CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

Security

- According to the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), on March 1, eight
 armed men stopped two non-governmental organization (NGO) vehicles in South Darfur along the
 road from Kass to Bulbul, looting cash but allowing the convoy to continue. On March 2, another
 NGO reported that one of its vehicles narrowly avoided an ambush along the same road and police
 in Bulbul report that private vehicles have encountered similar security problems. In response, the
 Office of the U.N. Security Coordinator (UNSECOORD) closed the Nyala-Kass road.
- The African Union (AU) is investigating a February 28 incident in Thur, 20 km north of Kass, in which unidentified armed men killed at least 16 internally displaced persons (IDP) near Salakoyo. According to U.N. sources, the number of persons killed may be as high as 26.

Protection

- On February 24, the U.N. reported that two teenage girls were raped on February 21 while collecting firewood outside of Otash IDP camp in Nyala, South Darfur. According to the U.N., a health clinic initially refused to treat the girls, as clinic staff had not yet been informed that victims are no longer required to report incidents of sexual assault to the police prior to receiving medical treatment. U.N. human rights officials are investigating reports that local authorities arrested the IDP leader who reported the incident at Otash camp, accusing him of reporting unfounded incidents.
- The U.N. reported on March 1 that the level of harassment experienced by women when they venture out of IDP camps in Zalingei, West Darfur appears to have significantly decreased since AU monitors began patrolling the area and escorting women to collect firewood.
- In North Darfur, the U.N. reports that the Interagency Protection Working Group is currently conducting an orientation session on protection issues to 49 newly arrived AU ceasefire monitors.

Food Assistance

- The USAID/DART reports that WFP will conduct a re-registration exercise of the entire Darfur caseload in March and April in order to correct redundant registrations and respond to the increasing demand for food assistance. In order to maintain an orderly process and avoid fraudulent enrollments, no prior announcement of the registration will be made.
- According to the USAID/DART, some NGOs have voiced concerns that potential beneficiaries may not seek food assistance until their coping mechanisms are exhausted and no food stocks remain.

Relief agencies report that registrations are increasing in supplementary and therapeutic feeding centers, confirming the fact that additional communities are beginning to lack sufficient food. In response, WFP reports that it is conducting an information campaign to inform people about the upcoming registration process.

Humanitarian Assistance

• In recognition of the vulnerability of Arab pastoralists, the U.N. has initiated a "Nomad Gap Group" in West Darfur to develop a strategy for assessing the needs of such groups and providing assistance. Humanitarian agencies have begun a series of meetings with members of the Arab pastoralist leadership in West Darfur to discuss community needs and problems such as looting or violent disruptions to humanitarian assistance by armed nomads. Assessing the needs of and ensuring access to Arab populations remains a major challenge.

Water and Sanitation

- Following a series of assessments, the USAID/DART reports that the supply of water for human and livestock consumption in North Darfur is critically low and declining. Rainfall in 2004 was approximately 50 percent less than in 2003, and the water tables are receding. These drought conditions, along with continued insecurity and a neglected water infrastructure, may result in large-scale population and livestock movements away from traditional grazing lands and watering points that are now dry. Predicted movements of population and livestock into IDP camps and towns in search of food and water will increase the existing high demand for water, further disrupt the already fragile economy, and increase tension and conflict. The U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) reports an immediate need to increase water production capacity in rural areas to prevent additional relocation.
- According to the USAID/DART, the Government of Sudan (GOS) reports the presence of an
 estimated 1,300 boreholes with hand pumps in North Darfur, although approximately half of these
 systems are not functional. In addition, only 40 percent of the approximately 166 water yards are
 reported to be operational. UNICEF is working with NGOs and the private sector to rehabilitate
 neglected infrastructure and increase drilling capacity.

Eastern Chad

- According to WFP, UNHCR has determined the number of Sudanese refugees in eastern Chad to be 213,314. This figure may be revised pending the results of an ongoing WFP/UNHCR registration exercise that has been completed in Farchana, Bredjing, and Treguine camps in the past week and is due to occur in Oure Cassoni during March.
- WFP reported on March 2 that a new refugee camp location, Gaga, has been identified east of Abeche in eastern Chad. According to Oxfam, the site has sufficient water levels to meet the needs of 15,000 to 20,000 refugees. A joint WFP/UNHCR mission is expected to visit the site on March 8 to meet with local authorities and review infrastructure requirements. Another site, Habib, has been identified, 180 km south of Abeche. According to satellite images, the site has adequate water levels, but may be difficult to access during the rainy season. Validation of the site will depend on a thorough assessment of access to the camp.
- On March 2, WFP reported completing distributions of the full 30-day ration in all refugee camps except Goz Amir and Djabal in the south, where WFP distributed only half of the cereal ration as a result of delays in the Libyan corridor. The rations in Goz Amir and Djabal will cover needs until mid-March, after which normal monthly distributions should resume. Approximately 2,285 MT of assorted commodities are currently in transit via the Libyan corridor.
