THE MINERAL INDUSTRY OF

BELIZE

The mineral industry of Belize comprised various types of natural construction materials for various domestic uses. A small quantity of alluvial gold was recovered by individual entrepreneurs. Several petroleum wildcat wells in the past several years have yielded information, but no commercial quantities of oil or gas. No mineral commodities are known to

have been exported, and the country was dependent on imports for its mineral requirements.
