres.

LUMBERING. The forests are extensive and valuable, although not more than one per cent. of the timbered land is virgin forest. There is a large quantity of valuable timber of second growth, but as it is being cut off at least twice as fast as it grows, the lumbering industry will soon be a thing of the past, unless modern methods of forestry are introduced. The growth consists chiefly of the various species of oak, with other valuable hardwoods. The 1916 output was 525 million feet.

MINERALS. In southeastern Kentucky there are 10,000 square miles underlaid with coking and bituminous coals of superior grade. The greatest known area of coking and fine cannel coals exists at the head of the Kentucky river. The total coal production in 1917, Kentucky standing fifth among the states, was 27,807,971 tons, in which year 863,071 tons of coke were made. Large quantities of so-called Red River and Oriskany ores used in the manufacture of car wheels and other fine iron products are annually mined, the product averaging over 50,000 tons annually. Petroleum and natural gas are found in various places.

MANUFACTURES. The manufacturing interests are varied and important, and are carried on chiefly in the towns on the Ohio river. An extensive industry is the smelting and working of iron, while all wood manufacturing industries flourish, especially those making railroad ties, spokes, handles, staves and headings. The chief manufactures, according to the 1910 census, are flour and grist mill products \$22,365,000; lumber products \$21,381,000; tobacco \$18,598,000. Salt is made from springs in the mountain counties. The manufacture of cotton goods is becoming important. There were 73 looms and 9,022 spindles in 1880. In 1910 the looms had grown to 1,312, the spindles to 84,078. The total number of all factories in 1909 was 4,776, an increase of 28 per cent. in ten years, and the value of the products was \$223,754,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Kentucky is 277, including 33 daily, 1 three times a week, 17 semi-weekly, 194 weekly, 5 semi-monthly, 22 monthly, 2 bi-monthly, 2 quarterly and 1 three times a year. The places of publication number 153, of which 111, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, BATON ROUGE

LOUISIANA is bounded north by Arkansas and Mississippi, east by Mississippi and the Gulf of Mexico, south by the Gulf of Mexico, and west by Texas. Its extreme length from east to west is about 300 miles, breadth 240 miles; land area, 45,966 square miles. The surface is generally low and level. There are low hills in the north and northwest, from which the land slopes gradually to the Mississippi and the Gulf. Much of the land along the river is below the water level during the spring freshets, and is protected from overflow by the levees, which are built on both banks below Baton Rouge, and on the west bank throughout the state. Many of the principal rivers and bayous are protected in like manner so that but a small portion of the land is subject to overflow. The extent of navigable water surpasses that of any other state in the Union, as also does the area of alluvial land. The soil of the river bottoms is exceedingly fertile, and yields large crops of cotton, sugar cane, rice, etc. The prairies are productive, and afford good pasture in places. The hilly section yields good cotton crops, but about half is covered with pine barrens.

LUMBER. The wooded area of the state is estimated at half of the total area. Louisiana has a greater area of long leaf pine and more cypress timber than any other state. There are also large quantities of oak, hickory, and other hardwoods. The state is excelled only by Washington in the value of its lumber products. 4,200,000,000 feet of lumber were produced in 1916.

AGRICULTURE. The great agricultural staples are cotton, sugar, rice, and corn, but other crops of infinite variety are grown abundantly. Cotton varies much in production from year to year. The 1918 crop was 525,000 bales. The state produces nearly all the cane sugar made in the United States. The sugar product has rapidly increased of recent years. The production for the season of 1918-19, was estimated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture at 524,900,000 pounds, out of a total output for the country of 533,900,000 pounds, Texas produced about 7,000,000 pounds. In that year the state produced nearly 45,000,000 gallons of syrup and molasses. The yield of rice, in which Louisiana takes first place, is very large, and the quality excellent. In 1918, there were 580,000 acres devoted to this grain, and the product was 17,980,000 bushels, nearly half of the country's crop, and more than double the production of Texas, which takes second place. The total crop for the United States was 40,424,000 bushels. Corn produced 29,600,000 bushels; potatoes, 4,345,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 4,875,000 bushels; peanuts and truck are important crops. The genuine Perique tobacco is grown only in this state. The crop for 1918 was 126,000 pounds, grown on 300 acres. Cattle raising is an important interest. The farms of the state numbered, in 1909, 120,270 and averaged 87 acres.

MINERALS. Iron ores, ochre, gypsum, lignite coal and marl are abundant; large deposits of sulphur exist in Calcasieu Parish, the deposits being among the largest in the world, and the sulphur produced is 98 per cent. pure. In 1903, before the Louisiana sulphur industries started, the United States imported 191,033 tons of sulphur, and the domestic production was 5,000 tons. In 1913 the domestic production was 311,590 tons, almost all from this state, and the imports had dropped to 22,605 tons. Immense deposits of rock salt are found, much of it being 99 per cent. pure, on Petit Anse and Weeks Islands. There are numerous oil wells in the western part of the state. In 1915 the petroleum production was 18,500,000 barrels. The natural gas fields are extensive and their development has been the cause of a rapid increase in manufacturing industries, especially in and near New Orleans.

MANUFACTURES, ETC. The leading manufactures are refined sugar, cotton goods, lumber, lath, naval stores, castings, machinery, clothing, flour mill products, cottonseed oil, and beer. Its commerce, carried on chiefly through New Orleans, is extensive and important. In 1909 the factories were 2,516 in number and their output valued at \$223,928,000. The fisheries, especially oyster fisheries, form an important industry. On account of the great extent of navigable waters and the network of railroads penetrating every part of the state, the products of Louisiana's fields, mines, factories and fisheries are readily and rapidly moved, and none of the state's resources need be neglected for lack of transportation facilities.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Louisiana is 182, including 17 daily, 1 three times a week, 5 semi-weekly, 131 weekly, 5 semi-monthly, 19 monthly, 2 bi-monthly, 1 four times during the college year and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 98, of which 59, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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MAINE

STATE CAPITAL, AUGUSTA

MAINE is the most northeasterly state in the Union, bounded on the north by Quebec and New Brunswick, east by New Brunswick, south by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by New Hampshire and Quebec; its extreme length is 302 miles, width 285 miles, which is extended to 2500 miles by the many indentations; land area, 29,895 square miles. The northern part is mainly a wilderness of forest land with rugged surface and groups of detached mountains; thinly peopled, except in the fertile tracts of Aroostook county. In the northeast, on the St. John's river are several French Canadian settlements. The southern part is varied, seldom much broken, and has tracts of great fertility, while others are only moderately fertile, especially in the southeast.

AGRICULTURE. The farms, at the time of the latest census, numbered 80,006 and averaged 104 acres. The potato crop is large and excellent, and Maine potatoes bring high prices as seed potatoes. The 1918 crop was 22,400,000 bushels, and was sixth largest among the states. Hay is an important product, 1,375,000 tons being grown in 1918; oats, the foremost cereal, produced 6,760,000 bushels; corn, buck wheat, barley and wheat are also grown. Maple sugar and sirup are important products. Dairy products are of great value. Large numbers of horses and cattle are exported. Wool is abundant and of good quality. Maine has nearly half the sheep in New England. She had 173,000 in 1919. The 1918 wool clip was 883,000 pounds. The principal fruit is the apple, which is largely grown. The 1918 picking produced 2,287,000 bushels.

MANUFACTURING. Manufacturing industries are of great importance. In 1909, the 3,546 manufacturing establishments produced goods having a value of \$176,029,000. Water power is abundant and regular, and there is an enormous amount of undeveloped power of this class available for manufacturing purposes. The leading articles of manufacture are cotton goods, lumber, woolen goods, leather, paper, boots and shoes, foundry and machine shop products, ships, agricultural implements, etc. The chief seats of the lumber trade are Augusta, Bangor, Biddeford, Calais, Eastport, Fairfield, Lewiston, and Machias; of cotton manufacture, Augusta, Biddeford, Lewiston, Brunswick, Saco, and Waterville; of ship building, Bath, Bangor, Belfast, Calais, Damariscotta, Machias, Rockland, Thomaston, and Waldoboro. Woolens are made at Bridgton, Dexter, Dover, Lewiston, Madison, Oxford, Sanford, and Warren; boots and shoes at Auburn, Bangor, Fairfield, Farmington, Lewiston, Richmond, Skowhegan, Norway, Paris, and Mechanic Falls. Bangor and Portland have foundry and machine shops, furniture factories, and planing mills. Extensive hemlock sole leather tanneries are located at Brookton, Grand Lake Stream, Kingman, Lincoln, Lowell, Medway, and Winn. Large spool factories are located at Foxcroft, South Lincoln and Willimantic. Apart from these special branches of trade, Belfast, Ellsworth, Gardiner, Hallowell, Portland, Rockland, Skowhegan, and Waterville are seats of varied and extensive manufactures.

OTHER INDUSTRIES. The state holds a prominent position among the eastern states in the lumber trade, 935 million feet being cut in 1916, in which year Maine produced one-eighth of all the lath in the country. The fisheries are of considerable importance. The product of the salt water fisheries for a number of years has averaged close to \$6,000,000. Over 12,000 persons are actively engaged in the industry. The seaboard towns enjoy a large coasting and West Indian trade. Large quantities of lime are exported from Camden, Rockland and Thomaston. Granite is extensively quarried at various places, Maine standing third in this industry. Slate is quarried in large quantities at Brownsville and Monson. Ice is an important and profitable article of export. Maine is a fishing, hunting and summer resort of considerable popularity, and sportsmen and summer visitors spend there every year from \$12,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Maine is 106, including 12 daily, 2 three times a week, 3 semi-weekly, 69 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 16 monthly and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 57, of which 14, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, ANNAPOLIS

MARYLAND is bounded north by Pennsylvania, east and southeast by Delaware and the Atlantic Ocean, west by West Virginia, and south and southwest by Virginia, West Virginia, and the District of Columbia. The Chesapeake Bay divides the greater part of it into two unequal parts, known as the Eastern and Western Shores. Its extreme length from east to west on its northern border is 198 miles, and its width, following the course of the Potomac, varies from 3 or 4 miles to about 120 miles; land area, 9,860 square miles. The surface of the Eastern Shore is mostly level, and in parts low and swampy, but towards the north rocky and broken. The Western Shore, between the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay, presents mainly the same general features. The northwest is very mountainous; five or six ridges of the Alleghanias, principally the Blue and Laurel, traverse that section. In the extreme west are the beautiful elevated valleys named "glades." The mountain slopes are thickly wooded.

AGRICULTURE. The soil of the Eastern Shore and the lower part of the Western is generally light and sandy, well adapted for peaches and market gardening, that of the central and northern parts very rich, yielding immense crops of tobacco, wheat, oats, and corn. Maryland had in 1909, 48,769 farms with an average area of 104 acres. Wheat, 11,346,000 bushels in 1918; corn, 24,010,000 bushels; potatoes, 4,000,000 bushels; and oats, 1,980,000 bushels, are among the chief crops. Apples produced 2,365,000 bushels. Dairy products are of great value. A very important agricultural industry in the eastern portion of the state is the growing of truck and fruits for shipment to the northern cities and for the numerous canneries in the state. Maryland produces more tomatoes than any other state. The 1918 crop was 326,034 tons, almost all used by the canneries, which turned out 6,089,380 cases of canned tomatoes, in addition to large quantities of soup, ketchup, etc. Especial attention is given to tobacco growing in the lower counties of the Western Shore. There were 23,738,000 pounds grown on 28,600 acres in 1918. Maple sugar and sirup are made.

FISHERIES. The oyster fisheries are more extensive than in any other state except Virginia. 25,000 persons are employed in this industry and the property in boats, apparatus, etc., was valued in 1912 at \$3,880,087. The production is over 5,000,000 bushels a year. Clams, herring, menhaden, crabs, shad, and other salt and fresh water products bring the total value of the annual fishery output to over \$4,000,000. The value of the fisheries of the whole of Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries is estimated at \$10,000,000 annually.

MANUFACTURES. The manufactures are very numerous—canned goods (fruits, tomatoes, peas, corn, meats, and oysters) being one of the most important. Maryland furnished in 1918, nearly a third of all the canned tomatoes in the United States, the states' record that year being over six million cases. The manufacture of boots and shoes, bricks, cement, chemicals, clothing, cotton and woolen goods, cooperage, tobacco, flour, leather, lumber, machinery, and metallic wares are leading industries. The total value of the state's manufactured goods in 1909 was \$317,570,000, made in 4,827 factories. Its commerce is confined principally to Baltimore, whose foreign trade is very important, amounting to \$150,000,000 yearly.

MINERALS. Maryland is bountifully supplied with minerals of great variety. Maryland coal is used extensively in all the Atlantic states, the product in 1917 being 4,745,924 tons. Fire clays are abundant, those of Mt. Savage having a wide reputation. Brown hematite is found in the Trenton limestone, and bog ore on the Eastern Shore. There are numerous quarries of marble, granite, serpentine, and other building stone, limestone for burning, and roofing slate. Kaolin is found in Anne Arundel county; magnesite near Baltimore, from which large quantities of magnesite, carbonate, and epsom salts are manufactured. There are many other minerals, including glass sand, mineral waters, alum, amber, barytes, breccia, soapstone, kaolin, mica, cements, tripoli, chromium, hone stone, mill stone, iron pyrites, ochres, etc., some of which are very plentiful. Gold, silver and copper are produced in small quantities. The total annual value of the mineral products averages over \$10,000,000, of which coal produces about two-thirds.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Maryland is 182, including 17 daily, 1 three times a week, 2 semi-weekly, 101 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 3 semi-monthly, 35 monthly, 7 bi-monthly, 13 quarterly, and 2 four times during the college year. The places of publication number 66, of which 23, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

MASSACHUSETTS

Population 3,693,310

STATE CAPITAL, BOSTON

MASSACHUSETTS is bounded north by Vermont and New Hampshire, east by the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean and by Rhode Island and Connecticut, and west by Rhode Island and New York. Its extreme length is 160 miles, and breadth from 47 to about 90 miles; land area, 8,040 square miles. The surface is greatly diversified; mountainous in the extreme west, hilly and broken in the east and northeast, and in the southeast mainly low and sandy. Toward the west is the fertile valley of the Connecticut river. The mountains are the Taconic and the Hoosac (continuations of the Green Mountain ranges of Vermont), with detached members of the White Mountains.

AGRICULTURE. The soil in the hilly regions is not remarkably favorable for agriculture, being usually shallow and stony, but energy and intelligence have succeeded in making it very productive. The Connecticut valley, however, can hardly be excelled for fertility. The chief agricultural productions are dairy products, potatoes, hay, cranberries, maple sugar and sirup (nearly 200,000 pounds of sugar and over 50,000 gallons of sirup being made each year), and honey. Seed potatoes grown in the "hill towns" of Hampshire and Berkshire counties are much in demand for planting in the lower lands of Massachusetts and Connecticut. Corn is grown everywhere, the 1918 crop being 2,000,000 bushels. The corn crop per acre, 52 bushels, was higher than any other state. It is used chiefly for home consumption. Of other grain, the crop of oats comes first, with 480,000 bushels. Some rye and buckwheat are also grown. The tobacco crop, grown entirely in the Connecticut valley, is a valuable one; 10,000 acres were planted in 1918, and produced a crop of 15,000,000 pounds, having a value of \$6,000,000. It produces cigar wrappers of high quality, excelled in this country only by those grown further down the river, in Connecticut. Onions are a valuable crop, Massachusetts ranking third among the states in 1915, with 1,487,454 bushels. Massachusetts produced 200,000 barrels of cranberries in 1918, more than half of the country's total. They are grown chiefly in Barnstable county.

FISHERIES. The fishery interests are larger than in any other state, and almost half the fishing vessels owned in the United States belong to Massachusetts. The fish brought into the two ports of Boston and Gloucester in 1913 weighed 162,218,786 pounds and were sold for \$4,983,017.

MANUFACTURES. Manufactures, however, constitute by far the largest of its industries. It ranks fourth among the states in the total value of its manufactured goods, although it stands seventh in point of population. Not only is it the leading center of the American cotton, boot, shoe, leather, wool, and paper trades, but all the large towns are busy seats of more or less numerous branches of manufacture. The largest industries are the boot and shoe and cotton trades, in each of which, in normal years, the product is nearly \$200,000,000. About 100,000 persons are employed in the cotton mills, and over 70,000 in the shoe factories. Woolen and felt goods, metal goods, paper and leather follow in order as named, woolen goods with a value, in 1909, of \$141,966,882, nearly equal to the combined product of the second and third states in that industry. The chief seats of the ship-building interests are Boston, Quincy, Newburyport and Salem. The state is rich in building stone, principally granite. Massachusetts is exceeded only by Vermont in the output of granite, which is largely quarried at Rockport, Graniteville, Fall River, Monson and Quincy; a handsome brown sandstone is quarried in the Connecticut valley, and marble and limestone in Berkshire county, in which there are also deposits of excellent iron ore. Fall River, Lowell, New Bedford and Lawrence are, in the order named, the chief cotton manufacturing centers of the country. The lumber industry is of some importance. The 1916 cut was 210 million feet.

ROADS, ETC. The state has been assisting the country districts by building stretches of good roads in various places, and there are now nearly 9,000 miles of improved roads in the state. This, taking into consideration that the area of Massachusetts is but little over 8,000 square miles, is a proportion of improved roads that no other state even approaches. The Cape Cod Canal, an eight-mile cut, 25 feet deep, between Buzzard's Bay and Sandwich, finished during 1914, enables coasting vessels to avoid the long trip around the Cape Cod peninsula and shortens the distance between Boston and New York by over seventy miles. Except Rhode Island, Massachusetts is the most densely peopled state.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Massachusetts is 604, including 82 daily, 1 three times a week, 5 semi-weekly, 838 weekly, 2 fortnightly, 9 semi-monthly, 119 monthly, 3 bi-monthly, 1 four times a year and 44 quarterly. The places of publication number 196, of which 20, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

There are over 50,000 looms for weaving cotton goods, and more fine cotton goods are produced here than in any other city. The mills use about 300,000 bales of cotton in one year. There are also silk and rubber mills, twist drill, copper, leather, cordage, glass, iron, paper, soap and candle, silverware, shoe, screw, sash and door, sperm and whale oil, carriage, chair and eyelet factories, numerous glass cutting establishments and many other industries. STATE CAPITAL, LANSING

MICHIGAN is bounded north by Lake Superior, east by Lakes Huron, St. Clair, and Erie, and their connecting rivers, south by Ohio and Indiana, and west by Lake Michigan and Wisconsin; land area, 57,430 square miles. It consists of two peninsulas, of which the southern is the principal seat of wealth and population, its length, north to south, being about 300 miles; width, about 200; coast line of state on lakes not less than 1,600 miles. This part of the state is a very level region, abounding in lakes and streams, with very extensive forests of pine and other timber in the north, oak openings or natural parks in the south, and prairies in the southwest.

AGRICULTURE. The soil contains sufficient sand to make it easily tilled, and few districts excel it as a farming region. In the west and southwest is the great fruit belt. Beans, winter wheat, oats, and potatoes are abundant, and of excellent quality; corn and other cereals are largely grown. The 1918 crop of corn was 48,300,000 bushels; wheat, 10,716,000 bushels; oats, 66,320,000 bushels; barley, 8,332,000 bushels; rye, 6,750,000 bushels; buckwheat, 780,000 bushels; beans, 4,887,000 bushels; potatoes, 28,560,000 bushels; maple sugar, in 1917, 364,000 pounds, and sirup, 279,900 gallons. Michigan, in bean production, is exceeded only by California. Dairy products are very valuable. Wool is produced in large quantities, sheep numbering over 2,000,000. The 1918 wool clip was 8,765,000 pounds. Peppermint and celery are raised extensively in the southwest, and grapes in the south. Sugar beets are grown in large quantities. The beet sugar made in 1918 was 132,092 tons, putting Michigan in the second place among the states. Apples are an important crop, and Michigan produced 10,966,000 bushels in 1918. Pears are a large and value crop.

MINERALS. The surface of the northern peninsula is somewhat rough and mountainous, with a good soil in most parts outside the mining regions; its mineral wealth is very great, especially in copper and iron. Large quantities of iron ore are mined and shipped to Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois to be smelted either alone or with the inferior ores found in those states. Marquette, Ishpeming, Negaunee, Gladstone, St. Ignace and Escanaba are the principal points of shipment. By far the most important copper mines of the country, and what is claimed to be the largest iron mine in the world, are in this state. Michigan produced 164,344,058 pounds of copper in 1914. There was also a production of iron ore to the amount of 10,706,200 tons. Silver in 1917 produced a value of \$565,500. There is a large quantity of coal in the lower peninsula, used chiefly for local and railroad purposes, the production in 1917 reaching 1,374,805 tons. The salt producing territory covers about 9,500 square miles, and the 1914 product was 11,670,976 barrels; it is procured from artesian wells, and the Saginaw river and the mouth of the Manistee are the chief centers of manufacture. About 100,000 barrels of dairy salt are produced, pronounced by competent judges to be the best in the world, 3,600 persons are employed in the salt manufacture. Gypsum, fire clay, and glass sand are also found. The manufacture of cement is becoming a very important industry.

INDUSTRIAL. Michigan ranks high in the value and extent of its lumber product; the largest interest centering in East Saginaw. The lumber product, however, is rapidly falling off, through the rapid and wasteful reduction of the forest area. The 1916 cut was about one and a quarter billion feet. The fisheries on the great lakes are very valuable, the fish sold each year having a value of nearly \$2,000,000. \$2,500,000 is invested in this industry, which keeps nearly 7,000 men employed. Manufactures are important and varied. Among the leading products are iron, lumber, salt, paper, woodenware, furniture, farm implements, leather, cotton and woolen goods, machinery, castings, and hollowware. The great extent of the coast line gives Michigan a commanding position in lake commerce. The ship canal at Sault Ste. Marie handles more traffic than any similar thoroughfare in the world. In 1917, 65,307,233 tons passed through, about three times as much as the average traffic through the Suez canal and nearly eight times as much as went through the Panama canal in that year. The traffic now is nearly 100,000,000 tons yearly.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Michigan is 629, including 66 daily, 4 three times a week, 16 semi-weekly, 456 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 75 monthly, 4 bi-monthly, 1 four times a year and 5 quarterly. The places of publication number 379, of which 80, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, ST. PAUL

MINNESOTA is bounded north by Ontario and Manitoba, east by Wisconsin and Lake Superior south by Iowa, and west by North and South Dakota. Its extreme length from north to south is 380 miles; breadth varies from 133 miles in the center to 262 on the south line, and about 330 on the north border; land area, 79,205 square miles. The climate, although the cold during the winter season is somewhat severe, is healthful and invigorating. The surface is generally an undulating plain, diversified with rolling prairies, dotted with lakes and groves, with frequent timber belts. The northeast is generally hilly, and was formerly entirely covered with immense forests. The greater part of the salable pine has been cut, but there is a vast quantity of valuable timber, both pine and hardwood, still standing. There are thirty-two varieties of marketable timber found in the state. The lumber output of 288 mills in 1914 was 1,312,230,000 feet. This region also contains innumerable lakes, which abound with almost every species of fresh water fish; and much marsh land. The Red River valley is almost a dead level. The southeast is a beautiful rolling prairie region, while the surface rises from the undulating prairies of the south and southwest to the Hauteur des Terres or Heights of Land in the northwest.

MINERALS. In St. Louis county in the northeast is located one of the greatest iron producing regions in the world, the output of which keeps Minnesota in first place among the iron ore producing states. 300,000 persons are employed in the mining industries, and 21,946,901 tons of iron ore were produced in 1914. This was two-thirds of the total of the iron ore marketed in the United States in that year. Other mineral products are comparatively small.

AGRICULTURE. The soil is fertile, about two-thirds of it being adapted to the cultivation of cereals and general farm produce, although little more than one-third of this is under cultivation. While the temperature shows wide extremes, the Weather Bureau station at Duluth recording a range in one year from 99° in July to -45° in January, with an annual mean of 39°, the climate is particularly healthful and the long summer days are extremely favorable for the growth of vegetation, especially grain crops. The rainfall averages 28½ inches per annum, which provides ample moisture for all crops which can be grown in the latitude of Minnesota. In the northern part of the state drainage ditches are being constructed, and millions of acres will thereby be made suitable for agricultural purposes. Minnesota's largest and most valuable crop is wheat, for which its soil is peculiarly adapted. Instances are known where wheat has been produced for twenty-five years on the same land, which still continues to yield average crops. Corn of high quality grows well all over the state, even in the northern counties. Wool growing is remunerative in the southwest. Maple sugar is an important product. Cattle, horses, and swine of the finest class are largely exported, and pork packing is a valuable industry. In 1918 Minnesota grew 79,710,000 bushels of wheat, 134,562,000 bushels of oats, 110,000,000 bushels of corn, 32,760,000 bushels of potatoes, 43,400,000 bushels of barley, 8,700,000 bushels of rye, 3,120,000 bushels of flaxseed. Minnesota's 1918 production put her third in wheat, rye and oats, first in barley, second in flaxseed and potatoes, fifth in corn. There are over 800 creameries, three-fourths of them being co-operative, and sixty-seven cheese factories. The state had in 1919 1,368,000 dairy cattle and 1,682,000 other cattle and holds a high place in the value of dairy products, the dairy industry in the state having increased rapidly in recent years. The value of the 1918 crops was \$582,545,000. The number of farms in 1910 was 155,759, their area averaging 177 acres.

MANUFACTURES. Manufactures are rapidly increasing in number and value, and their value in 1910 amounted to over \$400,000,000. The leading branches are flour and grist mill products, in which the state has held first place for many years, producing in 1909 nearly 23,000,000 barrels of wheat flour, over one-fifth of the country's total production, lumber (1,220,000,000 feet in 1916) and wooden ware, carriages, furniture, and cooperage, while boots and shoes, bricks, leather, lime, saddlery and woolen goods are also extensively manufactured. It is estimated that the state's streams have sufficient undeveloped water power to supply the future needs of every industry, public or private, in the state. There are productive fisheries of white fish and lake trout in Lake Superior.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Minnesota is 761, including 45 daily, 10 semi-weekly, 622 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 12 semi-monthly, 63 monthly, 4 bi-monthly and 4 quarterly. The places of publication number 451, of which 85, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, JACKSON

MISSISSIPPI is bounded north by Tennessee, east by Alabama, south by the Gulf of Mexico and Louisiana, and west by the Mississippi River, which separates it from Louisiana and Arkansas. Its extreme length from north to south is 332 miles; average breadth, 142 miles; land area, 46,340 square miles. The surface is generally hilly or undulating, except in the Mississippi bottom, from Vicksburg to the Tennessee line, and between the Mississippi and Yazoo rivers, where it is low and swampy, subject to inundation, and covered with a dense growth of timber, but with soil which, if reclaimed, would be exceedingly fruitful. Below Vicksburg the surface for some miles inland is hilly, and known as the "cane hills" or "bluffs," and with a generally productive soil. There is a very fertile prairie region in the northeast where alfalfa, producing from three to five heavy crops each year, is one of the principal products. The southern part is chiefly a level pine region, and furnishes good pasturage and large quantities of timber, tar, turpentine, etc. The soil of this tract, although sandy, is with suitable fertilization particularly well adapted to truck farming, and is being largely taken up for that purpose, as soon as the timber is cut off. In the production of lumber, chiefly yellow pine, Mississippi stands second among the southern states.

AGRICULTURE. Agriculture is the prevailing industry. Mississippi had, at the time of the last census, 273,390 farms, averaging 67 acres. Cotton and corn are the great staples. The average crop of cotton for the five-year period 1906-1910 was 1,400,153 bales, and its value, including its by-products, was about \$100,000,000. The crop in 1918 was 1,210,000 bales. While cotton is still king in Mississippi, the doctrine of diversified farming is spreading, with benefit both to the land and the farmers. The corn crop for 1918 was 66,300,000 bushels. The average yield per acre for the state was but 17 bushels. What can be done on Mississippi land with better methods of culture is shown by the fact that a Franklin county boy grew 152 bushels of corn on one acre. The oat crop for 1918 was 5,600,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 8,455,000 bushels; white potatoes, 1,600,000 bushels; rice, 69,000 bushels; hay, 416,000 tons. Wheat is grown in the north, and rice and sugar cane in the south, producing 4,748,000 gallons of syrup in 1918. Dairy products and sorghum are produced in considerable quantities. A little tobacco is grown, also peanuts. In the coast counties the growing of semi-tropical fruits is meeting with decided success. The pecan crop in these counties is worth over \$150,000. The state had in 1919, 549,000 dairy cows, 708,000 other cattle, 256,000 horses, 316,000 mules and 2,282,000 hogs. Drainage districts in the Yazoo-Mississippi delta have been organized, one project calling for the expenditure of \$8,000,000. This will change the swamp lands into farming land unexcelled anywhere for fertility, as the soil has for ages been enriched and augmented in depth by the alluvial deposits of the two rivers.

INDUSTRY AND COMMERCE. Commerce is carried on principally through New Orleans and Mobile; coasting and river trade is large. The coast ports of Gulfport and South Pascagoula have a large commerce which is growing rapidly, both in exports and imports. These two ports send out over 400,000,000 feet of lumber annually. The lumber output (2,730,000,000 feet in 1916, is exceeded only by Washington and Louisiana). The state has no coal or iron of practical value. Its mineral deposits are confined mainly to fertilizers, soft limestone and clays. Tishomingo county has large beds of fine pipe and potter's clay, there is also some sandstone suitable for rough masonry. The state is growing fast in the number of its manufacturing enterprises. In 1909, it had 2,598 factories, an increase of 70 per cent since the previous count. The value of their products was over \$80,000,000. Lumber and grist mill products were the most important, while cotton goods and cottonseed oil and cake rank next.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Mississippi is 186, including 16 daily, 6 semi-weekly, 154 weekly, 2 fortnightly and 8 monthly. The places of publication number 184, of which 89, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, JEFFERSON CITY

MISSOURI is bounded north by Iowa, east by Illinois, Kentucky, and Tennessee, south by Arkansas, west by Oklahoma, Kansas and Nebraska; length, north to south, 277 miles; average breadth, about 244 miles, ranging from 208 miles in the north to 312 miles in the south; land area 68,735 square miles. The Missouri River divides the state into two distinct parts. The surface north of the river is generally nearly level, while that south of it is undulating, becoming rougher and somewhat mountainous as it approaches the Ozark Mountains. There are also open, treeless plains, an extension of those in Kansas; and in the southeast, bordering on the Mississippi River, is an extensive marshy tract, called the "Sunk Country," the result of the earthquake of 1811-12. Plans have been made to reclaim the lands along the Mississippi and Missouri rivers and their tributaries, by levees along the great rivers and drainage canals in the valleys of the smaller rivers, and by this means large tracts of swamp lands, and other tracts subject to destructive overflows, can be profitably tilled.

AGRICULTURE. The state contains every variety of soil. Corn, wheat, and oats are the staple products. The yield of corn in 1918 was 133,860,000 bushels, which gave Missouri fourth place in that year. Wheat produced 53,154,000 bushels, oats 41,196,000 bushels, apples 4,245,000 bushels, hay 2,690,000 tons, cotton 70,000 bales, tobacco 2,970,000 pounds. Barley, rye, hay, fruit, white and sweet potatoes, dairy and market garden products, wool, cattle, and pork are raised largely in excess of home needs. Sorghum, rice, peanuts and castor oil beans are produced. Hemp and flax are cultivated to some degree; so are grapes, and much wine is made. The farm crops had a total value in 1918 of \$482,436,000. Sheep, swine, cattle, horses and mules are produced in great numbers, the Missouri mule being a famous product. In 1919 Missouri had 4,943,000 hogs (exceeded by only Iowa and Illinois), 1,539,000 sheep, 1,782,000 head of cattle, in addition to 919,000 dairy cows, 1,040,000 horses and 374,000 mules. Missouri sheep, in 1918, contributed to the national wealth 5,532,000 pounds of wool. The output of poultry products is enormous. In 1910 Missouri's shipments from her poultry yards amounted to \$30,766,267 and the total production about \$50,000,000. Dairying is an industry of great importance, the surplus shipments in 1910 having a value of \$3,182,380. As a very large proportion of dairy products is always consumed locally, it is estimated that the total value is fully \$20,000,000.

MINERALS. Iron ore is mined in very large quantities, and the supply seems inexhaustible. The output of lead in 1914 was 192,612 tons, value \$15,023,736; zinc, 105,994 tons, value \$10,811,388. More than half the zinc in the United States comes from the Missouri mines. Bituminous coal is found in considerable quantities in the north and west, the output in 1917 being 5,670,549 tons. Silver to the value of \$17,400 was mined in 1917. The Kansas oil field extends into several counties in Missouri. Some natural gas exists in the western part. Many other minerals abound; also marble, limestone, glass sand, kaolin, barytes, fire clay, etc. Two-thirds of the barytes produced in the United States comes from Missouri. The production of cement is large.

INDUSTRIES. Lumbering is an important industry, 260,000,000 feet being cut in 1916. Meat and packing house products, flour and meal, boots and shoes, malt liquors, lumber, hardware and clothing are among the most important manufactures, but there are innumerable other articles made in the state among which may be noted pearl buttons to the value of \$113,469 in 1908, and corn-cob pipes, the manufacture of which is confined to three or four counties in the state, where corn of a special variety producing a peculiarly large cob is grown. In 1912, 28,171,872 "Missouri meerschaums" valued at \$500,000 were made and shipped to all parts of the world. Over \$574,000,000 in manufactured goods was the 1909 output of the state's 8,375 factories. Missouri has grown rapidly in population and wealth, railroads have multiplied, and extensive areas of territory, particularly in the southwest and southeast portions of the state, have been brought into cultivation, and now support large populations, and afford a considerable surplus to feed the world.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Missouri is 881, including 75 daily, 1 three times a week, 15 semi-weekly, 638 weekly, 9 fortnightly, 25 semi-monthly, 98 monthly, 1 every 6 weeks, 6 bi-monthly and 13 quarterly. The places of publication number 434, of which 114, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, HELENA

MONTANA is bounded north by Saskatchewan and Alberta, east by North and South Dakota, south by Wyoming and Idaho, and west by Idaho; length, east to west, about 540 miles; breadth, about 280 miles; land area, 146,080 square miles. Montana's total area is 94,000,000 acres, classified into mountainous, 26,000,000 acres; farming lands, 30,000,000 acres; grazing lands, 38,000,000 acres. The farming lands of Montana are equal in area to the state of Iowa; the Indian and forest reserves to the state of Georgia, and the mountainous and grazing lands to the state of Indiana.

AGRICULTURAL AND LIVE STOCK. This state will always be an important factor in the stock raising industry, as more than half its surface can never be successfully cultivated, but must be devoted to other purposes. The area of cultivated land is rapidly increasing, but not more than 10 per cent of the land capable of tillage has been improved. While Montana has always been considered a mining state, the agricultural production is nearing the total of mineral production, and will soon exceed it in value. Nearly all staple crops known to northern states are grown in Montana. Fruit growing in the western portion of the state has become a great industry. Over 65,000 acres are planted in fruit trees, principally apples, the 1918 crop of which was 790,000 bushels. Nearly 7,000,000 fruit trees have already been set out. Wheat and oats are largely grown. The production in 1918 of the principal grain crops was as follows: Wheat, 25,434,000 bushels; oats, 20,400,000 bushels; barley, 1,914,000 bushels. Montana held third place in flaxseed, with 2,844,000 bushels. Potatoes, 7,029,000 bushels. Hay made a crop of 1,227,000 tons. The Government has irrigation projects in course of construction, which will bring into use large tracts of land in northern Montana, while private enterprise is also reclaiming an immense area. "Dry farming" is also being practiced with a considerable degree of success in districts adapted to it. In Yellowstone, Gallatin, Beaverhead, and Cascade counties large numbers of sheep and cattle are winter fed for the spring markets. The production of wool in 1918 was 23,342,000 pounds, only one state, Wyoming, exceeding this amount. Horses numbered in 1919, 557,000, cattle 1,217,000, sheep 2,984,000. One-third of the population is engaged in farming and stock raising.

MINERALS. The mineral wealth is of great value. The output of gold in 1917 was valued at \$3,756,500; silver, \$11,291,100. Copper, 275,000,000 pounds; zinc, which comes only from Silver Bow, Jefferson and Fergus counties, 184,086,000 pounds; lead, 14,000,000 pounds were mined in 1915. Nearly every county has iron, and ten counties have deposits of bituminous coal, of which the 1917 yield was 4,226,689 tons. There are petroleum deposits in the northern part of the state. Montana surpasses all the states in the production of precious stones, her leadership being due to the sapphire mines, whose output in 1913 was worth \$744,965.

INDUSTRIES. In the western and northwestern portions of the state vast lumbering interests have been developed, producing 383,900,000 feet in 1916; fir, pine, tamarack and cedar being the chief varieties. Water power is abundant. Leading industries are mining, lumber sawing, quartz crushing, smelting, flour milling, etc.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Montana is 263, including 19 daily, 4 semi-weekly, 227 weekly, 5 semi-monthly and 8 monthly. The places of publication number 192, of which 47, designated by a dagger(†), are county seats.

NEBRASKA

Population *1,245,873
(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, LINCOLN

NEBRASKA is bounded north by South Dakota, east by Iowa and Missouri, south by Kansas and Colorado, and west by Colorado and Wyoming. Its extent from north to south is about 210 miles; greatest length about 420 miles; land area, 77,082 square miles. The surface is generally a vast, gently undulating plain, with a gradual ascent toward the mountains; the river bottoms are level. There are some bluffs along the Missouri River, some hills in the north-west, a small part of this region being occupied by the Mauvais Terres or Bad Lands. The state is well watered, three large rivers, the Niobrara, the Platte, and the Republican, crossing it from west to east, while the Missouri flows for 500 miles along the eastern border. The Missouri is the only navigable river. East of the Bad Lands and south of the Niobrara is a tract called the Sand Hills region, 8,000 square miles area, the valleys of which produce an abundance of corn and wheat, while the rest of the country is used for cattle. Timber is scarce.

MINERALS. Mineral products are of small importance. An interesting fact is that Nebraska produces 97 per cent. of all pumice dug in the United States. There is little coal, and that poor; but peat abounds. Brick and potter's clay are plentiful, and there are extensive saline deposits; good building stone is abundant.

AGRICULTURE. The eastern half of the state is a rich agricultural region. The west is mainly adapted to grazing, but farms are being taken up in many districts and half of the land area of the state is now under cultivation. Sugar beets are successfully grown in the western part without irrigation, and crops of thirty tons to the acre are not uncommon. In 1918, the sugar factories made 68,494 tons of sugar. There is an abundant rainfall in the east, and that of the west seems increasing annually since the era of agriculture, so that the farm limit is extending westward. The leading products are wheat, corn, barley, oats, sorghum, flaxseed, and hemp; vegetables, small fruits, and grapes are raised extensively. Nebraska is one of the foremost states in grain growing and stood sixth in corn in 1918. The corn crop was 123,066,000 bushels; wheat, 43,141,000 bushels; 56,188,000 of oats; 5,660,000 of barley; 5,005,000 of rye; 10,406,000 bushels of potatoes and 2,381,000 tons of hay. With wild prairie hay included, the total would be over 7,000,000 tons. The yearly money value of the grain and hay crops alone is greater than that of all the gold, silver and iron produced in the United States in a year. More than 150 species of wild grasses have been classified, which afford excellent pasturage to large numbers of cattle and sheep. The live stock in 1919 numbered: hogs 4,250,000, sheep 367,000, horses 1,049,000, and cattle 3,602,000, of which 662,000 were dairy cows. Texas was the only state with more beef cattle than Nebraska. The shipments of poultry in 1909 were 28,119,058 pounds; dressed meat, 210,393,160 pounds; eggs, 24,470,265 dozens; butter, 37,414,274 pounds, and cream, 3,502,776 gallons.

MANUFACTURES. Manufacturing interests are growing, but are chiefly confined to a few of the large cities, principally Omaha, South Omaha, Lincoln and Nebraska City. They include meat packing and canning, smelting and refining, and the making of flour, farming implements, wagons, cars, etc. The dressed meat and packing industry is by far the largest, its product in 1917 being worth \$191,000,000. Refining and smelting of metallic ores came next, with an output of \$59,000,000. Mill products, \$11,569,165, and butter, over \$11,000,000, were next in line.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Nebraska is 584, including 26 daily, 1 three times a week, 15 semi-weekly, 505 weekly, 8 semi-monthly, 28 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 401, of which 90, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, CARSON CITY

NEVADA is bounded north by Oregon and Idaho, east by Utah and Arizona, and southwest and west by California. Extreme length from north to south, 485 miles in the eastern and 210 miles in the western boundary; greatest breadth, 320 miles, decreasing to 310 miles in the north and to a point in the south; land area, 109,740 square miles. Surface generally is a table land about 4,000 feet above the sea, traversed by nearly parallel mountain ranges, between which are valleys varying in width from 5 to 20 miles, in some cases narrow canyons, and in others broad deserts, covered with sage brush and other scanty herbage.

AGRICULTURE. The soil, when irrigated, is fertile and produces spring wheat, barley, oats, potatoes, hay, etc., abundantly. There is much good pasturage, and cattle and sheep fatten readily upon it. The state lies almost wholly in the "Great Basin," the most arid region of North America, but it is considered possible, by storing the waters of its mountain streams, to reclaim several millions of acres by irrigation. Several irrigation enterprises have been completed and there are numerous others planned and under construction, and the agricultural interests are steadily increasing. Cotton and sub-tropical fruits do well in the south. Some cereals are grown, wheat being the chief, with 1,070,000 bushels to its credit in 1918, followed by barley, 408,000 bushels; oats, 552,000 bushels, and corn, 64,000 bushels. Potatoes gave a crop of 1,539,000 bushels on 9,000 acres. It is a crop that seems to do remarkably well on irrigated land, and has a record—in Kane Co., Utah—of 825 bushels from one acre. The live stock interests of the state are next in importance to its mineral resources. The latest government reports show 562,000 head of cattle and 1,520,000 sheep in the state. The 1918 wool clip was 10,000,000 pounds.

MINERALS. Nevada's greatest wealth, however, is in its minerals. It has for years been a leading state in the production of the precious metals, especially copper, gold and silver. The milling and smelting of ore is the leading manufacturing industry. The output of precious metals in 1917 was gold, \$6,922,900 and silver, \$9,421,700; 67,480,000 pounds of copper were produced in 1915 together, with 14,782,000 pounds of lead; 21,000,000 pounds of zinc and 156,675 pounds of quicksilver. Other minerals are antimony, salt, sulphur, borax and gypsum, all of which are produced in commercial quantities. A valuable deposit of anthracite coal has been discovered on the Elko river, near Humboldt, and is being developed.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Nevada is 42, including 7 daily 6 three times a week, 28 weekly and 1 semi-monthly. The places of publication number 27, of which 16, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, CONCORD.

NEW HAMPSHIRE is bounded on the north by Quebec, east by Maine and the Atlantic Ocean, south by Massachusetts, and west by Vermont. Its length is 180 miles from north to south; its extreme breadth 88 miles; average breadth 50 miles; land area, 8,005 square miles. Most of the state, except the southeastern part, has a rough and hilly surface. In the northern part are the White Mountains. The state is generally well wooded, and the yield of timber is very large. The valley of the Connecticut is famed for the beauty of its farms and villages.

AGRICULTURE. In productions, the hay crop is by far the most valuable, and while this is steadily increasing the agricultural interests have for some years been gradually declining. While there are some very fertile tracts among the valley lands, the greater part of the surface is rugged and stony, and much more valuable as woodland or pasture than as tilled land. Oats, barley, buckwheat, corn and potatoes are very generally cultivated, but little more is grown than suffices for home needs. Dairy farming and wool growing are followed to some extent. Tobacco is grown in Cheshire county, in the southwestern part of the state. A fair quality of wrapper tobacco is produced. Fruit growing is generally profitable. In some localities in the south the peach is successfully cultivated. Maple sugar, 556,800 pounds and sirup, 147,900 gallons were made in 1918.

MINERALS AND INDUSTRIES. Fine building and monumental granite, which makes fully two-thirds, in value, of the state's mineral output, is extensively quarried at Concord, Milford, Pelham, Plymouth, and other places. There is a thin vein of tin at Jackson. A little zinc is mined. Other minerals are mica (\$47,837 in 1914), soapstone and scythestones. There is abundant water power in all parts of the state, and manufactures constitute by far the largest industry. There is scarcely a town of any considerable size without its important manufacture. It is especially noted for its textile interests, which turned out cotton goods to the value of \$42,379,360 in 1909, and woolen goods valued at \$5,498,799. Paper and pulp in the same year \$11,212,042, and lumber, \$10,202,668. The other important manufactures are leather, carriages, flour, saddlery, clothing, starch, etc.

One of the chief industries of the state at the present time is that of providing for summer visitors. New Hampshire has an almost perfect summer climate, especially in the central and eastern portion, and the scenery throughout the state is remarkable for its beauty, that in the White Mountain district being unsurpassed in all the eastern states. Visitors from the other New England states, and from many other parts of the country spend the summer months here, and the hotel and boarding house industry is one of considerable magnitude. It is estimated that summer visitors leave about \$10,000,000 in the state each year. The state government, recognizing the value of good roads, is constructing three trunk line highways extending from the Massachusetts line to the White Mountains.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New Hampshire is 97, including 13 daily, 2 three times a week, 2 semi-weekly, 66 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 11 monthly, and 1 bi-monthly. The places of publication number 57, of which 13, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, TRENTON

NEW JERSEY is bounded north and northeast by New York, east by New York and the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean and Delaware Bay, and west by Delaware and Pennsylvania. Its extreme length is 167 miles; its greatest breadth 59 miles, and its least 32 miles; land area, 7,525 square miles. The surface is mountainous in the northwest, hilly in the northeast and central parts, low and gently undulating in the south. The mountains, a part of the Appalachian system, are the Kittatinny or Blue, and the Highland Range. Between them lies the productive Kittatinny Valley, about 10 miles wide. New Jersey has 374.7 inhabitants per square mile, and is exceeded in density of population only by Rhode Island and Massachusetts.

AGRICULTURE. The agricultural products of the state generally, especially market garden produce, are very extensive. The central part is the most thickly settled and is, in fact, a vast market garden for the supply of New York and Philadelphia, and the fruits and vegetables from this region are of a quality which is not surpassed anywhere. Apples, peaches and pears are grown abundantly. Large quantities of grapes and small fruits are grown in the south. Cranberries are an important crop. The chief cranberry counties are Ocean, Atlantic, and Burlington. The 1918 crop was 114,000 barrels exceeded only by Massachusetts. Potatoes produced 8,464,000 bushels in 1918, sweet potatoes 2,875,000 bushels. The chief grain crops for that year were corn, 11,439,000 bushels; wheat, 1,700,000 bushels; oats, 3,400,000 bushels and rye, 1,350,000 bushels. Tomato growing for the canneries is of considerable importance. The 1918 crop was 143,129 tons, and the output of canned tomatoes was 1,110,252 cases, in addition to immense quantities of soups, ketchup, etc.

MANUFACTURES. It has become one of the leading states in the value of its manufactures, which embrace a wide range of goods, and had a value in 1909 of \$1,145,529,000. There are 8,817 manufacturing establishments, employing 371,265 people. Oil refining is the greatest of the state's industries, with an output of the value of \$70,724,942. The silk industry comes next, with an output of \$52,572,837. Other prominent manufactures are wire goods, \$39,150,336; machinery, \$36,718,146; chemicals, \$35,657,246; rubber goods, \$34,733,592; woolen goods, \$30,754,104. Prominent also are china and sanitary ware, in which New Jersey has the largest production among the states, fruit and vegetable canning, glass, electrical goods, textiles, leather goods and soap. Mercer county is the chief seat of the pottery industry and Middlesex county of the brick and tile manufactures. Newark, the metropolis, has a population of 366,721, and its manufacturing industries are said to be more important in proportion to population than those of any other city in the United States.

MINERALS. Its clay deposits, iron mines, zinc mines and slate quarries are very valuable. The clay products, consisting of brick and tile, and pottery, worth \$18,484,652, furnished more than half of the total value of the state's mineral products in 1914. New Jersey's output of zinc in 1914 was 74,253 tons, valued at \$7,515,914. Other mineral products were iron ore, 346,826 tons, and cement, 3,530,476 barrels. Iron ore is found generally throughout the state. There are a large number of productive mines of magnetic iron ore in Sussex, Passaic, Morris, and Warren counties. Clay for gas retorts and fire brick is found at Amboy, and valuable deposits of franklinite at Mine Hill and Stirling. In the northwestern portion of the state excellent roofing-slates, building and flag stones and rich hematites are abundant.

FISHERIES, ETC. The oyster and deep sea fisheries are of great value. It has a large coasting trade, and considerable ship building is carried on. New Jersey is well provided with marine transportation, as three-fourths of her border is on navigable waters. An inland waterway is now being constructed, which will provide a sheltered channel from the northern end of Ocean county to Cape May, about four-fifths of the whole ocean coast of the state. It will have a minimum width of 100 feet, and a low water depth of six feet. Plans are being made for a canal from the Delaware, near Bordentown, to the ocean.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New Jersey is 356, including 39 daily, 1 three times a week, 3 semi-weekly, 261 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 6 semi-monthly, 39 monthly and 6 quarterly. The places of publication number 166, of which 23, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, SANTA FE

NEW MEXICO is bounded north by Colorado, east by Oklahoma and Texas, south by Texas and Mexico, and west by Arizona; greatest length, north to south, 390 miles, average width, 335 miles. Land area, 122,460 square miles. Its general surface is a region of high plateaus, traversed by mountain ranges with isolated peaks. The valleys are generally nearly level, and their soil fertile. In the southeast is a part of the "Llano Estacado" or "Staked Plain." Some of this region is being brought into use under the modern systems of farming arid and semi-arid lands. There are about 40,000,000 acres of public lands open to entry.

AGRICULTURE. The number of farms increased nearly 200 per cent. from 1900 to 1910. The mesas, or table lands, occupy a large part of the surface, placing stock raising and wool growing among the leading occupations; the bunch grass affords rich pasturage, and neither hand feeding nor shelter is necessary for the herds and flocks. The live stock in New Mexico in 1919 included 1,409,000 cattle, 84,000 being dairy cows. There were 3,135,000 sheep. The 1918 wool clip was 17,132,000 pounds. New Mexico was the third state in number of sheep and fourth in amount of wool. There are 200,000 goats and 261,000 horses. In the year ending June 30th, 1911, there were shipped out of the state 243,194 cattle; 16,756 horses and 775,286 sheep. The climate is very dry, the weather station at Santa Fe showing the lowest per cent. of humidity in the United States, with the exception of the station at Yuma, Arizona. The soil, when sufficient water can be had, shows wonderful fertility, and the days of continual sunshine are especially favorable to the development of plant life. Agriculture is becoming, with the development of the various irrigation projects, the leading industry of the state. Irrigation is in use on nearly a million acres. There are extensive systems of water storage and irrigation on the Pecos Rio Grande and other large rivers, which, with works projected, will reclaim three or four million acres. Many farmers are irrigating their own land by means of artesian wells. There are over 700 of these in Chaves and Eddy counties. There are many other river valleys of high fertility, whose soil is susceptible of irrigation. Over 15,000,000 acres have sufficient annual rainfall to be classed as "dry farming" land, and the flow of immigration into these districts is rapid and continuous. Those who have followed the methods of culture proper to such lands have been successful with such crops as are adapted to the conditions. While there is still much experimenting to be done with the system, there is no doubt that it will in the near future add considerably to the nation's food supply. New Mexico has over 3,000,000 acres farmed on this system at the present time. The agricultural productions are increasing rapidly in amount and value. Wheat, corn, beans, onions, cabbage, alfalfa, sugar beets, canteloupes, oats, wild hay, and all kinds of vegetables are produced abundantly. The chief grain crops are corn, 4,250,000 bushels in 1918; oats, 1,260,000 bushels, and wheat, 3,334,000 bushels. Of fruits, the apple, peach, melon, fig, apricot, pomegranate, and especially grapes, flourish.

MINERALS, MANUFACTURES, ETC. Gold, silver, copper, iron, and lead exist, and all are being extensively worked. New Mexico's gold in 1917 was worth \$1,025,000. The same year saw silver produced to the value of \$1,081,800. The production of copper in 1915 was 72,000,000 pounds; zinc, 24,640,000 pounds; lead, 3,951,000 pounds. Iron ore has recently been discovered in extensive deposits. Bituminous coal is very abundant and deposits of fine anthracite exist. 34,345 tons of anthracite were mined in 1913. The total coal product in 1917 was 4,000,537 tons, coke, 577,579 tons. Plumbago, mica, petroleum, cement, fire clay, gypsum, mineral paint, marbles and other excellent building stones are found. The mineral production for 1918 was over \$30,000,000. Chief industries are quartz crushing, milling and manufacturing of woollens, wines and brandies. The lumber industry is growing. A fine system of public roads has been planned, comprising over 1,000 miles through various parts of the territory, the work being done by convict labor. Several hundred miles have already been surveyed. There is some production of lumber in the National Forests. The state is becoming more and more popular as a resort for health seekers and tourists, also as a hunting region.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New Mexico is 108, including 6 daily, 3 semi-weekly, 93 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 3 monthly, and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 61, of which 26, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

Population 9,687,744

STATE CAPITAL, ALBANY

NEW YORK is bounded on the north and northwest by Lake Ontario and the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, east by Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and the Atlantic Ocean, south by the Atlantic Ocean, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania, and west and northwest by Pennsylvania and Lake Erie. Its greatest length from north to south is 312 miles; its greatest breadth 412 miles; land area, 47,620 square miles. The surface is exceedingly diversified.

AGRICULTURE. The greater portion of the soil is arable, much of it exceedingly fertile. The dairy industry is of immense value. The value of its products is exceeded by only one state, Wisconsin. There were 1,478,000 dairy cows in the state in 1919, besides 911,000 other cattle. Delaware and St. Lawrence are the leading counties in this important industry, each turning out about six per cent. of the state's total, with Delaware a little in the lead. The reports of the State Department of Agriculture for a recent year show that in addition to the milk and milk products used on the farm and delivered direct to consumers, the state dairies shipped out 745,555,809 quarts of milk. Its creameries made 42,671,688 pounds of butter. 112,555,404 pounds of cheese and 68,838,289 pounds of condensed milk were also produced. Casein and other milk products are also manufactured in large quantities. The many large cities make hay a valuable product, and more land is devoted to this crop than in any other state. The 1918 crop was 5,375,000 tons, its value, \$109,261,000. New York was first in acreage, quantity and value. Immense crops of cereals are grown in the valley lands, which also produce an abundance of grapes and other fruit; hops in Otsego, Madison, Chautauqua and Oneida counties; tobacco is grown in several counties, and corn generally throughout the state. New York holds second place in buckwheat, this state and Pennsylvania producing nearly three-fourths of the country's total; second in maple sugar and sirup, with 3,732,000 pounds of sugar and 1,755,000 gallons of sirup in 1918, third in beans, second in pears, first in onions and first in apples. The production of the principal cereals in 1918, in bushels, was for corn, 29,520,000; buckwheat, 4,725,000; wheat, 7,840,000; oats, 51,660,000; barley, 3,988,000, and rye, 1,848,000. Potatoes yielded 34,960,000 bushels, the largest crop of any state; tobacco, 3,750,000 pounds; onions (1915), 4,534,887 bushels. The total value of the 1918 field crop was \$47,216,000. In the neighborhood of the large cities market gardening is extensively carried on. The fruit industry is of great value. New York's 1918 apple crop was 37,253,000 bushels, about a fifth of the country's total. The census of 1910 credited New York with 35,603,897 grape vines. They produced 253,006,361 pounds of grapes, having a value of \$3,961,677. The value of other fruit crops in the same year (1909) was: Apples, \$13,343,028; peaches, \$2,014,088; pears, \$1,418,218; plums, \$519,192; cherries, \$544,508; apricots and nectarines, \$14,490; quinces, \$135,345, and small fruits, \$2,875,495, a total of \$24,426,041.

MINERALS. The state is well wooded and the timber varied and excellent. Its leading mineral is iron ore, of which the mines, especially those of the Champlain and Adirondack regions, yield abundantly. Galena is found in large quantities in St. Lawrence and other counties. Building stone is abundant, consisting of granite, white and colored marbles, of which those of Westchester and St. Lawrence counties are the most important; Potsdam and Medina sandstones and gray and blue limestones; also fine brick clay. It has large quarries of slate and stone for flagging. There are extensive deposits of hydraulic cement and gypsum, the former being largely produced at Rondout, Manlius, and Akron, the latter near Syracuse. A vast amount of salt is made, chiefly from the springs of Onondaga county. The 1914 output was 10,389,314 barrels, an output exceeded by only one state. In recent years new and promising salt fields have been developed in Wyoming and Genesee counties. The 1914 graphite production was 10,455,139 pounds, value \$698,800. There are natural gas wells in several counties, with an output value in 1914 at \$2,600,352; and petroleum is found near Olean, Wellsville and other places. The 1914 production of petroleum was 938,974 barrels. Many other minerals are found. New York has no coal, but nearly a million tons of coke was made in 1917.

INDUSTRIES AND TRANSPORTATION. The state ranks first in the value of its manufactures. The industries cover almost the whole range of business and are well distributed over the state. The value of the manufactured goods in 1909 was \$3,369,490,000, over half of which (\$2,029,693,000) was credited to the five boroughs of "Greater New York." The fishing industry is large and valuable, the menhaden and oyster fisheries being the most productive. Transportation facilities in New York are of the best. Railroads penetrate everywhere, the total mileage in the state being 8,416 miles. The Erie Barge Canal, which is mainly the historic Erie Canal, deepened and improved at a cost of over \$135,000,000, connects the great lakes with the Hudson river. The main canal runs from the Niagara river to the Hudson river at Troy, with branches to Lake Ontario at Oswego and from the Hudson to Lake Champlain at Whitehall. Other branches connect through Lake Cayuga, with Ithaca and with Geneva on Lake Seneca. It has a depth of twelve feet, and the locks are fifty-five feet wide and three hundred feet long, permitting vessels of 2,500 tons to pass, without transferring cargo, from any of the lake ports to the ocean. The state has appropriated \$50,000,000 to be expended at the rate of \$5,000,000 per year, together with a like sum from the counties, in improving the roads. The state ranked third in 1915, with a surfaced road mileage of 15,686. This is being increased every year.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New York is 2,083, including 203 daily, 8 three times a week, 35 semi-weekly, 969 weekly, 1 three times a month, 14 fortnightly, 51 semi-monthly, 1 twenty times a year, 700 monthly, 1 every 40 days, 24 bi-monthly, 2 five times a year, 2 four times during the college year, 69 quarterly, 2 semi-annual and 1 issue unknown. The places of publication number 477, of which 68, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.
