MISSISSIPPI MAN PLEADS GUILTY TO KATRINA FRAUD

JACKSON, Miss - W.C. Blackmon of Canton, Mississippi, pled guilty to submitting a false claim to FEMA for Hurricane Katrina disaster assistance funds, U.S. Attorney Dunn Lampton announced today. Blackmon caused \$14,470.90 to be mailed from FEMA by providing a false statement regarding appliances at an address in Biloxi, Mississippi, and claiming hurricane damage to items at that address.

Blackmon will be sentenced before U.S. District Judge Tom S. Lee on July 27, 2007. He faces a maximum sentence of 5 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

In September, 2005, Attorney General Alberto R. Gonzales created the national Hurricane Katrina Fraud Task Force, designed to deter, investigate and prosecute disaster-related federal crimes such as charity fraud, identity theft, procurement fraud and insurance fraud. The Hurricane Katrina Fraud Task Force - chaired by Assistant Attorney General for the Criminal Division, Alice S. Fisher, includes members from the FBI, the Federal Trade Commission, the Department of Labor Office of Inspector General, the Postal Inspector's Office and the Executive Office of United States Attorneys, among others.

Pursuant to the Justice Department initiative, a local Katrina Fraud Task Force, consisting of over 20 Federal and State law enforcement agencies, was formed in the Southern District of Mississippi to pursue and proceedute individuals who engage in fraud associated with the

Mississippi to pursue and prosecute individuals who engage in fraud associated with the hurricanes.
