South Asia – Earthquake

Fact Sheet #37, Fiscal Year (FY) 2006

BACKGROUND

- A magnitude 7.6 earthquake struck Pakistan, India, and Afghanistan on October 8, 2005, at 0850 local time, according to the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS). The epicenter of the earthquake was located near Muzaffarabad, the capital of Azad Jammu and Kashmir (AJK) and approximately 60 miles north-northeast of Islamabad.
- Aftershocks continue in the affected areas. The delivery of humanitarian assistance is constricted by the mountainous area, cold weather, and damaged or collapsed infrastructure. The most affected areas are the Northwest Frontier Province (NWFP), Northern Punjab, and AJK in Pakistan, and Indian-administered Kashmir in India.

CURRENT SITUATION

- The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) reports that the U.N. Children’s Fund (UNICEF)-led water and sanitation cluster has identified disrupted water supplies and the repair of water pipes in earthquake-affected villages as current priority issues. USAID/OFDA implementing partners are conducting emergency repairs to fix sections of damaged piping and to reconnect existing pipe systems.
- On January 23, the USAID/DART Military Liaison Officer traveled to Shinkiari, NWFP to visit the Combined Medical Relief Team’s (CMRT) military field hospital and discuss current and future requirements for humanitarian assistance and transitional recovery priorities. The majority of unmet needs in Shinkiari are in the areas of water and sanitation, return of affected persons to their places of origin, and the restoration of livelihoods, especially in the agriculture sector.
- On January 26, the USAID/DART observed a USAID/OFDA-funded voucher distribution in Rangla, Bagh District, AJK. Vouchers contribute to livelihoods recovery by enabling families to purchase items of their choice. Many beneficiaries are using the vouchers to purchase corrugated galvanized iron (CGI) sheeting, tin boxes to protect household items from the weather, and clothing. The voucher system provides affected populations the flexibility to address their own needs while also stimulating the local economy.
- On February 1, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) concluded its 90-day earthquake relief operation in Pakistan. According to NATO, 160 flights from Europe transported more than 3,500 tons of emergency relief supplies to earthquake-affected populations. In Pakistan, NATO helicopters airlifted more than 1,700 tons of relief commodities and moved approximately 7,600 people. NATO medical teams also treated more than 8,000 patients. The U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) reported that two German CH-53 helicopters under NATO will remain in-country on a bilateral agreement through March 31, 2006.
- According to international media sources, the GOP announced on January 30 that the second tranche of government compensation payments for earthquake-affected populations would begin in mid-February. Of the total payment of 175,000 Pakistan Rupees (PKR), which is approximately \$2,900, to be given to each damaged house, GOP officials report that 25,000 PKR (approximately \$414) have already been awarded. The third installment of 25,000 PKR and the final installment of 50,000 PKR (approximately \$828) will be distributed following safety inspections of newly-constructed houses this spring.

USG HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

Pakistan

- To date, USAID has provided more than \$67.2 million in humanitarian assistance to earthquake-affected communities in Pakistan. USAID identified shelter, relief supplies, logistics, health, water and sanitation, and livelihoods support as priority sectors for relief operations.
- To date, USAID has provided nearly \$6.4 million in emergency relief commodities, including transport costs, for earthquake-affected populations in Pakistan. USAID has completed 25 flights of emergency relief commodities to Pakistan. The flights delivered a total of 97,725 blankets, 1,570 winterized tents, 8,050 rolls of plastic sheeting for approximately 36,672 families, 15,000 water containers, 17 water bladders, 2 water purification units, 10 U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) emergency health kits, 20 concrete cutting saws, and 136 shelters donated by Alaska Shelters.
- In response to the U.N. South Asia Earthquake Flash Appeal, USAID has provided more than \$22.6 million in funding to support transitional shelter programs, food, health, water and sanitation, humanitarian air service, logistical coordination, and the transport of supplies to affected populations and movement of those populations to safe areas.
- On October 27, President George W. Bush established the South Asia Earthquake Relief Fund (SAERF) headed by five private-sector chief executive officers (CEOs) to spearhead private fundraising efforts for relief and reconstruction in the aftermath of the South Asia earthquake. To date, the SAERF has collected more than \$17 million in cash, pledges, and in-kind contributions for the South Asia earthquake relief efforts. To date, the SAERF has allocated \$4.5 million to five NGOs focused on relief efforts and will provide remaining funds for reconstruction efforts.
- The USAID/DART has been on the ground in Pakistan since October 10. The mission of the USAID/DART is to assess humanitarian needs, assist with targeting and coordination of USG assistance in conjunction with USAID/Pakistan, and provide technical support as needed. Headquartered in Islamabad, the USAID/DART has also established bases of operations in Muzaffarabad and Mansehra.
- In addition to the provision of sheets of tarpaulin, blankets, and winterized and non-winterized tents in support of the overall shelter strategy, USAID funded nine NGO partners to provide shelter assistance to approximately 75,500 households.
- To date, USAID's Office of Food for Peace (FFP) has responded to the U.N. World Food Program (WFP) emergency operation for Pakistan with 4,990 MT of vegetable oil and 480 MT of wheat soy blend. The total value of this contribution is approximately \$6.7 million.
- As of February 2, the U.S. Department of State's Bureau for Population, Refugees, and Migration (State/PRM) has contributed \$4 million to the Office of the U.N. High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) to support activities identified in the 2005 U.N. South Asia Earthquake Flash Appeal. Specific activities include the establishment and management of camps and spontaneous settlements for earthquake-affected populations and the provision of essential relief supplies such as tents, blankets, and stoves to camp residents. State/PRM also has contributed \$100,000 to the International Organization for Migration (IOM) to conduct prevention and assistance activities for populations vulnerable to traffickers in the aftermath of the earthquake.
- As of January 20, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has provided 46,000 MT of wheat, valued at \$12 million, to the GOP. This wheat will be distributed to food-insecure families lacking the financial means to purchase food.
- On October 20, USAID and Procter & Gamble announced a \$600,000 public-private alliance to provide safe drinking water for those affected by the earthquake. Through this partnership, USAID and Procter & Gamble are supplying a point-of-use water purification product that significantly reduces diarrheal illnesses. Through the Global Development Alliance (GDA), USAID contributed \$300,000 toward this partnership, which provides safe drinking water to more than 50,000 households for 3 months.
- As of February 2, the U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) has flown 4,133 helicopter missions, delivered 11,042 short tons of humanitarian relief supplies, evacuated 3,741 casualties, and transported 14,843 humanitarian relief workers and other passengers. The 212th Mobile Army Surgical Hospital (MASH), established on October 25 in Muzaffarabad, and a 3rd Marine Expeditionary Force medical element, established on November 16 in Shinkiari, have performed more than 472 surgeries and treated more than 29,644 non-surgical patients. To date, DOD has obligated \$106.6 million for relief operations.

India

- From October 11 to 17, a USAID/OFDA Regional Advisor was in India assisting USAID/India with damage and needs assessments and making recommendations regarding USG assistance. The USAID/OFDA Regional Advisor and a representative from USAID/India conducted a post-earthquake visit to Srinagar in Jammu and Kashmir on November 15 and 16 in order to monitor program progress of USAID/OFDA-funded partners.
- On October 10, U.S. Ambassador to India David C. Mulford issued a disaster declaration due to the effects of the October 8 earthquake in northern India. As of November 1, USAID has provided more than \$600,000 to relief organizations for emergency relief supplies and shelter.
- The Government of India did not request international assistance.
