- New Sites—North Dakota and Jacksonville, FL, held kickoff meetings this month.
- **Twin Cities**—With ICTAP assistance, the site held a Policies and Procedures workshop and assigned a Local Administrative Manager (LAM) for the CASM tool.
- Washington—ICTAP demonstrated the CASM tool at the Statewide Interoperability Executive Committee meeting on November 11.
- Connecticut—ICTAP created coverage plots with detailed maps for 34 existing and five potential ITAC/ICALL tower sites.

FEDERAL PARTNER COLLABORATION

The ICTAP Quarterly Meeting brought together ICTAP Program Managers, support personnel, and the program's Federal partners to discuss existing and upcoming interoperable communications initiatives. In attendance were five Federal partners, including DHS G&T, DOJ, FEMA, NIJ, and SAFECOM.

One of the goals of ICTAP is to leverage existing Federal, State, and local interoperable communication efforts whenever possible. This coordination would allow State and local first responders to be informed of the various Federal resources that are available to assist with meeting the interoperable communications challenge.

The following selections provide brief insight on the programs and initiatives discussed.

DOJ 25 CITIES

The Department of Justice (DOJ) Wireless Management Office (WMO) provides Federal law enforcement/homeland security agencies with basic inter-systems communication for emergency situations and an ability to communicate with key State and local public safety agencies.

DHS CEDAP

The Commercial Equipment Direct Assistance Program (CEDAP), managed by the Office of Grants and Training, transfers technology systems and devices directly to local agencies, targeting law enforcement agencies.
CEDAP provides interoperable communications equipment such as the Radio Interoperable System (RIOS) and the Incident Commander's Radio Interface (ICRI).

DOJ COPS

In 2005, the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) awarded \$92.7 million in grants to 26 jurisdictions to support interoperable communications. Through a Memorandum of Agreement with DOJ designed to ensure coordination between the programs, ICTAP technical assistance is available to COPS grantees.

NIJ COMMTECH PROGRAM

National Institute of Justice (NIJ) CommTech Program assists State and local public safety agencies to communicate with one another within and across agency and jurisdictional boundaries. The program conducts research and development of emerging technologies, as well as outreach, technical assistance, and pilot programs.

ICE GRANT PROGRAM

In 2003, \$79.6 million in competetive grants was awarded by FEMA's Interoperable

Communications Equipment (ICE) Grant Program to 17 sites. Now managed by DHS G&T, this program provides modest Federal funding to smaller urban areas to improve multi-discipline, multi-jurisdiction First Responder communications.

NIMS INTEGRATION CENTER

The National Incident
Management System (NIMS)
is a nationwide approach for
all levels of government to
work effectively and efficiently
together to prepare for and
respond to domestic incidents.
Together with SAFECOM,
the NIMS Integration Center
is currently developing the
Communications Unit Leader
course referenced in FY '05 ODP
Grant Guidance.

SAFECOM

SAFECOM is a practioner-driven program that provides guidance, research, tools, and models for communications interoperability. The SAFECOM Continuum has become a benchmark for the technical assistance offered through the ICTAP Program.
