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ALUMINUM IN MARCH AND APRIL 2008

Domestic primary aluminum production in March was 233,000 metric tons (t), according to the U.S. Geological Survey. The average daily production was 7,530 t, essentially the same as that of the previous month and 8% higher than the rate for March 2007. Total aluminum recovered from scrap in March 2008 was 299,000 t, 183,000 t from new scrap and 116,000 t from old scrap. Total aluminum recovered from scrap for January through March was 8% less than the total for the first quarter of 2007. Aluminum recovered from new scrap for January through March was 4% less than the total for the same period of 2007. Recovery of aluminum from old scrap for January through March was 12% less than the total for the same period of the previous year.

Domestic primary aluminum production in April was 228,000 t. The average daily production was 7,590 t, essentially unchanged from that of the previous month and 9% higher than the rate for April 2007. Total aluminum recovered from scrap in April 2008 was 295,000 t, essentially unchanged from that of the previous month and 8% lower than the total in April 2007. Of this, 180,000 t of aluminum was recovered from new scrap, which was 4% less than the amount in April 2007, and aluminum recovered from old scrap in April 2008 totaled 114,000 t, which was 13% less than that in April 2007.

Total imports for consumption of aluminum in the first quarter of 2008 (table 6a) were down 9% compared with those in the same period in 2007; imports of crude metal and alloys declined by 7%, imports of semifabricated products declined by 18%, and imports of aluminum scrap were unchanged compared with the amount imported in the first quarter of 2007. Canada continued to be the leading source of imported aluminum materials, supplying 65% of all aluminum imports during the first quarter of 2008, followed by Russia with 8%. However, imports of crude metal and alloys from Russia declined by 38% compared with those of the same period in 2007, accounting for much of the overall decline in imports for consumption.

Total exports of aluminum (table 7a) increased by 32% during the first quarter of 2008 compared with those of the same period in the previous year. Exports of aluminum scrap increased by 57% and accounted for most of the increase, exports of semifabricated aluminum products increased by 9%, and exports of crude metal and alloys declined by 3%. The leading destinations of total aluminum products, in descending order of importance, were China, Canada, and Mexico, and accounted for 63% of all aluminum exports during the first 3 months of 2008. The sharp increase in scrap exports was mainly because of increases in exports to China, Taiwan, and Thailand.

The monthly average U.S. market price of primary aluminum ingot increased to \$1.399 per pound in March from \$1.286 per pound in February, but declined slightly to \$1.386 per pound in April. In May, the monthly average U.S. market price of primary aluminum ingot declined to \$1.358 per pound.

Following an increase in domestic primary aluminum production owing to new long-term power supply contracts, production cuts have been announced at two smelters. (See Aluminum in February 2008.) In June, Alcoa Inc. announced that one-half of the production capacity at its 267,000-metric-ton-peryear (t/yr) Rockdale, TX, smelter would be idled temporarily as a result of power supply disruptions and high power costs (Alcoa Inc., 2008). In July, Glencore International AG announced that the Columbia Falls Aluminum Co. smelter in Columbia Falls, MT, would shut one potline by the end of July. The closure would leave only two of five potlines operating. High electricity prices were also cited for the closure (Metal Bulletin, 2008). The combined capacity of the potlines being idled at these two smelters was 167,000 t/yr.
