Preface

The National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) collects data, directs analyses, and publishes information concerning the condition of education in the United States. In this role, NCES has collected secondary school transcripts since 1982, starting with the High School and Beyond longitudinal study. A great deal of power exists within transcript data to serve policy concerns, at both national and local levels.

Discussions about how to use and analyze transcripts inevitably include how to classify and measure individual courses and how to aggregate and measure groups of courses in a meaningful way. The Secondary School Taxonomy (SST) was developed in the 1980s as a framework for aggregating and analyzing transcript data and has since been used to monitor the nation's progress toward meeting national goals for student course-taking in academic and vocational subjects, as well as overall trends in course-taking in America's high schools.

This report is the first published update of the SST since it was first developed. Along with the companion guide, *Procedures Guide for Transcript Studies*, it is hoped that this report can facilitate better and more accurate comparisons of local, state, and national data, leading to a greater use of transcripts for policy, research, and practice.

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Chapter 1 Introduction

Introduction

The courses high school students take and the outcomes associated with their course-taking are a long-standing interest of national education surveys. One of the most accurate and complete sources of information on courses taken, grades awarded, credits earned, and other related data is the student transcript. The High School and Beyond (HS&B) study, which surveyed national samples of 1980 high school sophomores and seniors, was the first survey conducted by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) to collect high school transcript data. Subsequently, NCES collected high school transcripts along with the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) and as part of the National Education Longitudinal Study of 1988 (NELS:88).

The value of transcript data has become quite apparent to researchers and policymakers. Transcripts provide a detailed record of what courses students took and when, much more accurately than students can recollect. Information on grades and credits earned is also much more precise, either because students cannot remember exactly what they accomplished or because their memories reflect wishes more than reality. Furthermore, transcripts frequently provide other useful information, such as test scores or confirmation of high school graduation, that is not readily available elsewhere. Finally, when using transcript data directly, researchers are often better able to resolve such technical problems as reconciling different grading scales (for example, letter grades versus numeric grades) or computing comparable estimates of credits earned in courses offered by schools on a quarter or trimester system rather than those using semesters.

When reviewing transcripts in NCES surveys, one must begin by considering some of the primary uses of the data and analyses. Over the past 15 years, NCES transcript information has figured prominently in policy and research. While practitioners have probably used national transcript data less than researchers and policymakers, transcripts are nevertheless an important

component of administrative records at the local level. Transcript data can provide useful information on a number of questions that concern policymakers and educators, such as the following:

- What courses do high school students take, and how many courses do they take in each of the major subject areas—math, science, English, and so on?
- How many units do high school students accumulate over their high school careers, both in the aggregate and within subject areas, and have these totals changed over time?
- To what extent do course offerings reflect academic and industry skill standards established by national and state efforts to define curriculum objectives more clearly?
- How does the breadth and depth of course offerings vary among high schools? Have these offerings changed over time, and if so, how?
- To what extent do students pursue the higher level, more challenging courses in the high school curriculum, and have any of these patterns changed over time?
- To what extent do students engage in a coherent program of academic or vocational study, as opposed to dabbling in a wide range of unrelated or low-level courses?
- How do answers to any of these questions vary according to the characteristics of high school students or the communities in which they reside?

In order to further improve the usefulness and accuracy of transcript data, NCES requested a review of the procedures it uses to collect, analyze, and report information from high school transcripts. This project's wide-ranging discussions and research concerning transcript data and the opportunities and challenges they present during collection, compilation, analysis, and use have resulted in two papers. This paper, *The 1998 Revision of the Secondary School Taxonomy*, concerns the framework used for aggregating individual course offerings when analyzing transcript data. A companion paper, *Procedures Guide for Transcript Studies*, sets forth a set of standard procedures for conducting secondary school transcript analyses with NCES data.

Organization of the Paper

The 1998 Revision of the Secondary School Taxonomy begins by presenting the reasons for revising the Secondary School Taxonomy (SST), the primary framework used in NCES analyses of high school transcript data. Chapter 2 provides greater coverage of the taxonomy itself—its

background, structure, coding conventions, and use, ending with an outline of the revised SST. Chapter 3 will be of interest primarily to those familiar with the "old" SST because it explains the changes have been made in the revised SST. Chapters 4 and 5 contain the SST itself, filled with the course codes that make it a usable taxonomy, with chapter 4 using codes and sample course titles from the Classification of Secondary School Courses, and chapter 5 using course codes and titles from the Standard National Course Classification System. Each chapter begins with a brief introduction to these course classification systems to help users who are unfamiliar with their structures. Appendix A lists the analysts and educators who assisted with this task, and Appendix B uses data from the National Education Longitudinal Study of 1988 to provide examples of the changes brought about by the revisions. Appendix C details the relocation of course code assignments that resulted from revisions, enabling analysts to connect the old and new versions of the taxonomy.

Impetus for the Revision

NCES had several goals when it asked analysts and educators to convene as a professional work group to discuss high school transcript data and how they might be used to their full advantage: it hoped to share information about current practice among staff and contractors; to gain input from researchers, policymakers, and educators on the most effective ways to analyze its transcripts; and to increase data consistency across the publications produced by the various divisions within NCES. Guided by these goals, the group of convened experts determined some of the overriding issues that needed attention by the analysts working on the revision.

Capitalizing on Educational Trends

As a framework for analyzing patterns, determining relationships, and exposing trends in course-taking behaviors, a taxonomy must be able to reflect the curricula offered within the nation's schools. Several education reform movements have been promoted since the SST was developed a decade ago. Although it is perhaps too early to tell whether the changes made to course curricula as a result of these efforts will last, information regarding the prevalence and results of these changes is needed to further inform policymaking. Because the taxonomy should reflect current practice, the researchers and consultants working on the revision were charged with paying particular attention to recent and emerging curriculum changes. Included among the specific issues addressed in the revision of the SST were efforts to integrate material both within

and across traditional subject matter, development of new courses and content based on national standards projects, and increasing use of higher technology within schools. Certainly, not all of the educational trends occurring throughout the United States were discussed, and not all of the trends that were identified generated changes in the SST. It was important to weigh the desire to reflect emerging trends and recent innovations against the need for stable historical trend data.

Desire for Greater Detail

Members of the professional work group and other advisors raised questions about the possibility of having greater detail reflected in the SST categories. Researchers who use student-level NCES data (as opposed to the course-level data) work with credit totals of the SST code categories, not the individual and more specific course codes. If the level of aggregation is too great, important detail is lost and desired distinctions cannot be made. This desire for greater detail concerned Advanced Placement (AP) work for college (as defined by the College Board), cooperative or work experience courses in the vocational curriculum, and more or further topical categorizations within both the academic and vocational curricula. Chapter 3 contains a fuller discussion of these concerns.

Correcting Misplacements

Individual researchers performing transcript analyses under contract to the government have access not only to the SST codes but also to individual course codes. Several of these contractors have felt the need to make alterations to the SST during their analyses. Some of these changes have been felt necessary due to perceived errors in judgment during the development of the SST. For example, in the original SST, English as a Second Language courses were placed within the Foreign Language subject area. The revision process needed to address courses such as these, which may have been mis- or ill-placed. Other, less obvious concerns were added to the list of possible revisions. In particular, the researchers had differing opinions about the placement of several specific courses. A reasonable person could argue that some of the religion courses (contained within the Personal/Other category in the original SST) should be placed in academic areas (such as English or Social Studies), since they may involve the study of the literature of a certain religion or a comparison of the effect of different religious beliefs on different peoples rather than the study of religion per se. The revision process involved reviewing the original

course codes, double-checking all course descriptions, and carefully determining their proper placement within the SST.

Consistency Among NCES reports

A desire for consistency and accuracy across various analyses of transcript studies was another strong impetus for developing the revised SST and its companion *Procedures Guide for Transcript Studies*. As the Department of Education's main source of statistics regarding educational trends and outcomes, NCES needs to ensure that information published and disseminated from its various divisions, if based on the same data, results in the same estimates and conclusions. In recent years, NCES has contracted with several firms to conduct analyses of transcript data. However, these contractors have not always used the same procedures in performing their work.

As with the original development of the SST, educators as well as researchers with experience and expertise in transcript data research served as consultants for the project. (Members of the professional work group are listed in appendix A.) These consultants provided feedback on the taxonomy itself in addition to providing guidance regarding innovations and trends. As a result, many believe that the SST can serve as the foundation for future transcript studies, leading to more consistent analyses and estimates among NCES publications. In addition, as national statistics become more standardized, state and local education agencies can begin to use the same taxonomy in order to compare their local-level data with national outcomes and benchmarks.

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Chapter 2 The Secondary School Taxonomy

Background

Developed in 1987, the Secondary School Taxonomy (SST) is a framework for analyzing transcript data. Researchers working on the National Assessment of Vocational Education (NAVE) created the SST as an organizational tool to distinguish academic coursework from vocational coursework and to separate both from other types of coursework. The taxonomy is a way of aggregating secondary school coursework into categories that enable people to think about course-taking patterns more clearly, analyze more effectively, and draw conclusions more succinctly than they could without such an organizing structure. The SST has since become a primary vehicle for structuring analyses of transcript data resulting from longitudinal studies conducted by NCES. Prior to the publication of this report, the SST remained essentially unchanged since its initial development.

As a taxonomy—organizing individual courses into aggregate categories—the SST depends upon an underlying course classification system. It is not, however, a course classification system itself. The creators of the SST used the Classification of Secondary School Courses (CSSC) as the foundation of the taxonomy, but intended it to facilitate comparisons over time and serve as a bridge across several transcript data sets, regardless of the classification system used to code individual courses. Because NAVE analyses used the High School and Beyond (HS&B) 1980 Sophomore Cohort Transcript file, and courses within that file had been coded with the CSSC, the choice of the CSSC as the underlying system of the SST was a given. Although the CSSC is still the only course classification system used by NCES in longitudinal studies of secondary students, another system has been developed through its pilot stage: the Standard National Course Classification System (SNCC). As presented in this report (in chapters 4 and 5), the revised SST can be applied to both the CSSC and the SNCC.

Structure of the SST


At its highest (most aggregated) level, the revised SST divides high school coursework into four distinct curricula: Academic, Vocational, Enrichment/Other, and Special Education. These four categories maintain the distinctions made in the original SST between traditional academic

courses, courses in the vocational/technical curriculum, courses believed to be designed for students' personal enrichment, and courses specifically categorized as those designed for students with individual education plans. At this level, the SST provides the ability to collapse coursework into just a few areas, making it relatively easy to analyze trends in and trade-offs between large categories of course taking (such as academic and vocational).

In turn, these four curricular areas contain more specific subject areas with a coherent theme or similar content. The subject area categories within the academic curriculum—Mathematics, Science, English, Social Studies, Fine Arts, and Non-English Languages—mirror the traditional departments found in most American high schools. Within the vocational curriculum, the three areas include Family and Consumer Sciences, General Labor Market Preparation, and Specific Labor Market Preparation. The Enrichment/Other curriculum area categorizes courses into the subject areas of General Skills; Health, Physical, and Recreational Education; Religion and Theology; and Military Science. The Special Education curriculum is the only curriculum area in the SST without more specific subject area categories contained within it. Figure 2.1 illustrates the taxonomy's main curricular and subject areas.

Within the subject area categories of the academic curriculum, the SST organizes courses by topic and, where appropriate, by level of difficulty. The majority of the vocational course titles lie within the Specific Labor Market Preparation (SLMP) category. Within the SLMP category of the vocational curriculum, the SST creates further topical specializations and then organizes courses in a somewhat sequential nature: first course, second or later course in sequence, specialty course, and cooperative or work experience courses. Of the other two categories within the vocational curriculum, the Family and Consumer Sciences category is organized in a sequential manner, while the General Labor Market Preparation (GLMP) category has a topical organization. Other than the General Skills category, which is organized by topics into Enrichment, Assistance, and Service, the subject area categories of the Enrichment/Other curriculum area have no further organizing features. The only changes made to the SST in these major categories were to the SLMPs; previous SLMP categories of the SST are in greyscale in figure 2.1.

SST Coding

The alphanumeric coding of the SST roughly follows a modified outline format, but does contain a few irregularities. The four main curricula are noted as Arabic numerals: 1, 2, 3, and 4; the subject areas that further categorize coursework are also noted as Arabic numerals: 1, 2, 3, and so on. An underscore separates these two numbers. The main categories within the academic curricula (such as Science) are further divided into topics (such as survey science, biological science, chemistry, physics, earth science, physical science, and engineering). These further topical divisions are also marked by a number (creating 1_21, 1_22, and 1_23, continuing the science example). In general, the coding algorithm dictates that ending numbers (1, 2, 3, and so on) denote different "types" of courses, and ending letters (A, B, C, and so forth) denote "levels" of courses. For example, 1 64 indicates courses within the academic curricula (because the first digit equals 1), within the sixth subject area (Science), and further within a topical area; 1_64B would denote courses within a topical area that had been further separated into levels of difficulty. Within the academic curricula, the levels are usually basic, regular, advanced/honors, specialized topics, and Advanced Placement/International Baccalaureate (AP/IB); within the vocational curricula, the levels are first course, second (or later) course, specialty course, and coop/work experience. The levels for Non-English Languages assume that successive years of the same language increase in difficulty.

As mentioned, a few irregularities exist. The first exception concerns the English category. Although the first digit is appropriately followed by numbers denoting topical areas within English and then followed by letters denoting levels, English survey coursework is again differentiated by year. Therefore, although taxonomy codes for English survey end in a number, there is a much more intricate categorization than is usually the case for codes ending with a number.

The vocational curriculum has an additional letter immediately following its first numeral (2), making the beginning format of these codes different from the rest of the taxonomy coding. However, this additional level of coding for the three main areas of the vocational curriculum (Family and Consumer Sciences, GLMP, and SLMP) keeps the meaning of the coding structure consistent for most of the categories and courses within the vocational curriculum (those within SLMPs). Because of the additional letter following the numeral 2 within the vocational curricula, this portion of the SST can follow a normal outline format and have SST codes ending with

numbers still denoting topical areas, while those ending with letters indicating levels. A few categories within the SLMP categories (Business, Trade and Industry, and Technology and Communications) are divided into topical areas before dividing again by level.

The SST is an exclusive and strict hierarchical taxonomy. As an exclusive taxonomy, courses may be placed in one and only one category. As a strict hierarchical taxonomy, courses must be placed within one of the most specific categories possible. In other words, a course cannot simply belong to the Physics category; it must also be placed within one of the levels within Physics. Of course, if further topical areas or levels do not exist (such as with Military Science or Engineering), then the course obviously must remain at a higher level. However, where there is such specificity, further placement must be made. The strict hierarchical nature of the SST has both benefits and limitations. Analyses using the SST will always have the whole equal to the sum of its parts: adding up the credits earned by students in all levels of physics courses will equal the total number of credits earned by students in the Physics category (barring rounding errors). Likewise, adding up the credits earned by students in all types of science courses will equal the total number of credits earned by students in the Science category. This strict nature of the SST has at least one drawback: unusual courses are sometimes difficult to place. To alleviate this problem, several of the categories include "Other" as an option and most of the remaining subject areas have "specialized topics" or "specialty courses" where unusual courses can be placed.

Use of the SST

The design of frameworks for analyzing transcript data is determined, in part, by the research questions and policy issues that particular analyses are intended to address. Although originally developed primarily as an analytic tool to determine the prevalence of and patterns in vocational coursetaking, the SST has also been used to monitor the nation's progress toward meeting national goals for student coursetaking in academic subjects, as well as more general trends in coursetaking in America's high schools. In revising the SST, the developers sought to make the taxonomy even more flexible for informing a variety of policy concerns, such as monitoring the prevalence of advanced, honors, and Advanced Placement (AP) coursework; trends in completing the curriculum promoted as the New Basics; and so on. The SST is a valuable, flexible tool for analyzing patterns that discriminate between students, determining the

relationships between particular course-taking patterns and labor market or postsecondary outcomes, and exploring educational trends.

While the SST is designed to accommodate a wide range of concerns, it cannot anticipate all present and future uses of transcript data. The current and revised SST are both based on the CSSC course coding and primarily exploit the information that these codes provide. As such, the SST is also constrained by the same information. If other, more detailed course coding systems gain widespread acceptance and use, a different taxonomy (or features added to the revised taxonomy) might be able to capitalize on the information provided by these codes. For example, an expressed interest in service learning or learning opportunities outside the school building (such as internships or other types of work-based learning) could be explored if course codes denoted a dependence upon these pedagogies or learning activities within the course itself. Currently, the CSSC does not provide this level of detail. Given the wide variations in subject coverage, teaching expertise, and opportunities within given communities, questions regarding such innovative efforts as service learning and work-based opportunities may best be addressed at the local level. Alternative, specialized taxonomies may need to be designed to address issues that the SST cannot currently handle.

Outline of the Revised SST

The outline on the following pages presents the SST framework. Although not a usable taxonomy unless filled with actual courses, this outline provides users with the major and minor categories into which secondary school coursework has been divided.

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Chapter 3 Revisions

Throughout the revision process, the role of the SST in monitoring trends in coursetaking created a dilemma. On the one hand, interest in understanding change is sometimes best served by maintaining strict comparability between studies—that is, using the same definitions, adopting similar frameworks, and following identical procedures. On the other hand, capturing good information on change may require creating new frameworks and instituting new features to reflect innovation and, therefore, may undermine strict comparisons with information collected earlier. The revisions that were made to the SST strike a delicate balance between these trade-offs. Appendix B presents how these changes affect course-taking patterns, using data from the 1990 First Follow-up of the National Education Longitudinal Study (NELS); readers will note some, but not drastic, change. This chapter presents the major revisions made to the Secondary School **Taxonomy** by curriculum area—Academic, Vocational. and Enrichment/Other—and then discusses changes that affect the taxonomy as a whole.

Academic Expansion

Primarily, the major changes made within the academic curriculum area of the SST involved moving English as a Second Language (ESL) coursework from the previous Foreign Language subject area (now termed Non-English Languages) to the English subject area; expanding a number of subcategories in the Social Studies, Science, and Mathematics subject areas; and making category changes to the Fine Arts and Non-English Languages subject areas. Figure 3.1 shows how the revised SST Academic curriculum is organized.

English

As mentioned in Chapter 1, original placement of English as a Second Language (ESL) coursework within the subject area of Foreign Languages was deemed no longer appropriate. As part of the revision process, ESL coursework was moved to the English subject area. A reasonable argument could be made for distributing ESL courses among the other English survey courses, as they are helping students learn the skills and techniques of the English language, including reading/literature, writing/composition, and speaking skills/vocabulary. However, for practical analytic work, ESL coursework is a category of interest in and of itself, and for that reason, ESL remains as a subcategory of its own within the English subject area.

The revised SST will now allow researchers to combine English survey courses either by grade or by level. English survey courses are those designed to teach the entire subject of language arts, providing instruction in reading and interpreting literature, writing technique (including grammar) and style, listening skills, and speaking skills. The original SST divided types of courses mainly by grade, using the categories of remedial, grades 7 and 8, grade 9, grade 10, grade 11, and grade 12, with an extra category for AP coursework. The revised SST creates more distinctions, separating CSSC codes based on level as well. In other words, the taxonomy separates courses using the categories of Exceptional/Special Education (ESE)/Functional, Basic, Regular, and Advanced/Honors, and then contains further distinctions by grade. This greater detail is available only for the four main grades of secondary school, and only for English survey coursework. Literature, composition and writing, speech, and English as a second language courses, although having their own categories within the English subject area, do not offer further specialization. In creating the more detailed subcategories, the coursework in the old Remedial English and Language/Writing skills categories were moved to grade- and levelspecific subcategories where possible and appropriate. Some courses in each of these categories were not grade-specific; they were combined together, and the resulting subcategory renamed Language Skills.

Changes made to the Social Studies subject area, although large in scope, are quite simple. One series of revisions concerned adding more detail by dividing the courses within the Social Sciences, Humanities, and Other subcategory into more specific topical areas (for example, Economics, Behavioral Sciences, and Geography were created as additional subcategories). One of the benefits of breaking up this subcategory is that the prevalence of coursetaking in geography can now be seen, which is important because one of the national goals set in 1994 under the *Goals 2000: Educate America Act* explicitly concerns geographical knowledge. In addition, courses in the Social Sciences, Humanities, and Other subcategory concerning public

administration, public protection, education, and communication or mass media were moved into the appropriate vocational SLMP categories.² The other series of revisions within this subject area involved creating more categories that reflected the level of courses within a topical subcategory. Although the CSSC does not contain codes for all levels of courses within all of the subcategories, the professional work group felt that the structure of the SST should, for the most part, be parallel.

Science

The original arrangement of the topical subcategories within the Science subject area combined a number of foundation science courses traditionally offered to freshmen (such as physical or earth science) with other courses that provided more of an overview of several science topics. According to the research completed by one professional work group member, 75 percent of students take physical science, earth science, or the first year of unified science as their foundation science course.³ This combination was broken up and the topical subcategories of Earth Science and Physical Science were created. This change has the additional advantage of more closely aligning the science subcategories with the subscales of the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP). Of the courses that remained within the Survey Science and Other subcategory, integrated science and unified science courses were placed within a new subcategory to better inform the growth of science courses created in response to the academic standards movement.⁴

The other major revision made to the Science subject area concerned engineering courses. The earlier version of the SST placed these courses within Physics, and certainly, as physics is a body of knowledge that concerns matter and energy and the interaction between the two, this placement is justified. However, as one advisor commented, "At some level, all science is physics. Physics is the study of the processes and phenomena of matter and energy; what else is there?" For the purposes of the taxonomy and the analytic work that would result from its use, members of the work group felt that moving engineering coursework out of the Physics subcategory into its own subcategory was wise. Although the possibility of placing engineering coursework within the vocational curriculum was raised, there was consensus to have it remain in the Science subject area within the academic curriculum. Although the number of course codes moved from Physics to Engineering is substantial, the proportion of students receiving credit in these courses is quite small (see appendix B). The few engineering courses that had been in the Survey Science subcategory were also moved to the new Engineering subcategory.

Mathematics

Revisions made to the Mathematics subject area revolved around nomenclature (in order to more aptly describe the courses within each topical subcategory); coding (to make the mathematics coding consistent with the rest of the SST coding structure); the development of additional subcategories (to provide greater detail on topical subcategories); and the movement of computer coursework to the vocational curriculum. In the original SST, some types of computer coursework had been placed in I1C: Mathematics, Applied.⁶ This applied category was deleted (see the later section entitled "Changes Discussed but Not Made" for a review of the reasoning), necessitating placement of the computer courses within another subcategory.

The experts and advisors who were consulted believed that the original placement of these six computer science courses in the Mathematics subject area was due more to the fact that computer science was and is often taught by educators within mathematics departments than to issues of content. Although computer science courses taught at the postsecondary level include mathematical concepts, courses at the high school level are more typically focused on learning a programming language for simple tasks or problem solving using pre-written packages. The consensus of the work group led to including computer science coursework with the computer technology coursework already in the vocational SLMP category of Technology and Communications. The placement of computer coursework in that SLMP category has the further advantage of placing most computer coursework within one area, making it more readily available when conducting research on the New Basics curriculum.

Review of the other courses within the old Mathematics, Applied and Mathematics, Advanced subcategories prompted the creation of several new topical subcategories. Courses within the Applied subcategory were distributed among the General Mathematics, Consumer Mathematics; and Occupationally-Related Mathematics subcategories (in addition to the computer science course distribution discussed above). Unified Mathematics was created to hold the unified coursework, previously distributed among the Algebra 1, Geometry, and Advanced Mathematics—Algebra subcategories.

The previous version of the SST based the primary divisions within this subject area on year (first year of a language course, second year of a language course, and so on). An alternative categorization based on language was also available. These two organizational methods were combined during the revision, creating categories within the subject area of Non-English Languages that are based on the language being taught, and then subcategories within each language, based on year. Using "year" as the subcategories is equivalent to the use of "level" within other subject areas, assuming that each successive year of language instruction becomes more advanced. One additional language (Italian) is used as a category. Although work group members discussed the possibility of including other languages as categories, the percentage of students receiving credit in all languages other than Spanish, French, German, Latin, and Italian totaled less than 1 percent. Therefore, only those five languages are specified in the revised taxonomy. (The remaining languages are included under "Other.")

Lastly, one separation was made within the Fine Arts category. In the original SST, drama and dance coursework were combined into one category; the revised SST makes the distinction between the two types of courses clear.

Vocational Expansion


The major changes made within the vocational curriculum area of the SST involved adding a Cooperative/Work Experience category in each SLMP category and disaggregating several SLMP categories. These revisions were made to retain finer detail regarding the types of coursework involved and, in some cases, to establish a better relationship to the clusters being developed by the National Skill Standards Boards. On the following pages, figure 3.7 illustrates the revised SST vocational curriculum and figure 3.8 compares the SLMP categories of the old and revised SST.

Cooperative/Work Experience Coursework

As a result of Tech-Prep programs and programmatic changes created in response to the School-to-Work Opportunities Act, more students are being offered the opportunity to gain competency in a work-based setting. High schools are offering students credit for internships and coordinated classroom learning through off-site experience, in addition to the more traditional cooperative education courses. The School-to-Work Opportunities Act specifically encourages work-based learning, and although the intent is to encourage all types of learning experiences outside of the traditional educational setting, most students have access to these experiences through the vocational curriculum. The desire to monitor and report the proportions of high school students earning credit in cooperative and work experience-type courses necessitated that in the SST they be separated from the other vocational coursework categories. Before the revision, cooperative coursework was placed in the appropriate "2nd (or later)" subcategory or within the GLMP, Work Experience/ Career Exploration subcategory). A Co-op/Work Experience level was added to all the SLMP subcategories to identify these courses exclusive of any other coursework.

Detailing of Several SLMPs

Viewed from the perspective of resulting SST codes, Technology and Communications as a vocational subject area and Precision Production as a subcategory within Trade and Industry both masked important detail. Coursework within Technology and Communications (or, "Technical and Communication," as it was titled originally) ranged from computer programming courses to broadcast management and television production to robotics technology. Not only did the aggregation of all of these courses into one SLMP mask important distinctions, but it also made comparisons to international statistics difficult. During the revision process, this single SLMP category was divided into three subcategories: Computer Technology, Communications Technology, and Other Technologies in order to reflect the content of the courses contained within it.

The subcategory of Precision Production had the same problem of obscuring the variety of courses contained within it, although perhaps to a lesser degree. Although vocational educators may be aware that precision production includes printing and drafting as well as machining, metalwork, and other kinds of processing that produce goods and materials within low tolerances, policymakers may not know this, much less the general public. By disaggregating this subcategory during the revision process, comparisons may be made over time regarding students' movement toward or away from the printing and manufacturing industries.

Changes to SLMPs

During the past five to seven years, there have been several developments that may have major implications for how best to conceive the overall organizing framework for SLMPs. In 1991, the America 2000 strategy called for "business and labor to adopt a strategy to establish job-related skill standards built around core proficiencies and to develop skill certificates to accompany these standards." The National Skill Standards Act of 1994 established the National Skill Standards Board (NSSB) to "stimulate the development and adoption of a voluntary national system of skill standards and of assessment and certification of attainment of skill standards." To carry out its mandate, NSSB is contracting with a variety of industry and research groups for projects to refine and test the voluntary skill standards system. The projects build upon the work completed by 22 organizations funded in 1992 and 1993 by the U.S. Departments of Labor and Education.

To guide this development work, the NSSB has developed 15 industry clusters or sectors that will provide the basic framework for developing skill standards in the future. Together these 15 clusters account for virtually all paid employment in the American economy and reflect a desire to conceive of workforce preparation much more broadly than the relatively narrow, occupationally-specific framework that has characterized vocational education and employment training.

Responding to the NSSB initiative as well as to other stimuli for programmatic change, many states have also begun reorganizing vocational education and other workforce preparation offerings under different rubrics of broadly defined career majors or clusters. To date, about 38 states have adopted some new form of industry clusters or career majors. While these state efforts typically use some of the categories developed by NSSB, few states have adopted the NSSB categories without modification, and there is considerable variation among states in the specific approach taken.

A critical issue, therefore, is whether the SST should be modified to reflect these new directions. While these trends are likely to have major implications for program definition, course specification, and curriculum content over the next decade, there is as yet no clear, relatively uniform structure that has emerged that would justify changing the SST at this time.



Consequently, it would be premature for the SST to adopt the NSSB taxonomy entirely. Some changes, however, appear to be appropriate, and the proposed SST contains new categories of Public and Protective Services (with a number of courses moved from the Social Studies, Humanities, and Other category), Personal and Other Services, Food Service and Hospitality, and Child Care and Education (including a number of courses moved from the Social Studies, Humanities, and Other category). These closely resemble some the NSSB clusters. Additionally, as displayed by Figure 3.11, it should not prove too difficult to "crosswalk" the revised SST to the NSSB framework.²

At this time, one additional change was made: the elimination of Occupational Home Economics as a discrete category and the assignment of these programs to existing occupational or industry clusters that more accurately reflect the purpose and content of these offerings. This category, which dates back at least to the late 1960s when it was used by the U.S. Office of Education to distinguish consumer and homemaking offerings from related programs that had paid employment as their primary objective (for example, a program training child care workers), is no longer used in most states. Rather, the course offerings have been organized under related industry occupational or industry clusters such as personal services, food services, or education. This practice communicates much more clearly the purpose and content of the particular program.

Addition of Technology Education

Technology Education, as a field, has grown in the 1990s with a subsequent increase in coursework offered in middle and secondary schools. Technology Education aims to expose all students to technology and to develop a foundation and an understanding about technology in contemporary society: how technology works, the basic principles supporting it, and its uses and effects. The courses are not vocationally or occupationally oriented, nor do they have the same educational objectives as industrial arts courses. Most of the curriculum stemming from this movement is directed toward students in middle schools and in the 9th and 10th grades. In the original SST, technology education courses did not have a separate designation; analysts have placed these courses in Introductory Industrial Arts. However, this placement miscasts the intent of these courses. The revision adds Technology Education as a category within General Labor Market Preparation, correcting this placement and also enabling the growth of secondary technology education coursework to be monitored through future studies.

Enrichment/Other Expansion

The third curriculum area of the SST contains Enrichment and Other courses: general skills courses typically taught as electives within secondary schools; health and physical education-related courses; religion and theology courses that are mainly found in private schools; and courses that provide an introduction to and exploration of military organization and training. Although the reviewers studied the descriptions of these courses to determine whether any should be moved to one of the other curriculum areas, all but 7 of the courses that were previously in this area remained there. The major change within this curriculum area involved the further separation of courses included in the General Skills subject area. This separation enables researchers to distinguish between courses providing Enrichment, such as a study dynamics or a mentorship class; courses providing Assistance, such as tutorial classes and dropout prevention programs; and Service courses, in which students are providing a service to either the school or the surrounding community. Although there was interest in separating physical education and health courses, this distinction could not be clearly drawn. Although sometimes offered as separate courses, health and physical education are often combined into one course in high school, and separating them would be difficult, if not impossible.

Special Education

The fourth curriculum area, Special Education, originally contained all course codes designating courses designed for students who had Individual Education Plans or participate in special education programs. However, it was felt that as the taxonomy is based on content, not methodology, special education courses should be placed in one of the other curriculum areas where possible, within the appropriate subject areas. During the revision process, eighteen courses were moved from this curriculum area into specific subject areas and subcategories as warranted. The courses remaining in Special Education are those courses whose content is unspecified (for example, Self-Contained EH and Resource).

Changes Throughout the Taxonomy

AP/IB Coursework

Advanced Placement (AP) coursework, as developed by the College Board and International Baccalaureate (IB) coursework, as developed by the International Baccalaureate Office, are courses with defined and specific objectives that prepare students for AP and IB exams. Students passing these exams at certain levels of performance are eligible for college credit or advanced standing in many colleges and universities. Because of the desire to monitor and report the proportions of high school students earning credit in these specific types of advanced courses, it was necessary that they be separated from the other advanced and honors coursework offered in most of the nation's secondary schools. An AP/IB level was added to all the appropriate subcategories to capture these courses exclusive of any other coursework.

Nomenclature

Several SST subject area, category, and subcategory names were changed to describe the coursework contained within them more appropriately. For example, *Non-English Languages* replaced *Foreign Language* as a subject area title. This replacement was the only change made to major subject area titles. *American Government and Politics* was changed to the more inclusive *Government and Politics*, given that the study of other political systems is also included within this category. *Visual Arts* replaced *Fine Arts and Crafts* within the Fine Arts subject area, to communicate that Dance and Theater Arts (the other two subcategories within the Fine Arts subject area) are also fine arts. In addition, *Drama* was changed to *Theater Arts* during the revision. The vocational area of *Consumer and Homemaking Education* was updated to *Family*

and Consumer Sciences Education. As SLMP categories within the vocational curriculum, Health became Health Care to more easily distinguish the coursework involving the health care profession from the health coursework that typically complements physical education, and Technical and Communications became Technology and Communications. Only two subcategory names were changed: Business Services replaced Business Support within the Business SLMP, and Mechanics and Repair replaced Mechanics and Repairers within the Trade and Industry SLMP. Lastly, Enrichment/Other is now the title of the curriculum previously called Personal/Other.

Movement of Individual Courses

The need for revision stemmed not only from the desire to make SST divisions more useful for policy research but also from the perception that some courses were misplaced in the original SST. Major changes have already been discussed, but some individual courses were also moved based on a study of their CSSC code course description. Table 3.1 presents courses that were moved not as a result of changes to the SST structure or categories, but as a result of individual study of their descriptions. Most (but not all) of the changes concerned vocational coursework. A number of vocational courses moved from the specialty course category to 1st course or 2nd (or later) course categories based on the addition of CSSC codes. In the original development of the SST, vocational courses that were not part of an obvious sequence were placed in the Specialty course category. Some of these courses now have an "advanced" course that students can move up to. In developing the Child Care and Education, Food Service and Hospitality, and Personal and Other Services SLMP categories, a number of courses were shifted within the vocational curriculum. Lastly, a number of vocationally applied academic courses were moved from the vocational areas to the appropriate academic areas. Table 3.1 lists the course codes, titles, and the subject areas they were moved to and from, and is organized by the subject areas in which the courses are presently placed. The following table is only a subset of the changes that have taken place; Appendix C presents all 674 changes that were made during the revision.

Changes Discussed but Not Made

The professional work group wrestled extensively with the idea of levels and topical categories, as well as with the differences between a taxonomy based on content versus pedagogy. These issues apply throughout the taxonomy and throughout the revision process itself, but are possibly most evident within the Mathematics and Science subject areas. Essentially, the SST relies on course content to create distinctions between coursework; in other words, the content of a course determines whether it is placed in the academic or vocational curricula, into specific subject areas, and further into topical subcategories. Therefore, a subcategory such as "applied" created a true dilemma.

If a subcategory exists that purports to contain courses taught in an applied manner, by implication, courses outside of that category are "nonapplied." However, as the movement to make academic courses more applied grows, increasingly courses are being taught using application of academic concepts to the workplace and to everyday situations and problems. For instance, algebra, physics, and biology can all be taught in an applied manner while covering the same exact content as a course taught in a more theoretical manner. The underlying research and policy question—whether there are differences among students who are taught using applied methodologies and those who are taught with a more conceptually based methodology—is important. However, the use of this taxonomy to answer that query is questionable. Describing a course (or a collection of courses) as "applied" becomes less and less helpful as more emphasis is placed on alternative methodologies and strategies.

The group talked at length about the possibility of adding extra flags on course codes to denote certain attributes of those courses. An "applied nature" was one such attribute; other opportunities included courses using service learning, courses that required work-based learning, bilingual education courses, and courses taught within a block schedule. Although the course itself would still be assigned an SST placement, the addition of flags would enable researchers to extract just those particular courses of interest and conduct analyses on them (or the students receiving credit in them). As an example of how this extra coding might be accomplished, the 1990 and 1994 High School Transcript Studies³ included a series of six flags attached to each CSSC course code, indicating 1) the position of the course in a sequence, 2) whether the course was taught in English, 3) whether the course was remedial, regular, or honors, 4) if the course was a combination course, 5) where the course was taught, and 6) whether the course was taught in a specialized setting for disabled students. In the Pilot SNCC system, flags are embedded as part of the course code.

The convened professionals recognized, however, the limitations of the information received from a course catalog. Although some course synopses provide descriptions of course content, fewer provide specific objectives and very rarely characterize the teaching methodology or pedagogy. Instructors teaching the "same class" within a single school may cover the same content in very different fashions. Additional enrichment opportunities available from connections to other classes, the workplace, or the community at large are not always discernible from simple course descriptions.

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Chapter 4 Revised SST (CSSC-filled)

Explanation of the Classification of Secondary School Courses (CSSC)

The Classification of Secondary School Courses (CSSC) was designed in 1982 for the High School and Beyond study using course catalogs from 52 secondary schools in 24 states. Over time, changes have been made to it in order to accommodate new courses that have appeared in transcript data collected since then. The structure of the CSSC emanates from the Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP), which outlines and briefly describes instructional programs at all education levels (elementary, secondary, and postsecondary). The CSSC is an organized list of approximately 2,180 secondary school course titles; codes are assigned to courses (as understood by course catalog descriptions) based on the CIP program description, main and alternate course titles, and a few keyword descriptors. Four of the six digits of a CSSC code stem from the CIP description, while the last two digits more closely identify the specific course.

Problems Encountered

"Duplicate" codes

Eighteen CSSC codes and corresponding titles could be placed in either of two revised SST categories, mostly due to the addition of the Co-op/Work Experience and AP/IB categories. The vast majority of vocational courses that included cooperative education, work experience, or work study in their titles were specifically co-op or work experience courses. These courses were moved during the revision from the SLMP 2nd (or later) subcategories to the appropriate Co-op/Work Experience subcategories. Ambiguity existed in the case of four course codes. Decisions concerning these courses were based on descriptors when they existed, and on main titles when the descriptors were absent. A Health Care course (17.0521: Health Occupations 2; Health Occupations Training; Medical Careers Work Experience) and a Graphic Arts course (48.0223: Graphic Arts 3; Printing Production, Cooperative) were moved, while two Agriculture and Renewable Resources courses (1.0662: Horticulture Mechanics II; Horticulture Mechanics—Cooperative Education and 2.0272: Small Animal Production II; Small Animal Production—Cooperative Education) were not.

All of the *current* CSSC codes that denote coursework that may include AP-level curriculum have been placed in the Advanced/Honors subcategories because the current codes are not AP-specific. In other words, courses in transcript databases that have already been coded with current codes may be either honors courses or AP courses. Therefore, researchers should remember when using the revised SST with old datasets that AP coursework will be undercounted. Westat is in the process of constructing new CSSC codes and course descriptions that will denote AP and IB coursework exclusively. Only these courses, clearly specified as AP or IB, will be placed in the revised SST AP/IB categories. In the CSSC-filled SST in this chapter, the AP courses that will be given new CSSC codes are marked with a double asterisk.

Codes not available

New CSSC course codes must be developed for the coding of future transcript data that make a clear distinction between AP coursework and other honors coursework (for example, Chemistry 2; Physics, Honors; and Honors Biology 2). Certainly, not all upper level advanced or honors coursework follows the College Board's guidelines for AP curricula or prepares students for the AP examinations. Any student (in theory) can take an AP exam, even without enrolling in an AP class; however, the classification should clearly set apart courses designed to reflect the College Board objectives from those that are not. In addition, more than one AP course exists within many subject areas (for example, Microeconomics and Macroeconomics). Although not a concern of the SST (since both AP courses would belong in the AP subcategory), the CSSC does need to reflect the additional development of these courses. IB courses also need to be reflected in the CSSC; there are 22 IB examinations, each with a suggested course curriculum.

SST with CSSC codes

The version of the SST that follows is complete with codes and titles from the CSSC. As mentioned, AP and IB courses that will be given new CSSC codes and descriptions have a double asterisk where their codes would normally be. Other course titles that need CSSC coding are followed by a 1 enclosed within parentheses. Lastly, several CSSC codes that are no longer used are included in the following SST, but are struck through. Although these codes have been retired, they may appear within old transcript data sets and therefore need a place within the taxonomy.

Chapter 5 Revised SST (SNCC-filled)

Explanation of the Standard National Course Classification System (SNCC)

In 1994, NCES completed a portion of a multi-year project to develop a standard course classification system for elementary and secondary education. The purpose of this project was to create a system that would more fully capture course content in order to 1) facilitate communication among education agencies—an effort that complemented another NCES project enabling student data to be electronically transmitted between school districts and to postsecondary institutions; and 2) allow states and school districts to answer research questions regarding their students. A Pilot Standard National Course Classification (SNCC) System for Secondary Education, which provides basic course descriptions for 632 secondary courses in 29 subject areas, represents the culmination of the first phase of this project. Currently, districts within Delaware, Iowa, Nevada. Washington, Oregon, Louisiana, and Mississippi are using or considering using the Pilot SNCC in their data systems. NCES, however, has not used this classification system in its transcript collections.

In the SNCC, every course has a title, a description, and a basic course title code. In addition, the system provides a procedure for including more detail through the use of seven additional fields. A course fully coded using the SNCC receives a 13-digit code in 9 fields: the first two fields (4 digits) specify the subject area and main content of the course; four fields (6 digits) provide an indication of the level, available credit, and sequencing of the course; and the last three fields (3 digits) provide for the additional coding of main emphasis, experiences available, or additional detail about course content.

In general, course descriptions within the Pilot SNCC are more full than the descriptive phrases used to describe courses in the CSSC. However, the Pilot SNCC course descriptions are also often more general than those in the CSSC, making no particular distinction between, for example, studying Pacific Rim nations versus Canada within an Area Studies course. Some

distinctions are reasserted if the subject fields are used; many are not. However, the subject fields often provide types of information that are not captured by the CSSC, such as frequency of writing within history/social science coursework, laboratory experience within science coursework, level of prose mastery within English coursework, and application of knowledge to real-world experiences within vocational coursework.

Problems Encountered

This classification system, like the CSSC, will need updating periodically. Although created more recently than the CSSC, there are already new AP courses being offered to secondary students throughout the nation that are not reflected in the SNCC. The "problems" encountered here in filling the SST with SNCC codes are actually opportunities missed. The subject area codes, especially those of the vocational courses, provide additional detail that cannot be exploited. The subject fields for vocational coursework have provide information on:

- the programmatic nature of the course (whether or not, by itself or in conjunction with others, the course is part of an approved vocational program or an articulated tech-prep program);
- the nature of any applied experience (in an independent business, a school-based enterprise, or on-campus/classroom laboratories); and
- integration of academic concepts and skills (mathematics, science, or language arts, individually or in combination with one another).

In placing SNCC courses within the revised SST, the three subject area fields were not used to guide the placement decision. In several subject areas, "Type of Credit" is one of the three subject fields. Because the SNCC is organized according to the subject matter that the coursework covers, students may receive credit in a secondary school "department" that is different from the area in which the course is described. For example, History and Literature of the Theater is described within the Fine and Performing Arts subject area. However, in some schools, the credit a student receives for passing that class may be counted toward his or her English requirements. In the crosswalk, the courses were, with few exceptions, placed in the subject area in which they were originally described (typically, the norm for the award of credit

as well); however, there is the possibility that the school would have placed it in another SST category. Continuing with the example, History and Literature of the Theater has been placed in the SST category of Theater Arts. However, if the SNCC course code included at least the first of the three subject fields, there would be more information on which to base placement. If the first digit equaled 1, the course should be placed with the other Arts (Theater) courses; if it equaled 3 or 4, the course would properly belong with other English courses. This situation occurs for the majority of the academic subject areas: English Language and Literature, Fine and Performing Arts, Foreign Language and Literature, Life and Physical Sciences, Mass Communication, Mathematics, Military Science, Physical Education, Religious Education and Theology, and Social Science and History.

The SNCC paid particular attention to courses that integrate content from two or more different subject areas. Several of these courses (American Literature/History, Team-Taught Block, Thematic Integration, and Multi/Interdisciplinary Studies—Other) cannot be accurately placed in only one category of the SST. When working with actual transcripts, the credit received for these courses would have to be split among the appropriate subcategories. The latter three courses cannot be categorized without the detail provided by the additional subject area codes available within the SNCC.

SST with SNCC codes

The version of the SST that follows is complete with codes and titles from the SNCC. The SNCC code used for each course in the crosswalk always includes the first four digits, followed by a decimal point. When necessary for placement within the SST, the *level* field is included; otherwise, an x holds the place of the level field (the possible codes are presented below). The *credit* field is denoted by the # sign. *Term* is denoted with an x, while *year* is included when necessary for placement within the SST (within vocational subject areas, English language and literature, and Non-English languages). After Agriculture and Business, years above year 2 are not used, with the understanding that any course with a 2, 3, or 4 in the year field will be included within the "Second or Later Course in Sequence" SST classification.

The level field has the following numerical possibilities:

"0 Information not collected, unavailable, or missing.

"1 Remedial

A course offered for the improvement of any particular deficiency, including a deficiency in content previously taught but not learned.

"2 Special Education

A course that adapts the curriculum, materials, or instruction for students identified as needing special education. This may include instruction for students with any of the following: autism, deaf-blindness, hearing impairment, mental retardation, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, serious emotional disturbance, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, visual impairment, and other health impairments.

"3 Basic

A course focusing primarily on skills development, including literacy in language, mathematics, life and physical science, and social sciences and history.

"4 General

A course providing instruction (in a given subject matter area) that focuses primarily on general concepts for the appropriate grade level.

"5 Honors

An advanced level course designed for students who have earned honors status according to educational requirements.

"6 Gifted and talented

An advanced level course designed primarily for elementary students who have qualified for and enrolled in a school, education institution, or district gifted and talented program

"7 Untracked

A course that is not limited to one level of instruction so as to meet the needs of student groups at a variety of educational levels.

"8 Limited English/bilingual

A course designed for students with a language background other than English, and whose proficiency in English is such that the probability of the individual's success in an English-only environment is below that of a successful peer with an English language background.

"9 Accepted as high school equivalent

A course offered at an education institution other than a secondary school (such as a junior high school or community college) or through correspondence or satellite media."
