OMB Releases Updated Summary of Government Expenditures Directly Related to September 11th Attacks

Washington, D.C. – The Office of Management and Budget (OMB) today released an updated summary of more than \$100 billion the United States Government has spent or committed to spend in response to the terrorist attacks of September 11th. The summary details the continued support for the War on Terrorism, Homeland Security, the New York Recovery Effort, victims' compensation, and increased airline safety (figures include the Emergency Response Fund, FY2002 Enacted and FY2002 Supplemental).

September 11 Related Expenditures

Overall

- War on Terrorism: \$30 billion
- Homeland Security: \$ 35 billion
- New York recovery: \$21 billion
- Victims Compensation: \$5 billion
- Airline Support: \$8 billion
- Other Recovery: \$3 billion

Homeland Security

- Border and Port Security: \$9.1 billion
- Aviation Security: \$6.4 billion
- Defense: \$6.3 billion
- Bioterrorism: \$5.1 billion
- FBI: \$1.4 billion
- First responders: \$1.2 billion
- Nuclear Security: \$0.9 billion
- Postal Service: \$ 0.8 billion

New York

- \$8.8 Billion in FEMA Response and Recovery efforts.
 - Lower Manhattan transportation infrastructure,
 - Debris removal and insurance costs associated with removal activities,
 - Emergency transportation (ferries, trains, road repairs, bus service, traffic operations and pedestrian bridges and walkways),
 - Cleaning and air monitoring, exterior building cleaning, air quality testing and environmental clean-up in schools, indoor residential cleaning,
 - Fire and Police Department of New York, overtime costs, destroyed vehicles and equipment, death benefits, firehouse restoration and equipment cleaning,

- School relocation, transportation and text books
- DNA testing, forensic analysis, equipment and other tools for victim identification,
- New York City Family Center
- Disaster Housing
- Mortgage and rental assistance
- Disaster unemployment
- Crisis Counseling
- \$ 5 billion for Liberty Zone financing package
- \$3.7 billion for Community Development Block Grants and Small Business low-interest loans used for housing and business assistance and rebuilding private and public infrastructure.
- \$2.3 billion in Department of Transportation to help fund transportation system upgrades and interim transit projects.
- \$1 billion from various other federal agencies, including job training, employment services, crisis counseling, and reimbursement to hospitals.
