DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE GRANTS

- ♦ The Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation was awarded a \$75,000.00 grant from the STOP Violence Against Women Discretionary Grant Program. This supplemental grant was awarded to lower police response time when responding to domestic violence calls, training for officers to produce reports that can be used for evidence-based prosecution, and to coordinate efforts between victim witness advocates and all tribal departments
- ♦ The Arizona Criminal Justice Commission was awarded a \$1,187,876.00 grant from the Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Formula Grant. This grant will help to continue funding for several existing residential substance abuse treatment programs at the state level through the Department of Corrections, and the Department of Juvenile Corrections.
- ♦ The Gila River Indian Community was awarded a \$6,000,000.00 grant from the Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands FY 2001Discretionarty Grants to build a 104-bed adult correctional facility on the Gila River Indian Community reservation. Technical assistance to address the tribe's short term interim and long term needs will also be provided.
- ♦ The Salt River Pima Maricopa Indian Community was awarded a \$10,000,000.00 grant from the Correctional Facilities on Tribal Lands FY 2001 Discretionary Grants. The money from the grant will be used in the construction of a 75- bed adult and 45-bed juvenile correctional facility to be located on the Salt River reservation.
- ♦ The Tohono Oodham Nation was awarded a \$50,000.00 grant from the Comprehensive Approaches to Sex Offender Management Grant Program. The grant will be used to design a comprehensive approach to reducing sexual violence and improving the management of sex offenders in their community.
- ♦ The Hopi Tribe was awarded a \$75,000.00 grant from the STOP Violence Against Indian Women Discretionary Grants Program. This third supplemental grant will be used to develop a coordinated response to domestic violence by tribal justice agencies and service providers and to provide legal advocacy services to victims seeking orders of protection from the tribal court.
- ♦ The Hopi Tribe was awarded a \$206,748.00 grant from the Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program. This second supplemental grant will be used to provide training specifically designed to assist law enforcement officers in conducting comprehensive investigation of domestic violence cases and provide training to tribal court judges and administration on developing uniform sentencing guidelines for offenders.

- ♦ The Yavapai-Prescott Indian Tribe was awarded a \$33,165.00 grant from the STOP Violence Against Indian Women Discretionary Grants Program. This supplemental grant will be used to provide domestic violence training specifically designed for police officers, and to develop counseling sessions for domestic violence victims.
- ♦ The White Mountain Apache Tribe was awarded a \$28,641.00 grant from the FY 2000 Community Prosecution Program Initiative. The grant will be used to develop a general planning process for a community prosecution program, including identify local community prosecution properties, and form advisory boards or planning teams to help in the development of a community prosecution effort.
- ♦ The Fort Mojave Indian Nation Ranger Department was awarded a \$199,200.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist Indian tribes in enhancing law enforcement infrastructures and community policing practices in their community. Funds will also assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Fort Mojave Tribal Police was awarded a \$249,285.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Hopi Tribe was awarded a \$1,240,873.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Hualapai Police Department was awarded a \$148,410.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Navajo Nation was awarded a \$8,605,360.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Pascua Yaqui Police Department was awarded a \$81,233.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
- ♦ The Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community was awarded a \$93,750.00 grant from the Tribal Resources Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hiring officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.

The Tonto Apache Tribe was awarded a \$430,916.00 grant from the Tribal Resource Grant Program, which provides funding to assist tribal police departments with hirin officers, procuring equipment and technology, and receiving training.
