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# NORTH CAROLINA

Population \*2,339,452

STATE CAPITAL, RALEIGH

NORTH CAROLINA is bounded north by Virginia, east and southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, south by South Carolina and Georgia, and west by Tennessee. Its extreme length from east to west is 490 miles; extreme breadth, 185 miles; land area, 48,580 square miles. The surface is very varied. For nearly 100 miles inland from the coast the country is level, marshy, and swampy; soil sandy but very fertile. It is estimated that there are nearly 3,000,000 acres of swamps in this region, which is known as the "Tidewater" section. Next is the middle or "Coastal Plain" section, with varied surface and fine soil. West of this is the "Piedmont" section, a fine farming region, producing North Carolina's staples, cotton and tobacco, in abundance, as well as large crops of wheat and other grain. It is a land of fertile valleys and gently sloping hills, increasing in altitude until they reach the "Mountain" region in the west. Some of the peaks in the Black Mountains and the Blue Ridge attain an elevation of from 5,000 to 6,000 feet, the highest land east of the Rocky Mountains. This region contains good grazing land, with much hard timber; and stock raising is largely carried on. It is a country of fine pastures and live stock of all kinds thrive. Grain and fruit, especially apples, are grown abundantly. The scenery is remarkably beautiful, and the climate is such that it is becoming a popular health and pleasure resort. In the coast region the river bottoms and reclaimed swamp lands are very fertile, and here cotton, corn, honey, beeswax, apples, peaches, and pears abound. Frost is infrequent, and the rainfall averages 60 inches. The Scuppernon and Catawba grapes are native here; cranberries and vegetables of all kinds are extensively produced, melons being especially fine. The lumber industries and fisheries are very valuable. Drainage work is being energetically prosecuted in this region, and many thousands of acres of swamp lands are annually brought under the plow. The pine region is being settled as the timber is cut off, but the forests are still extensive, and a large trade is done in timber, tar, and turpentine. The people are almost purely American, the number of individuals of foreign birth or parentage being smaller, both actually and relatively, than in any other state. The foreign born form about a quarter of one per cent of the population, those of foreign parentage only about two-fifths of one per cent.

AGRICULTURE. Cotton is grown chiefly in the southern and central counties. The middle section is adapted to the growth of cereals, tobacco, and cotton; sweet potatoes are a leading staple. In this section are a large number of cotton mills and woodworking plants. The state is excelled only by Kentucky in its tobacco crop, the production in 1918 reaching 282,000,000 pounds. In the truck growing industry she is among the first. The grain crops in 1918 were corn, 64,365,000 bushels; wheat, 7,105,000 bushels; oats, 6,500,000 bushels; rice, rye and buckwheat are grown to some extent. Potatoes produced 4,275,000 bushels; sweet potatoes 8,910,000 bushels, the third largest crop in the country, peanuts 7,200,000 bushels, also the third largest. Cotton produced 570,000 bales. Some sugar cane is grown for syrup. Apples and peaches are important crops.

MANUFACTURES. The principal manufactures are furniture, lumber, tar, turpentine, rosin, cotton and woolen goods, tobacco, zinc (smelted and rolled), carriages. The state takes fourth place among the southern states in lumber. The manufacture of cotton goods is very large and is constantly increasing, there being a greater number of cotton mills than in any other state. In the number of furniture factories North Carolina is exceeded by only one state. The 1910 census gives the value of manufactures for 1909 as \$218,658,000, the product of 4,931 factories. The state exports coastwise and to foreign ports large amounts of lumber, cotton, tobacco, flour, and fish. It is the fifth state in the lumber industry. The 1916 production was over two billion feet.

MINERALS. North Carolina has a large variety of minerals. It leads all the states in the production of mica, of which it had an output in 1914 of \$195,270. Gold is mined to some extent in Cabarrus, Mecklenburg, Lincoln and Rowan counties, the 1917 yield being worth \$15,141, and there is a branch of the United States Mint at Charlotte. Silver, lead and zinc exist, and there is a valuable mine of copper in Ashe county; barytes, corundum and many other minerals, and some precious stones are found. Coal and iron are found; the coal is mostly bituminous, and is contained in two fields, one in Stokes and Rockingham counties, known as the Dan River field, the other in Chatham and Moore counties, known as the Deep River field. The mines have been little worked in recent years. The region from the Roanoke and Cape Fear rivers westward to Cherokee county contains rich beds of magnetic and hematite ores; the "Cranberry" mine, in Mitchell county, yields the purest magnetic ore yet found in the United States, producing a remarkably strong and tenacious iron. Clay products make up about half of the total value of the state's mineral wealth, granite two-thirds of the remainder. The granite quarries in Surry and Rowan counties produce immense quantities of stone of high quality.

There are abundant transportation facilities by both water routes and railroads; and the latter are constantly extending. Particular attention is paid to educational matters, and over a thousand school houses were built in the three years preceding 1911.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in North Carolina is 275, including 87 daily, 2 three times a week, 26 semi-weekly, 174 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 4 semi-monthly, 22 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 160, of which 86, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# NORTH DAKOTA

Population 636,994

STATE CAPITAL, BISMARCK

**NORTH DAKOTA** is bounded north by Manitoba and Saskatchewan, south by South Dakota, east by Minnesota, and west by Montana. Length, east to west, about 355 miles, width, about 200 miles. Land area about 70,552 square miles. The Missouri river furnishes navigation for boats of three to six hundred tons burden. The Red River of the North, also navigable; drains the great wheat valley on its eastern border. That portion of the state east of the Missouri river is mostly rolling prairie; the soil on the Missouri slope being a black, sandy loam, with clay subsoil; while in the Red River valley it is a vegetable deposit of unsurpassed richness. West of the Missouri river the land is more broken, with stretches of excellent farming and grazing lands along the line of the Northern Pacific Railroad. In the north is a group of hills of moderate elevation known as the Turtle Mountains. In the southwest is a district of eroded clay hills, called the "Bad Lands," generally a good grazing region. Although great extremes of temperature are recorded, the Weather Bureau station at Bismarck registering 106° in July and -44° in January, the climate is healthful and the soil productive. The rainfall is not great, but sufficient in ordinary years. The Missouri river and all small streams and lakes are lined with timber.

**AGRICULTURE.** The total area of tillable land is about 40,000,000 acres. There were, in 1909 64,442 farms, averaging 338 acres. North Dakota's live stock, next to its grain crops, is the state's chief product. In 1919 there were 1,041,000 cattle in the state, of which 429,000 were used for dairy purposes; 850,000 horses, 285,000 sheep and 456,000 hogs. Creameries are numerous, and the dairy interests are large and growing larger. The northern and central parts are especially adapted to the growing of wheat and other cereals, potatoes, vegetables and the earlier varieties of corn. The Red River valley is celebrated for its wheat production. The chief products of the state are wheat, oats, barley, flax, corn, potatoes, dairy products, butter, cheese, and wool. North Dakota, in 1918, had a greater acreage in wheat than any other state, 7,700,000 acres. Unfavorable conditions, however, made her crop average only thirteen bushels per acre. Nevertheless, she ran, with a total crop of 101,010,000 bushels, a close second to Kansas, which state produced 102,008,000 bushels. Other 1918 crops were oats, 60,512,000 bushels; barley, 37,281,000 bushels; flaxseed, 6,864,000 bushels; potatoes, 8,910,000 bushels; corn, 9,196,000 bushels; rye, 20,422,000 bushels, leading the rest of the states in rye and in flaxseed, and being second in wheat and third in barley. While grain is still the greatest crop, other crops are claiming much attention, and diversified farming is becoming more common than formerly.

**MINERALS.** Mineral products are natural gas, cement rock, lignite coal, brick and pottery clays, the last being found chiefly in Morton and Stark counties.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in North Dakota is 815, including 12 daily, 2 semi-weekly, 293 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 4 monthly, 2 bi-monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 243, of which 52, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

## STATE CAPITAL, COLUMBUS

OHIO is bounded north by Michigan and Lake Erie, east by Pennsylvania and West Virginia, south by West Virginia and Kentucky, and west by Indiana; greatest length from east to west 225 miles; greatest breadth 200 miles; land area, 40,760 square miles, of which less than 700 square miles is waste land. The general character of the surface is that of a plateau of about 800 to 1,000 feet above sea level. The most prominent feature is the great divide which separates the drainage of Lake Erie from that of the Ohio river. This passes diagonally across the state from Trumbull county in the northeast to Mercer and Darke counties in the west. Its average height is about 600 feet above the lake; and from it the surface slopes gradually northward toward the lake and southward toward the river. The rivers and streams have excavated deep valleys, which give to the surface its distinctive undulating or rolling character.

**AGRICULTURE.** The soil is universally fertile; and Ohio holds a leading position in every branch of agriculture. The uplands are well suited to wheat, the southern slope of the watershed to grain generally, the northern slope to grazing and dairying, and the northeast section or Western Reserve especially so. The bottom lands of the Miami, Muskingum, and Scioto rivers are very rich in corn; the Western Reserve and Miami regions are famous for apples. Dairy products are also of great value. There were in 1918, 2,980,000 sheep in the state; the 1918 wool clip was 12,600,000 pounds. There were also 891,000 horses; 1,030,000 dairy cows, 1,102,000 other cattle; 4,268,000 hogs. Flax and flaxseed are staple products, and tobacco is largely grown in most of the southern counties. The production of the chief crops in 1918, in bushels, was corn, 183,200,000; wheat, 48,547,000; barley, 3,150,000; oats, 79,200,000; potatoes, 11,040,000; hay, 4,065,000 tons. Some rye and buckwheat are also grown. Apples made 8,316,000 bushels. Tobacco, in the same year, 113,288,000 pounds. Ohio stood fourth among the states in production of tobacco. Cincinnati is one of the country's largest tobacco markets. The 1918 field crops were worth \$541,400,000, sixth in value among the states. Beet sugar to the amount of 35,476 tons was made in 1918. Maple sugar production in 1918 was over 558,600 pounds; sirup, 1,098,000 gallons. Ohio is one of the leading states in poultry and poultry products. Fruit of all kinds is abundant.

**MANUFACTURES.** The virgin forests have largely disappeared, and while about one-fifth of the state's area is forest land, chiefly second growth, it is not of high value commercially, and the numerous woodworking industries are only partially supplied by the native woods. The lumber cut in 1918 was 280,000,000 feet. The fishing interests of Lake Erie are important. The manufactures of the state are very numerous and valuable, and Ohio stands fifth among the states in the annual output of manufactured goods. Iron, pork products, farm implements, clothing, flour and grist mill products, lumber, pottery (in which Ohio leads all the states) and malt and distilled liquors are among the most important.

**MINERALS, ETC.** In mineral wealth Ohio produced in 1914 a value of \$101,661,884. Coal (bituminous) underlies 12,000 square miles. The production in 1917 was 40,748,734 tons, in which year the coke ovens turned out 8,694,302 tons of coke. Iron ore is abundant, especially in the south; salt is largely produced (5,482,836 barrels in 1914); lime and cement are other important products. Good grindstones and building stones are obtained at Amherst, Berea (Berea grit), Buena Vista and Independence. There are excellent qualities of limestone and sandstone for building, especially at Massillon and Dayton. Marl deposits abound in the Maumee valley and other localities. There are good pottery and fire clays, the fire bricks of Mineral Point being among the best in the United States. Ohio stood first among the states in the value of clay products in 1914, with a value of \$37,166,768. Cleveland, Massillon, Youngstown, and the towns on the Ohio river are the chief seats of iron manufacture, which includes pig, forged, and rolled; iron castings and sheet iron, rails, Bessemer steel rails, etc. The state is second only to Pennsylvania in the production of pig iron. The development of the wonderfully productive oil fields (7,900,000 barrels in 1915) and the discoveries of natural gas in apparently inexhaustible quantities at many places in the state have been of incalculable value to its industrial interests. The railroad facilities are rapidly increasing, and Ohio has a network of well constructed and busy transportation lines. Ohio had in 1915, 30,569 miles of hard surfaced roads, out of a total road mileage of 86,354 miles, being a pretty close second to Indiana, which occupied first place with 30,962 miles.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Ohio is 877, including 160 daily, 1 four times a week, 6 three times a week, 42 semi-weekly, 476 weekly, 9 fortnightly, 9 semi-monthly, 145 monthly, 4 bi-monthly, and 25 quarterly. The places of publication number 388 of which 89, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

## STATE CAPITAL, OKLAHOMA CITY

OKLAHOMA is bounded on the north by Kansas, on the east by Arkansas and Missouri, and on the south and west by Texas. Land area, 69,414 square miles. The surface is generally rolling prairie, with abundant timber in the eastern part. The Arkansas and Red rivers are navigable for boats of light draft for some distance into the state.

**AGRICULTURE.** The land is generally tillable and the principal occupation of the people is agriculture. In 1910 Oklahoma had 189,438 farms, of an average area of 152 acres, and an average value of \$3,888. Corn is largely grown and the area devoted to it is increasing. The 1918 crops included 24,375,000 bushels of corn, 32,899,000 bushels of wheat; 33,120,000 of oats; 15,280,000 of kaffi and allied corn; 16,100 tons of broom corn, exceeded only by Texas; 1,258,000 bushels of potatoes; 975,000 bushels of sweet potatoes; 136,000 of barley; 550,000 bales of cotton were grown. Hay, peanuts and fruit of excellent quality are grown in considerable quantities. The production of alfalfa is increasing. The wealth of summer forage crops which may be grown and the abundant pasturage during the winter make the production of all classes of live stock very profitable. The value of domestic animals, poultry and bees in 1910 was \$144,276,000, an increase of over \$48,000,000 in ten years. The U. S. Department of Agriculture reported for January 1st, 1919, 561,000 dairy cows and 1,444,000 other cattle. Beef cattle were the only live stock showing a decrease in total value in the ten years following the 1900 census, the decrease being due to the loss in range cattle caused by the increasing number of small farms and the consequent diminution of the open ranges. There were 744,000 horses in 1919, 238,000 mules, 1,036,000 swine and 125,000 sheep. Poultry of all kinds had a value in 1910 of \$3,714,000, almost treble the value of the poultry in 1900.

**MINERALS.** Coal is abundant, and the mines produced 4,386,613 tons in 1917. Limestone, gypsum, and good building stone are plentiful. Oklahoma is second only to California in petroleum production, its wells producing in 1914 80,000,000 barrels, more than a quarter of the country's total. The natural gas product was 78 billion feet. Among other minerals were lead, zinc, asphalt and silver.

**MANUFACTURES.** Large shipments of flour are made to other states, after supplying home consumption. Cotton seed oil mills use the cottonseed produced on the farms, and large numbers of cattle are fed on the meal and hulls. Oklahoma, however, is an agricultural rather than a manufacturing state, although as the population grows, the number of factories established to supply the local needs and to use the local raw materials is constantly increasing. This increase has been considerable in the past few years. The total value of manufactured products, which was \$3,133,000 in 1899, had grown to \$53,682,000 in 1909, the year covered by the statistics of the 1910 census. In that year the state had 2,310 manufacturing establishments, employing 18,094 persons, and the value added by manufacture was \$19,529,000. The raw material used cost \$34,153,000 and the amount paid in wages to 13,143 wage earners was \$7,240,000 and in salaries \$2,045,000. The chief manufactures were flour and grist mill products, \$19,144,000; cottonseed oil and cake, \$5,187,000; lumber and its products, \$4,439,000.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Oklahoma is 488, including 60 daily, 1 three times a week, 4 semi-weekly, 398 weekly, 3 semi-monthly, 20 monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 320, of which 76, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL. SALEM

OREGON is bounded north by Washington, east by Idaho, south by Nevada and California, and west by the Pacific Ocean; average length from east to west, about 300 miles; average breadth, about 200 miles; land area, 94,560 square miles. It is divided unequally by the Cascade Mountains. East of this range the surface is generally undulating table land, with high cone-like hills and deep canyons. Between the Cascade and Coast ranges is the Willamette valley, 60 miles wide by 150 miles long and exceedingly fertile; from the Coast range westward the surface is mountainous, hilly, and broken. The principal industries of this region are dairying and fruit growing, but it is well adapted to wool growing, stock raising, and the growth of winter wheat, barley, oats, and hay. The eastern portion does better as a stock raising region, but good wheat is also grown there, especially in the northern counties, and several irrigation projects have been started to develop the arid portions of this region, the soil of which needs only water to make it produce abundantly. The climate is salubrious. In the extreme west, between the coast range and the ocean, the annual rainfall is very heavy, being about 70 to 80 inches; in the central and eastern portions it ranges from normal to scanty.

**AGRICULTURE.** In the Willamette valley wheat, corn, hops, tobacco, wool, flax, fruit, linseed, dairy products, and potatoes are produced in large quantities. The Rogue River valley, on account of its mild climate, is well adapted for raising fruits, especially grapes, and large quantities are shipped from there annually. The 1918 crop of apples was 3,500,000 bushels. The growing and drying of prunes form an important industry. Other important crops are strawberries, peaches, pears, cherries and plums. The chief grain crops are wheat, the 1918 crop being 15,811,000 bushels; oats, 9,025,000 bushels, and barley, 4,450,000 bushels. Hops are an important crop. Some corn and rye are also grown. Potatoes produced 5,500,000 bushels. The live stock product is large, there being about 222,000 dairy cows, 703,000 other cattle and 2,497,000 sheep in the state. The wool clip of 1918 was 12,500,000 pounds. The climate seems especially favorable for oats. In 1916, the third and fourth largest yield of this grain were reported from Oregon, the largest and second largest being in Colorado. A Clackamas county farmer grew one field of 22 acres which produced a crop of 120 bushels per acre. A Malheur county farmer grew 125 bushels per acre on 3/4 acres. The state's oat crop that year averaged 48 bushels per acre, the United States average being 30.1 bushels. The fourth largest yield of barley also came from Oregon.

**MANUFACTURING.** The manufactures comprise lumber, the large Douglas fir affording the best masts and spars in the world; leather, boots and shoes, saddlery, milling and smelting of ores, carriages, furniture, liquors, linseed oil, etc. The lumber industries, in which Oregon holds fourth place among the states, are of immense value. The 1909 output included 1,898,995,000 feet of rough lumber, over 181,512,000 lath and 293,644,000 shingles. The 1916 cut aggregated 2,222,000,000 feet. The trees are chiefly Douglas fir, western hemlock, spruce and pine of various species. Many of the trees are gigantic in size, and afford excellent lumber. Hardwoods form a very small portion, not more than three per cent. The value of manufactured goods in 1909 was \$93,005,000, an increase of 67.5 per cent. over 1899. The net value of manufactures, excluding the cost of the materials, was \$42,453,000. The wage earners numbered 28,750 and salaried employes 3,473. The amount paid as wages was \$19,902,000, for salaries, \$4,047,000. The largest industry, its output comprising nearly one-third of the whole in value, is the lumber industry in its various branches. Other important manufactures are flour and grist mill products and meat packing. Salmon canning, especially along the Columbia, is a great industry.

**MINERALS, ETC.** Gold and silver are produced, the gold in 1917 being valued at \$1,677,400; silver, \$177,600; copper, lead, platinum, cement rock, clay, glass sand, granite, marble, coal, etc., are also found. Navigable water lies on three sides of the state, the Snake River on the east, the Columbia River on the north and the Pacific Ocean on the west, and in addition to the mouth of the Columbia, which is one of the finest harbors in the world, there are several inlets along the coast.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Oregon is 263, including 32 daily, 1 three times a week, 9 semi-weekly, 185 weekly, 5 semi-monthly, 30 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 139, of which 36, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# PENNSYLVANIA

Population \*8,245,967

(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, HARRISBURG

PENNSYLVANIA is bounded north by New York and Lake Erie, east by New York and New Jersey, south by Delaware, Maryland, and West Virginia, and west by West Virginia and Ohio. Its greatest length from east to west is about 302 miles; its greatest breadth about 175 miles; mean length 230 miles; mean breadth 158 miles; land area, 44,832 square miles. The surface is exceedingly varied, chiefly level or slightly undulating in the southeast, hilly and mountainous in the interior, and generally rolling or broken in the west. A series of parallel ridges, members of the Appalachian system, each with a distinct name, traverse the state from northeast to southwest. The most eastern of these is the South Mountain, an extension of the Blue Ridge, and the western and highest the Alleghany, from which the surface slopes generally toward Ohio.

**AGRICULTURE.** The soil of the valleys and plains is generally fertile, and some of it exceedingly so. Lancaster county, and some of the counties bordering on the Ohio river, are the most productive. The state excels in dairy and market garden produce and all the agricultural staples of the Northern states. In 1918, 24,718,000 bushels of wheat, 47,190,000 bushels of oats, 62,400,000 bushels of corn, 5,850,000 bushels of buckwheat (in which this state stands first); 4,250,000 bushels of rye, some barley, 24,400,000 bushels of potatoes and 4,272,000 tons of hay were grown. The tobacco crop in 1918 was 64,752,000 pounds. Lancaster and York counties are the chief seats of this industry, Lancaster yielding more than any other county in the United States. Apples produced 17,775,000 bushels, second only to New York. The numerous large cities make dairying a popular and profitable industry and the total yearly milk production from the state's dairy cows, which number nearly 1,000,000, is about 575,000,000 gallons. Pennsylvania leads the Atlantic states in sheep and wool. The sheep in 1919 numbered 959,000, the 1918 wool clip was 4,774,000 pounds. About 1,000,000 pounds of maple sugar and 400,000 gallons of sirup are made each year. The field crops in 1918 were worth \$459,929,000.

**MINERALS.** Pennsylvania stands first in total production of mineral wealth, and first in coal, coke, cement, stone, sand, gravel and slate, and second in natural gas and clay products. The total mineral output in 1914 was \$452,374,085. The beds of anthracite and bituminous coal and iron ore, and the great oil basin, are sources of immense wealth. Anthracite coal is found mainly in the counties of Carbon, Dauphin, Lackawanna, Luzerne, and Schuylkill, to some extent in Columbia and Northumberland, and semi-anthracite in Sullivan and Wyoming. Bedford, Bradford, Centre, Clearfield, Fulton, Lycoming, and Tioga counties contain fields of semi-bituminous coal, while the bituminous coal beds are located beyond the main Alleghany ridge, every county west of it, with the exception of Erie, yielding more or less of this coal. Mercer supplies a good block coal for furnace use. The total coal production in 1917 was 172,448,142 tons of bituminous coal, and 88,939,117 tons of anthracite, nearly a third of the total bituminous output of the country and practically all of the anthracite, as only a few thousand tons came from the other two states producing it. The coke produced in 1917 was 27,912,025 tons. The petroleum region is situated mainly in the counties of Venango, Butler, McKean, and Clarion, and covers about 2,000 square miles. The natural gas field is about 2,730 square miles. The output of petroleum for 1914 was 8,170,335 barrels. Natural gas was worth \$20,401,295 in that year. The slate output had a value of \$3,609,959, nearly 70 per cent. of the country's total. Salt springs abound in the same region. Iron, graphite and copper are found in paying quantities. There are many medicinal springs, the principal of which are at Bedford, Doubling Gap, Ephrata and Yellow Springs. The southeastern corner of the state is rich in limestone and marble, of which great quantities are quarried for use in Philadelphia. This region also produces combined iron and chromium ores, hematite, magnetic iron, and corundum. A handsome black limestone is quarried at Williamsport, Silurian limestone in the Cumberland valley and at other places.

**MANUFACTURES.** The lumbering industry is decreasing, and the state, which was first in 1880, in 1916 occupied the twentieth place. In manufactures, Pennsylvania is second only to New York, the value of its manufactured goods in 1909 amounting to \$2,626,740,000. The chief manufactured goods are iron and steel goods of all kinds. This state produces two-fifth of the pig iron made in the country. In woolen goods it is excelled only by Massachusetts, its production in 1909 being \$77,446,996. Philadelphia is one of the principal seats of foreign and coastwise trade. The leading exports are grain, provisions, petroleum, tobacco, oil cake, lumber, tallow, hides, leather, shoes, cotton goods, machinery, and coal. Erie and Pittsburgh are also great commercial centres. Philadelphia and Chester are the chief shipbuilding stations. Pittsburgh, Harrisburg, Reading, and Scranton are the chief seats of the iron manufactures. Philadelphia is one of the great manufacturing cities of the world, and has an enormous production of iron goods, woolen and other textile fabrics, and other articles.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Pennsylvania is 1,202, including 193 daily, 6 three times a week, 28 semi-weekly, 686 weekly, 3 fortnightly, 16 semi-monthly, 211 monthly, 1 eight times during the college year, 1 six times during the college year, 1 semi-quarterly, 9 bi-monthly, 1 four times a year, 45 quarterly and 1 semi-annual. The places of publication number 415, of which 67, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

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# RHODE ISLAND

Population 595,836

STATE CAPITAL, PROVIDENCE

**RHODE ISLAND** is bounded on the north and east by Massachusetts, south by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by Connecticut. Its extreme length from north to south is 47½ miles; extreme breadth, 40 miles; average breadth, 35 miles; land area, 1,067 square miles. It is the most densely peopled state in the union, but on five-sixths of the area the population averages only about fifty to the square mile. The remaining one-sixth holds ninety per cent. of the people. The surface is for the most part rough, hilly and stony. There are no mountains, and few hills of any altitude. Nearly one-fourth is woodland.

**AGRICULTURE.** Rhode Island is not an agricultural state. The production of corn and oats is but little more than is used at home; that of other cereals small; dairy and market-garden produce and live stock very moderate. Agriculture is steadily declining, the only branch of this industry which is increasing being dairy farms carried on for supplying milk to the cities. The area devoted to the production of food crops declined in ten years from 350,000 acres to less than 200,000.

**MANUFACTURES.** Rhode Island is essentially a manufacturing community, and its factories produce an immense variety of goods. The most prominent manufactures are cotton, woolen and worsted goods, knit goods, machinery, jewelry, silver and plated ware, clothing, iron and ironware, rubber and elastic goods, leather, refined sugar and molasses, and flour mill products. In its production of cotton goods it is surpassed only by Massachusetts, in woolens only by Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, its production of woolen goods in 1909 being \$74,600,240; and it is the chief center of the jewelry manufacturing industry of the United States.

**MINERALS.** Coal was mined as early as 1812. The mines are situated in Cumberland, Portsmouth and Valley Falls, but the coal produced is hard and difficult to burn, and very little is being mined at present. There are extensive granite quarries at Westerly. Graphite is also mined, but not of high quality, as it contains much grit. The product is used chiefly for foundry facings, and as a basis for certain kinds of paint. Soapstone is found in paying quantities.

**FISHERIES.** The fisheries employ 131 vessels, and about 1,500 men, and the product in 1909 was about \$2,000,000. The lobster catch is an important item. The highest catch was in 1908, 1,391,231 pounds. In 1911 it was 891,886 pounds.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Rhode Island is 52, including 12 daily, 2 semi-weekly, 27 weekly and 11 monthly. The places of publication number 19, of which 5, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# SOUTH CAROLINA

Population \*1,590,015  
(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, COLUMBIA

**SOUTH CAROLINA** is bounded north and northeast by North Carolina, southeast by the Atlantic Ocean, west and southwest by Georgia. Its greatest length from east to west is about 275 miles, and its greatest breadth about 210 miles; land area, 30,170 square miles. The climate along the coast might be termed sub-tropical. Through the rest of the state it is mild and temperate. The rainfall varies from 40 to 55 inches. The surface presents nearly the same features as that of North Carolina. The coast for 100 miles inland is low and level, with sandy soil, numerous swamps, and extensive pine forests; then follows a tract of low sand hills, the soil of which is moderately productive. The land rises abruptly on the western edge of this belt, and continues to rise until it terminates in the Blue Ridge, the highest peak of which, Table Mountain, is 4,000 feet above the sea. The swamps embrace over 1,000,000 acres, and the pine lands 6,000,000.

**AGRICULTURE.** The sea islands are mainly devoted to sea island cotton and rice; the tidal swamps to rice; inland swamps, when drained, to rice, cotton, corn, and peas; the salt marshes to long staple cotton; the oak and pine and oak and hickory lands to corn and cotton; and the pine barrens to fruits and vegetables. Rice, cotton, and corn thrive best in the central and southern counties. The northwestern region produces corn, wheat, oats, tobacco, and many fruits. The grain crops for 1918 were:—corn, 38,250,000 bushels; oats, 11,000,000; rice, 104,000; wheat, 2,255,000. Sweet potatoes brought 7,600,000 bushels, white potatoes 2,856,000 bushels, peanuts 630,000 bushels. Some rye is grown. Cotton is the chief crop, averaging well over 1,000,000 bales. The 1918 crop was 1,500,000 bales, which put the state in third place in cotton growing. In 1916 a Union county farmer grew the second heaviest acre of cotton in the United States. Tobacco is also an important product, and 62,208,000 pounds were grown in 1918. The time when cotton was almost the sole money crop has passed, and while it holds its own as the chief staple, the production of other crops, such as grain, tobacco fruits and truck, is increasing year by year. Stock raising and wool growing are carried on with profit. Figs and pomegranates grow in the lower counties, and the peach and grape thrive over the state generally; strawberries are abundant. Peaches run over 1,000,000 bushels annually. Sugar cane is grown for syrup. Tea is being grown at Pinehurst, and while the total product is still small, crops have been grown producing 600 pounds of dried tea of good quality to the acre, and the demand for native tea is growing. Much attention is being paid to the improvement of the breed of cattle, both dairy and beef stock. Much care and money is devoted to agricultural education. Besides the work of the State Agricultural Department, there are a number of agricultural high schools, with experimental farms attached, and good work is being done by these institutions in developing the agricultural possibilities of the state. Alfalfa has been successfully grown, and many experiments are being made with other crops not native to the soil.

**INDUSTRIES.** In 1910, the standing timber in the state was estimated at 40 billion feet, chiefly yellow pine and cypress. The principal hardwood is oak, although ash, cottonwood and other species are plentiful. Tar, turpentine, and rosin have an important place among the state's forest products.

The manufactures are principally cotton goods, cottonseed oil, flour, lumber, machinery, tar, turpentine, carriages, and fertilizers. The chief industry is the manufacture of cotton goods, the annual production of which is rapidly increasing. In 1909 there were 179 textile mills in the state, with a total capital of over \$60,000,000, employing 46,855 persons, and the value of the product was \$68,971,307. The cottonseed oil mills numbered 108, and the product was worth over \$10,000,000. The state has abundant water power, except in the coastal plain, where the fall is very slight, and will, no doubt, work up a great part of its own raw cotton into textile goods before many years have passed. Commerce is mainly confined to Charleston, Georgetown, and Beaufort. Exports are chiefly rice, cotton, lumber, phosphate, naval stores, cottonseed and its oil, oil cake, fish, and spring vegetables. Shad and oyster fisheries are valuable.

**MINERALS.** The most important items in the mineral list are clay products, valued at \$568,645 in 1914; and phosphate rock, valued at \$415,039. The deposits of the latter mineral are becoming exhausted, however, and the production has gradually decreased from 502,584 tons in 1893 to 106,919 tons in 1914. Some gold is found in the northwestern counties, but the output has decreased in late years. Barytes, fuller's earth, lime, manganese, mica, silver and tin are all found, mainly in the northwest; white and colored marbles and limestones, granites and cyanites, soapstones, flagging stone, and buhr stone are abundant. In Fairfield county is found what is claimed to be the finest granite in the United States. It is of beautiful appearance, great strength and fine quality. Aiken county contains immense beds of the finest porcelain clay. A little coal is found in Chesterfield county.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in South Carolina is 152, including 17 daily, 2 three times a week, 13 semi-weekly, 95 weekly, 2 semi-monthly, 19 monthly, 1 bi-monthly and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 77, of which 46, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

**STATE CAPITAL, PIERRE**

**SOUTH DAKOTA** is bounded north by North Dakota, east by Minnesota and Iowa, south by Nebraska, and west by Montana and Wyoming. Length, east to west, nearly 360 miles; width, about 240 miles. Land area about 76,850 square miles. The Missouri River has depth enough for boats up to six hundred tons burden. That portion of the state east of the Missouri River is mostly rolling prairie; the soil on the Mississippi slope being a black, sandy loam, with clay subsoil. West of the river the land is more broken, with mining and grazing land in the southwestern or Black Hills region, which is a mountain district of nearly 5,000 square miles in extent, exceedingly rich in valuable minerals and in great part well adapted to stock raising. It is largely forested, and with the aid of irrigation much of it might be adapted to agriculture.

**AGRICULTURE.** In the northwestern part of the state the United States Government is constructing irrigation works, which will cost about \$2,500,000 and will bring into cultivation many thousands of acres hitherto untilled. The eastern portion of the state is especially adapted to the culture of wheat and other cereals, potatoes, vegetables, and flax. The Missouri river and all small streams and lakes are lined with timber. The principal agricultural products are wheat, corn, oats, barley, flax, hay and vegetables. Stock raising is still one of the state's great industries. The U. S. government reports for 1919 estimate the dairy cows at 561,000, other cattle 1,498,000, sheep 810,000, hogs 1,654,000 and horses 827,000. The value of the live stock marketed in 1909 was \$49,065,000; dairy and creamery products, \$8,500,000; eggs and poultry, \$5,300,000; wool and hides, \$900,000. The wheat product in 1918 was 71,805,000 bushels (fourth among the states); corn, 108,188,000 bushels; oats, 84,210,000 bushels; barley, 41,300,000 bushels. Flaxseed produced 1,368,000 bushels. Hay is an important crop, producing 1,235,000 tons in 1918.

**MINERALS.** The Black Hills possess some of the richest gold mines in the world; the gold production for 1917 was valued at \$7,392,600, making South Dakota rank fifth among the states in this industry, which accounts for nine-tenths of the state's annual mineral wealth. Tin occurs in great abundance, though as yet but little developed, from difficulty in reducing. Other important mineral products are silver (\$157,400 in 1917), copper, gypsum, mica, lime, brick, fire and potter's clay and a little coal. Petroleum and natural gas are also present, and marble and building stone are quarried.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in South Dakota is 359, including 19 daily, 321 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 4 semi-monthly, 12 monthly, and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 265, of which 63, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# TENNESSEE

STATE CAPITAL, NASHVILLE

TENNESSEE is bounded north by Kentucky and Virginia; southeast by North Carolina, south by Georgia, Alabama, and Mississippi; west by Arkansas and Missouri; greatest length from east to west 432 miles, breadth 109 miles; land area, 41,750 square miles. The climate is generally healthful and equable, the winters are short and the rainfall is everywhere sufficient for all needs, averaging about 52 inches. The state is popularly divided into East, Middle, and West Tennessee. East Tennessee comprises the eastern mountain border, the beautiful East Tennessee Valley, and about half of the Cumberland Mountain plateau. Middle Tennessee reaches from about the center of the plateau to the Tennessee river, and is a region of fertile terraces, including the vast elliptical basin of nearly 5,000 square miles, known as the Garden of Kentucky. West Tennessee extends from the Tennessee river to the Mississippi, and is somewhat broken in the east, succeeded by a rolling plain descending to the latter river. The Mississippi bottom is a low, flat, alluvial plain, covered with forests and abounding with lakes and swamps.

**AGRICULTURAL.** West Tennessee is extremely fertile, and produces corn and cotton in large quantities. Middle Tennessee is generally fertile, yielding excellent grain and tobacco and much cotton, especially toward the south. East Tennessee valley lands are fertile, producing corn, cotton, and winter wheat; potatoes, oats, hay, and hemp are extensively produced. The state's chief crop is corn, followed by cotton, wheat, hay and tobacco in the order named. The live stock production is large, especially of mules and swine. The Tennessee mule is much in demand in other states, as many of the breeders make a specialty of large and heavy animals, which command high prices. The wool clip is of considerable importance, and much attention is paid to fine breeds of horses. The 1918 cotton crop was 330,000 bales. The leading cereals are corn, wheat, and oats. Some rye, buckwheat and barley are grown. Corn in 1918 reached 84,000,000 bushels; wheat, 7,540,000 bushels; oats, 8,125,000 bushels; potatoes, 3,500,000 bushels; sweet potatoes, 2,940,000 bushels; hay, 1,620,000 tons, and tobacco, 62,240,000 pounds. Peanuts form a product of some importance, yielding about, in 1918, 684,000 bushels. Apples produced 4,700,000 bushels.

**LUMBER.** The lumbering interest is very great, there being a large area of valuable hardwood timber. Nearly a third of the state's land area is under forest. About \$25,000,000 is invested in the various branches of the lumber industry. The chief lumber products are cooperage stock, spokes and other vehicle stock, ties, handles, posts, piling and furniture stock. The 1916 cut of lumber was 700 million feet.

**MANUFACTURES.** The total value of manufactured goods in 1909 was \$180,130,000, with a net value, outside of the cost of materials of \$76,114,000; 73,840 wage earners were employed and wages were \$28,252,000. Besides there were 8,417 salaried employes, receiving \$9,186,000. Lumber with a gross output of \$30,457,000 and flour and other mill products \$29,070,000 were the leading industries.

**MINERALS.** Tennessee is rich in minerals of many kinds, over forty different minerals of economic value being found in commercial quantities. There are immense deposits of marble, limestone and other building stone; valuable copper mines exist in Polk county, producing 18,737,656 pounds in 1914; coal and iron ore are very abundant. The coal fields have an area of 4,400 square miles, and the output in 1917 was 6,194,221 tons. The average yearly production of coke is nearly 400,000 tons. Iron mining and smelting are becoming very extensive, and much iron ore is exported to the iron working towns on the Ohio river. Tennessee is second among the states in the production of phosphate rock, the 1914 output being 483,203 tons. Zinc production is growing fast. The 1914 output was 10,425 tons, nearly double that of 1913. Other minerals in paying quantities are gold, silver, barytes, bauxite, tripoli, etc. Colored marbles are found in immense quantities in East and West Tennessee; roofing slates in East Tennessee; hydraulic limestone in East, Middle and West Tennessee. Fire and potter's clay are abundant and of the finest quality.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Tennessee is 282, including 18 daily, 7 semi-weekly, 189 weekly, 5 semi-monthly, 41 monthly and 22 quarterly. The places of publication number 130, of which 84, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# TEXAS

STATE CAPITAL, AUSTIN

TEXAS is bounded north by New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Arkansas, east by Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Louisiana, southeast by the Gulf of Mexico, southwest by Mexico, and west by New Mexico; greatest length, about 740 miles; greatest breadth, 825 miles; land area, 265,896 square miles. From the Sabine river to the Trinity river is the great timber region, generally level and sandy in the south, rolling and fertile in the north. From the Trinity to the Colorado is prairie, timbered along streams, with extensive forests of live oak, extending through central and western Texas to the Red river, called the "Cross Timbers." The mean elevation is about 850 feet. The pecan tree is widely distributed, and is a valuable nut-bearing tree, its yield being estimated at 9,000,000 pounds, or 58 per cent. of the entire crop of the United States. Western Texas embraces the counties between the Colorado and Rio Grande; four-fifths of it is prairie; timber is generally confined to banks of streams. Between the Colorado and the Brazos rivers are the Comanche and Leon River Mountain ranges. In the north and northwest are the Church and Double Mountains, and the surface is generally broken until the Llano Estacado, or Staked Plain, is reached. It composes a great portion of the "Panhandle" and the natural vegetation consists only of grass. There is some farming here, but the chief industry of this district and the whole northwestern part of the state is stock raising. Between the Pecos and Rio Grande are several ranges, some times attaining an elevation of 5,000 feet.

**AGRICULTURE.** The chief crops of Texas are cotton, corn, and wheat, but almost every variety of plant which can be grown in the temperate or sub-tropical regions, and many which are considered tropical plants, can be grown successfully in some part of this great state. About a fifth of the world's cotton crop is produced in Texas. The 1918 yield was 2,580,000 bales; the total yield of the United States in that year was 11,700,000 bales. The world's yield was estimated at 17,500,000 bales. Galveston, through which port the bulk of Texas cotton is shipped, handles more than any other port, shipping nearly 4,000,000 bales each year. Texas also led in broom corn in 1918, with 19,200 tons. Cotton and corn may be grown in nearly any part of the state, but especially in the eastern and central sections, wheat chiefly in the north and centre. Sea island cotton is grown on the coast. 69,000,000 bushels of corn were grown in 1918, also 8,920,000 of wheat, 8,125,000 of oats, 7,840,000 bushels of rice (exceeded by Louisiana only), 24,075,000 of kaffir corn; some barley and rye. Sweet potatoes produced 5,046,000 bushels; peanuts, 7,117,000 bushels; peaches, 2,041,000 bushels. Sugar cane is grown chiefly on the Brazos and other rivers, near their mouths, and produced 7,000,000 pounds of sugar in 1919; rice is grown in the south and southeast. Onions are largely grown. While the production of beef cattle is still one of Texas' great industries, the day of the great cattle ranges is passing, and the "nester" is coming into possession of the land. The number of families owning and residing upon their farms rose from 172,160 in 1900 to 297,720 in 1910, and the total agricultural population is estimated at about 2,500,000, two-thirds of the state's whole population. The dairy industry is large and growing. There were 1,060,000 dairy cows in 1919 and 3,691,000 other cattle. Besides being first in the cattle industry, Texas produces more mules than any other state. There were 792,000 of these useful animals in the state in 1919. The Texas mule is usually somewhat lighter in weight than those of Missouri, Kentucky and Tennessee, but is strong, active and hardy, and in great demand in the gulf states and in Mexico. There were also 1,164,000 horses, 2,232,000 sheep and 2,320,000 hogs. The 1918 wool clip was 11,250,000 pounds. Texas now produces immense quantities of orchard and garden products. Thousands of acres are under irrigation from flowing artesian wells, principally located in southwest Texas. The chief occupation in the west is stock raising and wool growing. Angora goats form a valuable part of the live stock; Texas goats producing fully half of the 3,000,000 pounds of mohair cut annually in the United States. Figs and oranges thrive in the south. The agricultural products of the state in 1918 had a value of \$695,651,000, exceeded only by Illinois and Iowa.

**MANUFACTURES.** Manufacturing interests are increasing. The leading products are lumber (2,100,000,000 feet in 1916), cottonseed oil, flour, carriages, foundry and machine shop products, woollens, marble, etc. Cotton mills have been established in the state, operating a total of about 100,000 spindles and 2,500 looms.

**MINERALS.** Silver is found in Presidio and El Paso counties, the 1917 output being 583,200-ounces, worth \$480,300. In the southern part of Brewster county quicksilver is found. A little gold is found. Copper, lead and zinc are mined in small quantities. There is a field of lignite coal about 6,000 square miles in extent, and three large fields of bituminous coal, one in the north and two in the southwest, and smaller fields elsewhere in the state. The production of coal in 1917 was 2,355,815 tons. In 1914 the oil wells of the state produced 28,000,000 barrels. Natural gas is also found. Salt is produced in large quantities from springs in El Paso, Lampasas, Llano, and Mitchell counties. Texas leads in asphalt. The 1914 production was 57,984 tons, its value \$608,132. Large quantities of saltpetre are found in Blanco and Burnet counties; marble and roofing slate, grindstones, building stone, gypsum, sulphur, potter's and fire clays, marl and other fertilizers are abundant.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Texas is 904, including 110 daily, 1 three times a week, 23 semi-weekly, 679 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 11 semi-monthly, 73 monthly, 1 bi-monthly, 4 quarterly and 1 issue unknown. The places of publication number 557, of which 225, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

## STATE CAPITAL, SALT LAKE CITY

UTAH is bounded north by Idaho and Wyoming, east by Wyoming and Colorado, south by Arizona, and west by Nevada; length, north to south, about 350 miles; width, about 200 miles; land area, 82,0% square miles. The surface is generally mountainous, interspersed with arid plains, valleys and basins. The annual rainfall varies from five to twenty inches, the average for the state from twelve to fifteen inches. The timber lands, with a total stand estimated at 9 billion feet, are almost entirely situated in the National Forests.

**AGRICULTURE.** Grazing and mountain lands comprise about two-thirds of the state. The area at present under cultivation is about four per cent. It is estimated that "dry" farming can be successfully practised on several million acres of land which has a limited rainfall, but by reason of its location cannot be irrigated. Much of the finest wheat is grown on such land, and the quality is superior to that grown in more humid climates. Twenty per cent. of the soil can be made productive by irrigation, which almost invariably brings good results, as the soil contains all the elements of fertility. The state contains 3,220 miles of canals and lateral ditches and nearly 7,000,000 cubic feet of irrigation reservoirs. The United States government has four reclamation projects under way and in prospect, on which \$12,000,000 is to be expended. There are about 7,000,000 acres susceptible of irrigation, of which over 2,000,000 acres are now provided with water. Laws have been passed by which the rights of settlers on these lands will be thoroughly safeguarded. The mining industry, formerly Utah's chief source of wealth, and still increasing in value, year by year, has been compelled to yield first place by reason of the wonderful development of the state's agricultural resources. Wheat, oats, alfalfa, barley, rye, corn, potatoes, hay, sugar beets, and wool are the chief products. Wheat of fine quality is grown. It is the state's chief crop, 6,434,000 bushels being grown in 1918; 4,410,000 bushels of oats were also grown; 1,120,000 bushels of barley, 3,600,000 bushels of potatoes and 905,064 tons of sugar beet producing 105,794 tons of sugar. Utah's output of beet sugar was exceeded by only three states. Vegetables and small fruits grow luxuriantly on the irrigated lands. Utah farms have produced immense crops of potatoes. A farmer in Uinta county grew 640 bushels on one acre in 1918, another in Iron county 600 bushels. The United States average was under 100 bushels. The U. S. Agricultural Department reported, in August, 1918, what is said to be the world's record crop of marketable potatoes on one acre. It was 49,531 pounds or 825 bushels, grown in 19 near Kanab, in the southwestern part of the State. Cattle and sheep raising are profitable industries and are often successfully carried on where farming is impracticable. Utah had, in 1918, 2,410,000 sheep, 101,000 dairy cattle, 480,000 other cattle, 148,000 horses and 123,000 swine. The wool clip of 1918 was 15,800,000 pounds. Only four states exceeded this amount. About 10,000 acres are devoted to orchard and nursery interests. The dairy industry is growing fast, more than 500 silos having been built in the past five years.

**MANUFACTURES.** Manufacturing industries, which are numerous and varied, are of considerable importance, goods to the value of \$66,100,000 being sent out from the factories of the state in 1911. The canning industry is large and growing. Extensive works for the mining and melting of ores have been established.

**MINERALS.** The mineral wealth is very great. The total output of gold in 1917 was \$3,620,300; silver, \$11,788,700. In 1915 there were produced: copper, 182,549,000 pounds; lead, 219,098,000 pounds; zinc, 22,643,000 pounds; coal, 4,125,230 tons in 1917; asphaltum, sulphur, gypsum, clay, building stone and salt are also largely produced and some radium. The coal fields have an area of over 13,000 square miles. Petroleum is found, but not yet in commercial quantities. The state is exceedingly liberal in the treatment accorded her schools, and there are many well equipped institutions for higher education.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Utah is 109, including 8 daily, 3 three times a week, 6 semi-weekly, 75 weekly, 1 semi-monthly and 16 monthly. The places of publication number 60, of which 24, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

## STATE CAPITAL, MONTPELIER

VERMONT is the most northwesterly of the New England states, bounded north by Quebec, east by New Hampshire, south by Massachusetts, and west by New York. It is 143 miles long by from 40 to 85 miles wide, with a land area of 9,135 square miles. The Green Mountains traverse it from north to south, mainly in two ranges, generally covered with dense forests, but affording excellent pasturage. Western Vermont and a large tract of the eastern part comprise beautiful pastoral regions, but the central part is rugged and mountainous. The best soil is found on the western slope of the mountains near the border of Lake Champlain, and in the valley lands of the Connecticut river.

**AGRICULTURE.** The state occupies a prominent position in agriculture. When its area, population, amount of forest land, and long severe winters are considered, there is perhaps no other state that yields so large a return. All the ordinary agricultural staples are abundantly produced; 1,710,000 bushels of corn, 4,223,000 of oats, 294,000 of buckwheat, 3,380,000 of potatoes and 1,291,000 tons of hay were grown in 1918; also some rye, barley and wheat; wool and dairy products are abundant and excellent; cattle, sheep, and horses are raised in large numbers, and the state's live stock exceeds in value that of any other state in New England, although it is the smallest state in population. Vermont continues to be the greatest breeding state of fine horses (Morgans and Hambletonians) and of Spanish merino sheep. Every year numbers of these superior animals are shipped to all parts of this country, to South America and to Australia. The yield of maple syrup is large, the 1918 production being 664,100 gallons, in addition to 6,237,000 pounds of sugar. The State produces about half of the maple sugar in the country each year and nearly one-seventh of the syrup. As in all New England, the average crops per acre are much greater than in the country at large. The corn average for the United States in 1918 was 24 bushels per acre. No New England state went below 38 bushels. Massachusetts' average acre produced 52 bushels. Some wrapper tobacco is grown in the south, in the valley of the Connecticut.

**MANUFACTURES.** Manufactures occupy a prominent position in its industries, and cover a wide range of goods, including flour, furniture, cotton and woolen goods, leather, agricultural tools, tin and copper ware, lumber, etc. The 1910 census enumerates 1,958 plants, producing goods valued at \$88,310,000, of which value \$33,487,000 was produced by the labor of the state's workers. Large quantities of lumber are exported.

**MINERALS.** Vermont leads in the production of marble and granite, and stands second in slate. These three substances make up more than nine-tenths of the value of the state's mineral output. The principal marble quarries are at Brandon, Dorset, Isle La Motte, Manchester, Middlebury, New Haven, Pittsford, Proctorsville (serpentine), Roxbury (verdantique), Rutland, Shelburn, Sutherland Falls, Swanton and West Rutland; slate quarries at Castleton, Fair Haven, Guilford, Northfield, Pawlet and Poultney; granite at Barre and Brattleboro. The United States Geological Survey statistics for 1914 give the value of Vermont's stone output as \$6,535,477; slate, \$1,414,247. Potters' clay comes from Bennington and Rutland; steatite from Castleton and Grafton; manganese, brown hematite, kaolin and ochre from Brandon, South Wallingford and Manchester Center; copper ore from Vershire and Corinth. Other minerals are asbestos, mineral paints, soapstone and small quantities of copper, gold and silver. Rutland is the largest marble center in the world, not less than \$6,000,000 of capital and 4,000 men being employed in 15 quarries and 20 mills. Burlington is a large market for Vermont lumber, having extensive mills and a trade extending throughout the eastern states.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Vermont is 91, including 10 daily, 75 weekly, 1 semi-monthly, 4 monthly and 1 quarterly. The places of publication number 66, of which 12, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# VIRGINIA

STATE CAPITAL, RICHMOND

VIRGINIA is bounded north by West Virginia and Maryland, east by Maryland and the Atlantic Ocean, south by North Carolina and Tennessee, and west by Kentucky and West Virginia. Its greatest length from east to west is about 440 miles, its greatest breadth 192 miles; land area, 40,125 square miles. The surface is divided into six great natural divisions, the Tidewater, comprising the south and southeast; the Middle, an undulating plain, extending westward to the Coast Range; the Piedmont, from the Coast Range to the Blue Ridge Mountains, and from the Potomac River to North Carolina; the Blue Ridge, stretching across the state in a southwesterly direction; the Valley—a part of the great Appalachian valley, reaching from Canada to Alabama—a broad belt of rolling country between the Blue Ridge and the Kittatinny or North Mountain; and the Appalachian, a mountainous region traversed by the Alleghanies. The soil in the Tidewater region is a light sandy loam, yielding large crops of vegetables and small fruits. The Valley region has a rich, fertile soil, well adapted for cereals, of which corn, wheat, oats and rye are the principal. Much of the mountain region is uncultivated and chiefly forest land; but the parallel valleys are very fertile. The Piedmont, Blue Ridge, Valley, and Appalachian regions are noted for their grasses. The forests of Virginia are rich in a large variety of trees, especially the valuable hardwoods, and the export of lumber is large.

**AGRICULTURE.** The growth in the total products of the farms during the last ten or twenty years has been very large. "Corn Clubs" are doing a great work among the younger farmers. Of the five greatest yields from an acre of corn reported by the United States Department of Agriculture for 1916, four were in Virginia, including the first, second, fourth and fifth, and were 174, 154.2, 140.2 and 140 bushels respectively. These figures are official, each crop was grown on a measured acre and the facts certified as correct by responsible witnesses. It may not be possible for every corn grower to equal those yields, but there is no doubt that a general following of the methods used by these boys would increase the nation's crop to far more than the 24 to 28 bushels per acre which it usually averages, and thus solve a great part of the food problem, especially as wheat and potatoes show differences fully as great. In wheat the record crop is six times, in potatoes eight times as high as the average crop. The 1918 crop of corn in Virginia was 56,000,000 bushels; wheat, 15,600,000; oats, 5,175,000; potatoes, 11,750,000; peanuts, 5,880,000; also barley, rye and buckwheat. The yield of tobacco is exceeded only by Kentucky and North Carolina; 146,800,000 pounds were produced in 1918. Some cotton is grown in the Tidewater section, 26,000 bales in 1918; fruit grows all over the state, Virginia being especially celebrated for the fine quality of its apples. Virginia's apple crop for 1918 was 9,000,000 bushels. A considerable part of the Tidewater region is devoted to the growing of early vegetables for northern markets, especially near Norfolk, where in some cases of intensive culture \$1,000 profit has been made in a year from a single acre. Tomatoes grown in 1918, counting only those sold to canneries, etc., were 62,888 tons. Dairying, stock raising, and wool-growing are important industries. The dairy products in 1909 were worth \$7,000,000, against only \$2,000,000 ten years before. The dairy cows in 1919 numbered 424,000, and other cattle 567,000, sheep 713,000 and hogs 1,134,000.

**FISHERIES.** There are profitable fisheries of bass, shad, etc., and Virginia leads in the oyster industry, her output being 6,000,000 bushels annually.

**MANUFACTURES.** The manufacturing interests are also increasing, the chief seats being Richmond, Alexandria, Danville, and Lynchburg. The more important products are cotton goods, tobacco, leather, coke, saw and planing mill products, flour, clothing, woodenware, paper, agricultural implements, machinery, etc. The smoking and chewing tobacco in 1910 was worth \$12,504,844; cigars and cigarettes, \$8,939,894; leather, \$9,208,427; woodenware, baskets, boxes, etc., \$9,677,994; silk, \$1,533,631; paper and pulp, \$4,888,549; knit goods, \$2,428,152; flour and grist mill products, \$11,270,818; cotton goods, \$3,265,359; boots and shoes, \$3,819,232; lumber, \$10,088,478; sash, doors, etc., \$1,877,899; machinery and iron goods, \$24,143,272. In 1880 the cotton mills used 5,087,519 pounds of cotton. In 1909 they used 36,517,677 pounds. The lumber (1,335,000,000 feet in 1916) and mineral products increased almost in the same proportion. Virginia canned more tomatoes in 1918 than any state except Maryland and Delaware, 1,353,332 cases. Virginia has excellent natural advantages for commerce, but it is only lately that she has begun to take a prominent part in foreign trade.

**MINERALS.** The state has a great variety of minerals. There are beds of anthracite, semi-bituminous and bituminous coal in the southwestern counties, some of them producing a good coking coal. There are coal-bearing strata in other parts of the state, particularly near Richmond; the coal is bituminous, and generally of good quality. There were 10,087,091 tons of bituminous coal produced in 1917 and 1,304,230 tons of coke were made. Virginia produces more than half of the country's output of iron pyrites (used in the manufacture of sulphuric acid) and also is first in the production of soapstone and of articles manufactured therefrom. There are also large deposits of gypsum and marl, and abundance of fine granite, marble, and other building stones; barytes, mica, mineral paints, salt, slate, sulphur, kaolin, fire clay and many other minerals. It abounds in mineral springs of great reputation. Iron and manganese are extensively mined, also zinc and lead ores. A little gold and silver is produced from mines in the northern and central counties. Some copper is mined. Lime burning is an important industry. Transportation facilities are good, both by water and rail. Water power is abundant; even in the Tidewater section the small streams have sufficient fall to operate the local grist mills and other industries.

**NOTE:**—The 1910 Census does not include the populations of the cities of Bristol, Charlottesville, Clifton Forge, Danville, Fredericksburg, Lynchburg, Newport News, Norfolk, Petersburg, Portsmouth, Radford, Richmond, Roanoke, Staunton, Williamsburg and Winchester in the populations of the counties in which these cities are situated. While these cities are now separate from the counties, we still give, for the purpose of reference, the population figures of the counties to which they formerly belonged.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Virginia is 226, including 33 daily, 1 three times a week, 5 semi-weekly, 144 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 1 semi-monthly, 34 monthly and 7 quarterly. The places of publication number 130 of which 67, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# WASHINGTON

Population \*1,407,865  
(U. S. Census Bureau estimate for 1914)

STATE CAPITAL, OLYMPIA

WASHINGTON is bounded north by British Columbia, west by the Pacific Ocean, east by Idaho, and south by Oregon. Its average length, east to west, is 330 miles; width, 220 miles; land area 66,880 square miles. It is divided by the Cascade Mountains into two distinct parts.

**AGRICULTURE.** Western Washington is a fine timber country, with many fertile valleys, well settled and very productive in vegetables, of fine quality, fruit of all kinds and hops. Fruit growing has been especially successful, and some of the largest and finest fruits in the eastern market are those shipped from Washington. Dairying is an interest of growing importance, and produced butter worth \$3,160,599, cheese worth \$32,750, and condensed milk worth \$4,185,330 in 1909. Eastern Washington is especially adapted for the raising of fruit of all kinds, vegetables, hops and grain, particularly wheat, of which 26,429,000 bushels were grown in 1918. Oats also grow luxuriantly, frequently yielding seventy bushels to the acre. The 1918 crop was 8,370,000 bushels; potatoes, 8,580,000 bushels; barley, 2,630,000 bushels; apples produced 16,459,000 bushels, exceeded only by New York and Pennsylvania; hay, 1,429,000 tons. Some rye and corn were also grown. There are some waterless regions in the central and eastern portions of the state, between the eastern slopes of the Cascade range and the western slope of the Rocky mountains. Some parts of this area have been irrigated by private enterprise, and other reclamation projects are under way, in addition to the Yakima and Okanogan projects, which are being constructed by the United States government. The former of these is expected to reclaim at least 500,000 acres, and within a few years the area of irrigated land will be fully 1,500,000 acres. The climate of Washington is perfection; the mean average temperature for the year being 53°, without extremes of heat or cold. It is the best agricultural country on the Pacific coast. Cattle and stock of all kinds do remarkably well; the ranges are good and it is not considered necessary to feed the stock in the winter time, owing to the generally light snow fall and the abundance of natural grasses. In 1919, Washington had 303,000 horses, 216,000 dairy cows, 307,000 other cattle, 780,000 sheep and 317,000 hogs. The wool reaches over 5,000,000 pounds a year. An interesting fact, told in the Monthly Crop Report of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture for July, 1918, is that the largest yield of wheat ever recorded was grown in 1895 near Coupeville, in Island County. A field of 18 acres produced 117.2 bushels per acre. The field had been in pasture for several years, then three years in potatoes, after which without artificial fertilizer, it was sown to "Australian Club" wheat, with the above result.

**MINERALS.** Extensive coal and iron mines are being operated, and coke ovens established; 4,009,902 tons of coal were mined in 1917, and 497,533 tons of coke was made. Next to coal, the principal mineral industry is the manufacture of cement, of which 2,045,465 barrels were made in 1914. Clay products are also of importance. There are copper, silver and gold mines, all of which are being developed; \$484,900 in gold was produced in 1917 and \$211,600 in silver; copper is mined and also some lead and zinc. There is also an abundance of limestone, granite, marble, etc.

**MANUFACTURES.** Manufacturing industries of all kinds are increasing rapidly in numbers and importance. The 1910 census gave the number of plants as 3,674, employing over 80,000 people, and their product had a value of \$220,746,000, nearly half of which was created by the labor of Washington citizens. The principal industry is the manufacture of lumber and its products. In this Washington leads the nation. In addition to general wood-working factories, there are over a thousand lumber and shingle mills, and the pay rolls of the loggers and lumbermen reach a total of \$60,000,000 to \$70,000,000 annually. Washington's cedar shingles are celebrated for quality and durability. In the year 1912 over 8,000,000,000 shingles were manufactured. The 1916 cut of lumber was 4,494,000,000 feet. Ship building is one of the most important industries. The principal articles of export are lumber, shingles, coal, wheat and salmon.

**LUMBER AND FISHERIES.** Over 12,000 square miles of the state's area is in timber. Parts of this area bear immense trees, ten to twelve feet in diameter and 300 feet high. Douglas fir constitutes more than half of the standing timber. The rest consists of red cedar, hemlock, spruce and western pine. Hardwoods are found in small quantities.

Puget Sound is a vast harbor, having an extent of 1,594 miles of shore line, and Seattle, its principal seaport, is fast becoming the metropolis of the northwest Pacific coast. Fish of all kinds abound, and the taking and canning of salmon employs about ten thousand people in the season. The total value of the fisheries products in 1909 was \$18,534,010.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Washington is 349, including 33 daily, 1 three times a week, 6 semi-weekly, 249 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 8 semi-monthly, 42 monthly, 1 bi-monthly, 1 six times a year and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 185, of which 39, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

STATE CAPITAL, CHARLESTON

WEST VIRGINIA is bounded north and east by Pennsylvania and Maryland, east and south by Virginia, and west by Kentucky and Ohio. Its greatest length from north to south is about 240 miles; greatest breadth, 100 miles; land area, 24,715 square miles. It is abundantly watered, many navigable tributaries of the Ohio flowing through the state. The surface of its rivers is estimated at 185 square miles. The climate is remarkably healthful, without extremes of temperature or of dryness or moisture, making energetic outdoor labor possible at all seasons, which conditions, combined with the fertility of the soil, make possible the widely diversified and abundant harvests for which the state is celebrated. A large part of the surface is mountainous and hilly; about two-thirds is covered with forest. The soil of the ridges is fertile to the tops, and the summits of many mountains are flat, natural meadows or glades.

**AGRICULTURE.** There were, in 1909, over 100,000 farms in the state, averaging about 114 acres. The valley of the Great Kanawha is the finest grazing region of the state. No finer blue grass farms exist than those of the central, northern and Greenbrier sections. West Virginia is especially famous for wool, the product of the Northern Panhandle obtaining the highest award at the Paris Exposition; while the live stock interests generally are large. Other great staples are corn, wheat, oats, and tobacco. The 1918 crops included 24,800,000 bushels of corn; 4,942,000 of wheat; 4,820,000 of oats; 1,037,000 tons of hay; 8,174,000 bushels of apples; 5,220,000 bushels of potatoes; 8,792,000 pounds of tobacco; 918,000 bushels of buckwheat and some rye. The soil is particularly well adapted for apples, peaches and other fruits. In 1919 there were 194,000 horses, 789,000 sheep, 489,000 hogs and 609,000 cattle, of these 243,000 were dairy cows. The lumber trade is important, the forests being principally composed of hardwood timber of the most valuable kinds. The product is worth about \$15,000,000 per year. Maple sugar and sirup are produced abundantly.

**MINERALS.** The mineral wealth is very large, and the total production in 1914 was \$134,071,803, second only to Pennsylvania. Nearly the whole of the state lies within the Alleghany coal system, and large quantities of coal are exported both by river and rail, and new mines are constantly being opened. Fifty of the fifty-five counties have workable coal seams, generally bituminous, and the total area is about 11,000,000 acres, about one-thirteenth of the coal area of the country. In 1917 the mines employed about 75,000 persons, and the total production of coal was 86,441,667 tons, this production being second only to that of Pennsylvania. The coke output was 3,349,781 tons. The salt industry is of considerable importance. The Kanawha valley is one of the great salt-producing regions of the United States. Petroleum is extensively produced, chiefly in Ritchie, Pleasants, Marshall, Wood and Wirt counties. The 1915 output was 9,000,000 barrels. Natural gas is found in several places, Wheeling and the Northern Pan Handle using it as a fuel almost to the exclusion of coal. The state's production in 1914 was worth \$35,515,329, placing it first among the states and exceeding Pennsylvania's output by nearly \$15,000,000. The three fuels, coal, petroleum and natural gas, furnish over 90 per cent. of the state's mineral output. Not more than 25 per cent. of these fuels is consumed in the state, the greater portion being transported by rail, river or pipe line to manufacturing centers in other states. Limestone, sandstone, and grinding stone abound generally throughout the state.

**MANUFACTURES, ETC.** Manufactures are increasing. In the ten years, from the 1900 census to that of 1910, 2,300 new industries were started, costing over \$152,000,000, and employing over 60,000 people. The state has abundant water power, all its streams having a rapid descent, but so far this has been but little utilized. The leading products are steel and iron in various forms, glass, flour, salt, wood pulp, liquor, lumber, queensware and porcelain, fire brick, leather, cigars and tobacco, and machinery. The cigar manufacture is very important. The annual lumber cut is considerable over one billion feet. The total value of manufactured goods for 1909 was \$161,950,000, the increase in value through manufacturing processes being \$69,072,000. Wheeling is the largest and most important city; it is the manufacturing center and all the industries enumerated above, except salt manufacturing, flourish there. Transportation facilities are being extended in all directions, 1,200 miles of new railroad having been laid within ten years. Much attention is given to education. Over 1,200 new schoolhouses were built in the ten years after 1901, and the value of property devoted to educational purposes increased in the same time from \$4,515,000 to \$12,981,694. Over \$5,000,000 was appropriated for educational purposes in 1911. The population increased 27.4 per cent. from 1900 to 1910, the total assessed property increased from \$278,829,659 in 1904 to \$1,114,000,000 in 1911, and bank deposits, which in 1895 were \$16,447,000, increased to over \$100,000,000 in 1911.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in West Virginia is 185, including 31 daily, 3 semi-weekly, 141 weekly, 1 fortnightly and 9 monthly. The places of publication number 93, of which 55, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# WISCONSIN

STATE CAPITAL, MADISON

WISCONSIN is bounded north by Lake Superior, northeast by Michigan, east by Lake Michigan, south by Illinois, and west by Iowa and Minnesota. Its greatest length from north to south is 300 miles; greatest breadth, 260 miles; land area, 54,450 square miles. The surface is generally an elevated plain, with high bluffs along the rivers and lakes, and elsewhere gently undulating, diversified with prairie, woodlands, and numerous lakes. The northern part is heavily timbered, and has a somewhat severe climate. The lumber business of this section of the state, in pine and hard wood, has built up many large and flourishing inland cities, like Oshkosh, Eau Claire, Wausau, Chippewa Falls, Stevens' Point, Merrill and Shawano.

**AGRICULTURE.** Wheat, corn, rye, oats, barley, potatoes, dairy products, and maple sugar are all produced in large quantities, especially oats, of which the 1918 crop reached 110,162,000 bushels; rye, in which Wisconsin stood fourth among the states, her crop being 7,674,000 bushels and potatoes, 33,040,000 bushels. Corn produced 69,538,000 bushels; barley, 25,383,000; wheat, 9,837,000 and hay, 3,537,000 tons. Sugar beets are grown largely, the state's factories in 1918 turning out 13,358 tons of sugar. Maple sugar and sirup are also produced, and Wisconsin is one of the leading states in the production of cranberries. Some linseed is grown, hops are exceedingly prolific; fruit growing is an important industry. Wisconsin far surpasses all other states in the importance of its dairy industries. The dairy cows in 1919 numbered 1,803,000. This was 325,000 more than New York, the next state in order, and makes an average of nine to every farm, in addition to 1,436,000 other cattle. There were 65,418 silos in the state. Cheese and butter making have increased to enormous proportions, especially in the central and southern counties, making this state the leader in dairy products. The value of the state's dairy products in 1909 was \$53,843,249, almost a quarter of the country's total. The most recent authentic figures show 1,005 creameries in the state, Wisconsin leading the country in the number of plants devoted to this industry. 46% of the cheese factories of the United States are in Wisconsin. 84,000 farmers supply the creameries and 40,000 the cheese factories. The growing of seed leaf tobacco for wrappers has become an important and profitable industry, and the product commands good prices. The 1918 crop was 65,170,000 pounds. This state is third in cranberry production. Large numbers of horses are bred; hogs numbered 2,181,000 in 1919; sheep are numerous, and the wool clip large and valuable.

**MINERALS.** Zinc is the most important mineral product. Wisconsin, in 1914, produced 31,113 tons. Iron ore comes next, with a production of 886,512 tons. Limestone and lead exist in the southwest, chiefly near Mineral Point. One of the best hydraulic cements comes from the neighborhood of Milwaukee. Other minerals existing in workable quantities are graphite, mineral paints and pyrites.

**FISHERIES.** The lakes and streams abound with fish, especially trout and black bass. The commercial fisheries are valuable. Those of the waters of Lakes Superior and Michigan, subject to Wisconsin laws and control, during the season of 1911 gave employment to 1,363 fishermen. The catch, amounting to 15,380,137 pounds, had a total value of \$743,485.

**MANUFACTURES.** Manufactures are thriving and numerous, lumber and wood work of all kinds holding a very prominent position. Wisconsin leads the lake states in the lumber industry. Her 1916 output was 1,600,000,000 feet. The manufactures of furniture, wagons and other goods made wholly, or in great part, of wood; agricultural implements, leather and brooms are large and increasing, while at Milwaukee are situated several of the large breweries in the world, and the manufactures of cotton and woolen goods, nails, paper, steel rails and merchant iron are of great importance. The 1910 United States census reported, for the year 1909, 9,721 factories, producing \$590,305,000 in goods.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Wisconsin is 593, including 57 daily, 2 three times a week, 4 semi-weekly, 451 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 3 semi-monthly, 59 monthly, 4 bi-monthly, 1 five times a year, 1 four times a year, and 7 quarterly. The places of publication number 329, of which 71, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

# WYOMING

Population \*141,705

STATE CAPITAL, CHEYENNE

WYOMING is bounded north by Montana, east by South Dakota and Nebraska, south by Colorado and Utah, and west by Utah, Idaho, and Montana; length, east to west, 365 miles; width, 274 miles; land area, 97,575 square miles. The mean elevation of the state is about 6000 feet. The clear, dry atmosphere and the abundance of sunshine has made the state a favorite health resort, especially for persons afflicted with pulmonary diseases. Its surface is broken by mountain ranges, deep river canyons and flat-topped hills or buttes, the latter a feature of South Wyoming, which rise from valley or plain like walled cities or mounds. In the northwest corner is the Yellowstone National Park. There are extensive areas of pine and spruce timber, widely distributed throughout the mountain regions. The forests cover about 7,000,000 acres and as much more of the surface is more or less timbered.

**AGRICULTURE.** For many years cattle raising was the only industry, and it is still in the front rank. There were on January 1st, 1919, 1,000,000 cattle in the state, in addition to 72,000 dairy cows, 230,000 horses, and 4,018,000 sheep. But here, as in all the western states, agriculture is steadily progressing over the ranges. Wyoming leads all the states in the number and value of its sheep and of its annual wool clip, which reached 34,028,000 pounds in 1918, nearly one-seventh of the country's total. Hay is also a leading product. Irrigation is needed in a large part of the country to make the soil productive, as there are few places, except in the eastern portion, where crops can be successfully grown without additional water supply. Where it is used, however, the returns are very large; fine crops of alfalfa, sugar beets, vegetables and small fruits being grown. It is estimated that 10,000,000 acres may be reclaimed, and there are numerous public and private systems in operation and under construction. Over 1,000,000 acres are now supplied from the existing systems. Experiments are being made in methods of "dry farming" suitable for localities where irrigation is not practicable, and good crops of grain and alfalfa have been grown. The best results are obtained from the two-year system, by which half of the farm is allowed to lie idle each year, being plowed and harrowed to preserve the moisture for the next year's crop. By this method profitable crops have been secured where the annual precipitation is less than fifteen inches. Certain varieties of wheat and barley do especially well. It is believed that fully 20,000,000 acres can be made productive by dry farming. The United States crop report for 1918 shows 6,600,000 bushels of wheat, 11,085,000 bushels of oats, 1,110,000 bushels of barley, 4,500,000 bushels of potatoes and 1,218,000 tons of hay. Some flaxseed and rye are also grown.

**MINERALS.** There are few states with greater mineral resources than Wyoming. One hundred and fifty-six varieties of minerals have been discovered, and new ores are constantly being brought to light. Copper in commercial quantities has been found in many places. Gold and silver are found, but the quantity produced in recent years is small. There are vast beds of iron ore and plenty of good coal, the latter underlying 41,500 square miles of territory; 8,575,619 tons were dug in 1917. Gypsum, salt, soda, graphite, asphaltum, epsom salts, asbestos, plaster, clays, sulphur, lead, tin, and other minerals are found. There are many mineral springs. The oil fields in central and northern Wyoming cover a territory 350 miles long and 150 miles wide. Many wells have been drilled and promise to be large producers, but the majority are capped until the several projected pipe lines shall be constructed. The 1915 production was 4,200,000 barrels. All the various qualities of petroleum have been found, and several strong wells of natural gas. The total mineral output in 1914 was valued at \$12,417,752. Lumber (18,495,000 feet in 1916) and railroad ties are the chief articles manufactured.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Wyoming is 92, including 10 daily, 3 semi-weekly, 75 weekly and 4 monthly. The places of publication number 56, of which 21, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

## PORTO RICO

**Population \*1,184,489**

CAPITAL, SAN JUAN

Seventy miles east of San Domingo and 1,400 miles from New York. The island is 108 miles long from east to west and 36 miles broad. Its area is about 3,600 square miles, approximately the size of Delaware and Rhode Island together. It is traversed by a mountain range from east to west, the highest point of which is about 3,700 feet. The climate is generally salubrious. The soil is unusually fertile.

**AGRICULTURE.** The chief industry is agriculture and the principal products are sugar, of which 410,000 long tons were made in 1918, almost all of it going to the United States, coffee, rice, tobacco, salt, corn, beans, peas, sweet potatoes, yams, oranges, pineapples, bananas and other tropical fruits. Some cotton is grown. In the southern parts of the island irrigation has been found necessary for the better development of its agricultural possibilities, and plans have been made to supply water to about 30,000 acres. Beef cattle are raised in large numbers, and the dairy industry is growing fast, especially near the large cities. In January 1919, the Food Commission reported that there were on the island 123,259 steers and work cattle, 107,453 cows, 96,046 calves, 62,954 horses, 9,305 mules, 102,338 hogs, 49,127 goats, 976,084 head of poultry and a number of asses and sheep. It is said that there are over 500 varieties of trees growing on the island and lumbering is an industry of considerable importance.

**MINERALS.** The mineral deposits are not large, but have been worked to some extent. Gold, silver, copper, iron and lignite are found, and there are salt works in several localities. Marble, limestone and other building stones exist in large quantities, but have been very little used.

**COMMERCE, ETC.** The trade of Porto Rico is chiefly with the United States and Great Britain. The exports to the United States for the year ending June, 1917, were valued at \$73,115,224 and the imports from the United States at \$49,539,249. The amount of sugar exported to the United States in 1918 was 672,937,334 pounds. The imports from foreign countries were \$4,005,975; the exports to foreign countries, \$7,855,680. Large quantities of sugar, coffee, lumber, tobacco and cigars are exported. Fruits, fresh and preserved, are also a large article of export. When the island came into the possession of the United States, in 1898, the people, in common with those of all the Spanish colonies, lived in the densest ignorance, over eighty per cent. being unable to read. Since that time numerous good public schools have been established and much progress has been made in education. The public highways and transportation facilities of all kinds have also been greatly extended and improved.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Porto Rico is 27, including 13 daily, 1 semi-weekly, 11 weekly, 1 semi-monthly and 1 monthly. The places of publication number 8, of which 4, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

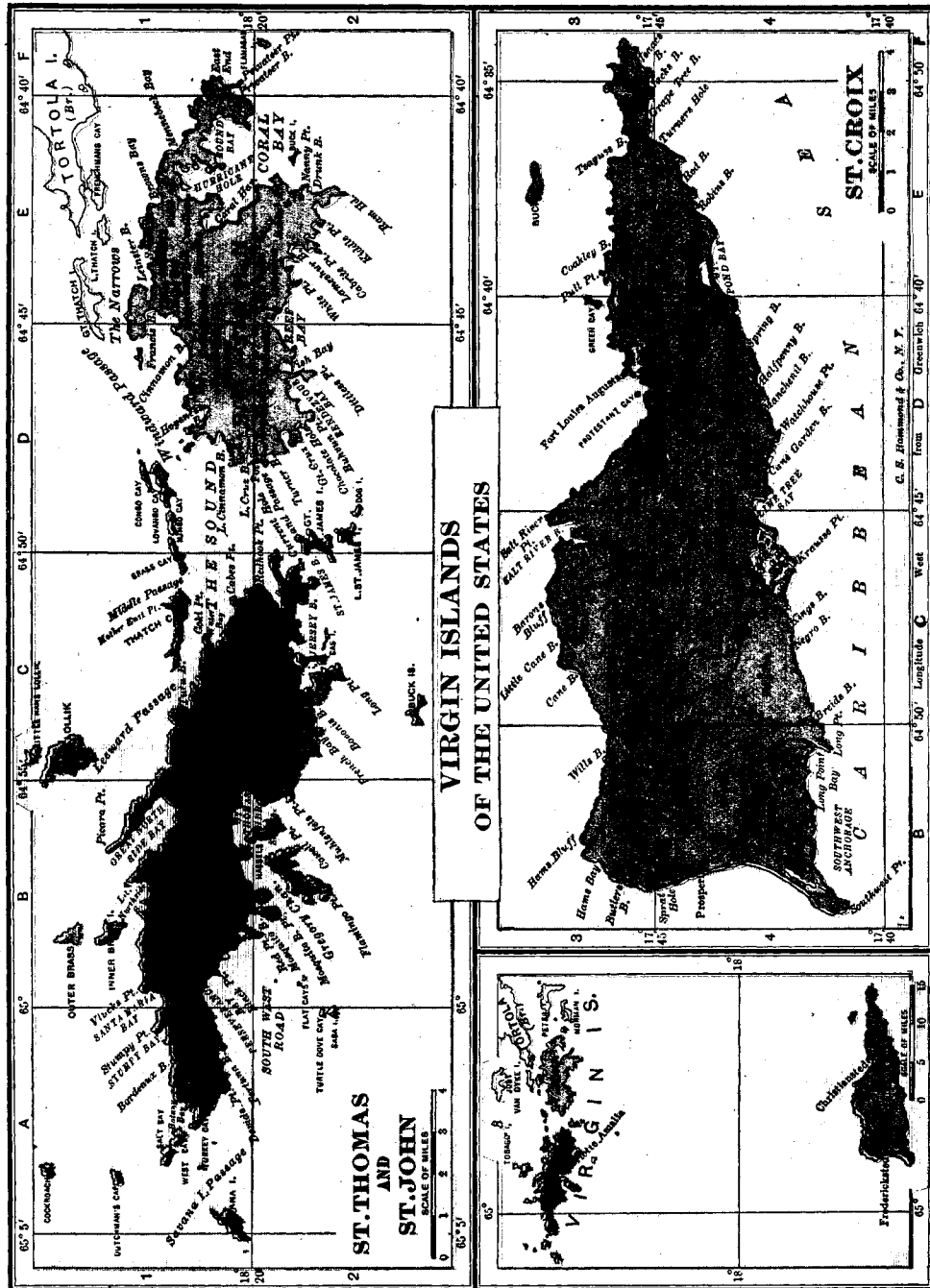

## CAPITAL, CHARLOTTE AMALIE

The Virgin Islands are three in number, situated about 35 miles east of Porto Rico. They consist of St. Thomas, area about 33 square miles, population 10,191; St. Johns, area 21 square miles, population 969; Saint Croix, area 80 square miles, population 14,901. St. Thomas contains the capital. Although the islands are in the tropic zone, the constant northeast trade winds render the temperature remarkably even and the climates healthful. The farm land is about five-sixths of the area, divided into 430 farms. The live stock in 1917 comprised 12,377 cattle, 2,129 horses, 1,600 mules, 974 asses, 2,329 hogs, 2,259 goats and 1,096 sheep. Sugar cane—with a crop valued at \$442,120 in 1917, rum, tobacco, cotton, hides and hardwoods are the chief products. The islands are the original home and the headquarters of the manufacture of bay rum, which is the principal industry. It is exported to all parts of the world. There are also a large trade in panama hats. The imports of the islands are principally foodstuffs and manufactured goods. The fisheries produce about \$45,000 annually. There is a magnificent harbor at Charlotte Amalie, which is a favorite coaling station. Goods were imported from the United States to the value of \$1,416,342 in the year ending June 30th, 1918, and exports to the United States were \$1,259,607. The islands were taken over by the United States on March 31st, 1917, being purchased from Denmark.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in the Virgin Islands is 6, published in three towns. There are 5 dailies and 1 weekly.

## TERRITORIAL CAPITAL, HONOLULU

The HAWAIIAN ISLANDS are situated in the North Pacific Ocean between longitude 154° 40' and 160° 30' west and latitude 22° 18' and 18° 13' north, 2,100 miles from San Francisco. The eight principal islands have an area of 8,454 square miles, the others are mere rocks. Hawaii is the largest, with an area of 4,210 square miles, and has given its name to the whole group. The islands are of volcanic formation. There are two active volcanoes, Kilauea and Mauna Loa. Mauna Kea, the highest point on Hawaii, is 13,825 feet high; the mountains generally range from 4,000 to 5,000 feet. Their sides abound in forests containing an abundance of timber and ornamental woods. Although the islands are situated within the tropic zone, the heat is tempered by the trade winds and ocean currents, and the average temperature is no higher than that of many places situated much further north. A large proportion of the population is Japanese and Chinese. The Chinese in 1910 numbered 21,874, the Japanese 79,874. The native race is dying out, there being but 28,041 of unmixed blood in the year 1910, a decrease of 3,746 since 1900. There are now 23,000 Portuguese resident in the islands.

**AGRICULTURE.** The chief agricultural products are sugar, rice, coffee, fruits, and vegetables. The production of sugar in 1913 was 550,000 tons. Nearly 250,000 acres of land is devoted to this crop, 120,000 acres being harvested each year, as the crop takes about 18 months to mature in Hawaii, and only a part of it can be harvested each season. The average yield per acre is about 42 tons of sugar, running nearly 250 pounds of sugar to the ton of cane. Bananas are an important product, over 100,000 bunches being exported annually, with a capacity of many times that number. The culture and canning of pineapples is a large and rapidly developing industry; one of the canneries being the largest fruit preserving plant in the world. Pineapples to the value of \$4,000,000 were exported in 1914. Rubber culture is a new industry, but has made good progress, about 500,000 trees having been planted in the past four years, and they are all thriving. The culture of cotton is increasing, and sisal hemp is one of the established products. The United States Experiment Station has been conducting a series of experiments in tobacco culture, and has discovered that a large area of the soil is suitable for this crop, which will probably be one of the staple products in the near future. Cattle and sheep are raised in sufficient numbers to supply the needs of the islands. Large quantities of commercial fertilizers are manufactured.

**COMMERCE.** The United States practically monopolizes the trade of Hawaii. The total exports from July 1, 1916, to June 30, 1917, to the United States, were valued at \$73,174,343. Sugar forms nearly 80 per cent. of the exports and canned pineapples 12 per cent.; 1,080,903,797 pounds of sugar were sent to the United States in 1918. The imports from the United States reached a total value of \$14,330,475. The principal imports were bread stuffs, textiles and iron and steel goods. There were exported to foreign countries, during the same period, goods to the value of \$923,747. Imported, \$6,482,951. There are excellent roads throughout the islands and seven steam railroads, three on Hawaii, two on Oahu, one on Kauai and one on Maui. The steam railroads have a total length of 296.69 miles.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Hawaii is 44, including 10 daily, 3 three times a week, 4 semi-weekly, 14 weekly, 1 semi-monthly and 12 monthly. The places of publication number 5, of which 3, designated by a dagger (†), are county seats.

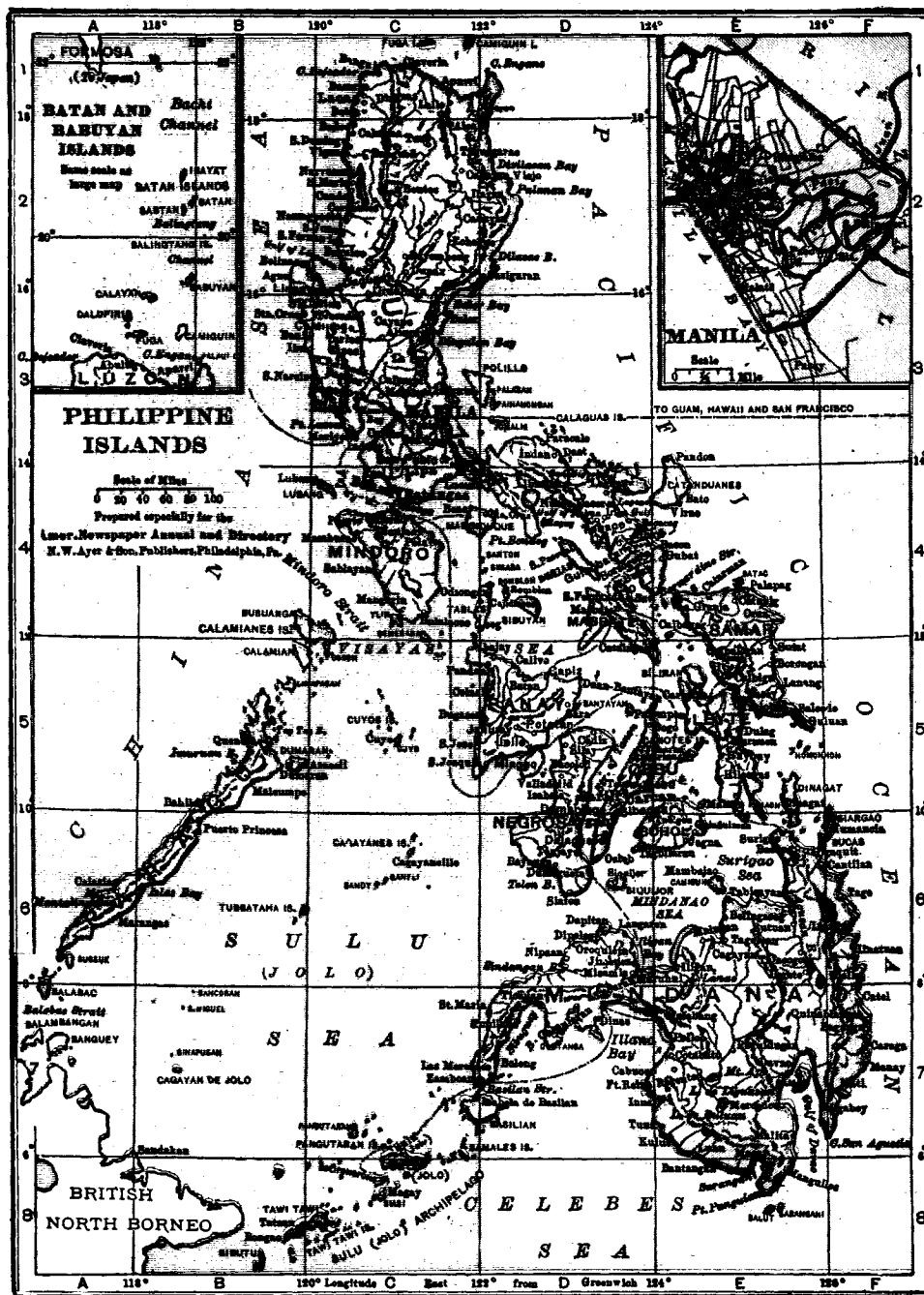

# PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

## CAPITAL, MANILA

**GENERAL DESCRIPTION.** An important group of islands in the Malay Archipelago, lying mainly between latitude 32° and 19° 38' north and longitude 117° and 126° east. They number over 3,000; large and small, about half of them being known by name. They range in area from the size of New York state down to tiny islets of less than a square mile, nearly ninety per cent. being in the latter class. (The total area is about 119,542 square miles, approximately the size of New York and New England. The principal islands are Luzon, 40,969 square miles, nearly 4,000,000 people; Mindanao, 36,292 square miles, 500,000 people; Samar, 5,881 square miles, 225,000 people; Panay, 4,611 square miles, 750,000 people; Mindoro, 3,811 square miles, 30,000 people; Leyte, 2,732 square miles, 360,000 people; Negros, 4,881 square miles, 475,000 people; Palawan, 4,927 square miles, ——— people; Cebu, 1,762 square miles, 600,000 people; Bohol, about 1,200 square miles, 250,000 people. There are many diverse races among the people, speaking as many different dialects. The Visayans are the most numerous, numbering about 3,250,000. Next in order come the Tagalogs, 1,500,000, and the Ilocanos, 800,000. Americans number eight or nine thousand; foreigners, chiefly Chinese, about 50,000. Education and religion have made much progress through the islands, and fully ninety per cent. of the people may be considered as being, to some extent, civilized. One beneficial result of American occupation has been the establishment of schools. There are now over 10,000 teachers in primary schools, more than ninety-five per cent. of them being Filipinos, and hundreds of new schools are opened each year. There are about 600 postoffices in the islands and 437 postal savings banks, with 36,000 accounts. All but about 14 per cent. of the depositors are Filipinos. There are about 6,000 miles of telegraph and cable line and 700 miles of railroad in operation.

**AGRICULTURE AND NATURAL PRODUCTIONS.** Agriculture is the chief industry. At present not more than twelve per cent. of the land is under cultivation, but this will, no doubt, be largely extended, as the soil is remarkably fertile, and a great proportion of the total area of the islands is suitable for tillage. One of the chief products is abaca, which is known throughout the world as Manila hemp. The crop from 1,207,000 acres, of which 844,501 acres were harvested in 1917, was 354,837,766 pounds, valued at \$31,799,068. Maguay fibre is also largely grown. The rice crop produced 44,000,000 bushels, valued at \$28,000,000. Tobacco of good quality is grown almost everywhere. The other principal products are corn, sugar, coconuts, spices, cacao, rattan and timber, including dye-woods. Practically all of the forest land is in forest reserves under the control of the Bureau of Forestry of the Philippines. The reserves have a total area of 59,500 square miles, and less than one per cent. of the forest lands are privately controlled. The production of crude sugar in 1917 was 425,266 tons, besides 520,242 gallons of molasses and 1,853,639 gallons of basi, a beverage in local use. The total value of sugar cane products was \$19,352,354. Corn produced 14,000,000 bushels (shelled), coffee 1,650,000 pounds, tobacco, 90,000,000 pounds. There are 54,000,000 coconut trees in the coconut plantations. Their product for 1916 was over 735,000,000 nuts, of which 61,000,000, or over \$1,000,000 worth, were consumed for food. Other coconut products (for 1916) were 156,000 tons of copra, having a value of \$9,500,000; 6700,000 gallons of oil, value \$356,000 and 53,938,612 liters (about 13,500,000 gallons) of tuba. Tuba is the sap of the coconut palm, chiefly used as a fermented beverage. Its value is from nine to ten cents in American money per gallon and the 1916 output was worth about \$1,282,000. Copra is dried coconut meat, the material from which desiccated or shredded coconut, coconut oil, etc., are made. The total value of the coconut products was over \$12,200,000. Cacao is grown in the southern islands, chiefly in Mindanao. The 1916 crop produced 1,228,000 pounds, worth over \$170,000. Many thousand tons of rattan are exported, also gums of various kinds.

**INDUSTRIAL AND COMMERCIAL.** The principal manufacturing industries are those connected with the manufacture of hemp, cigars and tobacco. The commerce is considerable, the imports for the six months ending June 30th, 1918, from the United States being valued at \$48,423,400 and from other countries about \$25,000,000. The exports to the United States were valued at \$78,101,412—including 173,600,941 pounds of sugar—to foreign countries about \$30,000,000, Great Britain, Japan, China and Spain have most of the foreign trade.

**MINERALS.** There are numerous districts known to contain minerals in paying quantities, and as exploration proceeds, others will be brought to light. Gold was mined to the value of \$1,404,000 in 1917. Silver, copper, iron, zinc, asbestos, manganese, lead, coal, sulphur, natural gas and petroleum are also found, but not in large quantities. Salt is manufactured in considerable quantities, by the evaporation of sea-water and that from saline springs by an old process in use among the natives from time immemorial. By the adoption of modern methods and machinery the salt industry may be made one of great importance. The commercial production of salt in 1915 was 22,000 tons, valued at \$300,000. The total value of all mineral products in that year was \$2,433,793.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in 9 towns of the Philippines is 44, including 17 daily, 1 three times a week, 3 semi-weekly, 5 weekly, 1 three times a month, 6 monthly, 2 quarterly and 9 of unknown issues.

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, EDMONTON

The PROVINCE OF ALBERTA, formerly a part of the Northwest Territories, is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by British Columbia, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States) and on the east by the Province of Saskatchewan. Its length from north to south is about 800 miles, its greatest breadth from east to west about 400 miles and its land area is 161,872,000 acres. 100,000,000 acres of this, about 60 per cent, of the whole, is capable of cultivation. The northern half is unsettled except for the scattered trading stations of the Hudson's Bay Company.

**AGRICULTURE.** The southern portion has for a number of years been the grazing ground of large herds of cattle, and is now attaining prominence in agriculture, especially in grain growing, for which the soil and climate seem peculiarly adapted, wheat in particular being of the finest quality. The number of farms in 1911 was 61,496, an increase of 52,000 over the 1901 census, and the area of land in occupied farms increased in the same period from 2,735,630 acres to 17,751,899 acres and the growth still continues. An enlightened system of taxation, based solely on site values, is in force in many districts and attracts a desirable class of energetic citizens, as the farmer who develops his farm and improves and increases his stock, buildings, etc., is not compelled to pay an extra tax for doing so, as in most communities elsewhere. In 1918 the wheat crop was 23,752,000 bushels (a very short crop, averaging only one-fifth the production per acre of the 1915 crop), oats 60,323,000 bushels, barley 7,756,200 bushels, rye 826,000 bushels. Potatoes produced 3,119,400 bushels and flax seed 480,600 bushels, turnips, etc., 2,357,400 bushels, hay 398,700 tons. Unfavorable conditions caused all the 1918 crops to fall much below the average. Ninety-six varieties of wild grasses have been identified, of which forty-six make valuable hay. They furnish an abundant supply and very little grass seed is sown. Alfalfa, however, has been tried with success and will, no doubt, come into general use, as the open range is taken up and devoted to farming. The 1917 crop was 64,000 tons. Live stock forms an important part of the wealth of the province, there being 791,246 horses, 601,534 swine, 332,179 sheep, 328,702 dairy cows and 1,362,880 other cattle in 1918. The creameries and cheese factories are important industries. What is said to be the largest irrigation system in the world is now being constructed in this province by the Canadian Pacific Railway, and will add 1,400,000 acres to the tillable area. It will cost about \$3,000,000, and will have over fifty miles of main canals and nearly 3,000 miles of lateral canals and ditches.

**MINERALS.** Alberta was third among the provinces in 1918 in the value of minerals produced. She excels all others in coal, producing about forty per cent. of Canada's total. In the Rocky mountain section, in the extreme western portion of the province, large deposits of coal are found, also petroleum, natural gas, gold, iron and zinc. In 1918 the coal mines produced 6,070,609 tons, chiefly bituminous; 115,405 tons of anthracite were dug, all from one mine near Banff. Natural gas in 1917 produced 6,818,131,000 feet. The total mineral production for 1918 was valued at \$23,238,118, more than \$20,000,000 being in coal. Nearly 1,000,000 barrels of cement and about 90,000,000 bricks were made in 1913.

**LUMBER, INDUSTRIES, ETC.** Timber is plentiful in the western portion, chiefly spruce, poplar, tamarack and pine of medium size. The fur industry in the north is of great value, and a large business is done in Edmonton in supplies for this industry, and in shipping its products. The fishery products in 1917, mostly white fish, were valued at \$144,134. The province is developing rapidly, its population having increased from 78,022 in 1901 to 374,863 in 1911, and the land is being taken up at the rate of 2,000 acres a day.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Alberta is 119, including 6 daily, 3 semi-weekly, 101 weekly, 2 fortnightly, 2 semi-monthly and 5 monthly. The places of publication number 87.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA

Population .....392,480

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, VICTORIA

**BRITISH COLUMBIA** is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by the Pacific Ocean and Alaska, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States), on the east by Alberta. It has an area of 390,344 square miles. It includes a number of islands, the largest being Vancouver, which contains the capital of the province, and has an area of about 14,000 square miles. The province is about 700 miles long and 500 wide. The Fraser river, its principal stream, is 800 miles long, and 600 yards wide at its mouth, its valley containing much the greater part of the arable land. The climate in the western half is generally mild, the eastern portion reaching greater extremes, both of heat and cold. The rainfall, except in some limited districts in the southeast, is abundant. There is unlimited water power everywhere. The surface is largely mountainous and densely wooded, producing trees of enormous size.

**LUMBER.** The forest area is about 180,000,000 acres. Lumbering is one of the principal industries, and as the land becomes cleared the soil is found very fertile and a considerable area is well adapted for agriculture of all kinds. The product of the lumber industry in 1913 was worth \$33,650,000. In normal times the lumber industries pay half of the wages in the province. The manufacture of paper and pulp is becoming important. Douglas fir, cedar, hemlock and spruce furnish the bulk of the lumber.

**AGRICULTURE.** The number of farms is increasing, and agriculture will soon be one of the prominent industries. The 1918 harvest included 816,700 bushels of wheat, 1,550,000 of oats, 209,000 of barley, 69,000 of other grains, 3,423,000 of potatoes, 2,429,900 of turnips, 217,400 tons of hay and 39,900 tons of alfalfa. The fruit growing industry has become a very important one. Tobacco has been successfully grown in the Okanagan Valley. The country is well suited for stock raising, which industry is rapidly increasing.

**MINERALS.** In minerals, this province stands first in copper, zinc and lead; second in gold and silver and third in coal. Gold has been found in large quantities, and mining is one of the chief industries. Copper and iron are widely distributed, and many other minerals are found. The mineral production in 1918, exceeded only by Ontario, reached a total value of \$42,090,741, of which gold, 187,069 ounces, valued at \$3,867,059; copper, 62,858,623 pounds and coal, 2,878,102 tons, produced the greater portion. The lead produced was about 35,000,000 pounds; silver, 3,965,823 ounces; coke, 211,643 tons; zinc 31,011,164 pounds. Platinum, antimony, tin, molybdenum, arsenic, pyrites and mercury are found in small quantities. In addition to the coal on Vancouver Island, at present the chief seat of this industry, there have been already discovered on the mainland over 5,000 square miles of coal-bearing lands. The total mineral wealth of the province is beyond computation, for many thousands of square miles of territory have never been surveyed or prospected, and large regions known to be rich in minerals are almost inaccessible at present, and have barely been touched. Of non-metallic minerals there are abundant supplies of building stone of many kinds, brick, fire and pottery clays, limestone and cement rock.

**FISHERIES.** The fisheries are the most valuable in the Dominion, salmon forming by far the greatest portion of the catch, followed by halibut, herring and cod. The 1917 catch of salmon had a value of \$10,343,503; halibut, \$2,026,670; herring, \$1,009,383; cod, \$554,463. The whale fisheries produce over \$300,000 annually. The total value of the catch of all kinds in the year ending March 31st, 1917, was \$14,637,346. The capital invested is \$10,371,303 and 18,855 persons are engaged in the industry. Fur bearing animals are very numerous. The fur sealing industry has decreased greatly since the Behring Sea fishing has been restricted. Some seals are still taken off the coast of British Columbia, and a few sea otter pelts are turned in each year, although the animal is almost extinct. The principal town on the mainland is Vancouver, the terminus of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in British Columbia is 96, including 14 daily, 2 three times a week, 2 semi-weekly, 54 weekly, 3 semi-monthly and 21 monthly. The places of publication number 45.

# MANITOBA

Population .....455,614

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, WINNIPEG

MANITOBA extends from the 49th to the 60th parallel of north latitude, and is bounded south by Minnesota and North Dakota, east by Ontario and Hudson Bay, north by Mackenzie Territory and west by Saskatchewan, and has an area of about 251,831 square miles, of which about 20,000 square miles is water.

**AGRICULTURE.** The settled portion lies almost wholly south of the 52d parallel. Its surface is principally prairie land, with groves of timber along the rivers and streams. Over 6,000,000 acres are under cultivation at present, in more than 50,000 farms. The area devoted to agriculture is increasing rapidly, as thousands of new settlers take up land in the province each year, coming from all the northern European countries. Many also come from the United States. The soil is classed among the richest in the world, and produces the finest wheat known in the market. Almost all other cereals grow and ripen in great abundance, also vegetables and small fruits of all kinds suited to the latitude. The 1918 crops were: oats, 54,487,500 bushels; wheat, 18,191,100; barley, 27,968,400; rye, 3,985,700; other grains, 856,000; flaxseed, 1,081,000; potatoes, 8,325,000; turnips, etc., 2,494,800; hay, 74,000 tons; alfalfa, 8,100 tons. Field crops in 1918 had a total value of \$180,507,500. There are numerous elevators and warehouses scattered through the province and new ones are constantly being erected to take care of the immense crops of grain. In 1912 there were 3,193 threshing outfits operated in this province. The province has been prominent as a most favorable district for the cattle raising industry for many years. The stock returns for 1918 show 384,772 horses, 225,659 dairy cows, 521,240 other cattle and 284,596 hogs. Sheep numbered 136,782, having nearly doubled in two years. Dairy products are increasing in amount year by year, the annual output of butter being over 9,000,000 pounds. Irrigation is not needed, the work necessary for improving and adding to the area of tillable land consisting chiefly in reclaiming a large amount of first-class land which has a surplus of water.

**MINERALS.** Coal of the lignitic variety is abundant, though mining operations so far have been inconsiderable. There are abundant deposits of clay, salt, sand, gypsum, building stone, etc. Some gold is found in the northern portion of the province, the 1918 output being 67.55 ounces. The same region also produced 2,000,000 pounds of copper and 14,033 ounces of silver. There is some production of tungsten, gypsum, etc. The mineral production for 1918 was \$3,197,6970. The Laurentian district of the north and east is thought to be rich in other minerals, though much of it is yet unexplored. This region gives a rich yield of furs, while its streams are full of fish.

**INDUSTRIES, ETC.** Manufacturing industries are growing in size and number, especially those using the products of the province, as flour and oatmeal mills, meat packing houses, breweries, etc. The manufactures are large and rapidly growing larger, and \$39,000,000 worth of goods was the 1912 output of the city of Winnipeg alone. Flour and other mill products reached \$3,809,833, dressed meats and meat products \$2,336,000, lumber and forest products, nearly \$3,000,000. The fisheries are a valuable asset, their 1917 product being worth nearly \$1,390,002.

Winnipeg is on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which passes through Manitoba from east to west, and from it several railways branch out into the province and the United States, the province having a total of over four thousand miles of railroad. The means of water communication are also very considerable.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Manitoba is 115, including 7 daily, 2 three times a week, 1 semi-weekly, 82 weekly, 5 semi-monthly and 18 monthly. The places of publication number 63.

Surrounded by a fertile prairie region, particularly adapted to wheat, which is produced in immense quantities, also other grains, wool, flax, beef, hides, dairy products. Brick clay, glass sand, gypsum, salt, peat, manganese and spruce lumber are also abundant. Chief industries flour, saw, planing, grist and oat meal mills, railroad shops, foundries, machine shops, breweries, soap, biscuit, confectionery, boot, shoe, pickle, sauce and aerated water factories, tannery, cured meats, linseed oil and numerous other industries, producing over \$80,000,000 worth of goods annually. The western offices of almost all Canada's largest manufacturing, commercial and financial organizations are situated in Winnipeg. It is the metropolis of western Canada, and does a wholesale business of over \$500,000,000 a year. The freight, incoming and outgoing, averages nearly 2,500,000 tons each year. Winnipeg is the leading grain market on the continent. Its receipts of grain for the year 1912 were 143,682,750 bushels of wheat, 51,633,000 of oats and 10,049,800 of barley. A dam across the Red River of the North with a system of locks, has made it possible for vessels of considerable size to reach the city from Lake Winnipeg, fifty-two miles distant. The water power of Lac du Bois, east of the city, is being developed, and when the work is finished will supply over 500,000 horse power, with electrical distribution. # SASKATCHEWAN

Population.....492,432

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, REGINA

The PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN, formerly a part of the Northwest Territories, is bounded on the north by the parallel of 60° north, on the west by the Province of Alberta, on the south by the 49th parallel (the boundary of the United States), and on the east by Manitoba. Its length from north to south is about 760 miles, and its breadth 820 miles. Its land area is 242,832 square miles. North of the 54th parallel the country is a region of lakes, swamps and forests, and is practically uninhabited, except by Indians, the white population consisting chiefly of the employes of the Hudson's Bay Company. The annual production of furs from this region is very large. The province is well watered, having numerous streams, lakes and rivers, some navigable. The climate is healthful, although the winters are somewhat severe. The summer days are long, and the great duration of the sunlight brings the crops to maturity in a shorter season than in many countries apparently more favorably situated. The rainfall, averaging 16.68 inches, is usually fully sufficient, especially as the heaviest rains occur during the growing period of the crops. The lumber industry, chiefly handling spruce and small pine, is attaining considerable importance.

**AGRICULTURE.** The acreage under cultivation is increasing at the rate of over 1,000,000 acres yearly, although there is still about 90 per cent. of the tillable land open to settlement. The 1911 census showed 96,871 farms, more than seven times as many as in 1900, containing a total of 28,642,985 acres, and the area of improved land was nearly ten times as great, being nearly 12,000,000 acres. About 60 per cent. of the land, or nearly 100,000,000 acres, is capable of cultivation. The total value of the field crops for 1918 was \$200,862,100, exceeded by only one province, Ontario, about 22 per cent. of the total value of all field crops in Canada. The southern portion is unexcelled as a grain growing district. The wheat production in 1918 was \$2,493,000 bushels; oats, 107,253,000 bushels; barley 11,838,000 bushels; potatoes, 6,950,900 bushels; turnips, etc., 2,203,300 bushels, and flaxseed, 4,205,000 bushels. In addition to these, large quantities of hay, sugar beets and other crops were grown. There are over 900 grain elevators in the province, having a total capacity of 29,314,000 bushels. Live stock is also of considerable value, there being, in 1918, 990,009 horses and 1,279,331 cattle, 352,989 of these being dairy cows, 134,177 sheep, 521,240 hogs and about 8,000,000 head of poultry. The provincial government allows a subsidy to co-operative creameries and the industry is increasing so fast that figures given early in the year afford no idea of conditions at the end of the year. The output has increased more than 1,000 per cent. in four years. Eighty per cent. of the population is engaged in the various branches of agriculture.

**MINERALS, ETC.** Coal is mined to some extent, the 1918 output being 347,622 tons and there are deposits of petroleum, salt, sulphur and various other minerals. The total value of the minerals produced in 1918 was \$894,591. There were in December, 1912, 4,617 miles of railroads in the province, and extensions and branches are being built as needed. Many thousands of new citizens settle in the province each year, by far the greater number being farmers. The fishery industry reported in 1916 a production valued at \$231,946.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Saskatchewan is 175, including 7 daily, 4 semi-weekly, 160 weekly and 4 monthly. The places of publication number 156.

# YUKON TERRITORY

Population..... 8,512

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, DAWSON

YUKON TERRITORY is bounded on the north by the Arctic Ocean and Mackenzie Territory, on the east by Mackenzie Territory, on the south by Alaska and British Columbia, and on the west by Alaska. Its extreme length from north to south is about 675 miles, its greatest breadth about 625 miles, and its land area 206,427 square miles.

**MINERALS.** Yukon contains the great Klondike gold-producing region. Practically the only industry in Yukon is mining, chiefly for gold; silver, lead and copper are mined to some extent. The amount of gold produced has been decreasing for some years past. In 1900 the value of the output was \$22,275,000. Since then it has dropped rapidly. In 1918 it was 102,302 ounces, valued at \$2,116,124. The decrease was due to the deposits of gold accessible to the methods of placer mining, formerly used, having become, to a considerable extent, exhausted. Many companies have been formed recently to prosecute the search for this metal by the more modern methods of hydraulic mining and dredging, also quartz mining. Much machinery has been imported for these purposes, and in a few years the output will no doubt be increased. Silver also decreased from \$177,857 in 1900 to \$46,490 in 1918. The copper production in 1918 was 300,000 pounds. The production of coal is variable. In 1911 it was 2,840 tons; in 1912, 9,245 tons; in 1913, 19,722 tons. In 1915 it dropped to 9,724 tons and 2,900 tons in 1918. The total mineral production for 1918 was \$2,248,398, little more than half of the previous years production. The closing of some of the mines, from lack of labor and high cost of both labor and supplies, caused the falling off.

**AGRICULTURE, ETC.** There are a number of successful "truck" farms, on which a considerable portion of the vegetables used in the territory are grown, but practically all other agricultural products must be imported. Experiments are being carried on to determine what crops are best suited to the soil and conditions. Oats and barley have been successfully grown. The varieties of wheat so far tested have attained good growth, but have failed to ripen the kernels. Vegetables started under glass, and set out when the summer opens, grow to a large size, the almost continuous sunlight being highly favorable to rapid growth. The fisheries in 1917 reported a product, chiefly white fish and salmon, valued at \$90,210. The population, which was 27,219 in 1901, has decreased, with the decrease of gold production, to 8,512.

Three papers are published in two towns in the Territory, including 1 daily and 2 weekly.

# NEW BRUNSWICK

Population ..... 351,889

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, FREDERICTON

**NEW BRUNSWICK** is bounded north by Quebec, east by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, west and south by the Bay of Fundy, part of Nova Scotia, and Maine. It is 210 miles in length and 180 miles in breadth, and has a coast line of about 500 miles. Its area is 27,174 square miles. Surface generally is undulating, and there is scarcely an elevation on the east coast exceeding 800 feet, while on the north there is a district of mountainous character, consisting of hills of considerable elevation, covered with dense forest, of which there is about 7,500,000 acres, and surrounded by fertile valleys and table lands. The forests are extensive, and lumbering is one of the principal industries. The stand of available timber is estimated at 22 billion feet. The pulp wood exports in 1910 were 122,698 cords.

**AGRICULTURE.** The climate is healthful and the soil fertile, with great agricultural capabilities. The principal cereals, legumes, root plants, and vegetables are grown, with apples and the small fruits. The chief grain crop is oats, of which in 1918, 7,051,400 bushels were grown. Buckwheat is also largely grown, the 1918 crop being 1,499,500 bushels. Wheat produced 940,250 bushels. Potatoes and turnips produced 9,077,600 and 6,477,500 bushels respectively; hay, 1,111,000 tons. The manufacture of cheese, for which New Brunswick has long been famous, is falling off, the production having decreased from 1,910,738 pounds in 1902 to 1,044,825 pounds in 1911, a loss of over 40 per cent. In 1911 there were 16 creameries which made 844,000 pounds of butter. Much attention is given to fruit culture. The area of land under cultivation and the number of farms show a steady increase each year. The live stock reports for 1918 show 288,747 cattle, of which 120,123 were dairy cows, 66,590 horses, 79,814 hogs and 140,015 sheep.

**FISHERIES.** The fisheries, chiefly lobster (which leads in value), salmon, mackerel, cod, sardine, smelt, herring and oyster are third in value among the provinces. About 22,000 persons are engaged in this industry and the 1917 product was worth \$5,656,859.

**MINERALS.** Coal, iron, antimony, copper, tungsten, manganese, gypsum, salt, petroleum, natural gas and other minerals are found in considerable quantities. The total mineral production in 1918 was valued at \$2,111,816.

**INDUSTRIES AND COMMERCE.** Ship building, formerly extensively carried on, has declined of late years, owing to the modern practice of building almost all large ships of iron. Manufactures are chiefly sawed lumber and wooden wares, cotton and woolen goods, refined sugar, rope and cordage, canned goods, especially salmon and lobster, polished granite, boots and shoes, edge tools, furniture, paper, castings, machinery, locomotives, etc. The total value of manufactured goods in 1910 was \$35,422,302, an increase of over sixty per cent. over 1900. Chief exports—lumber, fish, cotton goods, potatoes, butter and eggs, beef and mutton, gypsum, hay, etc. Game and fish, especially salmon, are abundant, and it is a favorite resort for hunters and anglers from the other provinces and the United States.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in New Brunswick is 46, including 9 daily, 1 three times a week, 12 semi-weekly, 17 weekly, 1 semi-monthly and 6 monthly. The places of publication number 15.

# NOVA SCOTIA

Population..... 492,338

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, HALIFAX

NOVA SCOTIA consists of a narrow peninsula, connected with New Brunswick by a narrow isthmus about 16 miles wide, and of the island of Cape Breton. It is bounded on the north by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, on the east and south by the Atlantic, on the west by the Bay of Fundy and New Brunswick. It is 300 miles long and from 80 to 100 wide, with an area of 20,907 square miles, or about 13,000,000 acres, of which 5,000,000 are fit for tillage. The rest is nearly all covered with forest, from which as much as 400,000,000 feet of lumber are cut each year. The Cobequid Range runs through the interior, the soil on both sides of it being very fertile; which is also the case in the beautiful valley of the Annapolis river.

**LUMBER.** The wood is mostly spruce, fir, hemlock and pine, with some birch, oak and maple. A great part of the wood is used in the ship-building industries of the province. Much is also used for the manufacture of pulp, which is exported to paper mills in the other provinces and the United States. The lumber cut in 1911 was valued at \$2,000,000.

**AGRICULTURE.** The soil is rich and agricultural productions, such as wheat, rye, oats, barley, buckwheat, corn, root crops, vegetables in general, and fruit grow abundantly. The farmers are industrious and prosperous, and all but a very small percentage own their own farms. Oats are largely grown, the 1918 crop being 5,408,000 bushels, that of potatoes 9,776,000 bushels, turnips 9,320,000 bushels. The dairy and live stock products are worth \$6,000,000 per year. Farm animals in 1918 were: Horses, 70,101; dairy cows, 157,829; other cattle, 249,422; sheep, 259,847, and swine, 68,238. Fruit growing, especially in the Annapolis valley, is an industry of great importance. Apples are exported in large quantities, being in great demand in England. The crop of this fruit ranges from 750,000 to 1,000,000 barrels annually, and is worth over \$2,000,000.

**MINERALS.** Nova Scotia is fourth among the provinces in mineral wealth. The principal minerals are coal and iron. Coal is abundant, and more than a third of Canada's total production comes from Nova Scotia's mines. Over 13,000 men are employed in the coal mining industry, and 5,838,520 tons were dug in 1918. In coke, Nova Scotia leads, producing in 1918 581,870 tons. Canada's total output was 1,234,347 tons. The pig iron output of Nova Scotia was 415,870 tons. Gold was produced to the value of \$24,700. Iron is found in large quantities; it is of a fine quality and the ore commands the highest price in the market. Small quantities of antimony, tin and tungsten have been found. Manganese, gypsum, and roofing slate abound. Valuable deposits of rock salt are being worked. The minerals produced in 1918 were worth \$22,754,780.

**INDUSTRIES.** Manufactures are numerous, and include railroad cars, coarse cloth, flannels, blankets, carpets, boots and shoes, wood pulp, ships and boats, saddlery, furniture and farm implements. The manufactured products have more than doubled in ten years, and the output for 1912 was over \$70,000,000.

**FISHERIES.** The fisheries are second only to British Columbia, the 1917 catch being worth \$10,092,902. About 30,000 people are engaged in this industry, with an equipment valued at nearly \$9,000,000. Lobsters, \$3,210,520 in 1917; cod, \$2,642,846; haddock, \$1,617,879; mackerel and herring are the leading species of fish. Hake and halibut are also abundant.

The capital city, Halifax, is situated on the west side of the harbor of that name, and contains nearly 50,000 inhabitants. The harbor is one of the finest in existence, over half a mile in width at its narrowest part, and large enough to contain the navies of the world. Halifax is the winter port for the direct mail steamers, and has direct communication with Liverpool, Boston, Baltimore, Quebec and the West Indies. As a summer resort it is yearly becoming better known its suburbs furnish the pleasantest of drives and superior bathing facilities, and its public gardens have been pronounced by those who have visited them among the most beautiful on this side of the Atlantic.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Nova Scotia is 71, including 12 daily, 1 three times a week, 3 semi-weekly, 44 weekly, 1 fortnightly, 2 semi-monthly and 8 monthly. The places of publication number 34.

# ONTARIO

Population.....2,523,274

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, TORONTO

ONTARIO is bounded on the east by Quebec, north by Hudson Bay and Manitoba, south-west and south by Minnesota, the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence river, west by Manitoba, and has an area of 407,252 square miles, exclusive of its water surface. It is the most populous and wealthy province of the Dominion of Canada, and contains many large cities. Ottawa, population (1911) 87,062, is the seat of government and capital of the Dominion. The surface is mostly undulating, traversed by the Laurentian Hills and Blue Mountains, but except in the neighborhood of Lake Superior and Georgian Bay these nowhere exceed a few hundred feet in height.

**AGRICULTURE.** The agricultural resources are very great. Three-fourths of the present area of habitation is fertile, while an immense region beyond is capable of cultivation. New Ontario, as the northern and the northwestern districts are called, has scarcely been touched by the plow, but settlement is now beginning, and the farms which have been cut out of the forests show that it will be fully equal to any part of Canada in productiveness. Oats are the chief grain crop, amounting in 1918 to 131,752,600 bushels. In the same year barley produced 21,247,700 bushels; wheat 15,241,000, buckwheat 4,598,000, corn 13,015,200, rye 1,413,000, peas 2,381,500, flaxseed 196,200, potatoes 19,376,000, turnips 64,896,000. Sugar beets, alfalfa, fodder corn and hay yield heavily. The total value of the field crops was \$384,013,900, nearly a third of Canada's total. Two of Canada's three beet sugar factories are in Ontario. The produce of all crops per acre is usually well above the average in other countries. There are no more successful horticulturists than those of Ontario, who produce about seventy-five per cent of all the fruit grown in Canada. About 350,000 acres are devoted to fruit growing, and almost all the fruits of the temperate zone flourish luxuriantly. The apple is the greatest fruit crop. In addition to those used in the province, over 1,000,000 barrels of apples are exported, chiefly to Great Britain, although many go to the western provinces and to the United States. Grapes are another large crop. The 1913 crop was 36,000 tons, about  $3\frac{1}{4}$  tons per acre. Tobacco has been successfully grown in the southern part for some years, chiefly in Essex and Kent Counties. The annual crop is over 7,000,000 pounds, about two-thirds of Canada's total, the remainder coming from Quebec, with a little from British Columbia. Some flax is grown for fibre, the 1917 production being 2,800,000 pounds, grown on 8,000 acres. Horses and cattle are raised in large numbers, and of the finest quality, and have taken many first prizes at international shows. The live stock included in 1918 732,977 horses, 1,102,039 dairy cows, 1,770,688 other cattle, 972,341 sheep, 1,656,386 swine. The dairy industry is very large and much care is given to improving the breed of dairy cattle. There are over a thousand cheese factories and in 1910 they made 157,631,823 pounds of cheese, worth \$14,845,661. The total value of dairy products ranges from thirty to thirty-five million dollars each year.

**LUMBER.** There are over 100,000 square miles of forest land in the province, and the timber cut in 1911 was worth \$30,011,000. There are large areas of spruce, which is cut for pulp wood, and the pulp and paper mills of the province use up 300,000,000 cords of pulp wood in a single year. The fisheries, chiefly on the great lakes, employ 3,600 persons, and the 1917 catch was worth \$2,658,993.

**MINERALS.** The mineral treasures are exceedingly rich and varied. The total mineral production for Canada in 1918 had a value of \$210,204,970, of which Ontario's share was over forty-four per cent., being \$94,084,420. More than half of this was represented by silver, 17,109,389 ounces, worth \$16,557,098, 80 per cent. of the total for the Dominion, and nickel, 92,076,034 pounds, worth \$36,830,414. Ontario is the only province where nickel is found, and it produces about four-fifths of the world's supply. It is obtained almost entirely from the nickel-copper ores of the Sudbury district. Cobalt is another mineral of which the world's needs are supplied principally by Ontario. It is a valuable by-product of the silver mines of the Cobalt region. Arsenic is another important product. The output of gold in 1918 was \$8,501,705, being 58 per cent. of Canada's total; copper, 47,047,801 pounds; cobalt, 1,347,541 pounds; petroleum, 288,692 barrels; pig iron, 770,000 tons; salt, 131,727 tons; pyrites, 288,692 tons. Mica is extensively worked. Natural gas is produced in large quantities. Marble, said to be equal to that of Carrara, is quarried. Galena, plumbago, molybdenum, platinum, gypsum, some asbestos (in the Porcupine district) and various other minerals exist.

**INDUSTRIES AND TRANSPORTATION.** The water power is widely distributed and abundant. Manufactures are rapidly increasing in number and importance, among the principal being agricultural implements of all kinds, wagons, carriages, railroad stock (including locomotives), cotton and woolen goods, leather, furniture, paper and pulp, soap, wooden ware, etc. Ontario is the first province in manufactures. Transportation facilities are abundant. In addition to the great trunk lines, the Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian Pacific, every important section has competing lines stretching out to it. The province has a magnificent system of waterways, both natural and artificial. It has over 1,300 miles of water front on the lakes and the St. Lawrence. Surveys are being made for a ship canal across the province, to connect Georgian Bay, on Lake Huron, with Montreal. It is to have a depth of twenty-two feet, and in addition to its use as a canal is expected to produce power to the extent of over a million horse power.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Ontario is 596, including 48 daily, 2 three times a week, 14 semi-weekly, 375 weekly, 2 fortnightly, 12 semi-monthly, 131 monthly, 2 bi-monthly and 10 quarterly. The places of publication number 262.

PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, CHARLOTTETOWN

**PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND** is bounded north by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, east by Cape Breton Island, south by Nova Scotia proper, and west by New Brunswick. The greatest length is 180 miles; greatest breadth, 84 miles; least breadth, 4 miles; area about 2,134 square miles. The surface is gently undulating, a large part of it formerly forest, but the forest area has been greatly reduced by lumbering operations, fires, etc.

**AGRICULTURE.** The soil is a light loam, not known to contain available minerals, but remarkably rich and particularly favorable for the growth of grasses, and practically the whole is fit for cultivation. The province is essentially agricultural. There are 14,869 farms, with 80 per cent. of the population resident thereon. Principal productions are oats, wheat, barley and other grains, hay, pork, potatoes, butter, cheese, starch, horses, sheep, etc. Oats, as in all the eastern provinces, are the chief grain crop, and produced 5,839,300 bushels in 1918. The potato crop for that year was 5,362,300 bushels. Turnips are an important root crop, being much in requisition for the dairy cattle. The 1918 crop was 4,292,000 bushels. Hay made 331,000 tons. The cattle in 1918 numbered 110,521, 41,429 being dairy cows; sheep, 73,046 and hogs, 40,814. The production of butter and cheese is very large, the 1910 output of the cheese factories being 3,298,765 pounds, and that of the creameries being 670,913 pounds of butter, in addition to that produced on the farms. Apples are an important crop. The latest count shows 205,979 apple trees in the province.

**FISH AND FURS.** There are valuable fisheries, especially of lobsters, smelts, cod, herring, mackerel and oysters; nearly 3,000,000 pounds of canned lobsters being shipped annually. The fisheries in 1917 produced a value of \$1,314,179, the lobster production being the most valuable. Over 6,000 persons are engaged in the industry, using equipment worth \$1,200,000. In late years a new industry, that of breeding black and silver foxes for their fur, has taken root in Canada. In this industry Prince Edward Island leads. The "fur farms" reported in 1912 numbered 241 for the whole of Canada, and held in captivity 2,500 black, silver, cross and red foxes. Prince Edward Island had 200 of the 241 farms and 1,800 of the animals. As a high grade black fox skin has sold for as much as \$2,500, the industry will probably be much further extended in the future.

**INDUSTRIAL.** Tweeds, flannels, pottery, boots and shoes, agricultural implements and domestic articles, sufficient only for home use, are manufactured; shipbuilding was formerly carried on to a considerable extent, but has latterly become much reduced.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Prince Edward Island is 11, including 3 daily, 7 weekly and 1 monthly. The places of publication number 3.

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# QUEBEC

## PROVINCIAL CAPITAL, QUEBEC

**QUEBEC** is bounded north by Hudson Bay, east by Labrador and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, south by New Brunswick, Maine, New Hampshire, New York and the Ottawa river, which separates it from Ontario, and west by Hudson Bay and Ontario. Extreme breadth from east to west 1,080 miles, length from north to south 1,280 miles; area 706,884 square miles. Surface south of St. Lawrence generally hilly, further north mountainous and rocky and abounding in rivers and small lakes. The extreme northern part is an unexplored wilderness. A great part of the surface of the province is covered with forests.

**AGRICULTURE.** The soil in many districts is rich, and cereals grow well. Quebec stood third among other provinces in 1918 in the value of its field crops. Oats, potatoes and hay are the chief crops. The 1918 harvest included 52,667,000 bushels of oats, 1,199,000 bushels of corn, 4,551,600 of barley, 4,711,000 of buckwheat, 38,336,000 of potatoes and 23,223,000 of turnips and other root crops, 6,308,000 of wheat and 6,799,900 tons of hay. Peas, beans, rye and other grains are grown abundantly. The total value of field crops was \$271,750,900. Hops and apples are extensively grown. Some tobacco is grown, the 1913 crop being 4,000,000 pounds. Nearly a third of Canada's sheep are in this province, and the wool clip is large. Cattle raising, dairying and cheese making are important industries. There were, in 1918, 1,163,865 dairy cows in the province, besides 1,245,819 other cattle. Sheep and hogs are raised in great numbers. The creameries in 1910 made 37,346,107 pounds of butter, the production of cheese in the cheese factories was 67,741,802 pounds. The total annual value of the dairy products is over \$25,000,000.

**MINERALS.** Copper and mica abound in the eastern townships, where silver is also found. The whole Canadian supply of asbestos, except a small deposit in the Porcupine district of Ontario, is in Quebec and the asbestos industries find employment for more than 3,000 people. The 1918 output of this useful mineral was 143,456 tons and its value was about \$3,970,779. In the same year Quebec's copper reached 5,869,649 pounds, pyrites, 124,871 tons; zinc, 2,652,526 pounds; silver, 147,816 ounces; molybdenum, 325,000 pounds; mica, to the value of about \$80,000. Gold, silver, iron, graphite, platinum, chromite, magnesite, etc., are found, and there are large deposits of phosphate of lime in the Ottawa river district. The total mineral production for 1918 was \$97,534,409.

**LUMBER AND FISHERIES.** Lumbering is the principal industry, and its products form a great part of the exports. The total production is about 1,000,000,000 feet a year. The fisheries are also of considerable importance. Salmon, lobster, cod, herring, mackerel and whale are the leading kinds, with cod in front, followed by herring and lobster. Over 12,000 persons are engaged in this industry and a capital of \$1,500,000. The value of the total catch in the year ending March 31st, 1917, was \$2,991,624. The catch of fur is greater than that of any other province. In 1910 it was over \$400,000, more than a fifth of Canada's total. Shipbuilding is carried on in Quebec.

**MANUFACTURES.** The principal manufactures are cloth, linen, furniture, leather, sawed timber, flax, iron and hardware, paper, pulp, chemicals, boots and shoes, cut stone, cement, clay products, cotton and woolen goods, agricultural implements, aluminum (from imported bauxite), etc. Quebec is one of the world's great centers in the manufacture of paper and pulp, its immense forests of spruce and other pulp woods and its abundant water power combining to give it unsurpassed advantages in this industry. The manufacturing establishments have increased 30 per cent. in five years. Montreal, though not the capital, is the largest city in the province and the chief commercial city of the Dominion. About 80 per cent. of the people are of French origin.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Quebec is 160, including 13 daily, 98 weekly, 2 fortnightly, 3 semi-monthly, 34 monthly, 1 bi-monthly, 1 four times during the college year and 3 quarterly. The places of publication number 40.

# DOMINION OF NEWFOUNDLAND

Population.....242,619

CAPITAL, ST. JOHN'S

NEWFOUNDLAND lies to the eastward of the Dominion of Canada and comprises the island of Newfoundland, in the Atlantic Ocean, at the mouth of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and a strip 800 miles long and about 80 miles wide along the eastern coast of the Labrador peninsula. Newfoundland is bounded on the east, north and south by the Atlantic ocean, and on the west by Quebec and the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The extreme length of the island of Newfoundland is 850 miles; average breadth 130 miles, and area 42,000 square miles. The surface is generally rugged, with numerous lakes and rivers. The central and eastern portion of the interior is but thinly wooded, and consists in part of elevated plains called "barrens." The river valleys and the western portion of the island have a considerable growth of timber, chiefly spruce and birch of moderate size.

The soil is fertile near many of the lakes and rivers, and in many places farming is profitable. The area of the cultivated land is rapidly increasing, having more than doubled within the past ten years. About 200,000 acres is now under cultivation or pasturage. Wheat, oats and barley grow well; also potatoes and green crops generally; apples and small fruits are profitable. The report of the Newfoundland Agricultural Board shows a production during the year 1911 of 15,000 bushels of oats, 80,000 tons of hay, 650,000 barrels of potatoes, 100,000 barrels of turnips and other root crops, 1,500,000 dozens of cabbage, 1,100,000 pounds of butter, 6,650,000 pounds of beef, mutton and pork. There were in the colony 12,745 horses, 18,408 dairy cows, 27,300 other cattle, 101,440 sheep, 38,409 swine. These figures all show considerable increase over those of the 1901 census. Agriculture is progressing, and while it has been necessary to import a proportion of the foodstuffs, especially meat, dairy products and oats, the government is endeavoring to develop the agricultural resources in every way and before long the colony will be self-supporting in the matter of food supplies. The lumber industry, while not large, is growing, and the exports in 1914 were valued at \$106,620. Much of the spruce is also made into paper pulp.

Copper and iron are mined; the other minerals found are lead, gold, silver, manganese, nickel, plumbago, marble, limestone, petroleum, coal, talc, slate, etc. The total value of the mineral exports in 1914 was \$1,450,512, by far the greater part being iron ore. Copper ore is next. Lead and a few other minerals are worked on a small scale. The coal deposits are extensive, but have not yet been developed.

The fisheries, both on the Grand Bank and in shore, are very valuable. The seal fishery employs a large number of vessels. Its catch in 1915 was 151,431 seals, weighing 3,867½ tons, and valued at \$868,552, the price, owing to the great war demand for oils, being much higher than usual. The Newfoundland cod fishery is the most extensive of the kind in the world. The aggregate annual catch of cod in North American waters is estimated at about 150,000,000 fish, worth about \$15,000,000. The principal exports are fish and fish-oils, seal-oil and skins, and other fishery products, forming about 80 per cent. of the total exports. The total exports of all fishery products, including the whale and seal products, in 1914, were valued at \$10,907,677, of which codfish in its various forms, including oil, brought \$8,475,724; herrings, \$469,546; lobsters (canned), \$347,941; salmon, \$101,498; seal products, \$759,854; whale fishery products, \$100,000. Including what is used for home consumption, the total value of the fisheries is not less than \$13,000,000.

Manufactures consist chiefly of lumber, pulp, paper, and canned fish and lobsters. Several large English companies have built pulp mills, with a total capacity of several hundred tons per day. Goods were exported to the United States in the year ending June 30, 1916, to the value of \$1,866,688. The imports from the United States were \$7,217,997. The imports from Canada in 1914 were \$4,861,047, from the United Kingdom \$3,826,529; exports to Canada 1,971,809; to the United Kingdom \$3,256,446. Total imports, chiefly coal, flour, textiles, railroad supplies and hardware, \$15,193,728; total exports \$15,134,543. The exports go chiefly to the United Kingdom and Brazil, each of which takes over \$3,000,000. Besides the United States; Canada, Spain and Italy, each take over \$1,000,000, the rest being distributed all over the world. The coast of Labrador, included in the colony, comprises about 120,000 square miles, but has only 3,989 inhabitants, a large proportion being Esquimaux. They are engaged in the cod and seal fisheries and, during the winter months, in trapping.

The number of newspapers and periodicals published in Newfoundland is 24, including 5 daily, 11 weekly, 6 monthly and 2 quarterly. The places of publication number 8.

## BERMUDA

Population 21,576

(White, 9,244; Negroes, 12,332)

### CAPITAL, HAMILTON

A group of islands in the North Atlantic Ocean, 660 miles southeast of New York. Although said to be 385 in number, they occupy a space only 18 miles by  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles. The largest has an area of 9,000 acres, the whole group containing only about 12,000. They are of coral formation, on the summit of a submarine mountain. The climate is delightful, without extremes of heat or cold, the temperature ranging from 55 to 85 degrees, and the islands are becoming very popular as a summer and winter pleasure and health resort, and are visited every year by increasing numbers of Americans and Canadians. Although a governor is appointed by the British crown, the islands have their own representative government for local affairs, having the oldest parliament among all the British colonies.

The soil produces almost every description of fruits, flowers and vegetables abundantly. Onions, potatoes, celery and early table vegetables are the chief crops, and the culture of flowers, especially Easter lilies, for the American market, is a large and growing industry. The 1911 crop of onions was worth \$210,000, potatoes, \$165,000, and other vegetables, \$125,000. The United States sent to Bermuda in the year ending June 30, 1918, goods valued at \$2,280,277 and imported from Bermuda \$704,540. There is frequent and regular steamship communication with New York, and also direct lines to Canada and England.

## CUBA

Population \*2,700,000

CAPITAL, HAVANA

CUBA, the largest of the West India Islands, is situated about 100 miles south of Florida; from which it is separated by the Florida Straits. It is 800 miles in length from east to west—greatest breadth at Cape Cruz, 110 miles; average width from 50 to 60 miles, except at its western extremity where it is about 30 miles. It has a coast line of 2,000 miles, with many fine harbors. Total area, 44,164 square miles. A mountain range intersects it longitudinally. The climate is hot but not unhealthful. The temperature ranges from a mean of 70° in January to a mean of 82.4° in July. Snow is never known to fall, but frost occurs occasionally on the highest points. The annual rain fall is 54 inches. The rainy season is mainly confined to July, August and September. The mountains are rich in minerals and there are abundant forests of mahogany, ebony, cedar and other valuable woods.

The vegetation is exceedingly luxuriant; the principal cereal is corn, of which two crops are obtained in a year. Rice is also produced in large quantities, but the principal crops are sugar, coffee and tobacco, and of these the first is by far the most important. The production of sugar in 1918 was 3,600,000 long tons, practically all of which went to the United States. The 1914, tobacco crop was 72,585,000 pounds. The chief fruit crops are oranges, pineapples and grape fruit.

The commerce of Cuba is rapidly increasing, especially with the United States, which furnishes four-fifths of the goods imported and takes three-fourths of the exports. The rest of the commerce is chiefly with the United Kingdom and Spain. The principal imports are cereals, meats, cotton and cotton goods, and machinery. The exports are sugar, tobacco, cigars, fruits, honey and beeswax, cocoa, molasses, cedar, mahogany, dye woods, cattle hides, copper, iron ore, manganese, asphalt, etc. The total imports for 1917 were \$261,377,000, the total exports \$357,140,000. The exports amount to \$132 per capita of the population, the imports to \$97 per capita. The exports to the United States for the year ending June 30, 1918, were valued at \$264,024,006 imports from the United States \$231,682,045.

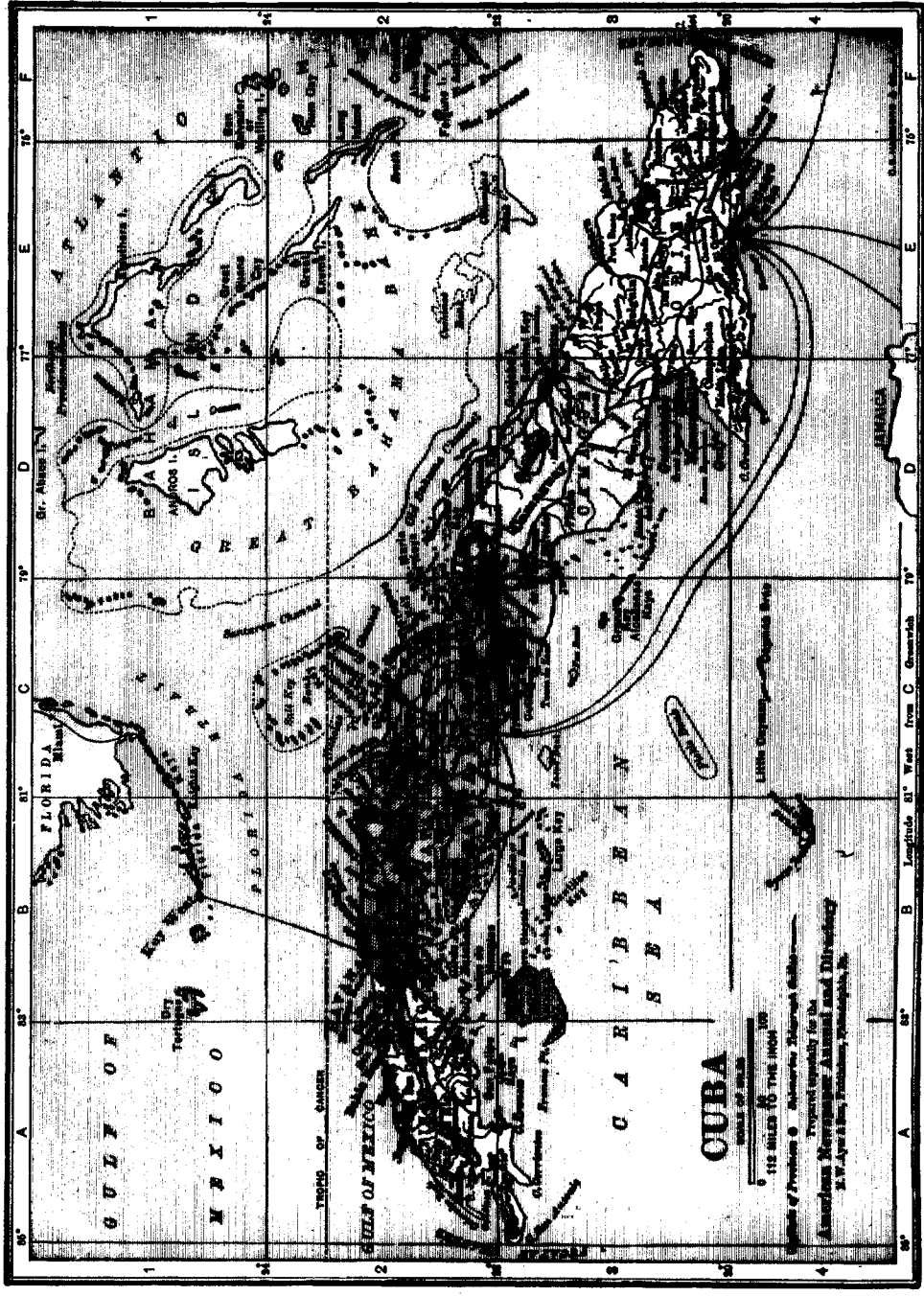
There are 2,600 miles of steam railroads in the country and 250 miles of electric lines, 32 steamers per week leaves for United States ports. Havana is one of the largest commercial ports in the Western Hemisphere.

Cuba forms an exception to the rule in the West Indian islands, in that the white people far outnumber the negroes. Fully seventy per cent. of the people are white. Education has made great strides since the people attained independence. Under the policy of those dominant under the Spanish regime, the people had no educational facilities, and only a very small percentage could read. At the present time the percentage of the people over ten years of age who can read is 82.6 in the cities and in the country districts 47.9. In the cities 49.9 per cent. of the children attend school, in the country districts 31.6 per cent. The island has 5,000 primary schools and 5,300 teachers.

# HAYTI

Population 2,000,000

CAPITAL, PORT-AU-PRINCE

(For Map, see Dominican Republic)

HAYTI occupies the western or smaller part of the island known as Hayti, and has an area of 10,240 square miles. Ninety per cent. of the population is of the negro race. Although much of the land is mountainous and rugged, and covered with dense forests, the soil, where cleared and cultivated, is remarkably fertile, and large crops of coffee, cotton, cacao, sugar and tobacco are grown. The coffee exported in 1915 was 57,594,000 pounds. Large quantities of valuable timber, consisting of mahogany, cedar and various dye-woods, the products of the forests, are also exported. United States Treasury reports show that in the year ending June 30, 1918, Hayti imported from the United States goods worth \$4,815,544. The exports to the United States were \$3,359,922. The amount of trade between the two countries grows larger each year. The mineral deposits, which are valuable, have been but little developed. A convention, signed between the United States government and Hayti and ratified by the senates of both countries, is now in operation and much benefit is expected to result from it in the future development of the country. With the help of the United States, the government will be more settled and industrial progress will probably be rapid.

About eighty per cent. came from the United States, the greater part of the rest from Great Britain. The exports were valued at \$1,200,000, and were chiefly sponges, fruits and hemp.

There have been no cases of yellow fever or contagious disease for twenty years. Forests of valuable hardwoods and dye-woods. Thermal mineral springs of medicinal repute. The chief articles of export are sugar, coffee, dye-woods, rum, limes, vanilla beans (50,000 pounds a year), bananas, cacao, coconuts, preserved pineapples, spices, etc.

The most important of the British West India Islands, situated 90 miles south of Cuba. Its length is 145 miles, the greatest width 50 miles. Area 4,207 square miles, of which 940,126 acres, or over 1,800 square miles are devoted to tillage or pasture, 31,160 acres of this to sugar cane, 20,023 acres to coffee, 85,468 acres to bananas and 19,995 to cocoanut palms. It is traversed by mountains in all directions, the highest of which (Blue Mountain) reaches an elevation of 7,360 feet. There are numerous other peaks varying from 2,000 to 6,000 feet. The census of 1911 gave the population of the island as \$31,383; 15,605 being white; 630,181 negroes; 168,201 with an admixture of negro blood; 17,380 East Indian; 2,111 Chinese and 2,905 of races not specified.

The soil in the valleys is very productive and vegetation extremely luxuriant. Most of the staple products of tropical climates are grown. Jamaica is famous for its coffee. The 1915 reports show exports of 10,034,000 pounds. In addition to sugar and bananas, which are the chief products, dye-woods, coconuts, coffee, cocoa, ginger and other spices, rum, fruits, etc., are largely exported. In 1913 the production of sugar was 4,891 tons, valued at \$243,551; rum, 958,677 gallons, value about \$492,454; bananas 11,597,881 bunches, value \$4,802,826. The total exports amounted to \$11,810,806. 57.4 per cent went to the United States. Jamaica is not a manufacturing country, almost all the manufactured goods being imported, chiefly from the United States and England. The value of imports in 1913, consisting chiefly of provisions and manufactured goods, was \$13,789,937. The United States supplied 46.7 per cent and Great Britain 38.3 per cent. The imports of live animals, provisions and beverages, of all kinds, had a value of \$5,950,981; the textiles imported amounted to \$2,425,412; the metal goods to \$1,849,743; raw materials to \$592,071 and other miscellaneous imports to \$3,471,830. The imports from the United States in the year ending June 30th, 1913, were \$7,834,096, the exports to the United States \$3,282,982. There is an abundance of timber, including all tropical hard woods; there are some copper mines. The fisheries are not of great commercial importance.

If the publication sought has general circulation, as distinguished from special or class circulation, it can as a rule be found in one of the three lists in this group, if it is not in the one first consulted.
