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**UNANIMOUS CONSENT AGREEMENT****STEM CELL BILLS**

*Ordered*, That on Tuesday, April 10, 2007, upon the conclusion of Morning Business, the Senate proceed to the consideration, en bloc, of S. 5 (calendar No. 3), a bill to amend the Public Health Service Act to provide for human embryonic stem cell, and S. 30, a bill to intensify research to derive human pluripotent stem cell lines; and that the bills be debated concurrently for not to exceed 20 hours, with the time divided as follows:

5 hours each under the control of the Majority and Republican Leaders or their designees;

5 hours each under the control of the Senator from Iowa (Mr. Harkin) and the Senator from Kansas (Mr. Brownback) or their designees.

*Ordered further*, That no amendments or motions be in order to either bill and that upon the use or yielding back of time, the bills be read a third time, en bloc, and that each bill be required to receive 60 votes in the affirmative to pass and that if S. 5 does not get 60 votes in the affirmative, it be returned to the Calendar and if S. 30 does not get 60 votes in the affirmative, it be placed on the Calendar; provided, that if either bill passes pursuant to the terms of this agreement, the motion to reconsider be considered made and laid on the table.

*Ordered further*, That S. 5 be the first vote in the sequence, and that there be 2 minutes of debate between the votes with the time equally divided between the Majority and Republican Leaders or their designees. (*Mar. 29, 2007.*)
