CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Security

- On January 26, international media sources reported that more than 9,000 people were displaced following violent clashes during the past week in the village of Hamada, South Darfur. Although the number of deaths caused by the fighting has not been confirmed, a spokesman for the U.N. Advanced Mission in Sudan (UNAMIS) reported that up to 105 civilians may have been killed, with women and children making up the majority of the victims.
- According to the U.N., the security situation remains tense throughout Darfur, especially in the northern parts of West and South Darfur where incidents of violence have increased in the past week. On January 21, a convoy of opposition forces attacked the village of Al-Mallam in South Darfur, approximately 100 km north of Nyala, and between 24 and 36 people were reported killed and 26 others injured. On the same day, at least 20 people were killed when a large group of armed tribesmen attacked the village of Seleia in West Darfur. The African Union (AU) is investigating the incidents and the U.N. has declared all roads north of Sirba, West Darfur to be "no go" areas for U.N. operations.
- On January 25, the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA) appealed for the release of three national staff members that were abducted on December 16 while traveling through the then opposition-controlled area of Labado. Traveling in a humanitarian convoy, the three workers were part of a larger ADRA well drilling team that was carrying equipment and supplies to rehabilitate 65 damaged and abandoned wells and construct 45 new wells. On January 27, the Special Representative of the U.N. Secretary General for Sudan, Jan Pronk, issued a press release condemning attacks on humanitarian workers and calling for the immediate release of the ADRA staff.
- The Office of the U.N. Security Coordinator (UNSECOORD) reported on January 24 that the AU has established a permanent presence in Labado and Mujaharia, South Darfur, in response to recent insecurity in the area. Additional troops from Nigeria and Senegal are expected to deploy to Darfur in the coming days, increasing the current protection force to 1,365 troops.

Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs)

- According to UNSECOORD, Sudanese Red Crescent (SRC) food distributions have resumed in Abu Shouk camp in North Darfur, following recent violence. The U.N. reported that an IDP was killed by police in Abu Shouk camp on January 15 while collecting water at 2230 hours. The man was reportedly shot after attempting to flee police arrest for violating the camp curfew. Following the incident, an estimated 2,000 IDPs demonstrated in El Fasher; AU peacekeepers intervened to diffuse the situation.
- OCHA reports that technicians are continuing to search for water sources at the newly identified Sewalinga camp in North Darfur, which is delaying plans to relocate an estimated 18,900 IDPs currently living outside Abu Shouk camp. The U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) reports that sufficient stocks of plastic sheeting are available to meet requirements for the relocating population.
- Humanitarian agencies remain concerned about the impact of the cold weather on IDPs. According to UNJLC, the emergency relief supply common pipeline is supporting a targeted distribution of blankets and other items to vulnerable groups such as the elderly, disabled, pregnant and lactating women, malnourished children under five years old, and unaccompanied minors.

Food Security

• On January 26, members of the USAID/Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) and USAID/Khartoum staff began a 10-day joint assessment and program design mission with the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), WFP, and the European Union (EU) to determine whether a market support program will be necessary to help meet anticipated cereal shortages in Darfur. Analysis of production and consumption statistics as well as food aid deliveries for Darfur suggests a cereal shortfall of more than 200,000 metric tons (MT). Although local populations normally adopt a number of coping mechanisms to offset a reduction in the availability of cereals, prolonged insecurity and the resulting disruption of livelihood patterns may have undermined these mechanisms.

Food Assistance

- As of January 24, WFP has dispatched 21,375 MT of food by road and air from hubs in Khartoum and El Obeid to the Darfur state capitals. This represents 52 percent of WFP targets to date. WFP reports that insecurity, especially in South Darfur, has reduced the availability of commercial trucks in the market. Limited road deliveries due to the lack of commercial trucks from Port Sudan to Khartoum and El Obeid have also affected WFP operations. In an effort to increase road dispatches to Darfur, WFP has leased 200 additional trucks to augment the current leased fleet of 276 long-haul trucks.
- According to WFP, slow and fragmented food deliveries through the Libyan corridor are
 disrupting planned monthly distributions to refugees in camps in Chad. As a result, WFP has
 requested a loan of 2,000 MT of cereals from the Government of Chad's National Food Reserves
 in order to avert a break in the food pipeline.

U.S. Delegation

• From January 21 to 25, a congressional delegation led by Representative Ed Royce, Chairman of the Subcommittee on Africa, visited refugee camps in eastern Chad and border areas of West Darfur to assess the humanitarian situation. The delegation also met with members of the AU observer protection force as well as opposition groups in Darfur.
