Volunteers Donate Over 13,000 Hours in 2007 to Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge

On April 22, 2008 Blackwater National Wildlife Refuge (NWR) held a volunteer recognition dinner. During the year 2007, 109 volunteers contributed 13,004 hours of their time to Blackwater NWR. There were 37 volunteers and 13 staff members present. The event was cosponsored by the Friends of Blackwater (FOB) who provided the buffet dinner at the Madison Bay Restaurant and Raw Bar, in Madison, MD. Following the delicious dinner and power point photo presentation on how the volunteers assisted the Refuge in 2007 by Maggie Briggs, Project Leader Suzanne Baird and Visitor Services Manager Maggie Briggs presented the awards to the Volunteers.

The highlight of the evening was the addition of two names engraved on the Volunteer of the Year plaque that is displayed in the Visitor Center. The Volunteers of the Year Nancy Kreek and Sharon Glock received a framed certificate in appreciation for the donation of over 600 hours and 880 hours respectively of their time and effort to many activities at the Refuge.

A Director's Award signed by the Director of the Fish and Wildlife Service, Dale Hall, was presented to Tom Hook for volunteering over 2,000 hours.

Paul Smail, Helen Davies, and Stan Trice received a 10 year pin for 10 years of continuous service. Chuck Mock and Lisa Mayo received certificates for 5 years of continuous service. Having already received a 20 year pin, honorable mentioned was made for Helen Combes's 23 years of service, and Harry Armistead and Terry Allen for 24 years of service.

There were forty two volunteers who donated over 100 hours in the year 2007. Two Volunteers, Brooke Miller and Sharon Glock, received a Blackwater NWR jacket for working over 100 - 800 hours for the first time in the year 2007. Erin Smail, Paul Smail, Nancy O'Connor, Mary Lynch, Jennie Rideout, George Anzalone, Merriam Brown, Tom Wolfle, Nancy Kreek, Wolf Hehn, and Charlotte Hehn received a vest and a brass name tag for their second year of earning over 100 -

800 hours, having previously earned a jacket. Donna Harms and Levin Willey, donated over 100 - 200 hours for the third year and received a 14 oz. copper mug with the volunteer logo on one side and Blackwater NWR logo on the opposite side. For each 1,000 hours they have volunteered, they receive a goose engraved on their name plaque. Seven new names were added to the plaque this year with Paul Stone, Mary Beth Goll, Alice Zalik, Wolf Hehn, Dave Wilford, Charlotte Hehn, and Mary Konchar each accumulating over 1,000 hours.
