Hot August Night—the Moon is bright — the Journey Begins!!

Just before sunset, we noticed some motion in one of the nests in the hatchery. Soon one head, then another head was spotted. Then suddenly all the motion stopped. The hatchlings have broken out of their eggs and begun to push each other up from their nest two feet below the top of the sand. It's as if they are now resting to regain some strength, for they know they will have a long, important swim tonight. The moon rises over the ocean and ascends higher into the sky. Movement in the nest begins again and suddenly there is an explosion of



loggerhead hatchlings they scram-

ble over each other in their rush to the water's edge. We stand to the side and watch the tiny reptiles rush down the beach, as they follow the moon's light and get whisked away by the ebbing tide. They will swim all night and into the following days, the Gulf Stream is their goal. How many will make it? How does Cape Romain protect Loggerhead Sea Turtles

Cape Island, the northernmost barrier island in Cape Romain National Wildlife Refuge, receives the highest annual density of Loggerhead Sea Turtle nests north of Florida. In 2007, there

were 709 nests created on this and Lighthouse islands. Refuge staff and volunteers patrol the beach every day

during the nesting season, locate nests created the previous night, and relocated 396 nests, moving 150 to protected hatcheries. This relocation process is necessary to ensure the highest hatch rate possible because of nest predation by raccoons and erosion or high tide intrusion into the nests.

So, how can I help with this protection process?

You can help with the process through the **Adopt a Turtle Nest** program. Cape Romain needs supplies to build the hatcheries and funds to maintain the equipment used for patrolling the beach. They want to have a person assigned to monitor the beach on Bulls Island as well as more nests are occurring there than in the past.
