Constitution Day A Celebration of Our Civic Roots

ABILENE, Kan.—The Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum will expand its Constitution Day celebration this year by showing a 62-minute documentary film entitled, *Key Constitutional Concepts*. The film will be featured on Wednesday, Sept. 17, in the Visitors Center. Viewing times are 9:00 a.m., 11:00 a.m., 1:45 p.m., and 3:30 p.m.. All viewers will receive a pocket-size Constitution. The film, in three parts, explores the creation of the Constitution and two landmark Supreme Court cases: *Gideon v. Wainwright* and *Youngstown v. Sawyer*.

"Key Constitutional Concepts is an excellent film. Our Constitution Day viewers will find it not only informative, but entertaining as well. We are pleased to share this Constitutional history with our visitors," states Kim Barbieri, Education Specialist at the Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum.

On Friday, Sept. 19, the Constitution Day school program will be held in the library building, beginning at 9:30 a.m. The Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard will present colors and lead the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. A program highlight will be a performance by St. Andrew's and Garfield Upper Elementary students, singing "We the People." Plumed pens in hand, students will sign a facsimile of the Constitution and receive a pocket Constitution and an American flag.
