Preserve Hiking Trails



Backcountry Hiking Trails

The preserve's backcountry hiking trails are open daily between 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. from May through October. From November through April, trails are open on weekends (weather permitting). Permits are required for the backcountry trails.

Scenic Overlook Trail - A 6.4-mile round-trip hike along the bus tour route to the scenic overlook area. Experience the beauty of native rolling prairie, as you take in the wide-open vistas of 1,490 feet above sea level.

3 Pasture Loop Trail - A 3.8-mile hike through upland prairie. This trail winds along existing ranch roads and a mowed path. From May through July, cattle graze here as they have for the past century.


Red House Trail - A 6-mile hike through upland prairie and natural drainage areas. This trail passes through several historic ranching features, while giving an intimate view of wetland prairie flowers and vegetation through a scenic grove of cottonwood trees.

Frontcountry Nature Trails

The preserve's frontcountry nature trails are open yearround during daylight hours only. For visitor safety and resource preservation, we ask that visitors stay on the designated trails.

The Southwind Nature Trail – A 1 3/4-mile hiking trail through the tallgrass prairie, passing by the Lower Fox Creek School. Scenic overlook areas.

The Bottomland Trail - A 1/2 or 3/4-mile loop through bottomland prairie along Fox Creek. Wayside exhibits and information kiosk tell the story of the prairie restoration and cultural history. The trail is wheelchair accessible and offers a comfort station.



Location: The preserve headquarters is located:

- 2 miles north of Strong City on Kansas State Highway 177 (Flint Hills National Scenic Byway)
- 18 miles west of Emporia
- 16 miles south of Council Grove
- · 85 miles northeast of Wichita
- Hours: The historic ranch headquarters is open daily (except Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day) from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Brochures and a 10-minute site orientation video are available in the barn (May - October) and on the back porch of the house (November - April).

A self-guided tour of the historic ranch headquarters is available daily between 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. A brochure and wayside exhibits tell the story of Stephen F. Jones, who owned the ranch from 1878 to 1888.

The bookstore/gift shop in the ranch house is open daily from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Visitors may purchase books for children and adults, prints, postcards, educational and hand-crafted gift items, natural objects, and items related to local culture.

While in Chase County, make time to visit the towns of Strong City and Cottonwood Falls. Steeped in prairie history, these scenic communities will take you back in time. They offer dining, shopping, and much more.

Natural History Programs

• Red House Discovery Hike -At 10 a.m. (Sat and

Sun) on the 2nd and 4th weekends of each month from June through October, enjoy a one-hour ranger led hike along the stream bank. Special natural history programs offered at 2:30 p.m. on Sat and Sun.



• Prairie Seed Harvesting - On the first Thursday of the month in June, July, September, and October help staff harvest prairie seeds from 9 a.m. to noon. The seeds will be used to restore bottomland prairie areas at the preserve. Call 620-273-8494 for details.

Cultural History Programs

• Ranching Weekends - On holidays and the 1st and 3rd weekends of each month from Memorial Day



through October, experience daily activities on a working ranch as you visit with living history interpreters. Special activities may include historic cooking, music, quilting, carpentry, roping, gardening, saddling, and blacksmithing. Programs given at 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday.

Old-time Music & Wool Spinning

On the 1st Saturday of each month from June through October, listen to live music and watch wool spinning demonstrations.

• Lower Fox Creek School - Visit a one-room schoolhouse on weekends from noon until 4 p.m. in May, June, September, and October. Visit with

National Park Service volunteers about the role the school played in the early days of education on the prairie. McGuffey readers, slates, and a recitation bench are on display.

Daily Activities

Prairie Bus Tours - This 90-minute prairie tour is available daily from the last Saturday in April through the last Sunday in October.

Bus tour times – 11 a.m., 1 p.m., and 3 p.m. \$5.00 per adult, \$3.00 age 5 -18 years, 4 and under free.

House Tours – Tours are conducted hourly from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. from May through October. House tour schedules vary November through April.

2008 Special Events at the Preserve

The preserve offers a variety of activities including guided tours of the 1881 ranch house, living history programs, a [r. Ranger booklet, natural history programs, prairie bus tours, nature trails, and backcountry hiking trails.

April 26 - Junior Ranger Day - Fun-filled day of Junior Ranger activities, including a Leave No Trace scavenger hunt. Earn a badge and certificate from real park rangers. May 10 - International Migratory Bird Count - Assist the staff with a bird count at the preserve. Program starts at 7 a.m. (weather permitting). Call 620-273-8494 for details.

May 24 - Memorial Day Weekend - On Saturday from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. experience an authentic horse-drawn

having and raking demonstration (weather permitting) in the field. Visit with living history interpreters as they prepare the noon meal for the harvesters or hear the clang of the blacksmith throughout the day as he demonstrates the art of metallurgy.

May 25 - Children's Day - From 10 a.m. to I p.m. pet the farm animals, feed the chickens, or clean the stalls. Kids can earn a Spring Hill Ranch certificate after doing their chores.

May 26 - School Day - On Monday join the

school marm and experience the one-room school with penmanship lessons, spelling, and reading from the McGuffey Readers. School day is from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

May 31 and June 1 - Birding at the Preserve

National Park Service staff lead 90 minute birding hikes at 8 a.m. both days. Learn birding techniques at 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. at the special interpretive program. Using self-constructed paper airplanes, learn flight dynamics at the children's workshop at 1 p.m. Birds of prey program will be presented in the historic barn on Saturday, May 31st at 2 p.m.

June 21 & 22 - Historic Farming Equipment - Once a vear the top floor of the barn is opened to exhibit the historic farming machinery from 1920 to the 1940s. Hear the ring of the blacksmith's hammer on Saturday.

July 4, 5, & 6 - Independence Day at the Ranch

On Friday, enjoy a day of music and clogging in the historic barn. Bring your instruments for jammin'. Clogging demonstrations at 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

July 4, 5, & 6 - Independence Day - (continued)

On Saturday ride in a covered wagon, watch historic cooking

demonstrations, or see the blacksmith hard at work. Historic barn dance from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. with the Tallgrass Express band. Refreshments served.

old-fashioned egg-toss, rope jumping, hoop and stick, and a lively bucket brigade. Activities from 2 p.m. - 4 p.m. Refreshments served.
