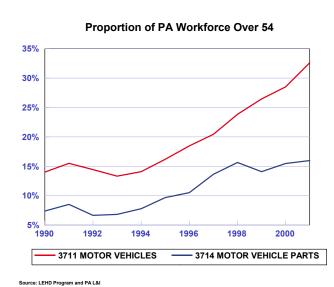

Labor Force Composition



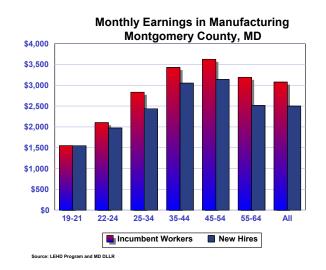
The data can be used to identify industry trends—such as the age of the workforce—to better inform training decisions. This chart, for Pennsylvania, shows:

- The proportion of the automobile manufacturing workforce nearing retirement age has more than doubled in the past decade.
- Over one third of the workforce is likely to retire in the next ten years.

Local Earnings Patterns

The new data can also help inform employers about local labor market conditions:

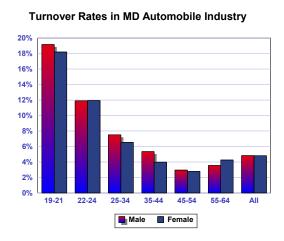
- How much new hires—of different ages—are earning
- The earnings of incumbent workers
- And the relationship between the two—one potential measure of labor market shortages.
