CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

United Nations

- According to U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan, the international community is not moving fast enough to address the "appalling situation" in Darfur. During a meeting with U.N. Security Council members on March 7, he reported that "the killing and raping and burning are still going on" in Darfur. He stated that there is general agreement for the African Union (AU) to continue its lead role in the security realm, as the AU presence has bettered the situation for populations in Darfur.
- The U.N. World Food Program (WFP) reported on March 9 that U.N. Under Secretary General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator Jan Egeland visited South Darfur on a recent four-day trip to Sudan. In Muhajariya, ERC Egeland met with Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) leaders to raise issues such as the abduction of relief workers and attacks on nongovernmental organization (NGO) and commercial vehicles. ERC Egeland also met with AU forces in Labado and visited the Al Sureif and Kalma internally displaced person (IDP) camps.

Security

- According to the USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART), incidents of banditry are on the rise in West Darfur. On March 8, two NGO vehicles were stopped outside Habila by armed attackers on horseback who looted the vehicles. On March 10, two humanitarian vehicles were stopped on the road between Geneina and Kerenik. One vehicle was allowed to proceed; however, money and communications equipment were stolen from the other vehicle.
- According to WFP, 12 WFP-sub contracted trucks were stolen in North Darfur during the past week. In the first incident, a driver en route from El Fasher to El Obeid escaped after his truck was fired upon. The truck, which was empty, remains missing. In the second incident, eight leased trucks were stolen in Al Kuma near Um Kadada. Four of these trucks were loaded with WFP commodities. In the third incident, three leased trucks that were empty were stolen in Sherif Katashi. One driver was injured and the convoy leader was detained.
- WFP reports that the organization is preparing to deploy an additional six security professionals to perform security assessments from March to June 2005. The security assessments will assist in the expansion of WFP food assistance, which is currently distributed predominately in IDP locations.

IDP Returns

- According to the USAID/DART, the Government of Sudan (GOS) and the humanitarian community have agreed upon 10 villages to be rehabilitated to encourage IDP returns in West Darfur. At a workshop on returns chaired by the GOS Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) in Geneina on March 2 to 3, representatives from a variety of GOS ministries, civil society representatives, and humanitarian agencies chose seven GOS-selected sites (out of a proposed 76) as well as three sites selected by the international humanitarian community that were not among the villages originally proposed by the GOS.
- The U.N. reported that the following criteria were used to choose the villages selected for rehabilitation: medium-sized villages that are places of origin, places where return has already taken place, locations that are part of a cluster of villages, and villages that have adequate security to enable returns. Humanitarian agencies emphasized that sustained peace remains a prerequisite for any large-scale rehabilitation or development projects.

Shelter

• The USAID/DART reported that USAID Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA) implementing partner Catholic Relief Services (CRS) is conducting innovative shelter projects in Sirba and Bir Dagig IDP camps in West Darfur. The conical, straw-thatch shelter design has a number of advantages over the traditional rectangular, flat roof design that is used in most IDP camps in Darfur. In Bir Dagig, CRS has effectively 'expanded' a current village by designing an IDP camp alongside it. Host communities have been supportive of the IDP camp, as they are from the same tribal family and have access to the same services as the IDPs.

Food Assistance

- WFP reported that, as of March 6, a total of 7,963 metric tons (MT) of food were dispatched by road and air from Khartoum and El Obeid to the Darfur state capitals, representing 22 percent of the monthly distribution plan of 36,795 MT and 18 percent of the overall monthly dispatch plan of 43,120 MT. WFP is currently pre-positioning commodities in West Darfur in advance of the rainy season to prevent the disruption of food distributions.
- WFP reported on March 9 that two vessels containing a total of 65,847 MT of wheat provided by the USAID Office of Food for Peace (USAID/FFP) through the Bill Emerson Trust arrived in February. The first vessel, *Atlantica*, containing 20,847 MT, arrived on February 18, and WFP discharged the vessel from February 19 to 24 at an average discharge rate of 3,000 MT per day. The second vessel, *Liberty Glory*, arrived on February 28 with 45,000 MT. The Liberty Glory was discharged at an average rate of 5,000 MT per day; discharge was expected to finish on March 10.

Beneficiary Registration

• In order to improve the targeting of current beneficiaries and give a more accurate estimate on the number of conflict-affected persons, WFP has launched a Darfur-wide registration exercise of IDP food beneficiaries. According to the U.N., in Kutum town and Kutum rural in North Darfur the exercise commenced on March 1, where an implementing NGO provided tokens to approximately 85,000 persons and the exercise was judged a success. However, in Kalma camp in South Darfur, a March 6 re-registration was cancelled until further notice partly due to logistical constraints and security concerns including disturbances by IDP leaders.

Health

According to the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO), nearly 1.4 million IDPs are currently
covered through the early warning surveillance system in the greater Darfur region. This number
represents approximately 77 percent of the total IDPs living in Darfur region or 59 percent of the
total conflict-affected population in Darfur. WHO reported on March 8 that acute respiratory tract
infection, clinically-diagnosed malaria, and bloody diarrhea continue to contribute significantly to
the overall disease burden in the Darfur IDP camps.
