# Message from Wanda K. Jones, Dr.P.H.

n behalf of the Office on Women's Health within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, I am pleased to present the first issue of the National Centers of Excellence in Women's Health newsletter.

The National Centers of Excellence in Women's Health (CoEs) represent a unique approach to women's health for academic health institutions – one that links together advances in research, service delivery, teaching, and public outreach and seeks to improve the career prospects for women in the health professions. The purpose of this newsletter is to highlight select programs and activities that offer a glimpse at this innovative new model for women's health. Each edition of this newsletter will also offer news on upcoming events, awards, and a resource page for the CoE Program. Our hope: that this newsletter will stimulate the exchange of information and strategies to truly advance excellence in women's health today, and in the future.

In the last 3 years, the CoEs have made significant strides in advancing a multi-disciplinary and comprehensive approach to women's health. They have begun to define a standard of excellence by which we may measure progress in women's health in the future. # **CoE Innovations**

cross the U.S. and Puerto Rico, the 17 National Centers of Excellence in Women's Health (CoEs) are addressing and providing for the health care needs of women in their communities and throughout the nation. The CoEs offer innovative, community-based solutions for women seeking the finest comprehensive health care.

Each issue of *Models for the Nation* will highlight innovative activities being coordinated at several centers. This issue features CoE programs at Harvard University, University of California at Los Angeles, University of California at San Francisco, University of Illinois at Chicago, and the University of Pennsylvania.

# **Harvard University**

Minority Women's Health Diary. The Harvard CoE is working with community health centers and other community-based organizations to develop a health diary for minority women to maintain throughout their lifetimes, from adolescence to older age. The diary will focus on the needs identified by minority women and will be available in several languages.

The diary will be divided into sections according to the age categories, and each section will provide general descriptions of what should take place in a standard "check-up" with a medical provider and will suggest questions women should pose to the provider. The sections will contain information about major

health concerns for each age group with explanations about preventive strategies and treatment options. This information will eventually be available on video with accompanying written guides.

HMS Fund for Women's Health. The CoE launched the Harvard Medical School (HMS) Fund for Women's Health, which provides 1-year grants to help HMS junior faculty initiate new, collaborative, inter-institutional projects in basic research, clinical research, health services research, or education in women's health. The grants focus on academic career advancement for women and minority faculty, health issues of particular concern to minority and disadvantaged groups, and women's health issues that are under-supported.

In 1999, eight grants were awarded to study topics ranging from "The Impact of 'One-Stop' Comprehensive Care on the Quality of Care for Minority Women" to "A Multicenter Randomized Controlled Trial of Sustained Release of Bupropion for Smoking Cessation During Pregnancy." The CoE is very encouraged by the huge response to the first offering of the HMS Fund for Women's Health, and sees this response as an indication of a real need to expand resources for women researchers.

# University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA)

**Prescription for Patient Education.** Developed by the Iris Cantor-UCLA Women's Health Education and Resource Center, a component of the UCLA CoE, the

Prescription for Patient Education Program integrates patient education and clinical services. Using a prescription pad similar to those used for medical prescriptions, physicians check off the topics that the patient needs information on, such as breast health, exercise, diabetes, or menopause, and refers the patient to the Resource Center, where they get the appropriate materials and Web site addresses.

The program was developed to give physicians more time to discuss diagnostic and treatment issues with their patients, leaving health education up to the Resource Center. The Prescription also gives patients education that is specific to their health, helping them become more informed, empowered health-care consumers.

**Top 10 List.** The Iris Cantor-UCLA Women's Health Education and Resource Center Top 10 list recognizes high-profile individuals for their significant efforts in women's health education, and encourages others to use their celebrity to educate women on critically important health topics. Television and film star Cybill Shepherd was one of the 1998 Top 10 award winners for her efforts in educating the public about menopause.

# University of California at San Francisco (UCSF)

Women's Health Pharmacy Residency. Recognizing the importance of developing specialists in women's health across disciplines the UCSF CoE, under the leadership of Ronald J. Ruggiero, Pharm.D., has developed and received funding to offer one of the

nation's only Women's Health Pharmacy Residency. Across the lifespan and at all educational levels, women have expressed confusion and frustration with contraception choices, menopausal therapies, and mental health treatments. Unfortunately, while pharmacological options for women are expanding, both time and formulary restrictions on care providers are reducing women's access to necessary information. Pharmacists have a unique role to play in the education and coordination of women's pharmacotherapy. To effectively fulfill the responsibilities of this new role, comprehensive educational programs are needed which address drugs that specifically impact the life and health of women. The UCSF CoE Women's Health Pharmacy Residency represents one program in a larger education strategy. The original funding to implement this residency program in 1998-1999

was obtained from the UCSF School of Pharmacy. The 1999-2000 residency is supported through an educational award from Parke-Davis.

# University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC)

Dietary Supplements Effectiveness Study. The UIC College of Pharmacy has received a \$7.9 million grant from the NIH to create one of the nation's first centers to research dietary supplements. Working closely with the UIC CoE, the Center for Dietary Supplements Research on Botanicals will focus on women's health, with an emphasis on education and outreach. The multidisciplinary UIC research team includes experts

from pharmacognosy, medicinal chemistry, pharmacy practice, obstetrics and gynecology, geriatrics, surgical oncology, and mathematics and statistics.

Researchers will begin by studying 10 herbal supplements that are widely used by women in this country to treat conditions including menopausal symptoms, premenstrual syndrome, and urinary tract problems. The College of Pharmacy will offer graduate students the opportunity to specialize in botanical supplements and post-doctoral professionals to receive training in this field. A long-term goal for the UIC Center for Dietary Supplements Research on Botanicals is the translation of research about botanical dietary supplements for women into the clinical care arena. Thus, phase I and phase II clinical trials are planned. The clinical project is entitled "Clinical Evaluation of Botanical Dietary Supplements." Other projects in the Center include:

**Health Tip Cards.** The Health Tip Card (HTC) project is an educational outreach program designed to educate African American women about health maintenance, disease prevention, healthy lifestyle promotion, and healthy aging. The HTC project was launched in March 1999 and continues to gain momentum at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania through Penn Health for Women and the CoE.

The HTC project was developed with funding from outside sources for the Helen O. Dickens Center for Women's Health, a health center serving a low-income community in West Philadelphia whose clientele is predominantly African American women. Prior to developing the tip cards, the CoE conducted a literature review and focus groups with women from West Philadelphia to determine the need for health information.

As a result of this research, the Health Tip Cards were developed to focus on four topics: Cardiovascular Disease, Depression, Cancer, and Female Aging Issues. The cards are being distributed to women throughout the clinic sites within the health system, through the Office of Community Affairs at the University of Pennsylvania, and in grocery stores in Philadelphia.
