### **CURRENT HUMANITARIAN SITUATION**

Security

- In a monthly U.N. report on Darfur, U.N. Secretary General Kofi Annan criticized the Sudan Liberation Movement/Army (SLM/A) and the Justice and Equality Movement (JEM) for the rise in abductions, looting, and banditry targeting civilians and humanitarian workers. Secretary General Annan warned that despite decreasing casualties, sustained conflict is causing serious long-term damage to Darfur's social and economic networks.
- The U.N. Mission in Sudan (UNMIS) reported that U.N. agencies, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), and IDPs continue to be targeted for attacks throughout Darfur. On August 13, a group of *jingaweit* reportedly attacked IDPs who returned from Kalma camp to Surman Jago village, South Darfur, according to WFP. Also on August 13, armed bandits robbed passengers in two NGO vehicles near Habilah Kanary, between Sisi and Geneina, West Darfur, WFP reported.

# Humanitarian Access

- On August 11, following negotiations with the U.N., the SLM/A pledged to permit the safe and immediate return of local NGOs to Zam Zam camp in North Darfur, according to OCHA. The SLM/A had denied local NGOs access to the camp in July.
- After receiving \$5 million in USAID/OFDA funding, the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC) plans to resume flights delivering relief commodities to affected populations in Darfur. UNJLC expects this funding to support flights for at least two months. The flights have been suspended since mid-June due to insufficient funding. The USAID Disaster Assistance Response Team (USAID/DART) reports that UNJLC and other partners have agreed that transporting medicine and medical supplies is the top priority.

### Food Assistance

• The USAID/DART reported that food distributions resumed August 17 in eight IDP camps in and around Geneina, West Darfur. Distributions had not taken place in the camps since May 2005 due to difficulties in obtaining accurate registration figures from some IDP leaders. As a precautionary measure, small groups of African Union protection forces will patrol the camps during the distributions.

#### Rains

- Recent heavy rains in and around El Fasher, North Darfur, have caused serious damage and population displacement, particularly in Abu Shouk IDP camp. According to the U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the Government of Sudan (GOS) Office of Water and Environmental Sanitation (WES), the flooding displaced approximately 2,000 families in the area of El Fasher. Additionally, both El Fasher town and Abu Shouk camp water supplies sustained damage. To address urgent water needs, UNICEF and WES are currently conducting chlorination activities in all 34 wells in Abu Shouk camp. The U.N. World Health Organization (WHO) expressed concern about the potential for an outbreak of watery diarrhea and malaria in the coming weeks and plans to address the situation.
- According to the USAID/DART, the humanitarian situation in Ardamata IDP camp, West
  Darfur, is dire due to severe flooding caused by the heaviest rains in 20 years. The flooding
  has affected 900 families, destroyed 300 homes, and resulted in the collapse of 900 latrines,
  contaminating the camp water supply. Humanitarian agencies have formed a task force to
  address concerns in Ardamata camp, including possible disease outbreaks and the urgent need
  for water, shelter, and latrines. The USAID/DART is coordinating with Catholic Relief
  Services to support shelter reconstruction, site planning, and the provision of plastic sheeting.

### Kalma Camp

• Negotiations between the Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) and the GOS Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) over whether NRC will remain the Kalma camp coordinator are expected to continue in the coming days, the USAID/DART reports. On August 15, NRC and HAC extended for one week the expired agreement designating NRC as camp coordinator.

### Health

- At the August 18 Cholera and Malaria Preparedness meeting in Khartoum, UNJLC reported that only 28 percent of the WHO mosquito nets required for 2005 had been resourced to date. UNICEF and UNJLC recently procured 50,000 nets from non-WHO sources. UNJLC will transport 25,000 nets to South Darfur, 10,000 to North Darfur, and 15,000 to West Darfur in the coming days.
- At the August 18 meeting, the GOS Ministry of Health and WHO reported that despite concerns, there have been no suspected or confirmed cases of cholera this year.
- The USAID/DART reported that the sixth round of the national polio vaccination campaign is scheduled for August 20 to 22. Vaccinations will occur throughout Darfur.

### Food Security and Nutrition

- UNICEF and WFP plan to conduct field work for the annual food security and nutrition assessment during the first three weeks of September. The assessment will address issues related to markets, agriculture, personal assets, and population movements. The assessment sample will include 3 million IDPs and residents and will cover the Darfur states. UNICEF and WFP plan to publish the findings by the end of October.
- Action by Churches Together International (ACT) and Caritas jointly conducted a nutrition survey in Zalingei, West Darfur, and surrounding camps in July and August 2005. ACT and Caritas reported that although mortality rates were lower than emergency thresholds, the malnutrition levels in both the town and camps warrant concern, especially among children ages 6–24 months.
