CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION

U.S. Delegation

• On July 21, U.S. Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice visited Sudan, accompanied by USAID Administrator Andrew S. Natsios. After meeting with Sudanese President Umar Hassan Ahmad al-Bashir in Khartoum, Secretary Rice flew to North Darfur to meet with representatives of the U.N. and non-governmental organizations (NGOs) and visit USAID/OFDA-funded humanitarian assistance programs in Abu Shouk internally displaced persons (IDP) camp. Secretary Rice held a private meeting with women IDPs to discuss conditions in the camp, as well as the issue of sexual violence against women.

Security

• The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) reports that a shooting incident occurred in Mornei IDP camp in West Darfur on July 16. IDPs reportedly opened fire during the food distribution and Government of Sudan (GOS) police responded by firing into the air and then the crowds. Two people were killed and the Médecins sans Frontières (MSF) clinic treated approximately 20 injured. NGOs left the camp immediately following the incident. Some have since returned in limited capacity; however, most continue to wait for approval from OCHA.

Re-registration

- According to the USAID/DART, the headcount in Kass IDP camp in South Darfur was conducted successfully on July 17. Two previous headcount attempts failed because IDPs thought that the headcount and food re-registration processes were connected to relocation campaigns. Given that the headcount occurred prior to the food distribution, IDPs expect that food commodities will be distributed shortly. IDPs and humanitarian relief agencies expressed concern about the condition of food commodities staged in the area for several weeks and exposed to rains.
- The USAID/DART reports that the Kalma IDP camp headcount to ascertain accurate numbers for food distributions is scheduled for August 1. Planning for the headcount is ongoing with World Vision, WFP's implementing partner in Kalma, as the lead agency. World Vision has held technical meetings with the sheikhs and NGOs working in Kalma on the procedures to be followed during the headcount. In addition, World Vision has met informally with sheikhs in each sector of the camp to underline the importance of the headcount and to discuss security. World Vision is working to

obtain GOS police troops to provide security on the outside of the camp to prevent people from entering the camp during the headcount and falsely registering.

Nutrition

• The U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) released the results of a series of malnutrition surveys conducted throughout North Darfur in May and June 2005. MSF/Spain (MSF/S) conducted the first nutritional survey in Zam Zam camp and reported a global acute malnutrition (GAM) rate of 24 percent. In Abu Shouk camp, Action Contre la Faim (ACF) reported 26 percent GAM. While the recent results in Abu Shouk represent an improvement over previous GAM rates—28 percent in December 2004 and 39 percent in June 2004—ACF also reported continued high levels of admissions and repeat cases at supplementary feeding centers (SFCs) and therapeutic feeding centers (TFCs), as well as increased defaulter rates coinciding with the current cultivating season when families leave to work in the fields.

Kalma Camp

- The USAID/DART reports that MSF/Holland is scheduled to pull out of Kalma camp in South Darfur by August 17. MSF/H will hand over water and sanitation activities to the GOS Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES) Office and UNICEF. Médecins du Monde (MDM) and the International Rescue Committee (IRC) will take over clinical services in the camp. In the event of a disease outbreak, MSF/H has agreed to assist in the response.
- Following visits to Kalma camp, the USAID/DART reported that heavy rains in early July had adversely affected more than 3,640 households, through displacement or loss of food and household goods. The rainfall caused damage to IDP shelters, schools, and latrines. The Norwegian Refugee Committee (NRC), the camp coordinator, reported that the rainfall affected 700 to 800 latrines, or approximately 10 percent of latrines. The USAID/DART observed standing water throughout the camp, raising concerns of a possible increase in malaria cases. According to the USAID/DART, the drainage ditch along the main road in Kalma proved to be effective, prompting NRC to train and provide IDPs with tools to individually construct drainage from shelters to the main ditch. Prior to the rains, IDPs in Sector 1 constructed a dam three sandbags high, which was successful in protecting one of the most heavily populated areas of the camp. UNICEF and WES are currently conducting a topographic survey to determine the potential for further damage during upcoming rains. The USAID/DART indicated that additional preparation, including ditches and dams, is needed to prevent further damage from rains expected in August.

Sanitation

• Despite a recent hygiene promotion campaign carried out in IDP camps throughout Darfur, diarrhea and other water-borne diseases remain prevalent causes of morbidity among the IDP population, according to the U.N. World Health Organization (WHO). The USAID/DART reports that the current soap ration utilized by WFP and the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) is 250 g. The USAID/DART recommends that the minimum soap ration should be no less than the Sphere humanitarian guideline of 450 g, and that soap distribution should be done simultaneously with food distribution.

Livelihoods

NRC reports removing 807 dead animals—primarily donkeys—from Kalma camp in the first six
months of the year. NRC also removed more than 100 goats, 26 horses, and at least 1 camel. The
dead animals represent not only lost livelihoods, but are also a major health concern. During a
recent USAID/DART assessment, approximately 50 percent of the animals, particularly donkeys,
appeared emaciated and in poor condition.

Locusts

On July 21, the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) reported that locust breeding is in
progress in West and North Darfur, as well as in eastern Chad. The extent of the locust population
in Darfur is uncertain because of the difficulty to access the infested areas due to security concerns
and recent flooding. FAO warned that an outbreak could develop in Sudan considering the good
rains and limited ground control operations.
