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

Proposals Must Meet Five Standards

1 Benefit to Census Bureau programs

2Scientific merit

3Clear need for nonpublic data

4 Must be feasible

(5)No risk of disclosure

If all standards are met, a proposal must also pass a review by the Census Bureau's Office of Analysis and Executive Support. If approved by the Census Bureau, the proposal may also require approval by the federal agency sponsoring the survey or supplying the administrative data.

Work Environment

RDCs are Census Bureau facilities staffed by a Census Bureau employee and meet all the physical and computer security requirements for restricted access.

Each researcher must undergo a background check to become a Special Sworn Status employee of the Census Bureau. Researchers are not permitted to remove anything at all from the RDC unless it passes a disclosure avoidance review.
