CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Water and Sanitation

• On December 6, at least 22 water and sanitation agencies attended a WHO hygiene promotion workshop in El Fasher. The participants agreed to target a small number of high risk practices, use a baseline survey to ensure risk practices are identified and prioritized, and develop a routine monitoring and evaluation plan with hygiene promotion agencies at the same location. Many of the participating agencies are USAID/OFDA water and sanitation implementing partners.

Health

• On December 9, USAID/OFDA implementing partner Action Contre la Faim (ACF) released preliminary results from nutrition surveys conducted in Nyala town, from September 1 to 8, and in Abu Shouk IDP camp, from October 28 to November 6. The Nyala survey included IDPs and resident populations and found a global acute malnutrition (GAM) rate of 23.6 percent for children under five, well above WHO's emergency threshold of 15 percent. In addition, ACF found a 51.4 percent measles vaccination rate, well below 93 percent coverage rate. ACF noted that malnutrition was greater in peripheral areas outside of Nyala town center, which corresponds to the lack of health care access and poor sanitation in these areas. Prior to the September 1 to 8 survey, there were no general food distributions in Nyala. The ACF survey at Abu Shouk found a 27 percent GAM rate in children under five and a 12.4 percent measles vaccination rate.

Food Assistance

• On December 7, WFP reported that nearly 1.3 million conflict-affected beneficiaries, or 71 percent of the target caseload for Darfur, received 22,499 metric tons (MT) of food commodities in November. Distributions in North Darfur fell significantly short of target, with only 54 percent of beneficiaries reached due to clashes between the GOS and SLM/A forces.

According to WHO, the emergency threshold for under-five mortality is 2 deaths per 10,000 children under five per day.

• Preliminary results of the joint WFP and U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) crop and food supply assessment in Sudan are expected by mid-December. The joint assessment's results will be used to confirm WFP's projections for the Darfur Emergency Operation (EMOP) and will provide data for the design of USAID/OFDA's Food Security Support Program. Under the EMOP, WFP expects to increase its beneficiary caseload from 1.8 million in November 2004 to up to 2.8 million people during the "hungry season" from July to October 2005.

Eastern Chad

• According to the Department of State's Bureau of Population, Migration, and Refugees (State/PRM), there have been no recent significant border crossings into eastern Chad, and humanitarian operations in eastern Chad are shifting from emergency relief to consolidation and stabilization. However, the lives and livelihoods of the Chadian population near the refugee camps are deteriorating due to increased competition for scarce resources, an inadequate rainy season, and a poor harvest. As a result, State/PRM reports that relief agencies are increasingly responding to the needs of both the Darfuri refugees and the local Chadian population.

Increasing Insecurity

- According to the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), IDPs from the Tawilah area continue to move towards El Fasher, North Darfur, as a result of fighting in late November between the Government of Sudan (GOS), the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A), and GOS-allied Arab militia. A late November interagency assessment located 500 IDPs in Zam Zam camp, 1,000 in Galab camp, 2,000 in Dali camp, and approximately 6,000 others in villages south of Tawilah. At Abu Shouk camp, the Spanish Red Cross Society camp manager reported an estimated 12,000 to 14,000 IDPs arrived by December 2. Save the Children/U.K. (SC/UK) reported that Tawilah, formerly home to 40,000 residents and IDPs, is virtually empty.
- On December 4, OCHA/El Fasher established a task force, including the U.N., the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC), and non-governmental organizations (NGOs), to work with the GOS to select a new site for the IDPs from Tawilah. The task force and the GOS are reviewing potential sites based on security, space, and water. Abu Shouk and Zam Zam camps lack the capacity to expand due to inadequate water and security considerations, respectively.
- On December 7, the GOS informed OCHA of plans to conduct a counter-banditry operation on major roads of the El Fasher area. As a result, the U.N. closed roads which earlier that day had been declared safe for humanitarian operations for the first time since GOS and SLM/A fighting in Tawilah. A humanitarian convoy was unable to deliver assistance to the estimated 16,000 Tawilah IDPs in Thabit. According to the U.N. Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator, the African Union (AU) is investigating reports that, soon after the GOS announcement, major military activity occurred in the area between El Fasher and Nyala, particularly around Thabit.
- On December 5, the vehicles of two international NGOs in South Darfur were attacked. In SLM/A territory, a World Vision International (WVI) team in four clearly marked vehicles was fired upon after it was forced to exit the Khor Abeche area, 30 km east of Manawashi, following a dispute with the SLM/A over the size of its team. No WVI team members sustained injuries. In a separate incident, two clearly marked SC/UK vehicles were hijacked by bandits on the road between Nyala and Kass in South Darfur. The AU and GOS police investigated the incident, and the staff members and cars were returned. The USAID/DART reports that, as a result of this incident, several NGOs have decided to suspend travel along the Nyala-Kass road; this will complicate the movement of staff and materials from Nyala to Kass and to Zalingei.

International Efforts to Resolve the Crisis

- On December 4, the head of the AU observer mission to Sudan indicated that, as both the funding and troops are now ready, deployments of the 3,300-member AU force may be completed by December 2004 rather than the projected date of January 2005.
- On December 10, the GOS and the two main opposition groups, the SLM/A and the Justice and Equality Movement (JE4w round of talks in Abuja, Nigeria.
