Opportunity: In partnership with FEMA, create community centers and empower families to identify problems & create solutions





10 Tips

- 1. Hug your children and tell them you will keep them safe.
- 2. <u>Listen to your children carefully</u> and give them opportunities to talk about what happened.
- 3. Limit TV time -- news & pictures can be frightening.
- 4. Watch for changes in your children's behavior.
- 5. <u>Be patient and understanding</u> -- your children might still be upset or frightened.



10 Tips

- 6. Give your children extra time and attention.
- 7. <u>Use positive behavior and language</u> around your children.
- 8. <u>Take care of yourself</u> and do healthy things to relax. Try to get enough rest.
- 9. <u>Help your children</u> return to school, normal activities & routines.
- 10. Encourage your children to volunteer and help others.

Children's EOP Annex/ESF

- Determine the basics that need to be covered to include:
 - Safe spaces in shelters
 - Health care
 - Mental health
 - Child oriented facility planning
 - Education
 - Legal system (attorneys and courts)
 - Temporary custody



Children's EOP Annex/ESF

- Establish a planning team made up of organizations that address those areas.
 - Schools
 - Health care communities
 - Transportation
 - Child care organizations
 - Children Services Organizations
 - Emergency responders
 - Emergency Management
 - Courts/Legal Associations

VOLUNTEERS

- Save the Children does not utilize a great many volunteers
- In a catastrophic event we probably would
- We would need to draw from a pool
- Could not take spontaneous volunteers (no way to verify requirements)
- We would provide a short training session on STC and the staff roles



VOLUNTEERS

- Requirements
 - Some professional child care experience
 - Must submit to a background check (best if that could be performed at the registration center or through their employer)
 - Prefer a current affiliation with a child care provider
 - Primarily working in a shelter, DRC and/or ARC Service Center
