- 1. MORCAO- Mothers' Rural Care for AIDS Orphans, A local NGO that has partnered with CARE to promote Safe Water System Intervention.
- 2. Originary Pottery Women Group is a local CBO that manufactures improved storage vessels (Clay pots) for Care's SWS intervention.
- 3. Adiedo Pan is a community water source catering for large community coverage without any feasible safe water source.
- 4. Homa Bay District Hospital is the medical clinic that will be piloting SWS intervention through Ministry Of Health set-ups. A model for partnership with CARE, MOH, CDC and PSI.
- 5. The distance between Kisumu airport and project sites is approximately 120kms. Half of the distance is all weather-roads and the rest is murram/earth road. Some of the scenery the visitors are likely to enjoy includes Homa Hills, Lake Victoria, Simbi Nyaima salt crater sea and beautiful tors/rocky hills of South Nyanza.
