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I. Executive Summary

The Lake County HIDTA was created in 1997; from 1997 to 2005 the overall Return-on-Investment (ROI – the value of assets and narcotics seized compared to the HIDTA budget) has been \$7.73 in assets and street value of narcotics seized for every dollar budgeted to the HIDTA. If wholesale values are used, the ROI from 1997 through 2005 is \$2.65 seized for every dollar budgeted (see Appendix E).

The past year was a year of successes for the Lake County HIDTA. The HIDTA and the region succeeded in law enforcement actions that attacked the drug problem and lowered crime rates. Additionally, the HIDTA reorganized the Intelligence Support Center and made great strides in moving the ISC forward to a fully capable center supporting all Federal, State and Local Agencies in the region.

The three HIDTA Law Enforcement Initiatives co-sponsored by ATF, DEA and FBI expanded their operations in the county significantly:

- Of 73 Drug Trafficking Organizations (DTOs) identified, 31 were targeted, with 6 being dismantled and 5 disrupted.
- Of the 6 DTOs dismantled, none were international in scope, while 3 were multi-state, and 3 were local.
- The HIDTA had 2 CPOT cases (involving 3 CPOT targets) and 1 RPOT case, of which 2 were OCDETF.
- The HIDTA removed over 1.7 million dollars in narcotics and assets from the region.
- The return on investment for Law Enforcement initiatives for narcotics and assets seized was \$0.67 for every \$1 spent in the HIDTA.
- CPOT and RPOT–level gangs were disrupted and dismantled in the Region.

The Intelligence Support Center (ISC) reached a full operational status, and has expanded its support throughout out the region:

- All Initiatives as well as Federal and Local Agencies in the Region are utilizing the ISC deconfliction capabilities.
- Deconfliction requests doubled from 2004, to over 1,800 requests in 2005.
- The ISC established regional connectivity with the Chicago HIDTA Regional MACGLOCLEN hub and local connectivity with the two major database systems used in the County; the ISC provides the interface for a free exchange of information between all agencies. Connection to the Chicago HIDTA created direct links to Chicago I-Clear and SafeTNet, a deconfliction system currently linked to four other HIDTAs that were also linked to the National Virtual Pointer System. The ISC established an internal pointer-type database for historical tracking of information requests that will complement the SafeTNet system.
- The goal of the ISC is to continue the process begun in 2005 of expanding the ISC connectivity and responsibilities.
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The Prosecution Initiative provided valuable support to the local authorities, facilitating 133 prosecutions (115 State, 18 Federal).

The Training Initiative continued an aggressive training program, providing valuable training and professional development for the local police agencies.

- 341 students were trained in 53 sessions facilitated by the HIDTA Training Initiative in courses ranging from 2-week Analyst Training to computer use to Interrogation Techniques.

II. Introduction

The purpose of this report is to provide the annual report for the Lake County HIDTA. The lake County HIDTA was created in 1996, and the annual budget is currently \$3,022,000.

The mission of the National HIDTA Program is to disrupt the market for illegal drugs in the United States by assisting federal, state, and local law enforcement entities participating in the HIDTA program to dismantle and disrupt drug trafficking organizations, with particular emphasis on drug trafficking regions that have harmful effects on other parts of the United States.

The mission of the Lake County HIDTA is to reduce drug availability and usage by creating intelligence-driven drug task forces (initiatives) aimed at eliminating or reducing domestic drug trafficking and its harmful effects through the enhancement and coordination of drug trafficking control efforts among federal, state and local law enforcement agencies.

Initiatives: The Lake County HIDTA consists of the following initiatives; the Intelligence Support Center (ISC), the Gang Response Investigative Team (GRIT), the Lake County Combined Task Force (LCCTF), the Firearms Interdiction Regional Enforcement (FIRE), the Prosecution Initiative, and the Training Initiative.

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The Lake County HIDTA is located in Crown Point, Indiana. Boundaries are indicated in red.



During 2005, the HIDTA, specifically the Intelligence Support Center established links to the various law enforcement agencies and HIDTA's throughout the country via the secure, law enforcement network, Riss.net. In 2005, the ISC responded to a number of requests originating outside of Lake County. These requests came from other counties and throughout the nation.

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III. National HIDTA Goals

The HIDTA National Program goals are to:

1. Disrupt the market for illegal drugs by dismantling or disrupting drug trafficking and/or money laundering organizations; and
2. Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of HIDTA initiatives.

The first goal is important to this region as Lake County is both a transshipment zone for cocaine, heroin and marijuana to the Northeast US, as well as a growing consumer zone. Endemic with the drug trafficking in the region has been an increase in violence in the area, such that two cities in the county rank in the top ten in the nation in homicides per capita. The Gang Response Initiative works directly on those problems, focusing their efforts on the northern urban areas of the county, where national-level gangs such as the Latin Kings and Gangster Disciples operate and traffic narcotics. The Lake County Combined Task Force attacks the drug market throughout the county, conducting both drug investigations that range from local groups to CPOT targets and interdiction operations throughout the region. The FIRE initiative has effectively targeted violent offenders and illegal gun activities in Lake County as well. The net result of these activities has been a lowering in narcotics-related crimes and violence in the area.

The second goal is to improve the efficiency of the initiatives. This is accomplished in the Lake County HIDTA through several mechanisms. The first is deconfliction and case support activities that are coordinated through the Intelligence Support Center. The second is through regular case coordination meetings that are held by all the Initiative Supervisors, Program Managers, and the HIDTA Director to focus efforts, avoid duplication of effort and maximize results.

IV. Summary of Threat Assessment for Budget Year 2005

A. For regional threat assessment, please refer to the NDIC Midwest Regional Threat Assessment.

B. The specific Lake County threat situation is as follows: Lake County drug trafficking is affected by two factors. First, the proximity to Chicago and the transportation hub, since Lake County sits just to the southeast of Chicago with the northern third of the county effectively part of urban Chicago. Three interstates move east-to-west through northern Lake County, one interstate travels north-to-south through the county, and two interstates also move north-to-south just west of the county. Second are local demographics. With a long-term Mexican-American population and a forced migration from lower-income housing out of Chicago as projects were torn down, a population shift occurred to East Chicago and Gary (both in Lake County). These populations provide natural connections for Mexican trafficking organizations in the Chicago area, as well as the population shift moved the local addiction and trafficking problems from Chicago to Lake County. The primary trafficking organizations in Lake County are gangs operating

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in the northern urban areas. The primary drug of abuse in the region is crack cocaine followed by marijuana. Additionally, heroin, powdered cocaine, marijuana and ecstasy are all present in significant amounts. In 2005, several methamphetamine labs were seized in Lake County. Large amounts of narcotics flow through the county on the interstate network; money laundering is present in the casino boats in the northern part of the county.

V. HIDTA Strategy Summary

To accomplish the Mission of the Lake County HIDTA and achieve the goals of the National Drug Control Strategy, the Executive Board will allocate and focus the HIDTA resources on initiatives that have a direct relationship to:

Disrupting the market for illegal drugs by disrupting and/or dismantling the drug networks (organizations) that transport and distribute drugs and the illicit proceeds from their sale.

Modifying individual behavior in order to discourage and reduce drug use and addiction.

The enforcement components of the Lake County HIDTA will aggressively pursue drug and firearms trafficking gangs/organizations in order to disrupt and reduce the supply of illegal drugs and firearms and help meet the National Drug Control Strategy goals of:

A 10% reduction in current use of illegal drugs by juveniles and adults within the next two years.

A 25% reduction in current use of illegal drugs by juveniles and adults within the next five years.

In addition, the HIDTA will partner with the Indiana National Guard Drug Demand Reduction Program that administers a number of community programs to promote a drug-free lifestyle and environment for Indiana youth. These interactive activities by members of the Indiana Army National Guard include mentoring, drug education and leadership training to inner-city youth who all too often live in areas where drug trafficking, drug abuse and violence are omni-present.

VII. Conclusions

The following conclusions are important to note for the operations of the Lake County HIDTA in 2006:

- The Lake County HIDTA is a highly valued member of the Law Enforcement Community of Northwest Indiana
 - o The HIDTA is tailored to the unique characteristics of Lake County, targeting not only the drug trafficking that occurs in and through Lake County, but also strongly attacking the gangs, weapons, and violence associated with drug trafficking.
 - o The HIDTA provides resources to local law enforcement that serve as a force multiplier in the region, such as deconfliction, database access and audio/video forensics.
 - o The HIDTA provides access to information and coordination capabilities that are unique to the region that otherwise would be unavailable or unaffordable to the departments in Lake County.
 - o The ISC provided support to authorities outside of Lake County during 2005.

- 2005 was a successful year in that:
 - o Three CPOT targets and 1 RPOT target were identified and investigated.
 - o Four OCDEF cases were opened in 2005.
 - o Narcotics with a value of 955 thousand dollars were seized.
 - o Assets worth \$759,000 were seized.

- The Return on Investment analysis in the tables shows a total return of \$0.67 in narcotics and assets seized for every \$1 spent at the HIDTA.

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- The Intelligence Support Center has made great strides forward: DEA provided an Intelligence Supervisor to oversee the ISC; the automation and connectivity of the ISC has been greatly improved and linked to regional law enforcement and HIDTA systems such as I-CLEAR (which links the HIDTA to Illinois state and local law enforcement databases), the SafeTNet deconfliction system (linked to the Great Lakes’ HIDTAs) was linked to the El Paso Intelligence Center and the National Virtual Pointer System in 2005, IDACS, which is the Indiana State law

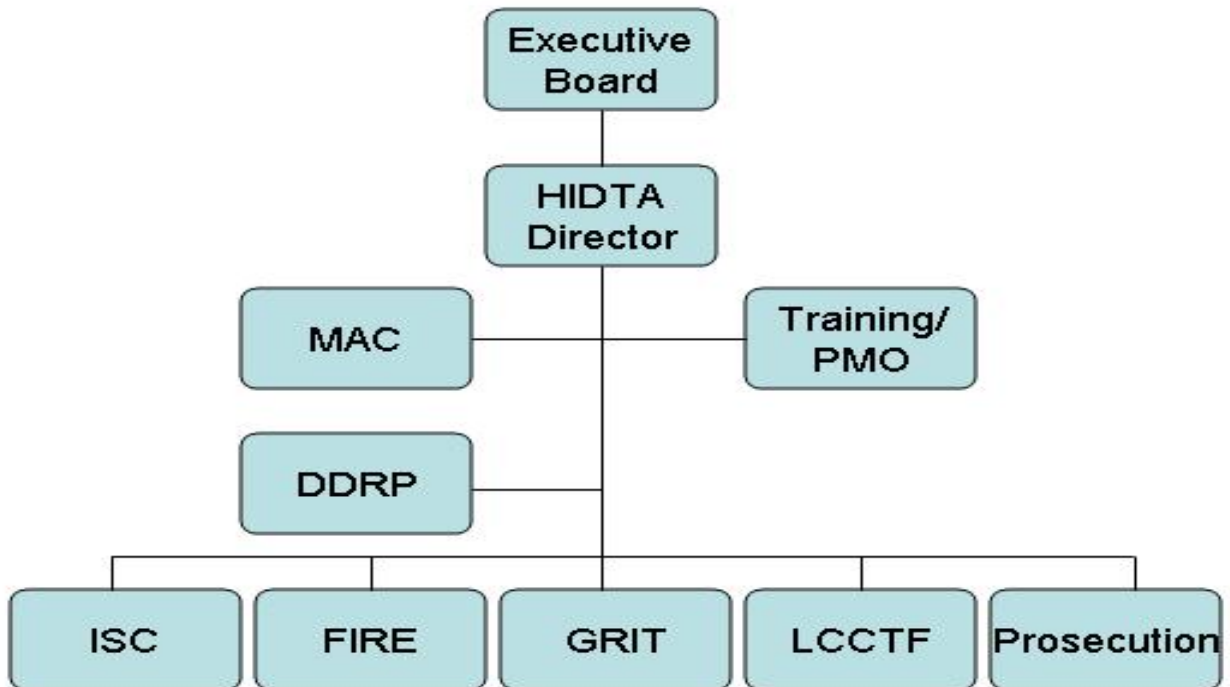
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enforcement database system, and the myriad of other federal and local databases incumbent at HIDTA ISCs.

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The Lake County HIDTA consists of the following initiatives/components:

FIRE – an Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms-led initiative that targets weapons in Lake County. FIRE has four Task Force officers from agencies in Lake County.

GRIT – the Gang Response Investigative Team – an FBI-led initiative that targets gangs in the urban areas of Northwest Indiana, with eight task force officers from local agencies assigned full-time.

LCCTF - Lake County Combined Task Force – a DEA-led initiative that targets drug trafficking in and through Northwest Indiana. It has officers from ten (10) municipalities in Lake County.

Prosecutor - The Prosecutor's Initiative that supports the initiatives and Lake County in drug and firearms prosecution.

Training – Consists of one HIDTA employee, coordinating HIDTA- supported training in the region.

Intelligence Support Center – Consists of a DEA Supervisor, DEA analyst, Indiana National Guard analysts, Lake County Sheriff's officers, Gary Police Department officer, and HIDTA analysts.

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Appendix D: List of Counties Participating in the HIDTA

Lake County, Indiana

The Lake County HIDTA is comprised of one county in the state of Indiana. Lake County is approximately 500 square miles and the second largest county in the state. It is situated in the northwestern corner of Indiana and has a population of 484,564. Lake County is ethnically and demographically diverse. It is comprised of 19 city and town jurisdictions with over 80 different ethnic cultures. It is heavily populated and industrialized to the north, which borders with Lake Michigan. The area contains major railroad lines, two airports and is home to several riverboat gambling casinos. The three largest cities in the northern region are Gary, Hammond, and East Chicago. Conversely, the south area is primarily rural farmland, which is rapidly being developed. The close proximity of Lake County to the Chicago metropolitan area and the major highway systems which intersect the county significantly impact and affect the drug trafficking in the region. Lake County serves as a major distribution point for drug shipments destined for the Great Lakes region.
