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## NEW YORK-NORTHERN NEW JERSEY CPI UP 1.0 PERCENT IN JUNE, 4.5 PERCENT INCREASE FROM YEAR AGO

Retail prices in the greater New York area, as measured by the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U), rose 1.0 percent for the second consecutive month in June. Michael L. Dolfman, Regional Commissioner of the U. S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics, attributed the June rise to an advance in energy prices coupled with higher prices for shelter. The increases were partially offset by a decline in the apparel index. For the year ended in June 2008, the CPI-U increased 4.5 percent, and core inflation, as measured by the all items less food and energy index, was 2.2 percent.

The energy index climbed 9.0 percent in June, following a 7.8 -percent increase in May. (See chart A.) The June increase was due to a 10.8 -percent jump in the price of household energy-the largest monthly increase in the history of the series-and a 7.1-percent rise in gasoline prices. Within household energy, the price of electricity rose 15.3 percent, in part due to seasonal surcharges. Prices for residential fuel oil and natural gas also rose. Over the year, energy prices rose 25.0 percent, with gasoline up 33.0 percent and household energy up 18.2 percent.

The housing index increased 1.5 percent in June, following a 0.4 -percent rise in May, largely due to the advance in the household energy component. Also contributing to the housing increase was a 0.6 -percent upturn in the shelter component, which had been unchanged in May. Within shelter,

owners' equivalent rent increased 0.8 percent over the month. Rent of primary residence rose 0.7 percent over the month after seven months of increases ranging from 0.2 to 0.4 percent.

The transportation index rose 2.6 percent, after advancing 4.2 percent in May. In addition to higher prices for gasoline and other motor fuels, the June index also reflected higher airline fares. These increases were tempered by lower prices for used cars and trucks. Over the year, transportation prices rose 11.5 percent, the largest 12-month advance since a 13.8-percent increase in September 2005.

The food and beverages index edged up 0.2 percent, the smallest increase in four months. A 0.5percent rise in the food-at-home component reflected higher prices for potatoes, coffee, chicken, and frozen and freeze-dried prepared foods. Food away from home and alcoholic beverages were little changed. Over the year, prices for food at home were up 6.4 percent, the largest 12-month change since June 2004.

The apparel index, often down in June, declined 5.2 percent over the month. The drop reflected lower prices for girls' apparel, women's footwear, men's shirts and sweaters, and women's outerwear.

Among other expenditure categories, the other goods and services index rose 1.9 percent, largely due to higher cigarette prices. The education and communication index increased 0.5 percent, and so did the recreation index, with higher prices recorded for sports equipment and toys. The medical care index fell 0.4 percent.

With the New York-Northern New Jersey Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers at 238.580 in June (1982-84=100), $\$ 23.86$ was required to purchase what $\$ 10$ could in the 1982-84 base period. The purchasing power of the dollar was 41.9 cents in 1982-84 dollars and 14.5 cents in 1967 dollars. In June, the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers (CPI-W) was 233.776, up 1.2 percent over the month. The CPI-W rose 5.2 percent over the year. On a 1967 base, the June CPI-W was 665.618.

Data in this report are not seasonally adjusted. Accordingly, month-to-month changes may reflect the impact of seasonal influences. The New York-Northern New Jersey-Long Island, NY-NJ-CT-PA consolidated area comprises the five boroughs of New York City, Nassau, Suffolk, Westchester, Rockland, Putnam, Dutchess, and Orange Counties in New York State; Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Hunterdon, Mercer, Monmouth, Middlesex, Morris, Ocean, Passaic, Somerset, Sussex, Union and Warren Counties in New Jersey; Fairfield County and parts of Litchfield, New Haven and Middlesex Counties in Connecticut; and Pike County in Pennsylvania.
