**TO: ALL STATE PIPELINE SAFETY PROGRAM MANAGERS IN STATES
PARTICIPATING IN THE PIPELINE SAFETY GRANT PROGRAM**

The Office of Pipeline Safety (OPS) received 33 applications from states requesting a total of \$1,376,046 in response to OPS's request to states interested in submitting an application for grant funds in support of the establishment, development, and enhancement of one-call damage prevention systems. Grant funds in the amount of \$886,000 was made available.

The NAPS Grant Allocation and Strategic Planning Committee assisted OPS personnel in reviewing the one-call applications using the guidelines at their January 2004 meeting, and made recommendations concerning the allocation. Enclosed is a chart showing the states that submitted applications, the amount requested, and the allocation based on the priority of the project. These funds, as all 2004 allocated funds, must be spent in calendar year 2004. Each state receiving grant funding for one-call damage prevention projects must submit a summary report to the OPS detailing the project and monies expended. This year we will be using FedSTAR to report the project accomplishments as well as the monies expended in CY2004. This process will be available by this fall with a due date of February 1, 2005.
