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INTRODUCTION

he purpose of this *Performance and Accountability Report (PAR)*Addendum is to provide updated information to give the reader a more detailed understanding of USAID performance in meeting its strategic goals during FY 2004. The Addendum, organized around the six-tiered methodology presented in the original PAR, enables the reader to track updated and supplemental information against targets and data presented earlier.

The USAID Performance and Accountability Report was submitted on November 15, 2004, as required. It contained the annual program performance information required by the Government Performance and Results Act. For the first time in recent years, the FY 2004 PAR included data from the fiscal reporting year just ended, rather than prior-year results data, as the Agency had been forced to do previously. However, the time constraints among the many USAID operating units in collecting data from various sources within their countries meant that only partial data for FY 2004 were available in time for the November PAR.

USAID regularly collects performance data against all Agency-wide and country-specific (Iraq and Afghanistan) performance indicators. Various USAID operating units—missions and, in some instances, regional offices and AID/W pillar bureaus with program implementation responsibilities—provide this information. They first assemble the data at the country program level (i.e., the actual performance in a particular country in relation to a performance indicator), which are then analyzed and aggregated in Washington. Along with performance data, operating units also provide some descriptive information about progress being made, and where useful comment on how the data was collected and its quality.

Much of the data contained in this report were provided by USAID operating units during the winter and spring of 2005. In a few instances, country-level data update information presented in the November, 2004 report. Usually, however, the data shown in the Addendum under "Final FY 04 Validated Results" are being presented for the first time, and supplement, rather than replace, other related information already appearing under the particular performance indicator. This Addendum shows all prior information provided in relation to an indicator, as well as new information first presented in this Addendum.

USAID continues to strengthen and streamline its system for reporting on progress toward its strategic goals. Improvements are being sought in order to:

- More clearly delineate those performance indicators that are based on clear causality from expenditure on USAID programs.
- Strengthen the standards for what can be deemed acceptable data for reporting purposes.
- Continue to assess the utility of each of the many performance indicators shown, with a view to eliminating those for which too many USAID operating units cannot effectively report.
- Tighten definitions to preventing double counting of results and expenditures.
- Introduce systems to accelerate the collation and reporting of data by operating units in order that a more factual presentation can be provided in the PAR immediately following the close of the fiscal year.

GOALS AND INDICATORS

he first column gives the FY 2004 performance targets. The November PAR results are shown in the second column. In some instances where highlights or country-specific results were shown in the PAR, these are condensed in this Addendum.

The third column indicates whether or not the results in this Addendum differ from the performance results reported in November 2004. Where no additional data is presented or where the additional data supplements but does not replace earlier data, the results are deemed not to differ (a "yes" response in this column is shown as blue, and a "no" response as light green).

The fourth column shows any additional data sine the PAR. The fifth column indicates if the performance was on target, below the target, or exceeded the target. Note that "N/A" is used in all instances where there was not a quantifiable performance target set prior to FY 2004. Information at the bottom of the table addresses data sources, reliability, and reasons for significant performance shortfall or exceedance.
