Teacher-Ranger-Teachers in Acadia

The Teacher-Ranger-Teacher (TRT) program is in full swing this year. Our 2008 teacher-rangers represented Maine, Missouri, and New York.

Middle school social studies teacher Jim Randall from Calais, Maine, was stationed at Saint Croix International Historic Site, 8 miles south of Calais. Jim was Saint Croix's first teacher-ranger. He is interested in creating a mock archaeological dig using replicas of the actual artifacts found on the island and bringing his students on field trips to the park site.

Our other Maine representative was Nancy Philbrick, who teaches sixth grade at Oxford Hills Elementary in the western part of the state. Her position was funded by Acadia Partners for Science and Learning. Nancy's experience included two weeks at Schoodic, assisting with park-sponsored teacher workshops and Acadia's annual Bio Blitz.

Dwight Warnke, a high school biology teacher from Rolla, Missouri, was particularly interested in research at Acadia and the diversity of career

opportunities in the National Park Service. Both Dwight and Nancy attended a two-day Leave No Trace workshop while here, which he will apply to his high school and college curricula.

Renay Moran-Kurklen will be teaching fourth grade this year at a charter school in New York City. While at Acadia, among other projects, she developed wildlife programs for the public and local camps and assisted at the weekly Carroll Homestead open house.

Youth Listening Sessions

In August the park held a "Youth Town Hall Meeting" at Camp Beech Cliff as part of the "Get Outdoors, It's Yours!" initiative. This was the first in a series of meetings requested by the U.S. Department of the Interior (the National Park Service is one agency within the department) at locations around the country over the course of several weeks.

Participants were organized into four small groups: elementary school students, parents of elementary students, middle school/junior high, and high school students. Park staff acted as group facilitators and scribes. Facilitators asked questions about spending time outdoors versus indoors, visiting public lands, and park activities.

Responses from the sessions will be compiled and summarized in a collective national report later this fall. We will share the findings from these discussions with you as national parks and other public land agencies collaborate to connect more closely with our youngest generation. Thank you to Debra Deal at Camp Beech Cliff, her staff, campers, and parents for their assistance and input.

GPS Units Available

The park has purchased ten GPS units with Centennial Challenge funds to loan to educators wishing to use Acadia's outdoor EarthCache program with their classes. Learn about local geology while working as a team and becoming familiar with GPS technology. The park's

Carriage Road Explorers
