### Dear Applicant:

We are pleased to provide the application package for fiscal year (FY) 2008 Designation as an Eligible Institution under the following Title III, Part A, Title V of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended, the College Cost Reduction and Access Act-Hispanic Serving Institutions and the Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institutions programs:

- □ STRENGTHENING INSTITUTIONS PROGRAM (SIP);
- □ AMERICAN INDIAN TRIBALLY CONTROLLED COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES (TCCU) PROGRAM;
- □ ALASKA NATIVE AND NATIVE HAWAIIAN-SERVING INSTITUTIONS (ANNH) PROGRAM;
- □ DEVELOPING HISPANIC-SERVING INSTITUTIONS (HSI) PROGRAM
- □ COLLEGE COST REDUCTION AND ACCESS ACT OF 2007 HISPANIC SERVING INSTITUTIONS (CCRAA-HSI) PROGRAM; and
- □ ASIAN AMERICAN AND NATIVE AMERICAN PACIFIC ISLANDER-SERVING INSTITUTIONS (AANAPISI) PROGRAM.

This application package includes the information and instructions that you need to apply for eligibility designation. Eligibility designation qualifies an institution of higher education (IHE) to apply for grants under the above Title III, Title V, CCRAA-HSI and the AANAPISI programs, provided the institution meets certain additional program specific eligibility requirements.

The purpose of these programs is to provide funds to eligible institutions of higher education to increase their self-sufficiency by improving their academic programs, institutional management and fiscal stability.

In addition, this application package may be used by IHEs to apply for a waiver of certain non-Federal cost-share requirements under the following programs:

- □ FEDERAL WORK-STUDY (FWS) PROGRAM;
- □ FEDERAL SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITY GRANTS (FSEOG) PROGRAM;

- □ TRIO STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES (SSS) PROGRAM; and
- □ UNDERGRADUATE INTERNATIONAL STUDIES AND FOREIGN LANGUAGE (UISFL) PROGRAM.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION: You must read this package in its entirety before you begin to complete the application. Please make sure that you provide sufficient responses to ALL applicable questions and that you enter the correct data throughout the application. Providing accurate information is essential in expediting the eligibility process.

- All institutions (including those designated as tribally controlled colleges and universities and Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian-serving institutions) interested in applying for a new FY 2008 Title III, Title V, CCRAA-HSI, and CCRAA-AANAPISI grant MUST apply for eligibility designation by the established closing date. You must reapply for eligibility EACH year that you wish to apply for a new grant award.
- ➤ IHEs currently receiving Title III, Part A, or Title V funds do not need to apply for eligibility designation unless they intend to apply for a new grant. IHEs designated as historically Black colleges and universities are statutorily exempt from the non-Federal cost-share match requirement and do not need to apply for eligibility designation. Institutions applying for grants under the Native American-Serving Nontribal Institutions Program and the Predominantly Black Institutions Program authorized by the CCRAA do not have to meet these eligibility requirements and do not have to submit the application described in this notice.
- ➤ FY 2008 applicants will report their required student head count figures based solely on their **2005 fall semester** enrollment.
- ➤ To further assist you in determining the low-income levels of your students, we have included (in the <u>Federal Register</u> notice) the **2005** low-income figures, as determined by the Bureau of the Census.
- To assist you with calculating your institution's **average educational and general (E&G) expenditures** per Full Time Equivalent (FTE) student, the ED Form 1049 has been improved to calculate your institution's E&G expenditures for you. See pages 12 and 13 for specific instructions.
- ➤ If you are interested only in obtaining a waiver of certain non-Federal cost-share requirements, you must apply for a waiver by the April 30, 2008, closing date.
- ➤ If you are designated as an eligible institution, your waiver of the non-Federal cost-share requirement is effective for five consecutive years. You will need to request another waiver in 2013.

➤ If you are a current Title III or Title V grant recipient, you are already entitled to the cost-share waiver.

For FY 2008, all applications must be submitted electronically as described in this application package. If you wish to apply for a new grant, please make sure you submit the application by the established closing date.

Periodically throughout this application package we refer to certain sections of program regulations. We anticipate that you will <u>not</u> need to read the program regulations because we have attempted to make these eligibility instructions all-inclusive. Only **individual** accredited institutions, including eligible branch campuses, may apply for designation as an eligible institution. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.2(a)(6) and 607.2(a)(4) outline the accrediting requirements. A higher education system, foundation or district may not apply on behalf of individual institutions. Submit data pertinent solely to your institution, no matter whether your institution normally maintains and submits data to the U. S. Department of Education as part of a single filing by a higher education system for all institutions within that district.

### **Designation As An Eligible Branch Campus**

To be designated as an eligible branch campus, the branch campus must meet the needy student enrollment requirement, the educational and general (E&G) expenditures requirement, and the definition of a branch campus. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.7(b) and 34 CFR Part 607.7(e) define "branch campus" to mean a unit of a college or

university that is geographically apart from the main campus and independent of that main campus. We consider a unit of a college or university to be independent of the main campus if the unit is permanent in nature, offers courses for credit and programs leading to an associate or bachelor's degree, and is autonomous to the extent that it has its own faculty and administrative or supervisory organization and its own budgetary and hiring authority. If your institution is applying for eligibility as a branch campus, provide the eligibility data pertinent only to that particular campus.

The Government Paperwork Elimination Act (GPEA) of 1998 (P. L. 105-277) and the Federal Financial Assistance Management Improvement Act of 1999 (P. L. 106-107) encourage us to undertake initiatives to improve our grant processes. Enhancing the ability of individuals and entities to conduct business with us electronically is a major part of our response to these Acts. You qualify for an exception to the electronic submission requirement, and may submit your application in paper format, if you are unable to submit an application electronically because –

- o You do not have access to the internet; or
- o You do not have the capacity to upload the data on-line; and
- o No later than two weeks before the application deadline date (14 calendar days or, if the fourteenth calendar day before the application deadline date falls on a Federal holiday, the next business day following the Federal holiday), you mail or fax a written statement to the Department, explaining which of the two grounds for an exception prevent you from using the Internet to submit your application. If you mail your written statement to the Department, it must be

postmarked no later than two weeks before the application deadline date. If you fax your written statement to the Department, we must receive the faxed statement no later than two weeks before the application deadline date.

# INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPLETING THE APPLICATION (ED Form 1049)

(ELECTRONIC SUBMISSION REQUIRED)

### PART I – IDENTITY OF APPLICANT INSTITUTION

### ITEM 1. INSTITUTION/CAMPUS OPE ID NUMBER

You will need your institution's unique 8-digit identifier, referred to as the Office of Postsecondary Education Identification (OPE ID) number, in order to electronically retrieve and complete a valid eligibility application form.

### ITEM 2. NAME OF INSTITUTION/CAMPUS

Use your institution's complete name. If your institution is a branch campus, use the parent institution's name but follow it with the name of the branch campus (see definition of branch campus on page 5 of the application package). For example, you would cite the State University of New York, Brockport Campus.

Enter the name of the institution in the spaces provided.

If your institution's name has changed within the last two years, include the former name on the appropriate line provided in Part V of the eligibility application form.

### ITEMS 3 THROUGH 6.

Self-explanatory.

### ITEM 7. DATA UNIVERSAL NUMBERING SYSTEM (DUNS) NUMBER

Enter your institution's DUNS number in the spaces provided.

**<u>DUNS Number</u>**: Dun and Bradstreet assigns your institution's 9-digit DUNS number. Your business office will likely know your institution's DUNS number. ### ITEM 8. TYPE OF INSTITUTION

Enter your institution's type: **Identify the institution as either a 2-year or 4-year institution of higher education.** 

If your institution recently changed its status from 2-year to 4-year, identify the institution as 4-year.

If the institution offers both undergraduate and graduate education, identify it as a 4-year institution.

### ITEM 9. CONTROL OF INSTITUTION

Identify the institution as either a private nonprofit institution or a public institution.

### PART II - INSTITUTIONAL ENROLLMENT

### ITEM 1. TOTAL INSTITUTIONAL ENROLLMENT (Fall 2005 Head Count)

Determine the institution's **2005 fall semester** head count of enrolled undergraduate and graduate students.

Do not include foreign students who are not eligible to participate in Title IV need-based financial assistance programs.

Enter this number in the space provided.

### ITEM 2. TOTAL MINORITY ENROLLMENT (Fall 2005 Head Count)

Determine the institution's **2005 fall semester** head count of enrolled minority undergraduate and graduate students.

Do not include foreign students who are not eligible to participate in Title IV need-based financial assistance programs.

The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.7(b) and Part 607.7(e) define minority student to mean a student who is Alaskan Native, American Indian, Asian-American, Black (African-American), Hispanic American, Native Hawaiian, or Pacific Islander.

Enter this number in the space provided.

### **PART III - INSTITUTIONAL STATISTICS**

### ITEM 1. NEEDY STUDENT REQUIREMENT

Fill out Part III, Items 1A through 1D, using the following instructions.

## ITEM 1.A. FALL 2005 HEAD COUNT ENROLLMENT OF UNDERGRADUATE AND GRADUATE DEGREE STUDENTS

Determine the institution's total **2005 fall semester** head count of undergraduate and graduate students who were enrolled in a **degree** program. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.7(b) and at 34 CFR Part 607.7(e) define "degree student" to mean a student who enrolls at an institution for the purpose of obtaining the degree, certificate or other recognized educational credential offered by that institution. We consider the transcript that a student receives for the successful completion of a two-year transfer program to be an "other recognized educational credential."

Do not include foreign students who are not eligible to participate in Title IV need-based assistance programs.

In determining the undergraduate student head count, include all undergraduate students who were enrolled in a program that results in the award of a bachelor's degree, those enrolled in a two-year transfer program, those enrolled in a two-year educational program that results in the award of an associate degree and those enrolled in a vocational or technical program of at least two years in length which results in the award of a certificate that testifies the student qualifies to work as a technician or at the semiprofessional level in technological fields.

Enter the total in the space provided under Part III, Item 1.A.

## ITEM 1.B. FALL 2005 RECIPIENTS OF TITLE IV NEED-BASED FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Determine the institution's total **2005 fall semester unduplicated** student head count of degree students who received any of the following Title IV need-based assistance: **Federal Pell Grant, Federal College Work Study, Federal Perkins Loan or Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant.** To compute the unduplicated student head count, count each student who received Title IV need-based assistance, regardless of the number of need-based programs in which the student participated, **only once**.

Enter the total in the space provided under item Part III, Item 1.B.

## ITEM 1.C. FALL 2005 ENROLLMENT OF HALF TIME, UP TO AND INCLUDING FULL-TIME, UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

Determine the institution's total **2005 fall semester** undergraduate head count of students who were enrolled at least **half time** in degree programs at your institution.

Do not include foreign students who are not eligible for Title IV need-based financial assistance.

Enter the total in the space provided under Part III, Item 1.C.

#### ITEM 1.D. FALL 2005 PELL GRANT RECIPIENTS ONLY

Determine your institution's total **2005 fall semester** undergraduate head count of students who received **Pell Grants** for the 2005-2006 academic term. Include Pell Grant recipients who were enrolled in a program on at least a half-time basis.

Enter the total undergraduate head count of Pell Grant recipients in the space provided under Part III, Item 1.D.

## ITEM 2. EDUCATIONAL AND GENERAL (E&G) EXPENDITURES REQUIREMENT

Use the following instructions to complete items 2.A through 2.D.

## ITEM 2.A. UNDERGRADUATE FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT, FALL 2005 ENROLLMENT

Determine your institution's full-time equivalent (FTE) **2005 fall semester** enrollment of undergraduate students. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.7(b) and 34 CFR Part 607.7(e) describe how you are to calculate your full-time equivalent enrollment and the instructions below paraphrase those regulations.

Whatever the full-time load is at your institution, count a full-time undergraduate student as one FTE.

To determine the FTE for part-time undergraduate students, enter the total number of credit hours of all part-time undergraduate students. That number will automatically be divided by 12. The result is the FTE for part-time undergraduate students.

The system will then add the total (full-time plus part-time) undergraduate students. The result is the total number of undergraduate FTE equivalent FY 2005 enrollment. [NOTE: This number should not exceed the total institutional enrollment entered under Part II, Item 1.].

## ITEM 2.B. GRADUATE FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT 2005 FALL ENROLLMENT

Determine the institution's full-time equivalent **2005 fall semester** enrollment of graduate students, if any, including both full-time and part-time students, as explained here.

Whatever the full-time load is at your institution, count a full-time graduate student as one FTE.

To determine the FTE for part-time graduate students, enter the total number of credit hours of all part-time graduate students. That number will automatically be divided by 12. The result is the FTE for part-time graduate students.

The system will then add the total (full-time plus part-time) graduate students. The result is the total number of graduate FTE equivalent FY 2005 enrollment.

### ITEM 2.C. TOTAL EDUCATIONAL AND GENERAL EXPENDITURES

Determine the institution's E&G expenditures for **2005-2006**. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.7(b) and 34 CFR Part 607.7(e) define E&G expenditures as the **total amount** expended by an institution of higher education for: instruction, research, public service, academic support (including library expenditures), student services, institutional support, scholarships and fellowships, operation and maintenance expenditures for physical plant, and any mandatory transfers which the institution is required to pay by law. In determining the institution's E&G expenditures, total these costs. **Do not include Federal student financial aid.** 

Enter the total 2005-2006 E&G expenditures in the space provided under Part III, Item 2.C.

## ITEM 2.D. AVERAGE EDUCATIONAL AND GENERAL EXPENDITURES PER FTE STUDENT

The system will calculate for you the institution's average E&G expenditures per FTE for 2005-2006.

# PART IV. SPECIFIC INSTITUTIONAL ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

### ITEM 1. NEEDY STUDENT REQUIREMENTS

Use the following calculations to determine whether your institution meets the needy student requirement in at least one of two possible ways.

### YOUR INSTITUTION MEETS THE NEEDY STUDENT REQUIREMENT IF:

A. At least 50% of its 2005 fall semester, unduplicated student head count of undergraduate degree students received financial assistance under one or more of the following programs: Federal Pell Grant, Federal College Work-Study, Federal Perkins Loan or Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Programs (Part III, 1B).

Or

B. The percentage of its 2005 fall semester, undergraduate degree students who were enrolled on at least a half-time basis and received Federal Pell Grants exceeded the median percentage of undergraduate degree students who were enrolled on at least a half-time basis and received Federal Pell

Grants at comparable institutions that offered similar instruction (Part III, 1D).

## ITEM 1. A. AT LEAST 50% OR MORE OF FALL 2005 DEGREE STUDENTS WERE RECIPIENTS OF NEED-BASED FINANCIAL SUPPORT

If your institution **meets** the needy student requirement because **50 percent or more** of its 2005 fall semester, enrolled degree students received the above-mentioned Title IV need-based financial assistance, fill in the bubble next to Part IV, Item 1.A. If the percentage turns out to be less than 50%, leave the bubble blank next to Part IV, Item 1.A.

### **EXAMPLE:** Needy Student Calculation (Bubble A)

To determine whether your institution meets the statutory needy student requirement for 2005-2006, divide the number of 2005-fall semester, Title IV recipients (Part III, Item 1.B) by the 2005 fall semester enrollment of degree students (Part III, Item 1.A). The result (Part III, 1.B., divided by Part III, 1.A) is the percentage of needy students enrolled in the institution for the base year. If the result is 50 percent or more, your institution meets the statutory needy student requirement threshold. The regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.3(a)(1) and at 34 CFR Part 607.3(a)(1) describe the needy student requirement.

### **Example**

2005 fall semester enrollment (Part III, 1.A) = 800 degree students 2005 fall semester Title IV recipients (Part III, 1.B) = 600 students Percentage of recipients of need-based financial support = 75% (600 divided by 800)

The example institution meets the needy student requirement because 50 percent or more of its 2005 fall semester degree students received need-based financial support.

# ITEM 1.B. THE PERCENTAGE OF FEDERAL PELL GRANT RECIPIENTS AT THE APPLICANT INSTITUTION EXCEEDED THE MEDIAN PERCENTAGE AT SIMILAR INSTITUTIONS.

If your institution **meets** the statutory needy student requirement because the percentage of its 2005 fall semester enrolled students that received Pell Grants <u>exceeded the median</u> Federal Pell Grant percentage for its category of institutions (see below), **fill in the bubble next to Part IV, Item 1.B.** If your percentage **does not exceed** the median

Federal Pell Grant percentage for your category of institutions, leave the bubble blank next to Part IV, Item 1.B.

If the institution meets both Part IV, Items 1.A and 1.B, fill in the bubble next to Part IV, Item 1.A only.

## **EXAMPLE:** Needy Student Calculation (Bubble B)

To determine if your institution meets the statutory needy student requirement for 2005, divide the number of 2005 fall semester Pell Grant recipients (Part III Item 1.D) by the 2005 fall semester enrollment of half-time up to and including full-time degree students (Part III Item 1.C). The result (Part III, 1.D, divided by Part III, 1.C) is the percentage of Pell Grant recipients enrolled in the institution for the base year. If this result **exceeds** the "Median Federal Pell Grant Percentage" for your category of institutions, your institution meets the statutory needy student requirement threshold.

### **Example**

2005 fall semester enrollment of half-time to full-time degree students (Part III, 1.C) = 600 2005 fall semester Pell Grant recipients (Part III, 1.D) = 250) Fall Pell Grant percentage = 41.6% (250 divided by 600)

### Here are the median Federal Pell Grant percentages or thresholds for base year 2005-2006:

For 2-year public institutions, the median = 25.1%

For 2-year non-profit private institutions, the median =36.7%

For 4-year public institutions, the median = 24.6%

For 4-year non-profit private institutions, the median = 25.0%

Since in our example, the institution's Pell Grant percentage is <u>greater</u> than the median Pell Grant percentage for any category of institution, the example institution meets the needy student requirement.

## ITEM 1.C. REQUESTING A WAIVER OF THE NEEDY STUDENT REQUIREMENT

If the institution **does not meet** the statutory needy student requirement, **under either** the Title IV need-based financial assistance 50% threshold **or** the appropriate Pell Grant threshold, you may request a waiver of this requirement. **Before doing so, study below the seven possible options under which you may attempt to make your case that we grant you a waiver**. These options correspond to the seven options listed in the regulations at 34 CFR Part 606.3(b) and 34 CFR Part 607.3(b).

Fill in the bubble corresponding to Part IV, Item 1.C, denoting that you are requesting a waiver.

After you review the seven possible options for requesting a waiver of the needy student requirement, select the option(s) that applies to your institution's particular case. You may apply under more than one option if you wish.

Prepare a separate narrative, providing the required evidence that shows the chosen waiver option(s) does, indeed, apply to your particular institution. Following the instructions detailed below, the narrative must contain persuasive and compelling evidence. Mere statements of fact may not be enough to support your request. Provide supporting documentation (relevant studies, recent reports and/or data, etc.) to justify your request for a waiver. It is okay to upload photocopies of supporting documentation when addressing the waivers.

### Needy Student Waiver Option #1, 34 CFR 606.3(b)(1) and 607.3(b)(1)

Provide evidence that the state provided more than 30 percent of your institution's budget for the 2005-2006 base year,

### **AND**
