STATEMENT OF PURPOSE AND NEED

This amendment would increase the pending request for Periodic Censuses and Programs to ensure resources are adequate to complete an accurate and on-time 2010 Decennial Census. Due to significant cost, schedule, and performance problems with a major information technology contract, the U.S. Census Bureau is reducing the scope of the 2010 Census reengineering effort by eliminating its plan to utilize handheld computers for the non-response follow-up (NRFU) operation. Therefore, additional funding is needed to plan for a paper-based NRFU, hire more staff reflecting updated workload and staffing assumptions, and mitigate other risks.

Major increases include \$69 million for critical systems and preparatory activities necessary for a paper-based NRFU in 2010; \$116 million for Address Canvassing to hire additional workers due to revised productivity assumptions and other changes; \$80 million for a more robust help desk to support the handheld computers for Address Canvassing; and \$50 million for end-to-end system testing, to ensure all decennial systems are fully integrated. Also requested is a \$200 million contingency fund, given the risks facing the program and uncertainty around what the final cost estimate will be for the Field Data Collection Automation contract.

The total increase for the 2010 Census is almost \$546 million. This increase is partially offset within this account by nearly a \$6 million reduction to lower priority activities. The remaining increase (\$540 million) is offset through proposed reductions to other accounts within the Departments of Agriculture, Commerce, Health and Human Services, Homeland, Interior, Labor, and the Treasury, as described in the accompanying amendments.

Goal Statement

The economic census provides the nation with comprehensive, detailed, and authoritative facts about the structure of the U.S. economy. Every five years, the economic census profiles the U.S. economy from the national to the local level. It provides official measures of output for industries and geographic areas. Economic policy makers in federal, state, and local governments use economic census data to project trends, guide economic development, and assess the impact of economic policy. The data help build the foundation for Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and other indicators of economic performance. The economic census supports Department of Commerce general goal/objective 1.3 to "advance key economic and demographic data that support effective decision-making by policymakers, businesses, and the American public."

Overview

Title 13 U.S.C. §131 requires the censuses of manufactures, mineral industries, construction industries, retail and wholesale trade, service industries, transportation, and other businesses every five years, covering the years ending in "2" and "7." The 2007 Economic Census will collect data on over 26 million establishments. The Census Bureau minimizes respondent burden by sending questionnaires to fewer than 25 percent of these establishments. Administrative records will be used to obtain information for the remaining establishments, which include smaller businesses. A data collection system will be developed that provides a number of reporting options for companies, including electronic reporting. Data will be disseminated through the American FactFinder.

The economic census also includes several related programs that provide statistics on the characteristics of businesses, business expenses, and other items of national interest. The economic census includes the census of the island areas (Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa and Northern Mariana Islands). The results of the census will be summarized and presented for various classifications, such as kind-of-business, geographic locations at various levels of aggregation, sales size, employment size, legal form of organization, and degree of specialization.

The 2007 Economic Census consists of eight core program components and several related data collections. The core components are separately tailored for each major domestic business sector, provide comprehensive and detailed information on the structure of the U.S. non-farm economy, and are the cornerstone of our nation's economic statistics programs. The related data collections are more specialized and provide supplementary information on businesses owned by women, minorities, supplementary information on expenditures and expenses for non-goods producing businesses, transportation information on the movement of goods, and periodic census information on the economies of Puerto Rico and the island territories.

The economic census represents the primary source of facts about the structure and function of the U.S. economy, providing essential information to government and business to help guide sound decisions. It furnishes an important part of the framework for composite measures, such as the GDP, and the Bureau of Economic Analysis' (BEA) input-output analyses and National Income and Product Accounts that provide important information about market sectors, such as manufacturing. The National Accounts and practically all major government economic statistical series are directly or indirectly dependent on the economic census. Statistics, analyses, and economic research produced by BEA, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Federal Reserve Board, Department of Energy, and the Census Bureau are dependent on the economic census results. The economic census not only provides BEA with vital source data for the national accounts, it also provides weights and benchmarks for indexes of industrial production, productivity, and prices. Moreover, the census furnishes benchmarks and sampling lists for the Census Bureau's current economic programs and for many data series at other federal agencies. Business enterprises, trade associations, banks, investors, economic development agencies, research groups, educational institutions, and unions use data from the census for the purpose of planning expansion programs, selecting locations for new establishments, forecasting sales trends, determining market potential, forecasting sales and advertising performance, and performing other analyses. For example, the data are used to decide where to locate a plant, where to build a shopping center, or figure out what the market demand is for a product. In forecasting and planning, economic census results are the primary source of information about the changing structure of the U.S. economy. The census identifies industries and geographic areas that are experiencing rapid growth, as well as those that are declining. The information is also used to revise the North American Industrial Classification System and to update the Business Register.

FY 2009 Proposed Amendment:

Economic census (-41 permanent positions; -41 FTE; -\$3,748,000) Fiscal Year (FY) 2009 is the fifth year of the six-year 2007 Economic Census funding cycle.

Direction (\$4,775,000 BA/Obligations, -\$74,000 from pending request): The decrease to this activity consists solely of a reduction to Adjustments to Base to partially offset the increases in the amendment.

Content Determination/Design (\$0 BA/Obligations): No change from FY 2009 pending request.

Mail List Development and Mailout (\$6,103,000 BA/Obligations, -\$551,000 from pending request): The decrease to this activity consists solely of a reduction to Adjustments to Base to partially offset the increases in the amendment.

Collection and Processing (\$76,874,000 BA/Obligations, -\$2,981,000 from pending request): The Census Bureau proposes to decrease funding in the pending request for this activity by \$1.71 million. This decrease is made possible by larger than expected increases in and more efficient electronic reporting in the 2007 Economic Census. Over 40 percent of multiple location companies are filing reports electronically resulting in reduced mail costs and reduced costs for handling paper returns. The electronic reporting software also works better and is more accepted by large companies, significantly reducing the special handling of large company electronic reports that did not "fit" in the Economic Census software. The reduction in positions represents decrease in expected workload. No reductions in force or similar actions are implied.

An additional \$1.27 million of the decrease to this activity consists of a reduction in Adjustments to Base to partially offset the increases in the amendment.

Publication and Dissemination (\$27,187,000 BA/Obligations, -\$142,000 from pending request): The decrease to this activity consists solely of a reduction to Adjustments to Base to partially offset the increases in the amendment.

Goal Statement

The decennial census has been conducted since the birth of the nation. It provides the official population counts for determining the allocation to states of seats in the U.S. House of Representatives and for determining how the districts are defined for those seats. The Census Bureau provides to each state the data necessary to determine congressional, state, and local legislative boundaries. The provision of these data is mandated in the U.S. Constitution and the U.S. Code. This program supports Department of Commerce general goal/objective 1.3 to "advance key economic and demographic data that support effective decision-making of policymakers, businesses, and the American public."

The decennial census provides comprehensive and useful demographic information about all people living in the United States, Puerto Rico, and the associated Island Areas. The program also provides data for small geographic areas and population groups that federal agencies need to implement legally mandated programs. In February 2003, a General Accounting Office report (GAO-03-178) stated "In fiscal year 2000, the federal government obligated about \$332 billion in grants to state and local governments to help fund an array of programs ranging from Medicaid to Highway Planning and Construction. Over 85 percent, or about \$283 billion, of this grant money was distributed to state and local governments using formulas that are based on data, such as state population and personal income. For example, the \$196 billion federal-state Medicaid program finances health care to low-income families with children and aged, blind, and disabled individuals through a statutory formula based on state per capita income—the ratio of total personal income to state population."

Starting in late November 2007, as a result of concerns raised regarding the ability to meet deadlines and budgets, the Census Bureau initiated a comprehensive assessment to determine the status of the 2010 Decennial Census Program and to better understand any issues or concerns as the program approached key 2010 Census milestones. This assessment included a series of wide-ranging meetings with Census Bureau staff directly involved in the Field Data Collection Automation (FDCA) program. The Census Bureau's Deputy Director also met with Harris Corporation, the company developing the FDCA system, and MITRE Corporation, an information technology firm under contract with the Census Bureau. MITRE's role is to provide an internal, independent assessment of the information technology systems in the decennial programs and also IT systems in the Census Bureau. This process identified issues that raised concerns about the complete development of all of the operations initially planned for the FDCA system in time for the 2010 Census.

To address the issues, the Census Bureau and the Department of Commerce worked with a wide range of respected sources, including the Office of the Inspector General, the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO), the MITRE Corporation, an internal 2010 Census FDCA Risk Reduction Task Force consisting of high-level officials, and an independent panel of experts, which included Dennis Hastert, former Speaker of the House; Kenneth Prewitt, former Census Bureau Director now of Columbia University; Vincent Barabba, former Census Bureau Director now of Market Insight Corporation; George Ligler, an independent software developer and consultant; Ron Ponder of Hudson Heights Partners; and John Thompson, the former Associate Director for the 2000 Census who is currently at the National Opinion Research Center.

The expert panel evaluated the options identified by the 2010 Census FDCA Risk Reduction Task Force. A majority of the expert panel members recommended that we proceed with the alternative recommended by the task force, which calls for the Census Bureau to utilize a paper-based nonresponse follow-up (NRFU) methodology, as opposed to using the handheld computers for NRFU.

Assessments by the MITRE Corporation, our Inspector General and the leadership of the Census Bureau echoed this recommendation to move to a paper-based NRFU. Based on these inputs and careful consideration of the benefits and risks of each option, the Secretary of Commerce determined that the Census Bureau would move forward with the recommendation to use a paper-based NRFU in the 2010 Decennial Census.

Pursuing this recommendation allows both the Census Bureau and the Harris Corporation to focus on what they do best. This path still represents a significant step forward for the Census Bureau in the use of automation. Address Canvassing, the operation that occurs the year before the decennial census validates and updates the location of every household location in the country, will be conducted using Global Positioning System (GPS)-enabled Harris handheld computers allowing for the most accurate and comprehensive address list in the Census Bureau's history.

The paper-based NRFU will be supported by a new office support infrastructure that will help ensure an accurate census. The Census Bureau has extensive experience conducting paper-based NRFU, and they will build on that experience for the 2010 Decennial Census.

Our flexibility to respond to unforeseen difficulties is greater under the paper-based option because we can deploy people more easily and faster than we can manufacture additional handhelds on short notice. Additionally, the majority of expert panel members recommended this alternative, believing that it offers greater flexibility to ensure a successful decennial census at this late time in the planning and development cycle.

FY 2009 Proposed Actions and Deliverables:

Program Development and Management (\$3,446,000 BA/Obligations): No change from FY 2009 pending request.

Content, Questionnaires, and Products (\$238,496,000 BA/Obligations, +\$57,679,000 from pending request): Funding in this category supports efforts towards completing the public use forms across all data collection modes planned for 2010 and functions related to the delivery of paper questionnaires, such as coordination with the U.S. Postal Service, printing and mailing of forms, and the mailing of replacement forms. Specifically, the proposed amendment supports the following:

- Increased costs (\$30,151,000) to print forms and questionnaires in order to conduct a paper-based NRFU.
- Increased costs (\$27,528,000) to print forms and questionnaires due to changes in field workload assumptions based on testing and revised estimates of the oversupply rate to ensure sufficient forms are available for field enumerator and Local Census Office (LCO) kits.

Field Data Collection and Support Systems (\$1,800,838,000 BA/Obligations, +\$413,401,000 from pending request): Funding in this category supports multi-year efforts to restructure the Census Bureau's business model for field data collection. Funding in this category also supports preparations, implementation, monitoring, and day-to-day management of the field components of the early operations for the 2010 Census itself. Specifically, the proposed amendment supports the following:

- Increased funding (\$116,017,000) for changes based on the Census Bureau's experience in using the handheld computers during Dress Rehearsal Address Canvassing. The Census Bureau now expects lower productivity (cases/hour) for the 2010 Census Address Canvassing operation than had previously been assumed. Also, the contractor's solution is not feasible for census blocks with more than 700 housing units. The Census Bureau estimates that about 1,100 of these blocks (out of a total of about 6.7 million collection blocks) will need to be canvassed by Census Bureau staff using a different approach.
- A net decrease from the FY 2009 President's Budget (-\$27,170,000) for the contractor to automate Address Canvassing and its Operating and Control Environment based on final requirements provided in January 2008; make contract modifications to support a paper-based NRFU; develop a revised Help Desk solution to remedy shortcomings observed during the Dress Rehearsal; and continue to develop an Operation Control System that will meet the needs of the revised operations.

- Increased costs (\$15,518,000) for the Census Bureau to provide additional staff in each LCO for Help Desk Support. This support is needed for both the 2010 Census Address Canvassing operation, which will use the handheld computers, and the office computing environment. Based on experiences during tests in 2004, 2006, and Dress Rehearsal Address Canvassing, a support desk in each LCO greatly enhances our ability to quickly respond to field problems, thus lessening downtime and associated cost impacts.
- Increased costs (\$28,635,000) for the Regional Census Center (RCC) network. The original contractor solution for the RCC network could not accommodate, without major rework and cost increase, critical geographic software that must be deployed to the RCCs. Therefore, we initially decided to install a second network in each RCC to support these applications. Now that the Census Bureau is providing automated support for Census Coverage Measurement (CCM), nearly half the RCC staff will be on that second network. Two large networks in each RCC will cause many management and operational problems. Given this, and continued concerns about the flexibility of the contractor to provide for RCC network needs, we now believe we need to revise our plan and deploy a single Census Bureau developed network for all RCC activities. While there is a reduction in cost for the contractor since they will no longer support the RCC network, the Census Bureau will require funding to develop and support this network internally.
- Increased costs (\$25,638,000) for End-to-End Testing. This enables the Census Bureau to ensure that all systems satisfy functional, interface, and performance requirements prior to 2010 Census implementation. The testing will be comprised of approximately 20 operational threads and encompasses 15 major systems. A contractor will conduct the testing with oversight by decennial census management and the FDCA Project Management Office. This additional testing is needed because of the reduction in scope of the 2008 Dress Rehearsal due to funding limitations, the scope change of the FDCA contract, and recommendations from the GAO.
- Increased costs (\$12,698,000) for assorted revisions to the census operation due to the paper-based NRFU. These changes include the addition of two high-level printers in each LCO to print maps and address lists; a decrease in the production hours per day in most operations; increased space for 94 smaller LCOs, and additional staff at both headquarters and the LCOs.
- Increased costs (\$8,100,000) for space and staffing at the National Processing Center (NPC) to support a paper-based NRFU. With a paper-based NRFU, staff and space at the NPC have to be increased to accommodate preparation and storage of enumeration materials for the NRFU operation.

- Increased costs (\$2,012,000) to protect Personally Identifiable Information (PII). This funding is needed for the Census Bureau to ensure it can comply with OMB Directive M-06-19, which stipulates that potential PII losses be reported within one hour of discovery. While the Census Bureau works aggressively to protect the PII it collects, prudence dictates that we have a obust reporting and investigation/follow-up infrastructure in place to handle potential data losses given the very large volume of data we collect as part of the decennial census. The Census Bureau's current PII reporting process cannot handle this potential volume. To meet this need, we need additional staff and a redesign of the current electronic reporting system to collect daily information from LCOs, RCCs, and Headquarters. This increase is partially due to NRFU being completed on paper, rather than on secure handheld computers, so the volume of PII documents at risk is much higher.
- Increased costs (\$6,000,000) for Independent Verification and Validation. The Census Bureau must acquire additional resources to independently validate and verify the work of the FDCA contractor. Currently the contractor performs its own testing and validation, with some witnessing and stakeholder involvement during acceptance testing. This additional testing will provide for earlier detection of problems so that corrective actions can be taken long before the products will be used during actual 2010 Census operations.
- Increased costs (\$5,000,000) for MITRE Support. The Census Bureau requires additional expert assistance in systems engineering and program management. The MITRE Corporation, which has worked with the Census Bureau since 2004, will provide the expert assistance coupled with the Census Bureau's domain knowledge of decennial census operations.
- Increased costs (\$5,007,000) for the Census Bureau's Integrated Product Team (IPT) Staff. To address the difficulties we have experienced in precisely communicating our requirements to the contractor during the development process, we need to more tightly integrate/embed experienced Census Bureau staff on-site with contractor developers. This will require travel costs for staff to be co-located at the contractor's facilities, and costs to temporarily backfill some positions at headquarters. This will reduce the risk of communication issues between the contractor and the Census Bureau, and the possibility of delivering finished products that will not meet our real needs and for which there is not enough time to "fix" or re-develop the application.
- Increased costs (\$4,539,000) due to a recent change in the mileage reimbursement rates (which have risen from \$0.485 per mile to \$0.505 per mile) and an adjustment for inflation.

- Increased costs (\$2,500,000) to develop a partnership contact database (PCD) that will be used by the partnership program staff to record and track partner commitments and agreements. Because the partnership contact database was removed from the scope of the FDCA contract, the Census Bureau will need to acquire alternative contract support to replace the current, antiquated database.
- Increased costs (\$1,300,000) for the Census Bureau staff to implement work-around solutions for critical requirements determined to be out-of-scope of the FDCA contract because of time limitations, such as modifying existing training and modifications to payroll processing.
- Increased costs (\$1,000,000) for contracting support to move the Decennial Applicant, Personnel and Payroll System (DAPPS) application to the FDCA infrastructure and for obtaining a Certification & Accreditation of the system.
- Increased costs (\$207,000) to conduct a series of tests of the handheld computers. The testing will verify the handheld computers have been built according to contract specifications.
- Increase (\$196,400,000) for risk mitigation contingency funds associated with planning and implementation of field data collection operations and automation. If this entire amount is not needed for FY 2009 activities, the funding can be carried over as a contingency for FY 2010 operations.
- Increase (\$10,000,000) to incorporate fingerprinting into the overall security screening process for temporary decennial census employees. The Census Bureau is working to develop the most cost-effective and appropriate method for employment screening in the decennial census environment, which involves hiring over a million temporary workers. As in the past two decennial censuses, the Census Bureau will screen all census applicants using the FBI's name-check database, which has proven extremely effective, with no or virtually no criminal incidents in 2000 or 1990. However, the Census Bureau recognizes the importance of the trust placed by the American public in census operations. Therefore, the Census Bureau is exploring options to most efficiently incorporate fingerprinting into its overall screening process.

Automated Data Collection, Systems, and Data Capture (\$365,819,000 BA/Obligations, +\$63,056,000 from pending request): Funding in this category supports multi-year efforts to maintain a business and logical architecture for the 2010 Census, conducting data processing for all testing efforts, determining requirements, completing development and implementation of data capture and

related processing systems for the 2008 Census Dress Rehearsal, and continuing those efforts for the 2010 Census. Specifically, the proposed amendment supports the following:

- Increased costs (\$25,500,000) for planning for data capture of paper NRFU forms as part of the Decennial Response Integration System.
- Increased costs (\$8,418,000) for the Census Bureau to lease a commercial data center to augment our current Bowie Computer Center. The latter currently houses a number of Decennial programs: the FDCA Data Center, RCC e-mail infrastructure, Decennial Post Collection Processing, Master Address File/Topologically Integrated Geographic Encoding and Referencing (MAF/TIGER), and the American Community Survey. The Bowie center does not have available power capacity to support the expected growth in decennial census programs.
- Increased costs (\$25,638,000) for End-to-End Testing. This allows for Census to ensure that all systems satisfy functional, interface, and performance requirements prior to 2010 Census implementation. The testing will be comprised of approximately 20 operational threads and encompasses 15 major systems. A contractor will conduct the testing with oversight by decennial census management and the FDCA Project Management Office. This additional testing is needed because of the reduction in scope of the 2008 Dress Rehearsal due to funding limitations, the scope change of the FDCA contract, and recommendations from the GAO.
- Increased costs (\$1,000,000) for a replan of the independent data quality evaluation to include paper-based NRFU.
- Increase (\$2,500,000) for risk mitigation contingency funds associated with End-to-End Testing. If this entire amount is not needed for FY 2009 activities, the funding can be carried over as a contingency for FY 2010 operations.

Census Design, Methodology and Evaluation (\$62,439,000 BA/Obligations, +\$11,704,000 from pending request): Funding in this category supports multi-year planning, testing, and development efforts regarding coverage improvement methods, application of residence rules, evaluation programs, quality assurance methods, and coverage measurement. Specifically, the proposed amendment supports the following:

• Increased costs (\$10,604,000) for the Census Bureau to provide Census Coverage Measurement Support. In December 2007, we decided to descope this effort from the FDCA contract and have this work completed in-house by the Census Bureau. This

includes such things as the programming for two automated questionnaires, developing the control systems for four paper operations and one Computer Assisted Personal Interviewing (CAPI) operation, procurement of 10,000 laptop computers, a more than doubling of the size of the existing Census Bureau CAPI infrastructure (from 6,000 to 16,000 users), and developing interfaces with other decennial systems.

• Increase (\$1,100,000) for risk mitigation contingency funds associated with moving the CCM support from the FDCA contract to the Census Bureau. If this entire amount is not needed for FY 2009 activities, the funding can be carried over as a contingency for FY 2010 operations.

Census Test and Dress Rehearsal Implementation (\$2,629,000 BA/Obligations): No change from FY 2009 pending request.
