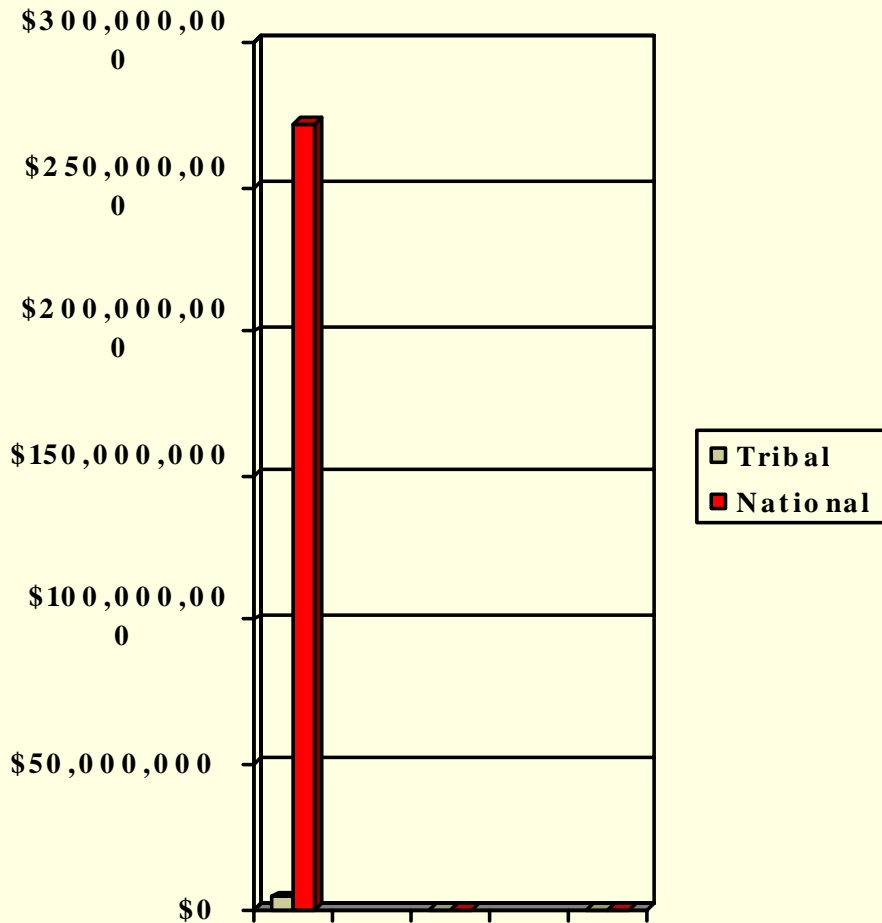
# Student Support Services (SSS)

## History and Purpose

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- One of three original TRIO programs authorized in 1968 by *Higher Education Act of 1965* (20 U.S.C. §1101a), as amended.
- The goal of SSS is to increase the postsecondary persistence and graduation rates of low-income students, first-generation college students, or students with disabilities and to facilitate these students' transition from one level of higher education to the next.

# Part II – Budget Summary and Narrative

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## Budget Summary

- **Include funds requested for grant aid in the Training Stipends category**
- **Double check the line items and category totals with the narrative budget**

## Budget Narrative (1<sup>st</sup> year only)

- **Be certain costs are allowable and related to the proposed project**

# Part III – Program Narrative

## *SSS Selection Criteria 646.21*

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•Need	•24 points
•Objectives	• 8 points
•Plan of Operation	•30 points
•Institutional Commitment	•16 points
•Quality of Personnel	• 9 points
•Budget	• 5 points
•Evaluation Plan	• 8 points
Total Maximum Score	100 points

# Need (24 points)

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- A high number or percentage, or both of eligible students (8 points)
- Academic & other problems (8 points)
- Comparison of eligible students with and appropriate group
  - retention and graduation rates
  - grade point averages
  - graduate and professional school enrollment rates (8 points)

# Need

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Clearly state the needs and provide specific documentation or evidence**
- **Relate the assessed needs to the purpose of the program**
- **Make sure the needs are reasonable and well defined**
- **Use recent data (not later than 3 years)**

# Objectives (8 points)

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- Process and outcome objectives ( 2 points)
- Address the identified needs of the participants (2 points)
- Clearly described, specific, and measurable ( 2 points)
- Are ambitious but attainable with each budget period and the project period (2 points)

# Objectives

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Objectives should be reasonable and measurable**
- **Consistent with the stated needs**
- **Ambitious and attainable**

# Plan of Operation ( 30 points)

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- Inform the institutional community  
(3 points)
- Identify, select, and retain participants  
(3 points)
- Assessing each participants' need and monitoring progress (4 points)
- Provide services that meet goals and objectives  
(10 points)
- Plan for proper administration of the project  
(10 points)

# Plan of Operation

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Effective management plan that ensures proper and efficient administration**
- **Provide milestones that show a logical progression of tasks**
- **Explain why the services/approaches are expected to be successful**
- **Detail a plan for equal access (GEPA)**



# Institutional Commitment

(16 points)

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- Committed facilities, equipment, supplies, personnel (6 points)
- Established administrative policies and academic policies that enhance (6 points)
- Commitment to minimize dependence on student loans (2 points)
- Assured full cooperation and support (2 points)

# Institutional Commitment

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Describe the specific resources that will enhance project services**
- **Discuss administrative and academic policies that will enhance participants' retention**
- **Describe how the project will establish a relationship with appropriate offices**

# Quality of Personnel

## (9 points)

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- Qualification requirements for the project director (3 points)
- Qualification requirements for other personnel (3 points)
- Plan for employing personnel who have succeeded in overcoming (3 points)

# Quality of Personnel

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Include the responsibilities and qualifications for project staff**
- **Plan to attract personnel with backgrounds similar to the participants**

# Budget ( 5 points)

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- Budget that is reasonable, cost-effective, and adequate to support the project.

# Budget

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Relate all budget items to the proposed project**
- **Make sure all costs are allowable, reasonable and justified**

# Evaluation Plan (8 points)

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- Appropriate to the project and include quantitative and qualitative measures (2 points)
- Appropriate baseline data to show success of project participants (2 points)
- Use results to make programmatic changes (4 points)

# Evaluation Plan

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Detail how the formative and summative evaluation will measure success**
- **Describe how and when the results will be used to improve the project**



## Part IV – Program Assurances

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- Two-thirds (2/3) of the students will be individuals with disabilities, and/or low-income individuals who are also first-generation college students; and one-third (1/3) of individuals with disabilities are also low-income
- Remaining students participating will be either low-income individuals, first generation college students, or individuals with disabilities.

# Part V – Prior Experience

## (15 points)

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- Persistence (4 points)
- Good academic standing (4 points)
- Graduation and transfer (4 points)
- Administrative requirements (3 points)

# Prior Experience

## Suggestions for Success

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- **Only include accurate information on APR**
- **Submit revisions that require prior approval**
- **DOCUMENT**

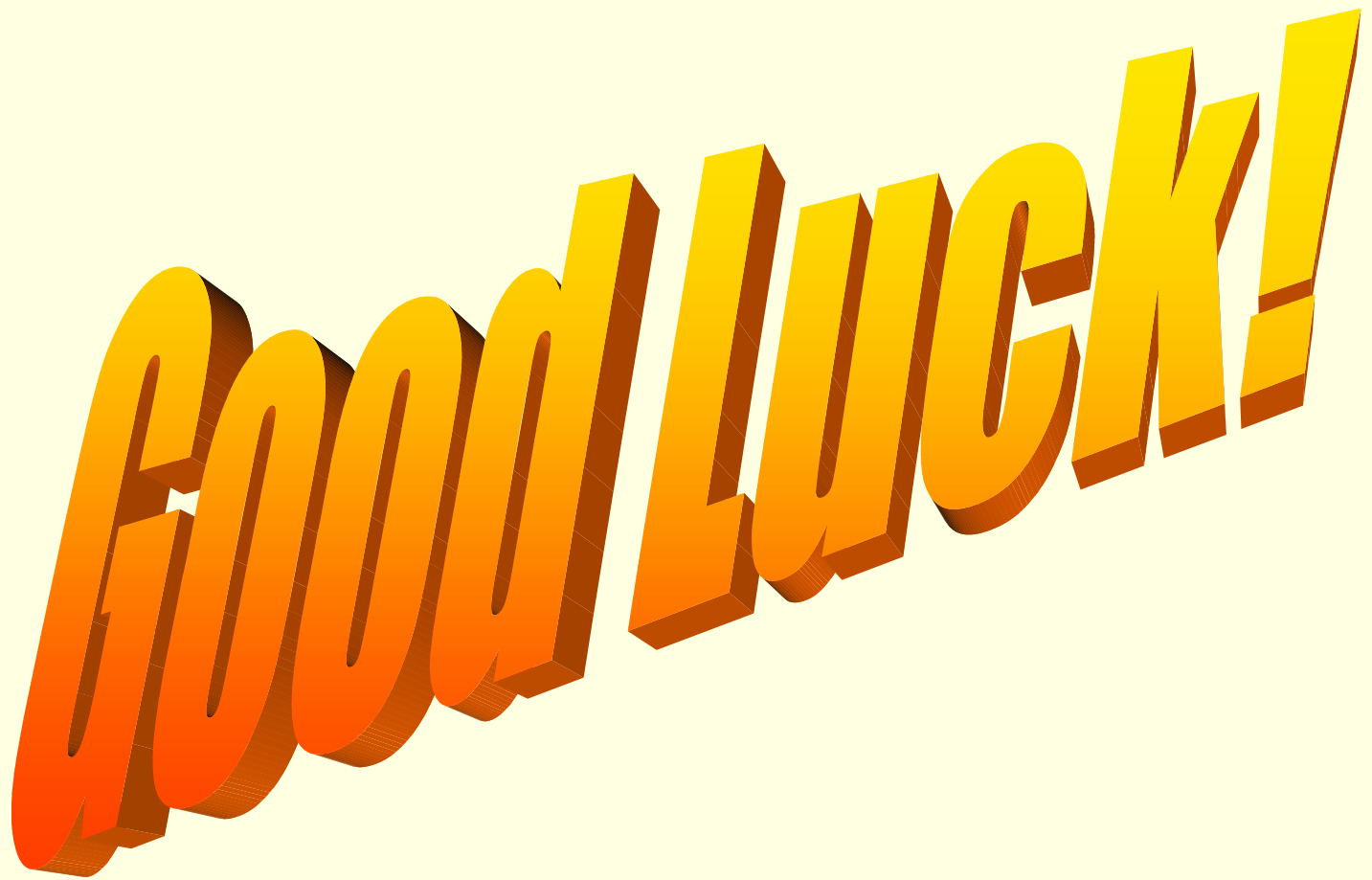
