## Clean boats = Clean waters

Prevent aquatic hitchhikers from catching a ride on your boat and equipment.....

**Zebra Mussels in the West!!** Mature zebra mussels look like small D-shaped clams. Their yellowish-brown shells have alternating light and dark stripes. Average length is often one inch or less.

Zebra Mussels are changing water resources across most of the nation and have now invaded the west. The filter feeding mussel colonies process large quantities of water. This water filtering action and the physical build-up of colonies negatively alters aquatic ecosystem functions.

Zebra Mussels have traveled across the United States with boaters like you and me!! Mussels and mussel eggs often attach themselves to boat and equipment surfaces. They are now established in some of America's most popular rivers and destinations.

- Inspect & Remove aguatic plants and animals
- > Dispose of unwanted bait and trash
- > Drain water
- Dry boat for 5 days OR
- Rinse boat and equipment with hot &/or high pressure water
