


PLAINS REGION SHOWS GAINS IN THE BANKING INDUSTRY

Statistics for GDP by Metropolitan Area



- In 2006, real GDP in most metropolitan areas in the Plains region grew, with the fastest growth occurring in Wichita, KS (10.1 percent) and Sioux Falls, SD (6.1 percent). In Wichita, KS, manufacturing in transportation equipment other than motor vehicles was the largest contributor to growth. In Sioux Falls, SD, banking was the largest contributor to growth.
- Real GDP in the banking industry in the Plains region grew 8.8 percent. The three metropolitan areas in the Plains region with the fastest growth in banking were Sioux City, IA-NE-SD (34.4 percent), Rapid City, SD (26.3 percent), and La Crosse, WI-MN (19.1 percent).
- Minneapolis-St. Paul-Bloomington, MN-WI—the largest metropolitan area economy in the region—had real GDP growth of 1.5 percent in 2006.
- Financial activities accounted for nearly 25 percent of the economic activity in the Minneapolis-St. Paul-Bloomington, MN-WI metropolitan area.
- Sioux Falls, SD (\$53,268) had the highest per capita real GDP in the region, while Lawrence, KS (\$25,064) had the lowest.
