Sudan - Complex Emergency

Situation Report #18, Fiscal Year (FY) 2007

October 2, 2007

Note: The last situation report was dated August 31, 2007.

BACKGROUND

In 2007, Sudan continues to cope with the effects of conflict, displacement, and insecurity countrywide. During more than two decades of conflict between the former Government of Sudan (GOS) and the southern-based Sudan People's Liberation Movement/Army (SPLM/A), fighting, famine, and disease killed more than 2 million people, forced an estimated 600,000 to seek refuge in neighboring countries, and displaced 4 million others within Sudan—the largest internally displaced person (IDP) population in the world. The former GOS and the SPLM signed the Comprehensive Peace Agreement (CPA) and formed the joint Government of National Unity (GNU) in 2005, officially ending the North-South conflict. The U.N. estimates that more than 1 million displaced people returned to Southern Sudan and the Three Areas from 2005 to 2007, taxing scarce resources and weak infrastructure.

Conflict in Sudan's western region of Darfur has entered its fourth year, despite a peace agreement between the GNU and one faction of the Sudan Liberation Army (SLA), signed in May 2006. Fighting among armed opposition group factions, Sudanese Armed Forces (SAF), and militias persisted throughout 2006 and 2007, displacing hundreds of thousands of civilians. The complex emergency in Darfur affects approximately 4.2 million people.

The U.S. Government (USG) is the leading international donor to Sudan and has contributed more than \$2.7 billion for humanitarian programs in Sudan and eastern Chad since FY 2004. The U.S. Mission in Sudan has declared disasters due to the complex emergency on an annual basis since 1987. On October 16, 2006, U.S. Chargé d'Affaires Cameron R. Hume renewed the Sudan disaster declaration for FY 2007. The USG continues to lead the international effort to support implementation of the CPA, while providing for the humanitarian needs of conflict-affected populations throughout the country.

CURRENT SITUATION IN DARFUR

In September, aerial bombardments, Arab militia attacks, and fighting involving armed opposition groups and government-aligned militias continued to displace civilians. In addition, aid workers continued to face a dangerous and highly insecure operating environment, which limited access to vulnerable populations. Throughout September, a Sudanese government policy requiring all vehicles to travel with a military escort from El Obeid, a logistical hub in Northern Kordofan State, to Darfur hindered the

transport of food aid, fuel, and other commodities.

Security and Humanitarian Access

According to a U.N. press release, attacks against aid workers increased by 150 percent from June 2006 to June 2007. From January to September 2007, violence against aid workers has resulted in 5 deaths, 11 injuries, and 66 physical assaults, according to OCHA. During this time period, various armed groups have carjacked 98 humanitarian vehicles, attacked 61

convoys, and abducted 105 relief staff during carjacking incidents.

On September 20, three staff from USAID partner World Vision were medically evacuated from Darfur after sustaining serious gunshot wounds during an ambush. Eight non-governmental organization (NGO) staff were traveling in a clearly marked humanitarian convoy that came under fire near Bulbul Timbisgo, South Darfur. World Vision implements USAID food aid, health, food security and agriculture, and water, sanitation, and hygiene programs in South Darfur.

From mid-August to mid-September, the Sudanese government did not permit travel on the road to Nertiti, West Darfur, restricting humanitarian access to conflict-affected populations in Jebel Marra, West Darfur. Due to increasingly volatile conditions in IDP camps, resulting from the presence of armed men and tensions between pro- and anti-government groups, the U.N. advised the humanitarian community to reduce its presence in some IDP camps, including Abu Shouk and As Salaam camps in El Fasher, North Darfur.

Despite a general decline in security and access in September, USAID staff noted improved access in Kutum locality, North Darfur. After suspending activities in early 2006, USAID partner the International Rescue Committee (IRC) has reopened five health facilities and initiated well and water pump repairs in Hashaba. USAID partner GOAL resumed activities in rural Kutum and Birmaza in September.

The high-level committee overseeing the implementation of the Joint Communiqué on the facilitation of humanitarian affairs in Darfur met twice in Khartoum, on September 1 and 24. U.S Chargé d'Affaires Alberto M. Fernandez attended the meetings as the international donor observer. The Tripartite Joint Technical Committee has completed the General Directory of Procedures for NGOs and the Darfur Fast Track Annexes, which were officially released on September 23. The documents provide guidance on administrative procedures for NGOs operating in Sudan and will be translated into Arabic and circulated.

Displacement

In recent weeks, aid agencies have reported newly arrived IDPs in Shearia, Muhajeria, Ed Daein, and Adila localities in South Darfur, as well as western Jebel Marra in West Darfur. On September 10 and 11, fighting and SAF aerial bombardment resulted in 25 deaths and the displacement of an estimated 25,000 people from Haskanita, North Darfur, according to U.N. reports. People displaced from fighting in Haskanita are believed to have begun arriving in Ed Daein and Adila localities, according to USAID field staff. Continuing insecurity has significantly limited access, humanitarian assistance, and efforts to assess the needs and verify the number of people displaced.

Population Movement

In South Darfur, the GNU Humanitarian Aid Commission (HAC) has reported that more than 80 villages have recently received returnees. However, International Organization for Migration (IOM) verification assessments conducted in September did not find returnees in Mershing, Damra, or Duma areas in South Darfur. In some locations, IOM identified seasonal returns, where male household members temporarily return to areas of origin to plant and tend fields. During IOM interviews, IDPs indicated that continuing insecurity is the major obstacle to return.

Health

In Darfur, the health situation remains stable, with no major disease outbreaks in September. However, due to the prolonged rainy season, the number of malaria cases reported in September has exceeded expected levels. Humanitarian agencies are distributing insecticide-treated mosquito nets throughout Darfur to help prevent additional malaria cases. Health organizations continue to monitor acute jaundice syndrome cases, which first emerged in January 2007. Most recently, relief organizations have reported acute jaundice syndrome cases in Kass IDP camp in northern South Darfur. Agencies in Kass are working to improve the availability of safe drinking water and sanitation facilities for more than 118,000 IDPs.

Nutrition

From September 14 to 22, a consultant from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) visited Nyala, El Geneina, and El Fasher to meet with U.N. and NGO partners as part of a USAID nutrition assessment examining the recent increase in malnutrition rates in Darfur. The consultant reported the presence of multiple contributing factors, including persistent insecurity resulting in reduced humanitarian access and inconsistent services for beneficiaries; population movement and repeated displacement; inadequate breastfeeding and weaning practices; disruption of child care due to the absence of mothers involved in income-generation activities outside the home; late detection and treatment of moderate malnutrition; and high feeding program default rates.

During a two-day meeting the week of September 24, participants from the GNU Ministry of Health, NGOs, and U.N. agencies reviewed the current nutritional situation and the surveillance programs. Participants discussed how to strategically address malnutrition through prevention, treatment, and information gathering and analysis. The U.N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) is studying the underlying causes of malnutrition and plans to share results in November.

CURRENT SITUATION IN SUDAN, EXCLUDING DARFUR

In September, a third wave of flooding affected communities in White Nile and Southern Kordofan states. Humanitarian agencies continue to respond to flood-affected communities throughout central, eastern, and southern states. Returns programs continued on a limited basis, as organizations prepare for the resumption of full-scale returns operations after the rainy season ends in October.

Flooding

In September, excessive rainfall and flooding continued to affect Sudan. According to the U.N. Resident and Humanitarian Coordinator's Office (RCO), flooding during the last week of August and the first week of September increased the countrywide flood-affected population to more than 500,000. Most new damage occurred in Southern Kordofan State, where flooding destroyed or damaged an estimated 15,000 houses, affected approximately 143,000 people, and resulted in the loss of more than 13,000 livestock. Kadugli area is the most affected in the state.

Heavy rainfall in early September also resulted in flooding in White Nile State, affecting an estimated 180,000 people. Kosti town was the most affected area with an estimated 115,000 people affected, according to local authorities. During the same time period, in Northern Bahr el Ghazal State, the RCO reported that

heavy rainfall had caused displacement in Aweil town, bringing the estimated total flood-affected population to 23,000 people statewide.

On September 6, USAID staff visited Mayo Farms IDP camp in Khartoum State to observe the distribution of relief items, including blankets, water containers, and USAID-provided plastic sheeting, for 858 flood-affected households organized by the Sudanese NGO the Sudan Social Development Organization (SUDO) and the U.N. Joint Logistics Center (UNJLC). More than 15,000 IDPs live in Mayo camp, which is the most flood-affected IDP camp in the state. USAID has provided approximately \$1.6 million to support flood-response activities in affected areas in northern, eastern, and southern states.

Returns

Limited returns operations continue, but rain and flooding have made road travel difficult. On September 13, the first GNU-assisted returns began arriving in Abyei, according to the RCO. The GNU helped organize and transport approximately 1,600 Ngok Dinka returnees from Sinnar State to Abyei. A second GNU-assisted group of approximately 1,000 Ngok Dinka residing in Port Sudan is scheduled to arrive in Abyei on October 10. Returns organizations are currently preparing to resume organized returns operations when the rains subside.
