• What is this thing?

- Standard on Disaster/Emergency
 Management and Business Continuity
 Programs
- Written for both the public and private sectors

- The History of NFPA 1600
 - Committee "Chartered" in 1991.
 - 1st document issued as a Recommended Practice in 1995.
 - Re-written and issued as a Standard in April 2000.

- The Standards-Making Process
 - Peer-Based
 - Voluntary
 - Overseen by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI)

- How an Idea Becomes an NFPA Document...
 - Person or organization identifies a need.
 - Need is presented to the NFPA Standards
 Council. If approved;
 - Technical Committee is organized.
 - Recommendation for new document is published in professional journals.
 - Committee meets to review proposals, develop its own proposals, and prepare report.

- Committee votes on proposals. If approved;
- Report on Proposal published for public review and comment.
- Committee meets to act on each public comment received.
- Committee votes on actions taken on public comments. If approved;
- Report on Comments published for public review.
- NFPA membership votes on Committee report or adopts document.

- How is the NFPA 1600 Committee Organized?
 - Users- those using the document
 - Enforcers- those that enforce standards
 - Special Experts- those who have special expertise in the scope of the document
 - Insurance-representatives of insurance companies or inspection agencies.
- Committee must have roughly equal numbers of each classification.

- Types of NFPA Documents-
 - Recommended Practice (you should)
 - Standard (you <u>must</u> or <u>shall</u>)
- NFPA 1600 is currently a standard
- Endorsed by IAEM, NEMA, and FEMA
- Currently in line with CAR

- Who does NFPA 1600 Apply to?
 - Any public or private entity that is required to develop emergency response plans by agency/company policy, legislation, regulation, or code.

- Does My Company, Jurisdiction or Agency have to Adopt NFPA 1600?
 - No. Adoption of any NFPA Standard is voluntary. However...
 - NFPA Standards are generally accepted as industry standards. In the unlikely event that your program ends up in court, it may be compared to it.

Scope

 Establishes a common set of criteria for disaster management, emergency management, and business continuity programs.

Purpose

 Provide criteria to assess current programs or to develop, implement, and maintain a program to mitigate, prepare for, respond to, and recover from disasters and emergencies.

• What is a disaster?

 How does this relate to emergency planning and/or business continuity planning?









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- Disaster can be a relative term
- Usually involves:
 - severe damage, injury, or loss of life
 - beyond the normal response resources of the entity
 - overwhelms local resources
 - has a long-term impact

- What is Required Under NFPA 1600?
 - Program Management
 - Policy
 - Program Coordinator
 - Program Committee
 - Program Assessment

Program Elements:

- Comply with existing laws and authorities
- Hazard identification and risk assessment
- Hazard mitigation strategy
- Resource management process
- Written Planning
- Direction, Control, and Coordination

Program Elements:

- Communications and Warning
- Operations and Procedures
- Logistics and Facilities
- Training
- Exercises, Evaluations, and Corrective Actions

- Program Elements:
 - Crisis Communications, Public Education, and Info
 - Finance and Administration

- Implications for Government EM Programs
 - NEMA has adopted NFPA 1600 as the basis of their Emergency Management Accreditation Program (EMAP)
 - Promoting continuous program improvement

- Future Development
 - Next revision starts in 2003
 - Task group on future alternative issues
 - Task group on business continuity
 - Currently surveying stakeholders
