Submitted for your consideration are requests to make available previously appropriated contingent emergency funds for the Departments of Agriculture and Transportation, International Assistance Programs, and the Appalachian Regional Commission. All of the emergency funding provided was made contingent upon your submission of a budget request to the Congress that includes designation of the amount requested as an emergency requirement. Your approval of these requests would make available \$2,839.1 million for a variety of purposes, outlined below.

- P.L. 106-387, the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001, provided contingent emergency funding for agricultural disaster assistance. This request will support emergency assistance to the Nation's farmers, ranchers, and rural communities, by making available \$1,424.9 million for rural development, crop and animal losses, livestock disease control, flood prevention, and income assistance.
- P.L. 106-377, the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Act, 2001, provided \$214.5 million in contingent emergency funds for repair of the Department of Energy's nuclear laboratories damaged by wildfires and for continuing construction of the Appalachian Regional Commission's Ritchie Dam project. These funds will be used both to help rebuild damaged nuclear laboratories and to fulfill the Appalachian Regional Commission's contractual obligations for the Ritchie Dam project, which have recently increased in cost due to litigation over environmental concerns. This request would make available the entire \$214.5 million for these purposes.
- P.L. 106-429, the Foreign Operations, Export Financing, and Related Programs Appropriations Act, 2001, provided \$467.7 million in contingent emergency funding to support assistance for international disaster, development, and security needs. This funding will provide essential resources for humanitarian programs in the former Yugoslavia, disaster relief in southern Africa, debt reduction for poorer countries, and international military assistance in the Balkan region. This request would make available the entire \$467.7 million for these purposes.
- P.L. 106-291, the Department of the Interior and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001, provided \$12.0 million in contingent emergency funding to address invasive species infestation. These funds will be used to fight plagues of invasive insect species and prevent severe tree and timber losses. This request would make available the entire \$12.0 million for this purpose.

P.L. 106-346, the Department of Transportation and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2001, provided \$720.0 million in contingent emergency funding to reimburse States for emergency highway repairs. These resources will improve the Nation's transportation infrastructure by providing essential funding for emergency repairs on Federal-aid highways and roads damaged by natural disasters or catastrophic failures. This request would make available the entire \$720.0 million for this purpose.

I recommend that you designate the above requests totaling \$2,839.1 million, which are detailed in the enclosure to this letter, as emergency requirements in accordance with section 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended. No further congressional action will be required.

I have carefully reviewed these proposals and am satisfied that they are necessary at this time. Therefore, I join the heads of the affected Departments and agencies in recommending that you make the requested funds available by signing the enclosed letter to the Speaker of the House of Representatives. We will continue to review the additional contingent emergency funds provided in FY 2001 appropriations bills and plan to submit other recommendations as needs arise.
