Featured Cultural Content

<p>Tipping</p>	<p>It is culturally important in the US to “tip” or give extra money for certain services provided. For many people in the US, tipping is a way of ensuring and rewarding good service. The most common service providers Americans tip are in the food and beverage industry. Waiters, waitresses and bartenders rely on tips to earn a full wage. Federal law allows these positions to be paid less than the mandated minimum wage, assuming these people will earn tips. Waiters, waitresses and bartenders are expected to pay taxes on their total receipts, not the actual amount they are tipped. Not tipping them actually costs these servers money.</p> <p>Other service providers you may be expected to tip are hairdressers, manicurists, baggage handlers, taxi drivers, and delivery people. The average tip is between 15% and 20% of the cost of the service. So, if you pay \$10 for a pizza to be delivered to your house, you would normally tip about \$2. Some people even give extra large tips, if the service was exceptionally good, though that is not necessary.</p> <p>Who leaves tip can also be an issue. If several people are dining in restaurant together, but only one individual pays for the entire bill, you will often see those who didn’t pay the bill leaving the tip.</p> <p>Other cultures see tipping differently. For example, in many European restaurants, 10% to 15% has already been added to the restaurant bill. In Australia and New Zealand, tipping is frowned upon -- virtually non-existent. In South Africa, you’ll be expected to tip almost everyone.</p> <p>Studies have shown that countries made up of more extroverted individuals tip a greater number of different service providers and also tipped the largest amounts. The U.S. is at the top of both of those categories. Studies suggest that tipping is seen as an incentive for getting extra attention or special service.</p>	
<p>Americans and their Cars</p>	<p>America has had a love affair with automobiles for over a hundred years now. When the first automobiles became available in the early 1900’s, the US was still a very young country. This could account for why cars have had such an impact on American culture. Today, in the US, there are many more registered cars than there are registered drivers.</p> <p>Henry Ford’s Model T first brought the automobile to the American middle class citizens. It was the first vehicle to be “mass produced” allowing Ford to sell it for less money than other automobile makers. By the 1950’s younger and younger people could afford to own cars of their own. It seemed everyone had a car. Soon entire industries were created around the car, like drive-in restaurants, car washes and drive-in theaters.</p> <p>Cars have become more than just a mode of transportation; they are often the way Americans promote their individual style. Some people choose “muscle cars” because they are sleek and fast.</p>	

	<p>Status cars are always very expensive; with many of them being European models. American status cars tend to be very large. Today many people even customize their cars with special paint, wheels, chrome, stereos and other accessories.</p> <p>Cars are celebrated in American songs, movies, and television shows. Even small towns have local car shows featuring restored or customized cars. People build and collect model cars and others have huge collections of actual cars. It is said that Jay Leno of the tonight show has over 80 classic cars and four full time employees to take care of them. He even has an antique fire truck!</p>
