Friendship	There's no doubt about it, friends are important! For many teens friends are often their whole world.	
	Most teens want to spend the majority of their free time with friends that are the same age. For many teenagers belonging to a "group" of friends is important. This group of friends may wear the same types of clothes, hairstyle and share common ideas, interests and values.
